AUSTRALIA.—NORTH-WEST COAST.

Reef reported Westward of Cartier I-let.

INFORMATION has been received through the Board of Trade, that the Master of the Barque "Millicent," reports the existence of a reef, which dries at low water, and on which that vessel was wrecked on 5th January, 1888, situated in lat. $12^{\circ} 35' S.$, long. $123^{\circ} 16' E.$

NOTE.—The above position is extremely doubtful, but as the whole of the vicinity is very imperfectly surveyed, and it is possible that many more reefs may exist than those laid down, mariners are warned accordingly.

UNITED STATES—EAST COAST.—CHARLESTON HARBOUR APPROACH—SOUTH CHANNEL.

(1.) *Black Buoy No. 1 Replaced by a Bell Buoy.*
THE United States Government has given notice, dated 14th April, 1888, that Black Buoy No. 1, moored on the southern side of entrance to South Channel, approach to Charleston Harbour, has been withdrawn, and replaced by a bell buoy, painted black.

Position, lat. $32^{\circ} 29' 5'' N.$, long. $79^{\circ} 56' 45'' W.$

WEST INDIES.—TRINIDAD ISLAND.

(2.) *Time Signal at Port of Spain.*

Information has been received that the following time signal has been established at Port of Spain, western coast of Trinidad Island:—

The signal is a ball, dropped from the Observatory Tower, at noon, Port of Spain mean-time, equivalent to 4h. Cm. 2.5s. P.M., Greenwich mean-time.

Position, lat. $10^{\circ} 39' N.$, approximate, long. $61^{\circ} 30' 38'' W.$

NOTE.—This signal is reported to be occasionally unreliable.

VENEZUELA.

(3.) *Visibility of Fixed Light at La Guayra.*

With reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 292, of 11th December, 1886, on the exhibition of a fixed white light from the signal fort (a), La Guayra:—

Information has been received, that this light should be seen in clear weather from a distance of 7 miles.

Position, lat. $10^{\circ} 36' N.$, long. $66^{\circ} 57' W.$

NOTE.—A lighthouse, constructed of stone, and about 100 feet high, is situated on the Bastion of Santa Barbara, but no light is shown from it.

An extensive breakwater is to be constructed at La Guayra, from the extremity of which, on its completion, a first order light will be exhibited.

INCOME TAX.

WHEREAS the Acts of Parliament relating to the Income Tax provide that all persons entrusted with the payment of

Annuities, or any dividends or shares of annuities payable out of the revenue of any colony or settlement belonging to the Crown of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or out of the revenue of any foreign State;

Annuities, pensions, or other annual sums payable out of the funds of any institution in India; or

Any interest, dividends, or other annual payment, payable out of or in respect of the stocks, funds, or shares of any foreign or colonial company, society, adventure, or concern

to any persons, corporations, companies, or societies in the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or acting therein as agents, or in any other character, shall, without further notice or demand thereof, deliver or cause to be delivered into the Head Office for Inland Revenue, an account, in writing, containing their names and residences, and a description of the annuities, pensions, or other annual sums, dividends, shares, or interest entrusted to them for payment, within one calendar month after the same shall have been required by public notice in the London Gazette, in order that an assessment may be made thereon, at the rate of duty prescribed by an Act of the present session of Parliament (51 Victoria, chap. 8), Her Majesty's Commissioners of Inland Revenue do hereby give notice to all persons entrusted with the payment of any such annuities, pensions, or other annual sums, dividends, shares of annuities, or interest as aforesaid, that the accounts of the said annuities, &c., required by the said Acts, are to be delivered, in writing, into the Head Office for Inland Revenue, at Somerset House, in the county of Middlesex, addressed to the Secretary of the Commissioners of Inland Revenue, within the space of one calendar month from the date hereof; and that any person who shall neglect or refuse to deliver such account, is, by the said Acts, made subject to the forfeiture of one hundred pounds, over and above the duty chargeable on such annuities, shares, dividends, or interest.
