WHEREAS by Treaty, grant, usage, sufferance, and other lawful means Her Majesty the Queen has power and jurisdiction in relation to Her Majesty's subjects and others, within the dominions of His Highness the Sultan of Zanzibar:

And whereas by the Zanzibar Order in Council of 1884 provision has been made for the exercise

of such power and jurisdiction:

And whereas a state of war exists between Her Majesty and other Powers in belligerent alliance with the State of Zanzibar, on the one hand, and insurrectionary subjects of the Sultan and other African tribes and populations on the other hand; and a blockade of the coast of Zanzibar has been proclaimed, and is to be enforced by the naval forces of Her Majesty and of the other allied Powers co-operating for that purpose:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf by the Foreign Jurisdiction Acts, 1843 to 1878, or otherwise, in Her Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

order, and it is hereby ordered as follows:—
1. This Order may be cited as "The Zanzibar (Prize Court) Order in Council, 1889."

2. This Order shall come into operation as from its date, and shall be forthwith published in the London Gazette, and shall continue in operation until the termination of the recited state of war and blockade shall have been notified by the Secretary of State in the London Gazette, and thereafter, for the purposes of any then pending

causes or matters, until the same are finally determined and concluded.

3. The Consul-General shall for the purposes of this Order have all such jurisdiction as ordinarily belongs to a Court of Vice-Admiralty in Her Majesty's possessions abroad, and shall hold a Court for the purposes of this Order (hereinafter referred as "the Court"), and shall have authority to take cognizance of, and judicially proceed in, matters of prize.

4. Part II of "The Naval Prize Act, 1864," and Part III, secs. 34 to 37, both inclusive (set forth in the schedule to this Order), so far as the same are applicable, shall have effect as if they

were set forth in this Order.

5. Expressions defined in section 2 of "The Naval Prize Act, 1864" (set forth in the schedule to this Order), shall have the same meanings for the purposes of the application of the provisions of that Act to this Order.

6. An appeal shall lie to Her Majesty in Council from any Order or Decree of the Court under this Order, in the manner, and subject to the provisions, directed by sections 5 to 8 (both inclusive), of "The Naval Prize Act, 1864" (set forth in the schedule to this Order).

7. The Consul-General shall appoint a Registrar

and a Marshal of the Court.

8. The Consul-General shall have power from time to time to make rules for regulating the procedure and practice in the Court, and the fees to be taken therein. Such rules shall be submitted to the Secretary of State, and shall have effect unless and until disapproved by him.

9. Subject to the provisions of this Order, and of the provisions of "The Naval Prize Act, 1864," applied by this Order, the provisions of the Zanzibar Order in Council of 1884 shall be applicable for the purposes of this Order, and the Court acting under this Order is, for the purposes of the last-mentioned provisions, included in the expression "the Court." Provided that no appeal shall lie in any cause or matter of prize otherwise than in accordance with this Order.

10. A printed copy of this Order shall be kept exhibited in the office of the Consul-General, and printed copies thereof shall be sold at such reason-

able price as the Consul-General directs.

And the Most Honourable the Marquess of Salisbury, and the Right Honourable Viscount Cross, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

SCHEDULE.

"NAVAL PRIZE ACT, 1864."

Section 2. In this Act-

The term "The Lords of the Admiralty" means the Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom, or the Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral.

.The term "The High Court of Admiralty" means the High Court of Admiralty of England.

The term "any of Her Majesty's ships of war" includes any of Her Majesty's vessels of war, and any hired armed ship or vessel in Her Majesty's service.

The term "officers and crew" includes Flag Officers, Commanders, and other officers, engineers, seamen, marines, soldiers, and others on board any of Her Majesty's ships of war.

The term "ship" includes vessel and boat,

with the tackle, furniture, and apparel of the ship,

vessel, or boat.

The term "ship papers" includes all books, passes, sea briefs, charter parties, bills of lading, cockets, letters, and other documents and writings delivered up or found on board a captured ship.

