WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the twenty-second day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, in the words following, viz. :-

"Whereas by 'The Dockyard Ports Regulation Act, 1865, it is enacted (among other things) that it shall be lawful for Your Majesty in Council from time to time by Order in Council to define the limits of a Dockyard Port for the purposes of

"And whereas by the same Act it is also enacted that in relation to any Dockyard Port it shall be lawful for Your Majesty in Council from time to time by Order in Council to make regulations for all or any of the purposes therein particularly mentioned and for such other purposes as from time to time seem necessary with a view to the proper protection of Your Majesty's vessels, dockyards or property or to the requirements of Your Majesty's Naval Service.

"And whereas by an Order in Council made in pursuance of the same Act dated the twentyninth day of February, one thousand eight hun-

T the Court at Windsor, the 29th day of | dred and sixty-eight, Your Majesty was pleased by and with the advice of Your Privy Council to define the limits for the purposes of the same Act of the Dockyard Port of Chatham and Sheerness and to make regulations respecting such Dockyard

" And whereas it seems desirable to us to amend the definition of the said Dockyard Port as contained in the said Order in Council and to make fresh regulations respecting the same.

"We therefore beg humbly to recommend that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased by virtue of the powers in this behalf by the said Act or otherwise in Your Majesty vested, by and with the advice of Your Privy Council to order, as follows :-

"1. This Order shall take effect on the expiration of thirty days from its publication in the London Gazette.

"2. On this Order taking effect the Order in Council of twenty-ninth February, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, shall be repealed.

"3. On this Order taking effect all previous rules orders and regulations of the Admiralty relative to the matters comprised in this Order shall cease to operate.

"4. The terms used in this Order have the same meaning as in the said Dockyard Ports Regulation Act 1865.

"5. For the purposes of the said Act and this Order the limits of the Dockyard Port of Chatham and Sheerness (in this Order called the Port) shall be deemed to be as follows, that is to say :-

" From the seaward limits hereafter mentioned up the Medway as far as the tide flows, namely, to the first lock on that river situate between Aylesford Bridge and Allington Castle.

"The seaward limits are; on the eastward a line drawn north and south (true) through Eastchurch Church, and on the northward a line drawn east and west (true) three miles and four-tenths north of Minster Church, as delineated on the chart annexed to this Order.

"6. All merchant and other private vessels at Sheerness shall anchor only at the following place, namely:-

"To the westward of an imaginary straight line drawn from a white beacon situate at the boat-house on Cockleshell Hard, Grain Island, to a black beacon on Fleet Marsh, on the opposite side of the river, which beacons lie nearly N. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. and S. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. (true).

which line is delineated on the chart annexed to this Order.

- "7. No merchant or other private vessel shall, without licence in writing from the Port Admiral, Captain Superintendent, or Queen's Harbour Master, be moored or fastened to any of Her Majesty's moorings, buoys, piles, or vessels in the port, unless forced thereto by unavoidable accident.
- "8. No merchant or other private vessel shall, without licence as aforesaid, be moored, anchored, or placed in the port within one hundred and fifty yards from any part of Her Majesty's moorings, or from any of Her Majesty's docks, dockyards, arsenals, wharfs, vessels, or hulks, or within two hundred yards from any of Her Majesty's powder magazines, or be moored, anchored, or placed in the port in the fairway, or across the stream of the Medway, so as to obstruct the passage or entrance into the port, unless forced thereto by unavoidable accident; but nothing in this Order shall prohibit or interfere with the mooring or placing of vessels in any place or manner authorized by or under any Act of Parliament relating to Sheerness Pier.

"9. If at any time a merchant or other private vessel hooks any of Her Majesty's moorings, the master of such vessel shall not proceed to unhook the same, but shall forthwith give notice to the Queen's Harbour Master or to the Chief Officer of the nearest of Her Majesty's Dockyards in order that aid may be given for clearing the mooring without damage.

