(SWINE-FEVER.)

AT the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 10th day of January, 1888.

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1886, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The following Area (namely),—the parish of Benwick, in the Liberty of the Isle of Ely,—which was declared by Order of Council dated the eighth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, to be an Area infected with swine-fever, is hereby declared to be free from swine-fever, and that Area shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an Area infected with swine-fever.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the eleventh day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight.
