(PLEURO-PNEUMONIA.)

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1886, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The following Area (namely),—those parts of the parishes of Bothwell and Shotts lying to the north of the highway leading from Glasgow to Edinburgh by way of Holytown and Newhouse, in the county of Lanark,—which was declared by Order of Council to be an Area infected with pleuro-pneumonia, is hereby declared to be free from pleuro-pneumonia, and that Area shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an Area infected with pleuro-pneumonia.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the twelfth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight.

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for the Colonies the following copy of a Notice, dated 2nd ultimo, recently issued by the Government of Cyprus respecting arrivals in that island from Rhodes:—

In consequence of an outbreak of small-pox at Rhodes, His Excellency the Officer Administering the Government, under the power and authority vested in him by "The Infectious Diseases Prevention Ordinance, 1883," has been pleased to order that all passengers arriving thence will be submitted to the following regulations before being allowed to land in Cyprus:—

Any vessel arriving at any port in Cyprus, except Larnaca, from any part of Rhodes with passengers for Cyprus is to be medically inspected before being admitted to pratique, and, in the event of their being any case, or suspected case, of small-pox on board, pratique will be refused, and the vessel is to be ordered to proceed to Larnaca, a note to that effect being made on the bill of health, and the Chief Medical Officer is to be at once informed of the fact by telegram.

All arrivals at Larnaca from any part of Rhodes are to be carefully inspected before being admitted to pratique, and for further security all persons wishing to land are to be carefully visited on the end of the pier, in accordance with instructions issued by the Chief Medical Officer.

In the event of any such person being found to be affected with small-pox, the said person, with his relations, friends, and servants accompanying him, if any, will be isolated in quarantine, and the Chief Medical Officer is to be immediately advised of the fact by telegram.