"10. No merchant or other private vessel shall take on board in the port within two hundred and fifty yards from any of Her Majesty's docks, dockyards, arsenals, powder magazines, or wharfs, gunpowder exceeding five pounds weight in the whole or come within that distance having on board gunpowder exceeding the said weight; and any such vessel having so come within that distance under stress of weather shall unship and deliver any gunpowder on board exceeding the said weight, if so required by the Queen's Harbour Master.

"11. No merchant or other private vessel shall be breamed in the port within two hundred yards from any part of the powder magazines at Upnor, or within one hundred yards from any of Her Majesty's docks, dockyards, arsenals, wharfs, vessels, or hulks.

"12. No fire shall be kept on board any merchant or other private vessel (except steam vessels) in the port within two hundred yards from any of Her Majesty's docks, dockyards, arsenals, powder magazines, or wharfs, between eleven o'clock in the evening and five o'clock in the morning from the first of October to the thirty-first of March inclusive; or between eleven o'clock in the evening and four o'clock in the morning from the first of April to the thirtieth of September inclusive.

"13. No pitch, tar, rosin, turpentine, grease, tallow, oil, or other combustible matter shall be boiled or heated on board any merchant or other private vessel in the port within two hundred and fifty yards from any of Her Majesty's vessels, or from any hired vessel in Her Majesty's service, or from any of Her Majesty's docks, dockyards, arsenals, powder magazines, or wharfs.

"14. No ship's gan on board any merchant or

"14. No ship's gun on board any merchant or other private vessel lying in the port within the last-mentioned distance shall be kept loaded, nor shall any such gun on board any such vessel lying there be discharged before sunrise or after sunset.

"15. No merchant or other private vessel shall be moored, anchored or placed within two hundred

yards from any of the wharfs on the Medway belonging or attached to Upnor Castle, or from any part of Her Majesty's powder magazines at Upnor; and every merchant or other private steam vessel when passing any part of those magazines shall keep as close as navigation will permit to the opposite bank of the river.

"16. No merchant or other private steam vessel between Garrison Point, Sheerness, and the Town Pier of the town, shall proceed at a greater rate of speed than five knots an hour over

the ground.

"17. No vessel, barge, or boat, shall unlade or discharge any ballast, stones, earth, ashes, rubbish, dust, or filth of any kind whatever into the waters of the Dockyard Port within the area between a line drawn from Garrison Port (Sheerness) to Dolly Bank on the westward, and the seaward limits of the Dockyard Port; viz. a line drawn north and south (true) through Eastchurch Church on the eastward and a line drawn east and west (true) three miles and four-tenths north of Minster Church on the northward; nor upon the banks, nor any portion of the shore within the said area in such a manner that the same may be washed into the water by the tide rain or otherwise.

"18. The master or other person in charge of every merchant or other private vessel, barge or boat to which this Order relates shall observe and cause to be observed the provisions of this Order as far as it relates to his vessel; and if any master or other person acts in any respect in contravention of any of the provisions of this Order, or fails to observe or cause to be observed in any respect any of those provisions, he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds."

Her Majesty having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by the eleventh section of the VV Volunteer Act, 1863, it is amongst other things enacted that "Her Majesty in Council " may from time to time declare what is requisite " to entitle a Volunteer to be deemed an efficient "Volunteer by an Order in Council defining for "that purpose the extent of attendance at drill to " be given by the Volunteer, and the course of "instruction to be gone through by him, and the " degree of proficiency in drill and instruction to " be attained by him and his Corps, such pro-"ficiency to be judged of by the Inspecting "Officer at the Annual Inspection of the Corps, " or otherwise as by Order in Council is from time "to time directed; and that the draft of any " scheme to be from time to time submitted to "Her Majesty in Council for approval under the present section shall have been laid before both "Houses of Parliament for one lunar month at " least, either before or after, or partly before and " partly after, the passing of this Act during the " present, or for the like period during any sub-sequent Session of Parliament before such " scheme receives the approval of Her Majesty in Council."