The term "goods" includes all such things as are by the course of Admiralty and law of nations the subject of adjudication as prize (other than

5. An appeal shall lie to Her Majesty in Council from any Order or Decree of a Prize Court, as of right in case of a final Decree, and in other cases with the leave of the Court making the Order or Decree.

Every appeal shall be made in such manner and form, and subject to such Regulations (including Regulations as to fees, costs, charges, and expenses) as may for the time being be directed by Order in Council; and in the absence of any such Order, or so far as any such Order does not extend, then in such manner and form and subject to such Regulations as are for the time being prescribed or in force respecting maritime causes of appeal.

6. The Judicial Committee of the Privy Council shall have jurisdiction to hear and report on any such appeal, and may therein exercise all such powers as for the time being appertain to them in respect of appeals from any Court of Admiralty Jurisdiction, and all such powers as are under this Act vested in the High Court of Admiralty, and all such powers as were wont to be exercised by the Commissioners of Appeal in prize causes.

7. All processes and documents required for the purposes of any such appeal shall be transmitted to, and shall remain in the custody of, the Registrar of Her Majesty in Prize Appeals.

8. In every such appeal the usual inhibition shall be extracted from the Registry of Her Majesty in Prize Appeals within three months after the date of the Order or Decree appealed from if the appeal be from the High Court of Admiralty, and within six months after that date if it be from a Vice-Admiralty Prize Court.

The Judicial Committee may, nevertheless, on sufficient cause shown, allow the inhibition to be extracted, and the appeal to be presented after the expiration of the respective periods aforesaid.

i6. Every ship taken as prize, and brought into port within the jurisdiction of a Prize Court, shall forthwith, and without bulk broken, be delivered up to the Marshal of the Court.

If there is no such Marshal, then the ship shall be in like manner delivered up to the principal

officer of Customs at the port.

The ship shall remain in the custody of the Marshal, or of such officer, subject to the Orders of the Court.

17. The captors shall, with all practicable speed after the ship is brought into port, bring the ship papers into the Registry of the Court.

The officer in command, or one of the chief officers of the capturing ship, or some other person who was present at the capture, and saw the ship papers delivered up or found on board, shall make oath that they are brought in as they were taken, without fraud, addition, subduction, or alteration, or else shall account on oath to the satisfaction of the Court for the absence or altered condition of the ship papers, or any of them.

Where no ship papers are delivered up or found on board the captured ship the officer in command, or one of the chief officers of the capturing ship, or some other person who was present at the

capture, shall make oath to that effect.

18. As soon as the affidavit as to ship papers is filed a monition shall issue, returnable within twenty days from the service thereof, citing all persons in general to show cause why the cap-

tured ship should not be condemned.

19. The captors shall, with all practicable speed after the captured ship is brought into port, bring three or four of the principal persons belonging to the captured ship before the Judge of the Court, or some person authorized in this behalf, by whom they shall be examined on oath on the standing interrogatories.

The preparatory examinations on the standing interrogatories shall, if possible, be concluded within five days from the commencement thereof.'

20. After the return of the monition the Court shall, on production of the preparatory examinations and ship papers, proceed with all convenient speed either to condemn or to release the captured ship.

21. Where, on production of the preparatory examinations and ship papers, it appears to the Court doubtful whether the captured ship is good prize or not, the Court may direct further proof to be adduced, either by affidavit or by examination of witnesses, with or without pleadings, or by production of further documents; and on such further proof being adduced the Court shall with all convenient speed proceed to adjudication.

22. The foregoing provisions, as far as they relate to the custody of the ship and to examination on the standing interrogatories, shall not

apply to ships of war taken as prize.

23. At any time before final decree made in the cause, any person claiming an interest in the ship may enter in the registry of the Court a claim, verified on oath.

Within five days after entering the claim, the claimant shall give security for costs in the sum of £60; but the Court shall have power to enlarge the time for giving security, or to direct security to be given in a larger sum, if the circumstances appear to require it.

