In order to carry out the existing regulations, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Lady who is to make the presentation, of her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command, that no presentations shall be made at the Drawing Rooms, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be very distinctly written upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them.

It is not expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at the Drawing Rooms, except in attendance on the Ladies of their families.

Any Gentleman who under these circumstances should desire to be presented, will observe the

same regulations as are in force for Her Majesty's Levees.

In order to carry out the existing regulations that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding " of benefices in plurality, and to make better " provision for the residence of the clergy," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That whenever it " shall appear to the Archbishop of the province, " with respect to his own diocese, and whenever " it shall be represented to him by the Bishop of "any diocese, or by the Bishops of any two "dioceses, that two or more benefices, or that " one or more benefice or benefices, and one or "more spiritual sinecure rectory or rectories, "vicarage or vicarages, in his or their diocese " or dioceses, being either in the same parish or " contiguous to each other, and of which the "aggregate population shall not exceed one "thousand five hundred persons, may, with " advantage to the interests of religion, be united " into one benefice, the said Archbishop of the " province shall inquire into the circumstances of " the case; and if on such inquiry it shall appear " to him that such union may be usefully made, " and will not be of inconvenient extent, and that " the patron or patrons of the said benefices, sine-" cure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages " respectively, is or are consenting thereto, such " consent being signified in writing under the bands " of such patron or patrons, the said Archbishop " shall, six weeks before certifying such inquiry "and consent to Her Majesty as hereinafter " directed, cause, with respect to his own diocese, " a statement in writing of the facts, and in other " cases a copy in writing of the aforesaid repre-"sentation to be affixed on or near the principal " outer door of the church, or in some public and " conspicuous place in each of such benefices, sine-" cure rectories, or vicarages, with notice to any " person or persons interested, that he, she, or they, " may, within such six weeks, show cause in writing " under his, her, or their hand or hands, to the " said Archbishop, against such union ; and if no " sufficient cause be shown within such time, the " said Archbishop shall certify the inquiry and con-

" sent aforesaid to Her Majesty in Council, and " thereupon it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in " Council to make and issue an Order or Orders " for uniting such benefices, sinecure rectory or " rectories, vicarage or vicarages, into one benefice, " with cure of souls, for ecclesiastical purposes only; " and it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council " to give directions for regulating the course and " succession in which the patrons, if there be more " than one patron, shall present or nominate to " such united benefice, from time to time, as the " same shall become vacant."

And whereas the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury pursuant to the provisions of the said Act, hath duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a certificate in writing, bearing date the fifth day of January, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, in the words and figures following, that is to say :--

#### "To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We Edward White by Divine Providence Archbishop of Canterbury do hereby in pursuance of the Act of Parliament made and passed in the first and second years of Your Majesty's reign chapter 106 certify to Your Majesty in Council that it having appeared to us that the benefice (being a rectory) of Saint Margaret and the united benefice consisting of the rectory of Saint Andrew with the rectory of Saint Marg Bredman all in the city of Canterbury within our diocese and province of Canterbury might with advantage to the interests of religion be united into one benefice for ecclesiastical purposes we enquired into the circumstances of the case and on such enquiry there appeared as follows (that is to say):--

"That the benefices are contiguous and the union will not be of inconvenient extent.

"That the aggregate population of the parishes of Saint Margaret Saint Andrew and Saint Mary Bredman according to the latest returns of population made under the authority of Parliament does not exceed one thousand two hundred and twenty-six persons—the population of the said parish of Saint Margaret being five hundred and thirty-nine the population of the said parish of Saint Andrew being four hundred and twenty and the population of the said parish of Saint Mary Bredman being two hundred and sixty-seven.

"That there is a church belonging to the benefice of Saint Margaret. There is also a church situate in the parish of Saint Mary Bredman for the united benefice of Saint Andrew with Saint Mary Bredman. The churches are distant about one hundred yards from each other.

"That there is a house of residence belonging to the benefice of Saint Margaret. It is situate in a very close and unhealthy place.

"That there is a house of residence belonging to the benefice of Saint Andrew with Saint Mary Bredman. It is an excellent and nearly new house but remote from the parishes.

"That the net yearly value of the said benefice of Saint Margaret is forty-five pounds or thereabouts and the net yearly value of the said united benefice of Saint Andrew with Saint Mary Bredman is one hundred and eighty-two pounds or thereabouts.

"That the patronage of the said benefice of Saint Margaret belongs to the Right Reverend Edward Lord Bishop of Dover Archdeacon of the Archdeanconry of Canterbury in right of his Archdeaconry and the patronage of the said united benefice of Saint Andrew with Saint Mary Bredman belongs to us the said Archbishop in right of our Archbishoprick.