" And whereas it is deemed expedient that the

Order in Council bearing date the thirty-first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, declaring what is requisite to entitle a Volunteer to be deemed an efficient Volunteer, be amended in such manner as will meet the case of the Cyclist Volunteers:

Cyclist Volunteers:

"And whereas a draft amendment of the said Order in Council was on the fourth day of May last laid before both Houses of Parliament in the words mentioned and set forth in the schedule to this Order annexed, and one lunar month having elapsed since that time, the said amendment of the said Order hath this day been submitted to Her Majesty in Council for Her approval thereof:

"Now, therefore, Her Majesty having this day taken the said amendment into consideration, doth, in pursuance and exercise of the power in Her Majesty by the said Act of Parliament in that behalf vested, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, hereby amend in the words of the said draft the aforesaid Order in Council of the thirty-first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, and doth declare Her royal approval of the amendment." SCHEDULE.

AMENDMENT to the Scheme relative to the Efficiency of Volunteers in force under Her Majesty's Order in Council dated July 31, 1880.

Submitted to Her Majesty the Queen in Council under the Volunteer Act, 1863.

Is order that the requirements for the efficiency of Volunteers may be adapted to the conditions of service of the Cyclist Volunteers, the Certificates, as per margin, alluded to in the first clause of the scheme in question shall, in addition to the foot-notes which they already bear defining the number and description of the drills to be performed, bear the following foot-note:—

Army Form. E. 572 (Certificate of Efficiency for Rifle Volunteers).

"In cases where the Volunteer belongs to an organised Cyclist Section, cycling drills ordered by the Commanding Officers, and of not less than one hour's duration, may be counted as follows towards the total number of drills required for efficiency:—

Army Form. LE. 615 (Certificate of Efficiency for 1st Oxfordshire (Oxford University), 2nd Buchs (Eton College), and 2nd Cambridgeshire (Cambridge University) Rifle Volunteer Corps.)

"(a.) For Recruits and Volunteers in their second year of service—Ten cycling drills of any kind.

"(b.) Volunteers in their third and subsequent year's service—Three cycling battalion drills, or three cycling company drills."

The following are the definitions of cycling

(a.) Battalion Drill.—Where a Cyclist Section under an Officer or Non-commissioned Officer parades with the corps of which it is a part, or goes through manœuvres in connection with that corps, or when two or more Cyclist Sections, each of not less than twelve of all ranks, combine under a command apart from the corps of which they respectively form a portion.

(b.) Company Drill.—Any drill under arms under an Officer or Sergeant, provided at least

six of all ranks are present.

(c.) Squad Drill.—All other drills, provided at least three of all ranks are present. Three squad drills may count as one company drill.

HEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of the Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding "of benefices in plurality, and to make better "provision for the residence of the clergy," after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, " hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts "may be separated from the parishes or mother " churches to which they belong with great advan-"tage, and places altogether extra-parochial may " in some instances with advantage be annexed to "parishes or districts to which they are con-"tiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for "ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when, with respect to his "own diocese, it shall appear to the Archbishop " of the Province, or when the Bishop of any "diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop "that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or "district within the diocese of such Archbishop, " or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may " be, may be advantageously separated from any " parish or mother church, and either be consti-"tuted a separate benefice by itself or be united "to any other parish to which it may be more " conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining "tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial, or extra-parochial so as to form a " separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-" parochial place may with advantage be annexed "to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be "constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical "purposes; and the said Archbishop or Bishop "shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme "of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said " Archbishop for his consideration), describing the " mode in which it appears to him that the altera-"tion may best be effected, and how the changes "consequent on such alteration in respect to "ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, " rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, "and payments, and in respect to patronage and "rights to pews, may be made with justice to all " parties interested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by "such alteration shall consent in writing under "his or their hands to such scheme, or to such " modification thereof as the said Archbishop may "approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full " consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any "such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall " certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, "by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it " shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to "make an Order for carrying such scheme, or "modification thereof, as the case may be, into " effect."