24. The Court may, if it thinks fit, at any time direct that the captured ship be appraised.

Every appraisement shall be made by competent persons sworn to make the same according to the best of their skill and knowledge.

25. After appraisement the Court may, if it thinks fit, direct that the captured ship, be delivered up to the claimant on his giving security to the satisfaction of the Court to pay to the captors the appraised value thereof in case of condemnation.

26. The Court may at any time if it thinks fit, on account of the condition of the captured ship, or on the application of a claimant, order that the captured ship be appraised as aforesaid (if not already appraised), and be sold.

27. On or after condemnation the Court may,

if it thinks fit, order that the ship be appraised as aforesaid (if not already appraised), and be sold.

28. Every sale shall be made by or under the superintendence of the Marshal of the Court, or of the officer having the custody of the captured

29. The proceeds of any sale made either before or after condemnation, and after con-demnation the appraised value of the captured ship, in case she has been delivered up to a claimant on bail, shall be paid under an order of the Court either into the Bank of England to the credit of Her Majesty's Paymaster-General, or into the hands of an official accountant (belonging to the Commissariat or some other Department) appointed for this purpose by the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, or by the Lords of the Admiralty, subject in either case to such Regulations as may from time to time be made by Order in Council as to the custody and disposal of money so paid.

30. The captors may include in one adjudication any number, not exceeding six, of armed ships not exceeding one hundred tons each, taken within three months next before institution of

proceedings.

31. The foregoing provisions relating to ships sliall extend and apply, mutatis mutandis, to goods taken as prize on board ship; and the Court may direct such goods to be unladen,

inventoried, and warehoused.

32. If the captors fail to institute or to prosecute with effect proceedings for adjudication a monition shall, on the application of a claimant, issue against the captors, returnable within six days from the service thereof, citing them to appear and proceed to adjudication; and on the return thereof the Court shall either forthwith proceed to adjudication, or direct further proof to be adduced as aforesaid, and then proceed to adjudi-

33. Where any person, not an original party in tlië cause, intervenes on appeal, he shall enter a claim, verified on oath, and shall give security for

34. Where, in an expedition of any of Her Majesty's naval or naval and military forces against a fortress or possession on land, goods belonging to the State of the enemy, or to a public trading Company of the enemy exercising powers of government, are taken in the fortress or possession, or a ship is taken in waters defended by or belonging to the fortress or possession, a Prize Court shall have jurisdiction as to the goods or ship so taken, and any goods taken on board the sliip, as in case of prize.

35. Where any ship or goods is or are taken by any of Her Majesty's naval or naval and military forces while acting in conjunction with any forces or any of Her Majesty's allies, a Prize Court shall have jurisdiction as to the same as in case of prize, and shall have power, after condemnation, to apportion the due share of the proceeds to Her Majesty's ally, the proportionate amount and the disposition of which shall be such as may from time to time be agreed between Her Majesty and

Her Majesty's ally. 36. Before condemnation a Petition on behalf of asserted joint captors shall not (except by special leave of the Court) be admitted, unless and until they give security to the satisfaction of the Court to contribute to the actual captors a just proportion of any costs, charges, or expenses or damages that may be incurred by or awarded against the actual captors on account of the capture and detention of the prize.

(except by special leave of the Court) be admitted unless and until the asserted joint captors pay to the actual captors a just proportion of the costs, charges, and expenses incurred by the actual captors in the case, and give such security as aforesaid, and show sufficient cause to the Court why their Petition was not presented before con-

Provided, that nothing in the present section shall extend to the asserted interest of a Flag Officer claiming to share by virtue of his flag.

