(SWINE-FEVER.)

AT the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 11th day of April, 1888.

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1886, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

1. The following Area (namely),—so much of the parish of Freystrop, in the county of Pembroke, as is bounded on the north by the stream flowing from Johnstone to the Pembroke-road, on the south by the high-road leading from Johnstone to Troopers Inn, on the east by the high-road leading from Troopers Inn to Middle Hill Chapel, and on the west by the boundary dividing the parishes of Johnstone and Freystrop,—which was declared by Order of Council to be an Area infected with swine-fever, is hereby declared to be free from swine-fever, and that Area shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an Area infected with swine-fever.

2 This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the twelfth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight.

1. The following Area (namely),—the whole of the parish of Crickhowell, in the county of Brecknock,—which was declared by Order of Council dated the third day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, to be an

Area infected with swine-fever, is hereby declared to be free from swine-fever, and that Area shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an Area infected with swine-fever.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the thirteenth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight.