And whereas by another Act of Parliament passed in the second and third years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to "make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne; and for other purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That any such scheme or modification as aforesaid may be drawn up according to the regulations and directions in the hereinbefore in part recited "Act contained, subject to the consent in writing of the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected thereby, under his or

"their hands, notwithstanding the vacancy of | " such benefice or benefices; and it shall be law-"ful for Her Majesty in Council thereupon to "make an Order for carrying such scheme or modification thereof, as the case may be, into " effect; and such Order being registered in the " registry of the diocese, as directed by the here-"inbefore in part recited Act, shall come into "operation, and shall be forthwith binding on "all persons whatsoever, notwithstanding such " vacancy or vacancies."

And whereas the Right Reverend Henry, Lord Bishop of Worcester, hath represented in a writing dated the tenth day of April one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Edward White, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:-

" To the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Edward White, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury.

" I, Henry, Bishop of Worcester, beg leave to represent to your Grace that there is in the parish of Hagley in the county and diocese of Worcester a district, defined as hereafter described, which lies at the distance of about three miles from the church of the said parish.

"That the said district adjoins the parish of Churchill in the same county and diocese, and lies at a convenient distance (not more than one mile for the most part) from the church of the

said parish of Churchill.
"That the populations of the said parishes of Hagley and Churchill according to the census of one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one were one thousand one hundred and ninetysix and one hundred and sixty-three respectively, and that there has been no material change in the number of such populations since the said census was taken; and that the population of the said district, ascertained by counting the number of houses is four hundred and seventy.

"That the annual incomes of the benefices of the said parishes of Hagley and Churchill at the present time are about five hundred and eight pounds and two hundred and forty-four pounds

respectively.

"That, in consequence of their distance from the church of the said parish of Hagley the inhabitants of the said district are put to much inconvenience for the performance of church offices and that the spiritual cure of the said inhabitants might be more conveniently and effectually provided for by the rector of Churchill than by the rector of Hagley.

"That it appears to me that the said district may under the provisions of the Acts of Parliament one and two Victoria chapter one hundred and six and two and three Victoria chapter fortynine be advantageously separated from the said parish of Hagley and be annexed to the said parish of Churchill for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That, pursuant to the directions of the twenty-sixth section of the said first-mentioned Act, I have drawn up a scheme appended to this representation describing the manner in which it appears to me that the alteration above proposed may be best effected and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, tithes, rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues rates and payments may be made with justice to all persons interested; and I submit the same to your Grace, together with the consents in writing of the patron of the benefices of the said two parishes and the rector of the said parish of Hagley (the benefice of Churchill being now vacant) to the intent that your Grace may, if you shall be satisfied with the said scheme,

certify the same and such consents to Her Majesty in Council.

"Given under my hand this tenth day of April one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight. " H. Worcester."

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop, and the consents referred to in the said representation are as follows:-

"SCHEME.

"It is proposed to separate the district, hereafter described, being part of the parish of Hagley in the county and diocese of Worcester, from the said parish and to annex it to the parish of Churchill in the same county and diocese for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That the rector of the parish of Churchill shall have exclusive cure of souls within the said

district.

"That all ecclesiastical offices shall be performed for the inhabitants of the said district in the church of the said parish of Churchill; and that the fees for all such offices performed within the limits of the said district shall belong to the

rector of the said parish of Churchill.

"That there shall be assigned and attached to the benefice of Churchill the annual sum of one hundred and twenty pounds ten shillings and six pence being part of the rent-charge given in lieu of the titles of the lands within the said parish of Hagley under the provisions of the Act for the commutation of tithes in England and Wales, such annual sum of one hundred and twenty pounds ten shillings and sixpence being composed of the several sums assessed upon the farms and lands numbered 299 to 305 inclusive and 340 to 462 inclusive in the Hagley tithe map.