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"We and the said Lord Bishop of Dover consent to the union of the said two benefices for ecclesiastical purposes only and that the course and succession in which the respective patrons for the time being shell collate present or nominate to the said benefices after the same shall be united into one benefice from time to time as the same shall become vacant shall be as follows that is to say the Archbishop of Canterbury for the time being shall be entitled to the first and second turns in every three turns and the Archdeacon of Canterbury for the time being shall be entitled to every third turn.

"That six weeks and upwards before certifying such inquiry and consents to Your Majesty in Council we caused a statement in writing of the aforesaid facts to be affixed to the principal outer door of the parish churches of Saint Margaret and Saint Mary Bredman and in a public and conspicuous place namely in a place where parish notices are usually affixed in the parish of Saint Andrew there being no church in that parish with notice to any person or persons interested that he she or they might within such six weeks show cause in writing under his her or their hand or hands to us the said Archbishop against such union and no such cause has been shown.

"The copies of the statement of facts and notice before referred to and the consent of the patrons before mentioned are hereunto annexed.

"And we do hereby certify the enquiry consents and matters aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for uniting the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes and for declaring that the course and succession in which the respective patrons for the time being shall collate present or nominate to the said benefices after the same shall be united into one benefice from time to time as the same shall become vacant shall be as follows that is to say the Archbishop of Canterbury for the time being shall be entitled to the first and second turns in every three turns and the Archdeacon of Canterbury for the time being shall be entitled to every third turn. As witness our hand this fifth day of January in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and " Edw. Cantuar." eighty-eight.

Now therefore Her Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of Her said Council is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the rectory of Saint Margaret situate in the city and diocese of Canterbury, and the rectory of Saint Andrew with the rectory of Saint Mary Bredman, situate in the same city and diocese, shall be united into one benefice with curc of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only.

And Her Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is further pleased to direct that the course and succession in which the respective patrons for the time being shall collate, present, or nominate to the said benefices, after the same shall be united into one benefice, from time to time as the same shall become vacant, shall be as follows that is to say—the Archbishop of Canterbury, for the time being, shall be entitled to the first and second turns in every three turns, and the Archdeacon of Canterbury, for the time being, shall be entitled to every third turn.

#### PRESENT,

### The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council-

HEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of the Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding "of benefices in plurality, and to make better "provision for the residence of the clergy," after reciting that, "Whereas from the increase of " population, or from other circumstances, it may " be expedient that two or more benefices which "have been heretofore united or which may be "hereafter united under the provisions of this "Act should be disunited," it is amongst other things enacted, "That when two or more benefices "shall have been united, or may be hereafter " united into one benefice, and with respect to " his own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop " of the Province, or the Bishop of any diocese "shall represent to the said Archbishop of the "Province, that one or more of the benefices " within his diocese, of which such united benefice " shall consist, may be separated therefrom with "advantage to the interests of religion, the said "Archbishop shall inquire into the circumstances " of the case ; and if on such inquiry it shall ap-"pear to him that such union may be usefully "dissolved, so far as respects such benefice or " benefices, he shall, six weeks at least before " certifying such inquiry to Her Majesty as here-"inafter directed, cause, with respect to his own "diocese, a statement, in writing, of the facts, " and in all other cases a copy, in writing, of "the aforesaid representation to be affixed on or "near the principal outer door of the church " or in some public and conspicuous place in " each of the benefices forming part of the united " benefice, with notice to any person or persons " interested that he, she, or they may within such " six weeks show cause, in writing, under his, her, " or their hands to the said Archbishop against "any such disunion; and if no sufficient cause " be shown within such time, the Archbishop shall " certify the inquiry and consent, when the patron's " consent is necessary, to Her Majesty in Council, " and thereupon it shall be lawful for Her Majesty "to issue an Order for separating such last-" mentioned benefice or benefices from such united " benefice, and for declaring the rights of patronage " of the several patrons, if there be more than one " patron, and such Order shall be registered in the " registry of the diocese to which such united " benefice shall belong, which Order the Registrar "of such diocese, immediately on the receipt " thereof, is hereby required to register accordingly, " and thereupon immediately if such united benefice "shall be then vacant, otherwise on the first " avoidance thereof, such union shall be ipso facto " dissolved, so far only as regards such benefice or " benefices so proposed to be separated from such " united benefice, but in all other respects shall " remain in full force and effect, and thenceforward " such last-mentioned benefice or benefices shall be " and be deemed and taken to be a separate and " distinct benefice or benefices to all intents and pur-" poses whatever as if no such union had taken place, and the patron or patrons thereof shall and may " " according to the terms of such Order present or " nominate thereto respectively, and so from time " to time upon each and every avoidance of the " same : Provided always, that no benefices which " have been united for more than sixty years " before the passing of this Act shall be disunited

" without the consent in writing of the patron or " patrons thereof."

