WHEREAS Her Majesty, by virtue of the authority committed to Her by the International Copyright Acts, 1844 to 1886, and having regard to the provisions of a Convention the ratifications of which were exchanged on the fifth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, between Her Majesty and the Governments of the foreign countries named in the said Order, was pleased to make an Order in Council dated the twenty-eighth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, with respect to the protection to be given by way of copyright to the authors of literary and artistic works first produced in one of the said foreign countries:

And whereas it has been intimated to Her Majesty's Government that the Government of the Grand Duchy of Luxembourg have notified the accession of that co: ntry to the said Convention:

And whereas Her Majesty in Council is satisfied that the said Grand Duchy of Luxembourg has made such provisions as it appears to Her Majesty expedient to require for the protection of authors of works first produced in Her Majesty's dominions:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, and by virtue of the authority committed to Her by the said Acts, doth declare, and it is hereby declared, that the provisions of the said Order hereinbefore specified shall extend to the said Grand Duchy of Luxembourg.

This Order shall come into operation on and from the date hereof.

And the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary orders herein accordingly.

HEREAS by the "Foreign Deserters Act, 1852," it is provided that whenever it is made to appear to Her Majesty that due facilities are or will be given for recovering and apprehending seamen who desert from British merchant ships in the territories of any foreign power, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council stating that such facilities are or will be given, declare that seamen, not being slaves, who desert from merchant ships belonging to a subject of such power when within Her Majesty's dominions shall be liable to be apprehended and carried on board their respective ships, and may limit the operation of such Order, and may render the operation thereof subject to such conditions and qualifications, if any, as may be deemed expedient:

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that due facilities will be given for recovering and apprehending seamen who desert from British merchant ships in the territories of

the Independent State of the Congo:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Her by the said "Foreign Deserters Act, 1852," and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, that, from and after the publication hereof in the London Gazette seamen, not being slaves and not being British subjects, who within Her Majesty's dominions desert from merchant ships belonging to citizens of the Independent State of the Congo shall be liable to be apprehended and carried on board their respective ships; provided always, that if any such deserter has committed any crime in Her Majesty's dominions he may be detained till he has been tried by a competent Court, and until his sentence, if any, has been carried into effect:

And the Secretary of State for the Home Department, the Secretary of State for the Colonies, and the Secretary of State for India in Council, are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

HEREAS by "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it is enacted that the word "lighthouses" shall in addition to the ordinary meaning of the word include floating and other lights exhibited for the guidance of ships, and that "buoys and beacons" shall include all other marks and signs of the sea:

And whereas it is by the said Act further enacted that upon the completion of any new lighthouse, buoy, or beacon, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, fix such dues in respect thereof to be paid by the master or owner of every ship which passes the same or derives benefit therefrom as Her Majesty may deem reasonable, and may from time to time alter the amount thereof, and that such dues shall be paid and collected in the same manner, by the same means, and subject to the same conditions, in, by, and subject to which the light dues authorized to be levied by that Act are paid and collected:

levied by that Act are paid and collected:
And whereas by "The Merchant Shipping (Miscellaneous) Act, 1887," it is enacted that in "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," and the Acts amending the same, the expression "lighthouses" shall in addition to the meaning assigned to it by "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," include sirens and all other description of fog signals, and the expression "new lighthouse" shall include the addition to any existing lighthouse of any improved light or any siren, or any description of fog signals:

And whereas the Commissioners of Irish Lights are erecting a lighthouse on the Bull Rock, off the coast of the county of Kerry, and a light will shortly be exhibited therefrom, and are also about to establish in conjunction with the said light a siren or fog signal:

And whereas from and after the exhibition of the said light, the light at present exhibited from Dursey Head will be discontinued:

And whereas it is fit and proper that in respect of the said lighthouse, siren, or fog signal, the dues hereinafter mentioned should be fixed and levied.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and direct, and be it hereby ordered and directed that from and after the date of the exhibition of the said light from the said lighthouse on the Bull Rock or from and after the time of the receipt of notice of such exhibition by the officers authorized to collect light dues there shall be paid by and collected from the master or owner of every ship which passes the said lighthouse, siren, or fog signal, or derives benefit therefrom, the dues in the Schedule hereto in that behalf respectively mentioned, and Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to fix, and doth hereby fix, such dues in respect of the said lighthouse, siren, or fog signal, to be paid by the master or owner of every ship which passes the said lighthouse, siren, or fog signal, or derives benefit therefrom.

Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is further pleased to direct and order, and it is hereby ordered and directed, that the said dues shall be levied subject to the regulations and exemptions contained in the Consolidated Table of Light Duties, sanctioned by Orders in Council, dated respectively October twenty-fourth, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, May sixteenth, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, and

February twenty-first, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, and also in the special section of the Consolidated Tables, prepared in pursuance of an Order in Council, dated September sixth, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, and to such other regulations and exemptions as may from time to time be duly sanctioned, and subject further also to the gross abatement or discount of sixty-five per centum mentioned in an Order in Council, dated May third, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, or to such other abatement or discount as may for the time being be directed and be in force.

Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, doth further order and direct that from and after the date aforesaid no dues shall be paid or levied in respect of the lighthouse on Dursey Head.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-two; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the seventeenth day of May in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Your Majesty, chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Your Majesty, chapter eighty-two, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Matthias situate in the Caledonian-road in the new parish (sometime consolidated chapelry) of Saint Luke West Holloway in the county of Middlesex and in the dicese of London.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said new parish of Saint Luke West Holloway and of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint Andrew Islington, in the county and diocese aforesaid, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such new parishes respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient

that certain contiguous portions (being the portions containing the population aforesaid) of the said new parish of Saint Luke West Holloway, and of the said new parish of Saint Andrew Islington should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Matthias situate in the Caledonian-road as aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Frederick Bishop of the said diocese of London, as such Bishop, and with the consents of the Reverend Lewis Borrett White of number sixty-seven Queen-street in the city of London, Clerk in Holy Orders, of the Reverend John Hurst of Saint Mark's Vicarage Tollington Park, in the said county of Middlesex, Clerk in Holy Orders, of the Reverend Walter Sunderland Lewis of number seventy-one Hornseyrise in the said county, Clerk in Holy Orders, of Thomas Wall of number seven Highbury-grange, in the same county Merchant, and of William Edwards of number sixty-six Saint Mark's-road, North Kensington, in the same county, Gentleman, the patrons of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint Luke, West Holloway and with the consent of the Reverend William Edward Haigh, Clerk in Holy Orders, the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the new parish of the Holy Trinity Islington in the said diocese of London, and as such vicar or incumbent, the patron of the vicarage of the new parish of Saint Andrew Islington aforesaid (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said new parish of Saint Luke West Holloway, and of the said new parish of Saint Andrew Islington which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Matthias situate in the Caledonian-road as aforesaid and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Matthias, Caledonian-road, Islington.

"We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

" The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Matthias,

Caledonian-road, Islington comprising:—

"I. All that portion of the new parish (sometime consolidated chapelry) of Saint Luke West Holloway in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London, which is bounded upon the west by the parish of Saint Paul Camden New Town upon the south by the hereinafter described portion of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint Andrew Islington, and upon the east partly by the new parish of Saint Clement Barnsbury partly by the new parish of Saint David, West Holloway and partly by the new parish of Saint James (Lower Holloway) all in the county and diocese aforesaid, and upon the remaining side that is to say upon the north-west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the lastly-named new parish from the new parish of Saint Luke West Holloway aforesaid, at the point where the Caledonian-road is joined by Hillmarton-road and in the words following, that is to say:-

by the North-road which leads to and along the north-western side of the Metropolitan Cattle Market, and extending thence that is from the Caledonian-road aforesaid, south-westward along the middle of the said North-road for a distance of thirty-five chains or thereabouts to its junction, at the north-western entrance to the said market, with Brecknock-road, and continuing thence still south westward and in a direct line across the last-named road to the boundary on the western side of the same road which boundary divides the said new parish of Saint Luke West Holloway from the parish of Saint Paul Camden New Town aforesaid.

