HE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Disenses (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1886, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The provisions of Article 73 (Swine-Fever Infected Circle) of The Animals Order of 1886, as amended by Article 2 of The Animals (Amendment) Order of 1888, No. 2, shall apply and extend to and be in force in the District mentioned in the Schedule to this Order, and shall continue to apply and extend to and be in force in that District until the Privy Council by further Special Order direct and order; and the Order of Council dated the sixtcenth day of September, one thou-sand eight hundred and eighty-six, which applies the said provisions to certain Districts therein named, shall be read and have effect as if the District named in the Schedule to this Order was also named in that Order.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the tenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight.

## (PLEURO-PNEUMONIA.)

T the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 11th day of December, 1888.

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1886, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

1. The following Area (namely),—in the parish of Ashton-under-Lyne, in the county of Lancaster, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the north and west Coal Pit road to the Canal bridge at Crimes, and on the '

south and east a sheet of water and a brook to Coal Pit road aforesaid,-which was declared by Order of Council dated the fifth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, to be an Area infected with pleuro-pneumonia, is hereby declared to be free from pleuro-pneumonia, and that Area shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an Arca infected with pleuropneumonia.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the twelfth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight.