37. A Prize Court, on proof of any offence against the law of nations, or against this Act, or any Act relating to naval discipline, or against any Order in Council or Royal Proclamation, or of any breach of Her Majesty's instructions relating. to prize, or of any act of disobedience to the orders of the Lords of the Admiralty, or to the command of a superior officer, committed by the captors in relation to any ship or goods taken as prize, or in relation to any person on board any such ship, may, on condemnation, reserve the prize to Her Majesty's disposal, notwithstanding any grant that may have been made by Her Majesty in favour of captors.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf by the Foreign Jurisdiction Acts, 1843 to 1878, or otherwise in Her Majesty vested, is pleased by and with the advice of Her Privy Council to order, and it is hereby ordered as follows:

1. This Order may be cited as "The Zanzibar Order in Council, 1888," and shall be construed as one with the Zanzibar Order in Council of

1884, herein called the principal Order.
2. The Consul-General shall have power from time to time to make Regulations for peace, order, and good government, and for enforcing the observance of any Treaty or Convention to which Her Majesty may be a party, and for enforcing the observance of any local law or decree for the time being in force made by or under the authority of the Sultan of Zanzibar. Every such Regulation shall be binding on all British subjects and British protected persons in Zanzibar, and if any such subject or person contravenes any such Regulation he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the principal Order, and shall, on conviction before a Court of competent. jurisdiction, be liable to be punished with fine which may extend to one thousand rupees, or with imprisonment which may extend to two months, or both; and the Court may declare any goods in respect of which such Regulation has been contravened to be forfeited, and may enforce such forfeithre in any mode in which any judgment of the Court may be enforced or executed.

Every such Regulation shall be published and exhibited by the Consul-General in his public office during one calendar month, and shall come After condemnation such a Petition shall not into operation at the expiration of one culturdar month after the first publication thereof, or at such earlier time, not being less than seven clear days from the first publication thereof, as may be

appointed in and by such Regulation.

Every such Regulation shall, as soon as practicable after the making thereof, be transmitted to the Secretary of State, who may disallow the same or any part thereof, and upon such disallowance being signified to the Consul-General, the Regulation or part disallowed shall cease to have effect, but not so as to invalidate further or otherwise than the Secretary of State or the Consul-General directs anything done or suffered before such signification is made or before effect can be given thereto.

A printed copy of any such Regulation purporting to be sealed with a Consular Seal, or to be verified by the signature of the Consul-General, or of a judicial assistant, shall be evidence of the due making and publication of such

Regulation.

Printed copies of every such Regulation for the time being in force shall be supplied for sale at the office of the Consul-General at a price not exceeding one rupee for the whole of such Regulations.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of the Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding " of benefices in plurality, and to make better " provision for the residence of the clergy, reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, "hamlets, chapelries, and other places or dis-"tricts may be separated from the parishes or "mother churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and places altogether extraparochial may in some instances with advantage " be annexed to parishes or districts to which they "are contiguous, or be constituted separate "parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That when with "respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the "Archbishop of the Province, or when the "Rishop of any diocese shall represent to the said "Archbishop that any such tithing, hamlet, " chapelry, place or district within the diocese of " such Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, "as the case may be, may be advantageously " separated from any parish or mother church and "either be constituted a separate benefice by "itself or be united to any other parish to which " it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any " other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, " or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to "form a separate parish or benefice, or that any " extra-parochial place may with advantage be " annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous " or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesias-"tical purposes: and the said Archbishop or "Bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the " scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the " said Archbishop for his consideration) describing "the mode in which it appears to him that the " alteration may best be effected, and how the " changes consequent on such alteration in respect "to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes,

" rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, " and payments, and in respect to patronage and " rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested: and if the patron or patrons " of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such "alteration shall consent in writing under his or " their hands to such scheme, or to such modifica-"tion thereof as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full " consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any " such scheme or modification thereof, and shall. " certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, "by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it " shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to " make an Order for carrying such scheme, or "modification thereof, as the case may be, into " effect.

