(PLEURO-PNEUMONIA.)

AT the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 26th day of June, 1888.

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1886, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The limits of the following Place which is declared by order of the Local Authority acting in and for the county of Aberdeen, dated the thirteenth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, to be a Place infected with pleuro-pneumonia (namely),—the byres and all the grass fields with the exception of the fields of first year's grass on the Farm of Whitestripe, in the parish of Strichen, occupied by James Adie,—are hereby contracted or altered so as only to include the Place as described in the Schedule to this Order, and the Place so described in the Schedule to this Order shall from and after the commencement of this Order be deemed to be the Place declared by the said order of the Local Authority to be a Place infected with pleuro-pneumonia.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the twenty-seventh day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight.

A Place comprising the byres and all the grass fields, with the exception of the fields of first year's grass and the grass field called the Garden Park situated between the houses and the public-road, on the Farm of Whitestripe, in the parish of Strichen, in the county of Aberdeen, occupied by James Adie.

The following Area (namely),—the townships of Marbury-cum-Quoisley, and Wirswall, in the Nantwich Police Division, in the county of Chester,—which was declared by Order of Council dated the ninth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, to be an Area infected with swine-fever, is hereby declared to be free from swine-fever, and that Area shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an Area infected with swine-fever.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the twenty-seventh day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight.
