ENTRANCE.

Havre—Intended Alterations in Lights.

THE French Government has given notice, that on 11th March, 1888, the following alterations will be made in lights at Havre:—

The two fixed red lights hitherto exhibited from the Great Quay, and the steeple of Notre Dame Church, will be discontinued.

A fixed green light will be exhibited from an iron support erected on the Great Quay; it will be elevated 56 feet above high water, and should be visible in clear weather for a distance of 8 miles.

The illuminating apparatus will be catoptric, or by reflectors.

Position, lat. 49° 29' 15" N., long. 0° 6' 40" E.

NOTE.—The above green light in line with the red occulting light on the South Jetty, leads between Le Haut du S.O. and Le Haut de Quarante, and to the entrance of the port.

MADAGASCAR—WEST COAST.

Shoals reported North-Westward of Bosi, and in Approach to Bembatooka Bay.

THE French Government has given notice, dated 10th February, 1888, on the authority of Captain Michel, commanding the French Naval Division of the Indian Ocean, of the existence of the following shoals, situated north-westward of Bosi, and in approach to Bembatooka Bay:—

(1.) A shoal, on which a depth of about 2½ fathoms was obtained, lies with Bosi bearing S.E. by E., distant 25 miles, or in lat. 19° 54' 30" S., long. 44° 5' 45" E.

A complete survey was not made of this danger; at three miles westward of it, a depth of 25 fathoms was found.

(2.) A bank, apparently extending N. by W. and S. by E., about five miles, and three miles broad, is situated with Bosi bearing S.S.E. ½ E., distant about 43 miles from its southern extreme; or in lat. 19° 30' 30" S., long. 43° 58' 45" E. A sounding of 8 fathoms, sand and coral, was obtained at the above position, and 14 fathoms S. ½ W., distant three miles from it, with 25 fathoms on a bearing of S. ½ E. From the colour of the