And whereas by the hereinbefore in part recited Act, it is, amongst other things, further enacted that "it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in " Council, on the recommendation of the Arch-" bishop of the Province, with the consent of "the patron or patrons of such benefices "respectively (such consent to be signified in "writing under the hands of such patron or "patrons) to assign and attach such portion of "the glebe lands, tithes, moduses, rent-charges, "or other endowments or emoluments be-"longing to or arising or accruing within the "limits of such united benefice to each of such " benefices respectively, as to Her Majesty in "Council shall seem fit, notwithstanding such proportion of glebe land, tithes, rent-charges, "moduses, or other endowments or emoluments, " or any part thereof, may not arise or accrue " within the limits of the benefice to which the " same shall be so assigned and attached as afore-" said, or may not have belonged thereto, and also " to divide and apportion between such benefices " all such charges and outgoings as before the " disunion thereof were imposed upon the whole " united benefice."

And whereas on the twenty-fourth day of January one thousand eight hundred and eightyeight the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Edward White, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, oursuant to the enactment aforesaid, certified to Her Majesty in Council as follows that is to say :--

#### "To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Edward White Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury Primate of all England and Metropolitan do hereby certify to Your Majesty in Council.

"That the rectory of All Saints the rectory of Saint Mary-in-the-Castle and the rectory of Saint Mildred all in the city of Canterbury and our diocese of Canterbury having been united into one benefice and it having appeared to us that the benefice of All Saints being one of the benefices of which such united benefice consists might be separated therefrom with advantage to the interests of religion we inquired into the circumstances of the case and on such inquiry it appeared to us—

<sup>7</sup> That such union might be usefully dissolved so far as respects such benefice of All Saints.

"That according to the latest returns of population made under the authority of Parliament the population of the parish of All Saints aforesaid is 349 the population of the parish of Saint Mary-in-the-Castle is 65 and the population of the parish of Saint Mildred aforesaid is 2,364.

"That there is a church situate within the said parish of All Saints. There is also a church situate in the said parish of Saint Mildred. The churches are distant about half a mile from each other. There is no church situate in the said parish of Saint Mary-in-the-Castle.

"That there is a house of residence situate within the parish of Saint Mildred suitable for an incumbent of that benefice.

"That the net yearly value of the said united benefice is two hundred and seventy-four pounds or thereabouts of which the annual sum of three pounds arises and is payable in respect of the benefice of All Saints.

"That the patronage of the said united benefice belongs to the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain in right of the Crown and he consents to the union of the said benefice being dissolved so far as respects the benefice of All Saints.

"That six weeks and upwards before certifying such enquiry and consent to Your Majesty in Council we caused a statement in writing of the facts to be affixed on the principal outer door of each of the parish churches of All Saints and Saint Mildred and on the Old Castle door being a public and conspicuous place in the parish of Saint Mary-in-the-Castle with notice to any person or persons interested that he she or they might within such six weeks show cause in writing under his her or their hand or hands to us the said Archbishop against such disunion and no such cause has been shown.

"The copies of the statement of facts and notice before mentioned together with the consent in writing of the patron are hereunto annexed.

"And we do hereby certify the enquiry and consent aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for separating the said rectory of All Saints from the united benefice of the rectory of All Saints the rectory of Saint Mary-in-the-Castle and the rectory of Saint Mildred and in accordance with the terms of the consent of the patron above referred to we recommend that after the said disunion shall have been carried into effect each benefice shall retain its own original endowments and emoluments and bear its own charges and outgoings.

"As witness our hand this twenty-fourth day of January in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight.

"Edw. Cantuar."

Now therefore Her Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased to order as it is hereby ordered, that the said united benefice consisting of the rectory of All Saints, the rectory of Saint Mary-in-the-Castle, and the rectory of Saint Mildred, shall be disunited by separating the said rectory of All Saints from the united benefice of the rectory of All Saints, the rectory of Saint Mary-in-the-Castle, and the rectory of Saint Mary-in-the-Castle, and the rectory of Saint Mildred.

And Her Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is further pleased, on the recommendation of the said Archbishop, and with the consent of the patron, to assign and attach to each of the said benefices its own original endowments and emoluments, and to direct that each benefice shall bear its own charges and outgoings. #### PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS Alfred Chichele Plowden, Barrister-at-Law, duly appointed in pursuance of the Reading Corporation Act, 1887, as Commissioner for determining the boundaries of the wards of the borough of Reading, as extended in in pursuance of that Act, and of apportioning the aldermen, councillors, and returning officers thereto, transmitted to one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State his determination and apportionment in the following terms:--

#### "BOROUGH OF READING. "THE READING CORPORATION ACT, 1887.

#### "New Wards Scheme.

" Election of Councillors and Aldermen, 1887.