And whereas by another Act of Parliament passed in the second and third years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to "make better provision for the assignment of Ecclesiastical Districts to Churches or Chupels " augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of "Queen Anne; and for other purposes," it is, amongst other things, further enacted, "That when "by any Order of Her Majesty in Council as " aforesaid, a separate parish for ecclesiastical pur-" poses is constituted, the same shall, on regis-" tration thereof, and with the consent in writing " of the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice "or benefices to be thereby affected, become a " perpetual curacy and benefice, and the minister "thereof, duly nominated and licensed thereto, "and his successors, shall be a body politic and "corporate, with perpetual succession, and may " receive and take to himself and his successors " all such lands, tenements, tithes, rent-charges, " and hereditaments as shall be granted unto him " or them, and such perpetual curate shall thence-"forth have within the limits of the district " parish formed under the Church Building Acts, " for the church of such perpetual curacy, sole "and exclusive cure of souls, and shall not in " anywise be subject to the controul or interference " of the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice " or benefices to be affected by such Order, if he " or they shall have consented to such Order as " aforesaid."

And whereas the Right Reverend Ernest Roland, Lord Bishop of Newcastle, hath represented in a writing dated the thirtieth July one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend William, Lord Archbishop of York as follows:—

"To the Most Reverend William Lord Archbishop of York.

"I the Right Reverend Ernest Roland Lord Bishop of Newcastle do hereby represent to your Grace that there is in the county of Northumberland, in my diocese of Newcastle, the rectory of Bothal the parish whereof comprises amongst other places the townships of Ashington, Sheepwash and Bothal Desmesne the boundaries whereof are well-known and defined certains portions of which said townships of Ashington Sheepwash and Bothal Demesne are more particularly described in the scheme and schedule hereafter written and are hereinafter referred to as 'the proposed parish or benefice of Ashington."

"That the population of the said parish of Bothal is estimated to be six thousand two hundred.

"That the population of the said proposed parish or benefice of Ashington is estimated to be four thousand one hundred.

's That there is a church situate within the said township of Ashington convenient for the use of the inhabitants of the said proposed parish or benefice of Ashington.

"That the net annual value of the said benefice of Bothal is one thousand five hundred and fifty-

"That the patronage of the said benefice being a rectory of Bothal is vested in William John Arthur Charles James Cavendish Bentinck Duke of Portland and the Honourable and Reverend William Charles Ellis is the incumbent thereof.

"That the said patron and incumbent of the said benefice are consenting parties to the scheme

hereinafter proposed.

"That it appears to us that under the provisions of the Acts of Parliament passed in the sessions held in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty chapter one hundred and six and the second and third years of the reign of Her present Majesty chapter forty-nine the said portions of the said townships of Ashington, Sheepwash and Bothal Demesne as the same are more particularly described in the said scheme and schedule may advantageously be separated from the said parish of Bothal and be constitute I a separate parish and benefice for ecclesiastical purposes.

That pursuant to the directions contained in the twenty-sixth section of the first-mentioned Act of Parliament I the said Lord Bishop have drawn up a scheme in writing appended to this representation describing the mode in which it appears to me that the separation above proposed may be best effected and how the change consequent upon such separation may be made with justice to all parties interested and I do submit the same to your Grace to the intent that your Grace may if on full consideration and enquiry you shall be satisfied with the said scheme certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to Her Majesty in Council.

"Given under my hand this thirtieth day of July one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight. " E. R. Newcastle.

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop of Newcastle, and the consents referred to in the said representation are as follows :

" The SCHEME referred to in the above Representation is as follows:

"It is proposed that portions of the township of Ashington Sheepwash and Bothal Desmesne in the parish of Bothal in the county of Northumberland and diocese of Newcastle boundaries whereof are well-known and defined and are more particularly set out in the first schedule hereto) shall be severed from the said parish of Bothal to which they now belong and be constituted a separate benefice and a parish for ecclesiastical purposes under the name or style of the parish or benefice of Ashington of which the said church situated within the said township of Ashington shall be the parish church.

"That the rector of the parish of Bothal shall cease to have cure of souls within the said proposed parish or benefice of Ashington and that the inhabitants of the said proposed parish or benefice of Ashington shall be exonerated from all liability to repair the parish church of Bothal or any other church or chapel now or

hereafter to be erected within that parish.

