(SWINE-FEVER.)

AT the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 14th day of March, 1888.

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1886, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The following Area declared by Order of Council to be an Area infected with swine-fever (namely),—in the county of Pembroke comprising the whole of the parish of Johnstone, and so much of the parish of Freystrop, which adjoins the parish of Johnstone, as is bounded on the north by the stream flowing from Johnstone to the Pembroke-road, on the south by the high-road leading from Johnstone to Troopers Inn, and on the east by the high-road leading from Troopers Inn to Middle Hill Chapel,—is, except such portion thereof as is included in the Area described in Article 2 of this Order, hereby declared to be free from swine-fever, and the Area above described, except as aforesaid, shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an Area infected with swine-fever.

2. The following Area (namely),—so much of the parish of Freystrop, in the county of Pembroke, as is bounded on the north by the stream flowing from Johnstone to the Pembroke-road, on the south by the high-road leading from Johnstone to Troopers Inn, on the east by the high-road leading from Troopers Inn to Middle Hill Chapel, and on the west by the boundary dividing the parishes of Johnstone and Freystrop,—shall continue to be and is hereby declared to be an Area infected with swine-fever.

3. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the fifteenth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight.

NOTICE FOR INFORMATION OF TRAVELLERS
PROCEEDING TO GERMANY.

INFORMATION has been received from Her Majesty's Ambassador at Berlin that Notifications have been issued in the Prussian Gazette stating that until September 30, 1888, foreigners arriving at any of the undermentioned places will be required by the police to show passports or papers

of identification, and if they fail to produce them are liable to be ordered to quit. Those places are town and district of—

Frankfort,
Hamburg,
Hanau,
District of Höchst and Obertaunus.

Towns of Stettin,
Grabow-on-the-Oder,
Alt Damm.

District of Bredow,
Warsaw,
Sileune,
Finkenwalde.

It is added that these provisions have been for some time practically in force in the city of Berlin.

Her Majesty's Ambassador reports that the following Notice has also been published:—

"The carriage of thrusting and cutting weapons or firearms, and the possession, carriage, introduction of, or traffic in, explosives, except in so far as concerns the munitions of the Imperial Army and Navy, is prohibited.

"Cartridges are not included under the above prohibition. Exceptions from the prohibition to carry arms are made:

"1. For persons who, in virtue of their office or profession are entitled to carry arms, as regards such arms.

"2. For members of clubs to which the privilege of carrying arms appertains, within the limits of that privilege.

"3. For persons in possession of a sporting licence, for such weapons as they require for sporting purposes.

"4. For persons in possession of a licence to carry arms specially made out for them, as regards the arms therein described.

"The provincial police authorities deal with the issue of the licence. It is issued by them without fee or stamp duty, and may be withdrawn at any moment."