"WHEREAS by the Reading Corporation Act, 1887, it was provided that the extended borough of Reading should be divided into wards, and the number, names or distinguishing numbers, and boundaries of such wards should be fixed and determined by a scheme to be made by a Commissioner to be for that purpose appointed by Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department. And whereas on the twelfth day of August last the Right Honourable Henry Matthews, one of Her Majesty's Counsel learned in the Law, and Secretary of State for the Home Department, did duly appoint me, Alfred Chichele Plowden, Barrister-at-Law, to act as such Commissioner aforesaid, and did, on the thirtieth day of August last fix the fourteenth day of September one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven as the day for the completion of the said scheme.

"Now, I, the said Alfred Chichele Plowden, in pursuance of the powers given me by virtue of the said appointment under the said Act, do hereby fix and determine that the borough of Reading as extended shall be divided into ten wards, the names and boundaries of which shall be as follows:—

#### " Names.

"Abboy Ward, Battle Ward, West Ward, Castle Ward, Minster Ward, Katesgrove Ward, Church Ward, Victoria Ward, Redlands Ward, East Ward.

#### " Boundaries.

"And I do hereby determine that Abbey Ward shall comprise the whole of the parish of Saint Lawrence Reading.

"And I do hereby determine that Battle Ward shall comprise so much of the parish of Saint Mary Reading, as is bounded on the east north and west sides thereof by the boundary of the said parish, and on the south side thereof, by the middle of so much of Oxford-road in the said parish, as lies between the boundary of the parish of Tilehurst, and the boundaries of the parish of Saint Lawrence Reading, where such boundaries meet at a point opposite the middle of the road in Thorn-street.

" And I do hereby determine that West Ward shall comprise all that part of the parish of Tilehurst which is described in the Second Schedule to the Reading Corporation Act, 1887; the whole of the tithing of Southcot in the parish of Saint Mary Reading; and so much of the parish of Saint Mary Reading, as is bounded on the north by the middle of Oxford-road from a point in the middle of the said road at the eastern end of the Great Western Railway Bridge over such road to a point where such road crosses the boundary between the parish of Saint Mary Reading and the parish of Tilehurst from such point in southerly westerly and easterly directions by such boundary, and by the boundary between the parish of Saint Mary Reading and the tithing of Southcot to the point in the lastmentioned boundary which is in the middle of the Holy Brook (being the easternmost point of the boundary between the parish of Saint Mary Reading and the tithing of Southcot) and from thence eastwards by the middle of the Holy Brook as far as to the middle of the bridge which carries the road from Coley-avenue over the Holy Brook near to and on the western side of Coley

Farm, and which said ward is bounded on the south-east, and east by the middle of the lastmentioned road, and by the middle of the road in Coley-avenue to a point in the middle of the road called Bath-road, at the eastern end thereof, on further part of the north and on the north-east by the middle of Tilehurst-road as far as to the eastern side of the railroad of the Great Western Railway Company, and on the remaining part of the east by the eastern side of the said railroad to the point first-mentioned in this description of West Ward.

" And I do hereby determine that Castle Ward shall comprise all that part of the parish of Saint Mary Reading which is bounded on the north from a point on the boundary between the said parish and the parish of Saint Lawrence Reading opposite the middle of the northern end of Saint Mary's Butt's to the eastern side of the railway bridge carrying the railroad of the Great Western Railway Company over Oxford-road by the middle of Oxford-road, on the west by the eastern side of the said railroad, on the south and southwest by the middle of Tilehurst-road to the aforesaid point in the middle of the road called Bathroad at the eastern end thereof, on the south-east from the last-mentioned point by the middle of Castle-street to a point opposite the middle of Bridge-street, and on the east from the last-mentioned point northwards along the road in Saint Mary's Butt's to the point first-mentioned in this description of Castle Ward.

"And I do horeby determine that Minster Ward shall comprise all that part of the parish of Saint Mury Reading which is bounded on the north by the parish boundary along the middle of Broadstreet, from a point opposite the middle of the road in Saint Mary's Butt's at the northern end thereof to the eastern end of Broad-street, and is also bounded by the parish boundary from the point where such boundary leaves the eastern end of Broad-street to the easternmost point of the boundary between the parish of Saint Mary Reading and the tithing of Southcot in the middle of the Holy Brook and from the lastmentioned point eastwards by the middle of the Holy Brook to the middle of the bridge which carries the road from Coley-avenue over the Holy Brook, near to and on the western side of Coley Farm, and is bounded on the westerly and northwesterly sides by the middle of the same road, and by the middle of the road in Coley-avenue, to a point in the middle of the road called Bath-road, at the eastern end thereof, and from that point on the north and north-west by the middle of the road in Castle-street, to a point opposite the middle of the road in Bridge-street, and on the west by the eastern boundary of Castle Ward.