"That the said proposed parish or benefice of Ashington shall be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said benefice of Bothal and that the incumbent of the said proposed parish or benefice shall have exclusive charge of souls within the limits of the same.

"That two churchwardens shall be chosen annually in the accustomed manner and at the time when churchwardens are usually appointed in or for such proposed parish or benefice and every person so appointed shall be duly admitted and shall do all things pertaining to the office of churchwarden as to ecclesiastical matters within

the said proposed parish or benefice.

"That baptisms, churchings, marriages, and burials shall be performed in the church of the said proposed parish or benefice and all fees and payments for the same and other ecclesiastical dues offerings and emoluments usually payable to the incumbent of a benefice as shall arise therein shall thenceforth belong and be paid to the incumbent of the said proposed parish or benefice of Ashington.

"That the parishioners of the said proposed parish or benefice shall not be entitled to any accommodation in the parish church of Bothal.

"That the patronage or right of nomination of a minister to serve the proposed parish or benefice of Ashington shall be vested in the said Ernest Roland Lord Bishop of Newcastle and his successors Lords Bishops of Newcastle for ever.

"That the endowment particulars of which are entered in the second schedule hereto shall from and after the date of the scheme taking effect be separated from the endowment of the said parish of Bothal and shall belong to and become part of the endowment for the minister of the said proposed parish or benefice of Ashington.

"That no alteration shall be made as to the

patronage of the said parish of Bothal.

"The FIRST SCHEDULE above referred to. " All that portion of the township of Ashington situate in the parish of Bothal in the county of Northumberland and diocese of Newcastle which is bounded on the north and east by the township of Bothal Demesne on the south partly by the River Wansbeck and partly by that portion of the township of Sheepwash hereafter described and on the west by the highway leading from Sheepwash to the North-Eastern Railway. Also all that portion of the township of Sheepwash (also situate in the said parish of Bothal) which is bounded on the north by the said township of Ashington on the east by the River Wansbeck and on the south and west by the said highway.

"And also all that portion of the township of Bothal Demesne (also situate in the parish of Bothal) which is bounded on the north partly by the township of Old Moor in the said parish of Bothal and partly by the parish of Woodhorn on the east by the said parish of Woodhorn on the south partly by the River Wansbeck and partly by the said portion of the township of Ashington and on the west partly by the said portion of the township of Ashington and partly by the said

highway.

"All which said portions of the townships of Ashington Sheepwash and Bothal Demesne are more particularly delineated in the plan accompanying this scheme and are therein distinguished by being coloured round with green.

"The SECOND SCHEDULE above referred to "The tithes of Ashington town- £ ship numbered 31 on the tithe map

and amounting at the commutation value to ... 109

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-nine and of the Acts therein mentioned that is to say the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen and the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-nine and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and fourteen have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called 'the said benefice') of Saint Luke, Chesterton, in the county of Cambridge and in the diocese of Ely.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint Luke, Chesterton is vested in the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the parish of

Chesterton in the said county of Cambridge and in the said diocese of Ely; out of which parish the new parish of Saint Luke Chesterton (being the benefice aforesaid) was formed.

"And whereas the Reverend Samuel Edgar

Perry, now Vicar or Incumbent of the said parish of Chesterton is desirous that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint Luke Chesterton now vested in him as aforesaid as such vicar or incumbent should be transferred to and be

vested in the Bishop for the time being of the

said diocese of Ely.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Alwyne, now Bishop of the said diocese of Ely, is willing to accept such transfer, and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary he the said Alwyne Bishop of the said diocese of Ely has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas a certain augmentation of the said benefice of Saint Luke Chesterton has through us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England and to our satisfaction been made upon condition nevertheless that the transfer of the advowson of the same benefice which in hereinafter mentioned and proposed shall be effected.

"And whereas under the circumstances aforesaid it appears to us that the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of Saint Luke Chesterton which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the new parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage or advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists that is to say in the said

new parish of Saint Luke Chesterton.