" II. And also all that contiguous portion of the said new parish of Saint Andrew Islington which is bounded upon the east by the new parish of Saint Clement Barnsbury aforesaid, upon the north by the hereinbefore-described portion of the new parish of Saint Luke, West Holloway aforesaid, upon the west partly by the parish of Saint Paul Camden New Town aforesaid and partly by the parish of Saint Thomas, Agar Town, in the county and diocese aforesaid, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the south partly by the new parish of Saint Michael Islington in the said county and diocese, and partly by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the last-named new parish from the new parish of Saint Andrew Islington aforesaid, at the centre of the bridge which carries the line of the North London Railway over the line of the Great Northern Railway, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the line of the North London Railway aforesaid for a distance of twenty chains or thereabouts to the boundary at the centre of the bridge which carries the same line of railway over the Caledonian-road aforesaid, which boundary divides the said new parish of Saint Andrew Islington from the new parish of Saint Clement Barnsbury aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London. HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her Majesty chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirtyfirst and thirty-second years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fourteenth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight,

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one bundred and thirteen and of the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-nine, and of the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and fourteen have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson and perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called 'the said benefice') of Sevenhampton in the county of Gloucester and in the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice is as to one moiety or half-part thereof vested for an estate in fee simple without incumbrances in Christian William Lawrence of Her Majesty's Diplomatic Service now Minister Resident and Consul-General to the Republic of Equador and his heirs and assigns; and as to the other moiety or half-part thereof, is vested in Goodwin Charles Colquitt Craven of Brockhampton Park in the said county of Gloucester Esquire for and during his life with remainder to Fulwar John Colquitt Craven for and during his life with remainder to Fulwar Lewis George Craven an infant son of the said Fulwar John Colquitt Craven subject to his attaining the age of twenty-one years in fee tail.

"And whereas the said right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Sevenhampton is exercised alternately by the said Christian William Lawrence and by the said Goodwin Charles Colquitt Craven.

"And whereas the said Christian William Lawrence and Goodwin Charles Colquitt Craven are and each of them is desirous that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Sevenhampton now vested in them by way of alternate patronage as aforesaid should be transferred to and be vested in the Bishop for the time being of the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Charles John now Bishop of the said diocese of Glouce-ter and Bristol is willing to accept such transfer and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which by the Acts hereinbefore mentioned or by some or one of them is made necessary he the said Bishop of the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of Sevenhampton which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will render the same benefice more eligible for augmentation out of funds under our control and we have provisionally agreed to make such an augmentation of the same benefice, and under these circumstances the said proposed transfer will in our opinion tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage or advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforcsaid arises or exists that is to say in the parish of Sevenhampton.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twenticth years of Your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of the Holy Trinity situate at Barnes in the parish of Barnes in the county of Surrey and in the diocese of Rochester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of the Holy Trinity situate at Barnes as

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Anthony Wilson Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Barnes which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of the Holy Trinity situate at Barnes as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry

of the Holy Trinity, Barnes.'

"And with the like consent of the said Anthony Wilson Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of the Holy Trinity situate at Barnes as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of the Holy Trinity,

Barnes, being: -

"All that part of the parish of Barnes in the county of Surrey and in the diocese of Rochester which is bounded upon the east upon the north and upon the north-west by the boundary in the middle of the River Thames which divides the said county and diocese from the county of Middlesex and from the diocese of London, and upon the remaining sides that is say upon the west and upon the south by an imaginary line commencing upon the said county and diocesan boundary at a point in the middle of the said River Thames, opposite to the south-western end of Chiswick Ait at Chiswick Ferry and extending thence south-eastward and in a direct line for a distance of five and a-half chains or thereabouts to a point upon the right bank of the said river at the northwestern end of Ferry-lane and continuing thence still south-eastward along the middle of the said lane for a distance of forty-three chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to a boundary-stone inscribed "B. H. T. D. C. 1888" and placed

Statutes to add to alter and amend the Statutes framed by the Commissioners appointed under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act 1877 (40 and 41 Vict. c. 48) in relation to Trinity College in the University of Cambridge duly made at a General Meeting of the Governing Body of the said College specially summoned for this purpose held on the twentieth day of April one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight and passed at such Meeting by the votes of more than two-thirds of the number of persons present and voting (there being then present the Master and more than twenty-five Fellows) and submitted for the approval of Her Majesty the Queen in Council.