"The district thus proposed to be transferred from the parish of Hagley to the parish of

Churchill is as follows :-

" All that part of the parish of Hagley described by the pink verge line on the accompanying plan, bounded on the west and north-west by the parish of Churchill, on the south and south-west by the Foreign of Kidderminster east of the River Stour, on the south-east by the parish of Chaddesley, on the east by the parishes of Broom and Clent, and on the north by a zigzag line dividing the district proposed to be transferred from the remaining part of the parish of Hagley; such zigzag line forming the boundary of the fields numbered on the tithe apportionment map 299, 303, 304, 305, 341 and 342 and including these fields within the district proposed to be transferred.

" CONSENTS

"To the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Edward White Lord Archbishop of Canterbury.

"I, the undersigned, Charles George, Baron Lyttelton, being the patron or person entitled to present to both the benefices of Hagley and Churchill, and I, the undersigned, William Cobham Gibbs, rector of Hagley, do hereby respectively certify to your Grace our consents to the scheme above proposed for separating the above-described district from the parish of Hagley and annexing it to the parish of Churchill. " Lyttelton.

" William Cobham Gibbs."

And whereas the said scheme hath been transmitted by the said Bishop to the said Archbishop for his consideration.

And whereas the said Archbishop being satisfied with the said scheme hath certified the same and the consents aforesaid to Her Majesty in Council, by his report dated the fourth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, which said report is in the words and figures follow-

"To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Edward White Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury, do hereby report to Your Majesty in Council.

"That the Right Reverend Henry Lord Bishop of Worcester has represented unto us (amongst

"That there is in the parish of Hagley in the county and diocese of Worcester a district which lies at the distance of about three miles from the church of the said parish.

"That the said district adjoins the parish of Churchill in the same county and diocese and lies at a convenient distance (not more than one mile for the most part) from the church of the said

parish of Churchill.

"That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that the said district which is described in the scheme to the said Lord Bishop's representation may be advantageously separated from the said parish of Hagley and be annexed for ecclesiastical purposes to the said parish of Churchill.

"That the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him the proposed alteration may best be effected and how the changes consequent upon such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithe rent-charges dues rates and payments may be made with justice to all parties interested which scheme together with the consents thereto in writing of the patron of both the said benefices and with the consent of the incumbent of the said benefice of Hagley (the incumbency of the said benefice of Churchill being vacant) has been transmitted by the said Lord Bishop to us for our consideration.

"The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consents before referred to

are hereunto annexed.

"And we the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said scheme do hereby pursuant to the Act of the first and second years of Your Majesty's reign chapter 106 certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said scheme into effect.

"As witness our hand this fourth day of May one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight. " Edw. Contuar."

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her Majesty chapter thirty-nine and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen, and the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her Majesty chapter one hundred and fourteen, duly prepared and laid White Archbishop of Canterbury (in testimony

before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-sixth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, in

the words following, that is to say :-

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the thirtythird and thirty-fourth years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen and the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Your Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and fourteen, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called 'the said benefice') of Saint John the Baptist Southend, in the county of Essex and in the diccese of Saint Albans.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint John the Baptist, Southend, is now vested in the Bishop of London and his successors.

"And whereas the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Frederick now Bishop of London is desirous that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint John the Baptist Southend, now vested in him as aforesaid, should be transferred to and be vested in the Bishop for the time being of the said diocese of Saint Albans.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Thomas Legh, now Bishop of the said diocese of Saint Albans is willing to accept such transfer, and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore firstly-mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary, he the said Thomas Legh, Bishop of the said diocese of Saint Albans, has executed this scheme as hereinafter-mentioned.