" Now therefore with the consent of the said Samuel Edgar Perry vicar or incumbent of the said parish of Chesterton acting as such vicar or incumbent (in testimony whereof he has signed and scaled this scheme) and with the consent of the said Alwyne Bishop of the said diocese of Ely (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal), we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint Luke Chesterton now vested in him the said Samuel Edgar Perry as such vicar or incumbent of the said parish of Chesterton as aforesaid shall be transferred from him the said Samuel Edgar Perry and from his successors vicars or incumbents of the said parish of Chesterton to the said Alwyne Bishop of the said diocese of Ely and his successors Bishops of the same diocese and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Alwyne Bishop of the said diocese of Ely and by his successors Bishops of the same diocese for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Ely.

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes to be taken out of the parish of Saint Mary, Nottingham, out of the new parish (sometime district chapelry,) of Saint Luke, Nottingham, out of the new parish (sometime particular district) of Saint Mark, Nottingham, and out of the district parish of Saint Paul, Nottingham, all in the town and county of the town of Nottingham, and in the diocese of Southwell.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said parish of Saint Mary, Nottingham, of the said new parish of Saint Luke, Nottingham, of the said new parish of Saint Mark, Nottingham, and of the said district parish of Saint Paul, Nottingham, which are hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in the manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes

of the second part, and us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners of the third part, (which said deed or indeuture is intended to be enrolled in the Chancery Division of Your Majesty's High Court of Justice), the said John Gray Richardson as such vicar of the vicarage of Saint Mary, Not-tingham aforesaid did with the consent of the said George Lord Bishop of Southwell, as patron and Ordinary of the same vicarage, grant, convey, and confirm unto the minister (so soon as a mimister shall have been appointed) of the district of Saint Catharine, Nottingham, being the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, and to his successors, and to the incumbent (when such minister shall have become an incumbent) of the new parish of Saint Catharine, Nottingham, and his successors, for the time being, all those several pieces or parcels of land messuages and buildings situate in and having frontages to Glebe - street, London - road, Arkwright - street, Tealby-terrace, and Colsterworth-terrace in the new parish of Saint Saviour in the said town and county of the town of Nottingham, together with the annual rents issuing and payable out of the same, and amounting in the aggregate to one hundred and forty-eight pounds, nine shillings and nine pence per annum which said pieces or parcels of land messuages and buildings are more particularly described in the schedule and delinested and numbered on the plan appended to the said deed or indenture, as an endowment for the said intended district to be called (as is in the said deed or indenture mentioned) 'The District of Saint Catharine, Nottingham,' to the intent that as soon as may be, the said several pieces or parcels of land, messuages and buildings together with the annual rents issuing and payable thereout, may become vested in the minister of the said district after one shall have been appointed and licensed in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore secondly-mentioned Act and, so soon as the said district shall have become a new parish under the provisions of the same Act, then in the incumbent of such new parish and his successors for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of paironage of the said proposed district and when the same shall have become a new parish as aforesaid then of the said new parish and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereto shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid be assigned to and become absolutely vested in and shall and may be exercised by the said George Bishop of the said diocese of Southwell and by his successors Bishops of the same diocese of Southwell for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or to any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Par-

" The District of Saint Catharine, Nottingham,

comprising:

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth chapter seventy-seven of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her present Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen and of the Act of the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth years of Her said Majesty chapter sixty-three duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-second day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, in the words and figures following, that is to say:-

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England acting in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth chapter seventy-seven, of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth years of Your Majesty, chapter sixty-three, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme with respect to the rural deaveries which are within the two archdeaconries of the diocese of Chester to wit the Archdeaconry of Chester and the Archdeaconry of Macclesfield.

"Whereas by an Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the sixth day of September in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty and published in the London Gazette on the twenty-first day of the same month ratifying a scheme prepared by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, the said Archdeatwo schedules to that scheme annexed were set forth the contents of the several rural deaneries within that archdeaconry and within the said

Archdeaconry of Chester.