WE the Master Fellows and Scholars of the said College do hereby in exercise of the powers given us by the fifty-fourth section of the said Act alter and amend the Statutes framed by the said Commissioners in relation to our said College in the following manner:-

By substituting for § 2 of Statute XII the following section to form an amended § 2 of the

same Statute : -

§ 2. The vacant Fellowships or so many of them as shall not be filled up under any of the titles  $(\beta)$   $(\gamma)$   $(\delta)$  or  $(\epsilon)$  temporarily suspended under the provision in that behalf hereinbefore contained shall be filled up (a) from among Members of the College (and if in any year the Council shall so think fit, other Members of the University) as next hereinafter provided (that is to say) any Member of the College (or other Member of the University who shall have been admitted to the title of Bachelor Designate in Arts or to some equal title shall be eligible at each or any of the three annual elections taking place or which might have taken place next after the end of three years and six months from the beginning of the term in which he commenced residence. Provided however that if a Member of the College has been by illness or other grave cause prevented from proceeding to a degree at the regular time the Council if they think fit may prolong in his case the said period of three years and six months so as to make him eligible at each or any of the three annual elections next after the time when he shall have been admitted to the title of Bachelor Designate in Arts or to some equal title.

By adding to Statute XII the following section to precede § 3 and to form § 2a of the same

Statute :-

§ 2a. The foregoing § 2 of Statute XII shall take effect from and after the approval thereof by Her Majesty in Council but so as not thereby to preclude any person who shall be then a Member of the College from becoming a Candidate at any annual election at which but for such alteration of Statute XII he might have been a Candidate nor in any case to enable such person to be a Candidate at more than three annual elections or otherwise than at three successive annual elections.

By substituting for § 2 of Statute XX the following section to form an amended § 2 of the same Statute:

§ 2. The election to the major Scholarships shall take place on the Monday after Easter week or on such other day as may be fixed by the Council. GENERAL ORDER of the Local Government Board: Altering General Consolidated Order as to Instruction of Children:-

Watford Union,

To the Guardians of the Poor of the Watford Union, in the county of Hertford :-And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS the Poor Law Commissioners. by a General Order dated the 24th day of July, 1847, addressed, among others, to the Guardians of the Poor of the said Watford Union, prescribed Regulations in regard to the government of the Workhouse or Workhouses of that Union, and by Article 114 of that Order provision was made for the instruction of the boys and girls who might be inmates of any such Workhouse:

And whereas it is expedient that the said Article 114 should be rescinded as regards the said Watford Union, and other provisions substituted in lieu thereof:

Now therefore, We, the Local Government Board, in pursuance of the powers given to Us by the Statutes in that behalf, hereby rescind Article 114 of the above-cited General Order so far as regards the said Watford Union, and We Order that the following provisions shall be substituted in lieu thereof:

ART. 114.—Except when the Guardians shall direct the School to be closed for holidays, the children who have attained the age of five years shall be instructed during at least eighteen hours in every week in reading, writing, and arithmetic, and the principles of the Christian religion, and such other instruction shall be imparted to them as may fit them for service and train them to habits of usefulness, industry, and virtue. The regulations in force for the time being prescribing what attendance at a Workhouse School shall be deemed to be an attendance for the purpose of the First Schedule to the Elementary Education Act, 1876, shall apply to the children in the School.

Provided, as follows:-

- 1. If the Guardians shall so direct, any child above the age of thirteen years who is in good health, and has been duly certified to have reached the Fourth Standard of the Code of 1876, or any higher Standard, may be employed upon works of industry for not more than seven hours in each week day. Any such child shall, however, be required to attend the classes for intellectual instruction during three half-days in each week, with the view of ensuring that the proficiency which the child has reached is maintained; except that if the Guardians shall so direct, any such child who has been out to service and has returned to the Workhouse may be employed wholly upon works of industry, without being required to attend the classes for intellectual instruction.
- 2. Nothing in this Article shall be deemed to relieve the Guardians or any child from any duty or liability imposed by the Elementary Education Acts, or by any Bye-laws made under those Acts and in force in the School District in which the Workhouse is situate.