"And whereas the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Edward White, Archbishop of the province of Canterbury, within which province the said diocese of London and the said diocese of Saint Albans are both situate, is consenting to the said proposed transfer, and in token of his consent has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Your Majesty chapter forty-one and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter fifty-five have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for setting out and constituting a district for spiritual purposes and annexing such district to the consecrated church of All Saints Heaton Norris situate within the limits of the new parish (sometime a district under the above-mentioned Act of the thirteenth aud fourteenth years of Your Majesty chapter forty-one otherwise known as 'The Parish of Manchester Division Act 1850') of Saint Mary Heaton Reddish within the original limits of the said parish of Manchester in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district for spiritual purposes comprising a portion of the said new parish of Saint Mary Heaton Reddish and also portions of the new parish of Christ Church Heaton Norris (which last-named new parish is also within the original limits of the said parish of Mauchester and was sometime a district under 'The Parish of Manchester Division Act 1850' aforesaid) should be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said church of All Saints, Heaton Norris, which church was not consecrated under the provisions of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-seven.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend James Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester testified by his having signed and Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that all those portions of the said new parish of Saint Mary Heaton Reddish and of the said new parish of Christ Church Heaton Norris, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, and are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme be severed and disannexed from such new parishes respectively and shall be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said Church of All Saints Heaton Norris and shall become and be a district for spiritual purposes and shall be named 'The District of All Saints Heaton Norris.'

" And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or to any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinnamed Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of All Saints, Heaton Norris,

comprising

"I. All that portion of the new parish (sometime a district under 'The Parish of Manchester Division Act 1850') of Saint Mary Heaton Reddish within the original limits of the parish of Manchester in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester which is comprised within the limits of the township of Heaton Norris and which is bounded upon all sides as follows that is to say upon the north-east and upon the northwest by the boundary which divides the said township of Heaton Norris from the township of Reddish upon the west and upon the south-west by the new parish (also sometime a district under the said 'Parish of Manchester Division Act 1850') of Christ Church, Heaton Norris also within the original limits of the parish of Manchester aforesaid and upon the south-east partly by the parish of Stockport in the county of Chester and in the diocese of Chester and partly by the new parish of Portwood in the last-named county and diocese.

And also all that contiguous portion of the said new parish of Christ Church Heaton Norris which is bounded upon the east by the new parish of Saint Mary Heaton Reddish aforesaid and upon the remaining sides that is to say upon the west and upon the south by an imaginary line commencing at the point at the centre of Ash Bridge which carries the Manchester Old-road over the line of the Staleybridge and Stockport Branch of the London and North-Western Railway at which point the boundary which divides the new parish of Heaton Norris also within the original limits of the said parish of Manchester from the new parish of Saint Mary Heaton Reddish aforesaid joins the boundary dividing the last-named new parish from the new parish of Christ Church Heaton Norris aforesaid and extending thence that is to say from the centre of Ash Bridge aforesaid southward to and along the middle of the said branch line of railway for a distance of thirty-four chains or thereabouts to a point at the centre of Wellington-road Bridge which carries Wellington-road North over the same branch line of railway and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named bridge and road for a distance of one and a quarter chains or thereabouts to a point directly opposite to the middle of the western end of Belmont-street and extending thence that is to sealed this scheme, we the said Ecclesiastical say from the last-described point eastward to and along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of seven and one half chains or thereabouts to the boundary at the junction of the same street with Lloyd-street which boundary divides the said new parish of Christ Church Heaton Norris from the new parish of Saint Mary Heaton Reddish aforesaid.

"III. And also all that other portion of the said new parish of Christ Church Heaton Norris which portion is also contiguous to the herein firstly-described portion of the new parish of Saint Mary Heaton Reddish aforesaid and is bounded upon the north and upon the cast by the last-named new parish and upon the remaining sides that is to say upon the south and upon the west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Mary Heaton Reddish from the new parish of Christ Church Heaton Norris aforesaid at the point where the said Manchester Old-road is joined by Bamford-street and extending thence westward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of five and one half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Baker-street and extending thence northward along the middle of the lastnamed street for a distance of four and one half chains or thereabouts to the boundary at the junction of the said last-named street with Shortstreet which boundary divides the said new parish of Christ Church Heaton Norris from the new parish of Saint Mary Heaton Reddish aforesaid."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the firstly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbents of the two cures out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such patrons and incumbents have respectively signified their assent to such scheme:

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Manchester.

