In order to carry out the existing regulations, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Lady who is to make the presentation, of her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command, that no presentations shall be made at the Drawing Room, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be very distinctly written upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them.

4. The Sheriff of the County of Lancaster shall act for the purpose of the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County.

5. The precepts of the Judges to the said Sheriff shall direct him to summon the Grand Jurors and Petty Jurors from the County of Lancaster.

6. The Gaol Delivery precept of the Judges to the said Sheriff shall direct him to cause the prisoners from all the prisons in the said Spring Assize County who under the provisions of this Order will have to be tried at Manchester, to be brought there, and the Sheriff shall cause such prisoners to be brought accordingly without any

Writ of Habeas Corpus.

7. All Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Coroners, Escheators, Stewards, Bailiffs, Gaolers, Constables, Officers, and persons having authority and being under an obligation to attend the Assizes for either Division comprised in the said Spring Assize County, or to certify, transmit, or deliver to the Court of Assize, or the proper officer thereof, any indictment, inquisition, recognizance, examination, deposition, or document, shall have the same authority, and be under the same obligation to attend at the said Spring Assizes held for the said Spring Assize County, and to certify, transmit, or deliver to the Court of Assize, or the proper officer thereof, such indictment, inquisition, recognizance, examination, deposition, or document.

8. In all indictments and presentments at the said Spring Assizes the venue laid in the margin thereof shall, in addition to the name of the county where the offence is charged to have been committed, contain the words "Spring Assize

County, No. 2."

9. Any person who after the date of this Order and before the said Spring Assizes, enters into a recognizance to appear and prosecute, or give evidence, or to appear and answer before a Court of Oyer and Terminer or General Gaol Delivery to be holden for either of the Divisions constituting the said Spring Assize County, shall be bound to attend at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County.

10. In all cases in which the like recognizances have been entered into in respect of any offence committed in either of the Divisions constituting the said Spring Assize County prior to the making of this Order, such recognizances shall be deemed to have been entered into for attendance at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County, and every person bound by such recognizance shall be bound to appear at such lastmentioned Spring Assizes or forfeit his recognizance shall be said to appear at such lastmentioned Spring Assizes or forfeit his recognizance.

11. before the day upon which the said Spring Assize for the said Spring Assize County are appointed to be held, to send, without any Writ of Habeas Corpus, such prisoners to Her Majesty's Gaol at Strangeways, Manchester, in the county of Lancaster, for the purposes of their trial, and to take all proper steps for their transmission to the said Gaol, and their maintenance by the way, and the Gaoler of the said Gaol shall receive such prisoners into his charge and custody on their arrival, and shall keep and maintain them in the said Gaol until they are either ordered to be discharged or remanded by proper authority, or until they shall have been tried and sentenced, and proper arrangements have been made for their being sent back to the prison from which they were sent for trial, or sent to any other prison which has been duly appointed as an alternative for such prison. If, however, the said Gaol has itself been duly appointed as an alternative prison for the prison from which such prisoners were sent to trial, the Governor of the said Gaol shall, subject to the orders of the Secretary of State, keep and maintain in the said Gaol such prisoners after sentence, until they are discharged in due course of law.

13. The Clerk of Assize at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County, shall have all powers of taxation of Bills of Costs, expenses of prosecution and witnesses, and all other powers necessary for checking and paying such costs relating to the trial of prisoners that the Clerk of Assize in the county where such prisoners were committed would have had if such prisoner had been tried at the Assizes held in such

last-mentioned county.

Where any person is committed for trial, or is bound by any recognizance to appear and answer, in the said Spring Assize County, any Judge of the High Court of Justice, or the committing Justice or Justices, or any two of the Justices of the county or place from which he is committed or admitted to bail, may, upon the application of such person, direct the Treasurer of the county or place where such person was committed, or entered into any recog-nizance to appear and answer as aforeto advance to such person a sum not exceeding 20l. to enable him to defray the travelling expenses of such of witnesses as may have been bound such of his recognizances to appear on his behalf, and the Treasurer shall advance such sum, and shall deduct it out of the amount ultimately allowed in respect of such witnesses.

14. In any case where money is ordered by the Court at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County to be paid in respect of costs and expenses of prosecutors and witnesses, the same shall be paid by the Treasurer of the county or place by whom the same would have been payable had a like order been made by a Court of Oyer and Terminer or Gaol Delivery in the county where the trial would have taken place but for the Spring Assizes Act, 1879, and this Order; and every such Treasurer, or some known agent on his behalf, shall attend the said Spring Assizes during the sitting of the Court to pay all such orders.

7 HEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding " of benefices in plurality, and to make better " provision for the residence of the clergy," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That whenever it "shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, "with respect to his own diocese, and whenever "it shall be represented to him by the Bishop "of any diocese, or by the Bishops of any "two dioceses, that two or more benefices, or " that one or more benefice or benefices, and one " or more spiritual sinecure rectory or rectories, " vicarage or vicarages, in his or their diocese or "dioceses, being either in the same parish or con-" tiguous to each other, and of which the aggregate "population shall not exceed one thousand five "hundred persons, may, with advantage to the interests of religion, be united into one "benefice, the said Archbishop of the Pro-"vince shall inquire into the circumstances of " the case; and if on such inquiry it shall appear " to him that such union may be usefully made, " and will not be of inconvenient extent, and that "the patron or patrons of the said benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicar-"ages respectively, is or are consenting thereto, " such consent being signified in writing under the " hands of such patron or patrons, the said Arch-"bishop shall, six weeks before certifying such "inquiry and consent to Her Majesty as herein-"after directed, cause, with respect to his own "diocese, a statement in writing of the facts, "and in other cases a copy in writing of the " aforesaid representation to be affixed on or near "the principal outer door of the church, or in "some public and conspicuous place in each of "such benefices, sinecure rectories, or vicarages, " with notice to any person or persons interested, "that he, she, or they, may, within such six weeks, show cause in writing under his, her, or "their hand or hands, to the said Archbishop, "against such union; and if no sufficient cause "be shown within such time, the said Archbishop " shall certify the inquiry and consent aforesaid "to Her Majesty in Council, and thereupon it " shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to " make and issue an Order or Orders for uniting "such benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, "vicarage or vicarages, into one benefice, with "cure of souls, for ecclesiastical purposes only; "and it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in "Council to give directions for regulating the "course and succession in which the patrons, if "there be more than one patron, shall present or " nominate to such united benefice, from time to "time, as the same shall become vacant."