MAGELLAN STRAIT TO ARAUCO BAY.

Amended Positions, Existence, and Non-Existence

of Certain Islands and Dangers.
THE following information relating to the positions, existence, and non-existence of certain islands and dangers on the western coast of South America, between Magellan Strait and Arauco Bay, is derived from a report and observations by Mr. J. T. Walbran, of the Pacific Steam Navi-

gation Company's steam-vessel "Aconcagua," July, 1888:

(1.) Cambridge Island—West Coast.—Amended Position of Islet Westward of Cape George.

The true position of the islet, marked on Admiralty Charts, W. by N.  $\frac{1}{2}$  N., distant  $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Cape George, south-western extreme of Cambridge Island, is, by careful observations from the "Aconcagua," considered to be W. by N.  $\frac{3}{4}$  N., distant  $3\frac{1}{2}$  miles from Cape George, or in lat. 51° 34′ 15″ S., long. 75° 22′ 45″ W.

(2.) Hanover Island-West Coast.-Amended Positions of Duncan Rock and White Horse Island, and Non-Existence of certain Dangers.

The true position of Duncan Rock, as determined by the "Aconcagua," on many occasions, by the course and distance run from Cape George, is lat. 51° 10′ S., long. 75° 27′ W.

White Horse Island, the position of which has

been ascertained in the same way as that of Duncan Rock, extends from lat. 51° 6′ 30″ S., to lat. 51° 8′ 15″ S., and from long. 75° 9′ 30″ W., to long. 75° 11′ 15″ W.

A conical islet is situated south-eastward of Duncan Rock, in lat. 51° 13' 10" S., long.

75° 25′ W.

The rocks and islets marked on Admiralty Charts, north-westward of Cambridge Island, and comprised between lats. 51° 23′ 30″ S., and 51° 26′ 30″ S., and longs. 75° 15′ W. and 75° 22′ W., are reported to have no existence, and they have been expunged from the charts.

Note.—The charts of the above localities are principally the result of information supplied by sealers and are very imperfect. Mariners are therefore cautioned that great care is necessary

when navigating in this vicinity.

(3.) Campana Islanu—rrow Position of Western Rock, and Non-Existence Campana Island-West Coast.-Amended of certain Islands and Dangers.

From good observations, taken at noon, on two occasions, from the "Aconcagua," with the western rock off the land to the northward of Cape Montague, close abeam, the latitude of that rock was found to be 49° 5' S., and longitude (as

previously marked on charts) 75° 49′ 15″ W.

The rock in latitude 49° 0′ 30″ S., longitude 75° 49′ 15″ W., and the dangers northward of it have therefore been expunged, and the rock whose position is now given, has been called Western Rock on the charts. It is conical.

The island, marked on Admiralty Charts 2 miles eastward of the above position of Western Rock,

is reported not to exist.

A reef, which breaks heavily, is situated northward of Western Rock, in latitude 49° 1' 15" S., longitude 75° 49' W.

The islands marked on Admiralty Charts between latitudes 48° 56′ 30″ S., and 48° 59′ S., and longitude 75° 46′ W., are reported, if they exist at all, to be eastward of the above positions.

(4.) Arauco Bay-Southern Approach.-Non-Existence of Dangers.

The danger westward of Carnero Head, in latitude 37° 21' S., longitude 73° 46' 30" W., marked, Reported Breakers, 1880, has been repeatedly looked for, and not seen, by the "Aconcagua"; on a recent occasion with a strong breeze from the southward, and fine clear weather, Maule Shoal being plainly visible, that vessel passed about 2 cables westward of the reported position of this danger off Carnero Head, and observed no trace of breakers on that spot. has therefore been expunged from the Admiralty Charts.

The locality of the danger westward of Santa Maria Island, on which the "John Renwick" was reported to have been wrecked, July, 1848, in latitude 36° 59' S., longitude 78° 44' W., has been frequently passed over by the steam-vessels of the Pacific Company, and it is reported that the commanders of those vessels have never observed any danger in that position. These reports are corroborative of similar that have been previously received; and the rock has consequently been expunged from the Admiralty Charts.