NHE following Statute, made by the University of Oxford (approved by Convocation, on fifteenth May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight), has been submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877:-

STATUTE to amend the provisions of the Statute concerning elections to Professorships.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the provisions of the Statute concerning Elections to Professorships, the University enacts as follows:-

1. Statt. Tit. IV, sect. 1 § 2 (p. 21, ed. 1887), after clause 5 shall be inserted the following

"6. In the case of any Professorship which is tenable only for a term of years, the Hebdomadal Council may at any time, within six months before the day on which such Professorship will become vacant, pass a resolution suspending the appointment in the manner prescribed by this Statute, or else may authorize proceedings to be taken for a new appointment, as if the office had already become vacant. The Council may proceed in like manner with respect to any Professorship which is tenable for life, in case the Professor has notified in writing to the Vice-Chancellor his intention of resigning the Professorship at any date within the six months following. Any Professor who has been appointed under this clause, before the occurrence of a vacancy, shall enter upon the duties of his office on the day when the vacancy occcurs, and shall be entitled to its emoluments from the same day."

2. In Statt. Tit. IV, sect. 1 § 2, there shall be added at the end of cl. 5 (c.), the following words, "or unless those present, being a majority of the whole Board are unamimous.'

The above Statute was approved by Convocation, on May the fifteenth, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, and the seal of the University affixed accordingly.

Borough of Swansea. Bye-laws as to Tramways.

OTICE is hereby given, that the following Bye-laws have been made by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the Borough of Swansea, acting by the Town Council as the Local Authority, under section 46 of the Tramways Act, 1870.

Interpretation.

1. For the purposes of these Bye-laws and Regulations the term "car" shall mean any carriage using the tramway laid down within the said borough, and the terms "driver" and "conductor" shall respectively mean the "driver" and "conductor," or other person having charge of

Speed of Cars.

2. The driver of every car shall cause the same to be driven at a speed of not less than five miles an hour on the average, and not exceeding eight miles an hour.

Distance between Cars.

3. The driver of every car shall so drive the same

that it shall not follow a preceding car at a less distance than thirty yards.

Stopping to take up or set down Passengers. 4. Subject to the requirements of Bye-laws Nos. 3 and 5, the driver or conductor of a car shall stop the same for the purpose of setting down or taking up passengers, when required by any passenger desiring to leave the car, or by any person desirous of travelling by the car, for whom there is room, and to whose admission no valid objection can be made; provided that nothing in this Bye-law shall require a car to be stopped on any gradient steeper than 1 in 25.

5. Except at a passing place or terminus, no car shall be stopped at the intersection or junction of two or more streets or roads, nor within ten yards of a car on an adjoining line of rails.

Bell or Whistle to be sounded when Obstruction

ahead.

6. The driver of a car, on coming in sight of a vehicle standing or travelling on any part of the road so as not to leave sufficient space for the car to pass, shall sound his bell or whistle as a warning to the person in charge of such vehicle, and that person shall, with reasonable despatch, cause such vehicle to be removed so as not to obstruct

Traffic not to be interfered with.

7. No person shall in any way wilfully impede or interfere with the traffic on the tramways, nor shall any driver or conductor needlessly cause interruption to the ordinary road traffic.

Penalties.

8. Every driver, conductor, or other person offending against any of these Bye-laws and Regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings for each offence, and not exceeding for any continuing offence ten shillings for every day during which the offence continues.

9. These Bye-laws shall come into force on the 30th August, 1888.