And whereas the Lord Archbishop of Canter-

bury, pursuant to the provisions of the said Act, hath duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a certificate in writing, bearing date the fourteenth day of February in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Edward White Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury, do hereby

certify to Your Majesty in Council.

"That the Right Reverend Edward Lord Bishop of Lincoln as Bishop of the diocese within which are situate the rectory of Asterby otherwise Asarby in the county of Lincoln and the vicarage of Goulceby in the same county having represented unto us that the said benefices being contiguous to each other and of which the aggregate population does not exceed one thousand five hundred persons and the aggregate yearly value does not exceed five hundred pounds might with advantage to the interests of religion be united into one benefice we inquired into the circumstances of the case.

"That on such inquiry it appeared to us that such union might be usefully made and would not be of inconvenient extent and that Edmund Pepys of 20 Portland-place in the county of Middlesex Esquire and the Right Honourable William Archer Amherst Earl Amherst the patrons or persons entitled to present to the said rectory of Asterby otherwise Asarby if the same were now vacant and John James of 13 Suffolkstreet Pall Mall East in the said county of Middlesex Gentleman and Irving Bagnell of Pau in the Republic of France M.D. the patrons or person entitled as trustees (upon the nomination of Frederick Bagnell of the Army and Navy Club St. James'-square in the said county of Middlesex a Colonel in Your Majesty's Army as equitable or beneficial owner) to present to the said benefice of Goulceby the same being now vacant consent to the proposed union and that the said Frederick Bagnell also consents thereto.

"That six weeks and upwards before certifying such enquiry and consents to Your Majesty in Council we caused a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation of the said Lord Bishop to be affixed on the principal outer door of the parish church of Asterby otherwise Asarby and in a public and conspicuous place in the parish of Goulceby where notices are usually affixed (there being no church in that parish) with notice to any person or persons interested that he she or they might within such six weeks show cause in writing under his her or their hand or hands to us the said Archbishop against such union and no such cause has been shown.

"The representation of the said Lord Bishop of Lincoln our enquiry into the circumstances of the case the statement of circumstances in reply thereto the consents in writing of the patrons and the copies of the representation and notice before mentioned are hereunto annexed.

"And we do hereby certify the enquiry and consents aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for uniting the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes and for declaring that the course and succession in which the patrons shall present or nominate to the united benefice from time to time as the same shall become vacant shall be as follows that is to say that the patronage of such united benefice shall be "bishop shall, six weeks before certifying such "inquiry and consent to Her Majesty as hereinticated, cause with respect to his own diotices, a statement in writing of the facts, and in "other cases a copy in writing of the aforesaid "representation to be affixed on or near the principle of the church, or in some public and conspicuous place in each of such benefices, sinecure rectories, or vicarages, with notice to "any person or persons interested, that he, she, or "they, may, within such six weeks, show cause in writing under his, her, or their hand or hands,

exercised by the patrons of the present respective benefices in an alternate course or succession and that the first turn to present to the said united benefice shall belong to and be exercised by the patron or patrons for the time being of the said rectory of Asterby otherwise Asarby.

"As witness our hand this fourteenth day of February in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight.

Now therefore Her Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the vicarage of Goulceby situate in the county and diocese of Lincoln, and the rectory of Asterby (otherwise Asarby), situate in the same county and diocese, shall be united into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only.

And Her Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of her said Council, is further pleased to direct that the patronage of such united benefice shall be exercised by the patrons of the present respective benefices in an alternate course or succession, and that the first turn to present to the said united benefice shall belong to and be exercised by the patron or patrons for the time being of the said rectory of Asterby otherwise Asarby.

"to the said Archbishop, against such union; and if no sufficient cause be shown within such "time, the said Archbishop shall certify the in-"quiry and consent aforesaid to Her Majesty in "Council, and thereupon it shall be lawful for "Her Majesty in Council to make and issue an "Order or Orders for uniting such benefices, "sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicar-ages, into one benefice, with cure of souls, " for ecclesiastical purposes only."

And whereas the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury pursuant to the provisions of the said Act, hath duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a certificate in writing, bearing date the fourteenth day of February, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eightyeight, in the words following, that is to say:

"To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Edward White Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury Primate of all England and Metropolitan do hereby certify to

Your Majesty in Council.

"That the Honourable and Right Reverend John Thomas Lord Bishop of Norwich as Bishop of the diocese within which are situate the vicarage of Holkham in the county of Norfolk and the rectory of Egmere-with-Waterden in the same county having represented unto us that the said benefices being contiguous to each other and of which the aggregate population does not exceed one thousand five hundred persons might with advantage to the interests of religion be united into one benefice we enquired into the circumstances of the case.

"The representation of the said Lord Bishop of Norwich our enquiry into the circumstances of the case the statement of circumstances in reply thereto the consent in writing of the patron and the copies of the representation and notice before

mentioned are hereunto annexed.

"And we do hereby certify the enquiry and consent aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for uniting the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes.