"And whereas it has been represented to us by the Right Reverend William, Bishop of the said diocese of Chester that the arrangements which are hereinafter recommended and proposed with respect to the said rural deaneries, or some of them, are desirable and should be carried into effect. And we are of opinion that the same may properly be carried into effects

"And whereas the said arrangements involve the formation of one new trural deanery within the said Archdeaconry of Chester and also the transfer of certain parishes or cures or churches from certain rural deaneries within the said Archdeaconry of Chester to certain other rural deaneries within the same archdeaconry, and the same arrangements also involve the formation of one new rural deanery within the said Archdeaconry of Macclesfield, and also the transfer of certain parishes or cures or churches from certain rural deaneries within the said Archdeaconry of Macclesfield to certain other rural deaneries within the same archdeaconry.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said William Bishop of the said diocese of Chester (in testimony whereof he has set his hand and episcopal scal to this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that as from the day on which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the Archdeaconry of Chester and the Archdeaconry of Macclesfield respectively shall comprise and consist of those rural deaneries the names of which are set down in order under the names of each of the two said archdeaconries respectively in the schedule to this scheme annexed, and that the name which in the said schedule is given to any rural deanery shall be the name thereof and that every parish or cure or church, the name of which is set down in numbered order in the first column of the said schedule under the name of the Archdeaconry of Chester or under the name of the Archdeaconry of Macclesfield, and under the name of any rural deanery in eitlier the one or the other of the same archdeaconries respectively shall belong to and be and form a part of the archdeaconry and of the rural deanery under the respective names of which it is set down as aforesaid and shall be subject to the jurisdiction and authority of the archdeacon of the same archdeaconry and of the rural dean of the same rural deanery and shall not belong to or be a part of any other archdeaconry, or any other rural deanery, or be subject to the jurisdiction or authority of any other archdeacon or rural dean, the intent of these our recommendations and proposals being that the said schedule to this scheme annexed shall as to the first column thereof be substituted as from the day herein lastlymentioned for those two schedules of the rural deaneries within the said diocese of Chester, which are, as aforesaid, annexed to the said scheme ratified by the Order of Your Majesty in Council herein firstly-mentioned as aforesaid; the second column of the said schedule to this present scheme annexed containing in the case of each of the said two archdeaconries a statement as to the name of the rural deanery within which each parish or cure or church named in the first column of the same schedule has been heretofore situate: which recommendations and proposals in this scheme and

in the said schedule thereto set forth as aforesaid will have the effect of making several alterations of the areas of certain of the rural deaneries within the said diocese of Chester and also of creating one new rural deanery within the same Archdeaconry of Chester to be called 'The Rural Deanery of Birkenhead' and the same recommendations and proposals will also have the effect of creating one new deanery within the Archdeaconry of Macclesfield aforesaid to be called 'The Rural Deanery of Mottram.'

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other matter or thing with respect to the matters aforesaid or any of them under or by virtue of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. HEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning "the burial of the dead in England beyond the

" limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act "concerning the burial of the dead in the Metro-"polis," it is enacted, that in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burialground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval or (as the case may require) that, after, a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burialgrounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the spicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the incumbent and vestry clerk or churchwardens of such

And whereas the Right Honourable Henry Matthews, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the incumbent and the churchwardens of the parish hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation made a representation stating that he was of opinion that the Orders of Her Majesty in Council of the fourth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and fitty-six, the second day of February, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, and the twenty-seventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, in so far as they affect burials in the parish of Old Swinford, in the county of Worcester, should be varied, and that the following directions should be substituted for those contained in the said Orders, with respect to burials in the church and churchyard of that parish:

And in the rest of the churchyard, except as follows:

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing, burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemeuted:

graves now existing as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the following relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order, namely, widows, widowers, children, grandchildren, brothers, sisters, uncles, aunts, nephews, nieces, and first cousins, as can be buried at or below that depth:

(c.) In such grave spaces (as have never before been buried in, and which when opened are free from water) burials may be allowed of so many bodies as can be buried at or below the depth of five feet.

This Order does not apply to any part of the said churchyard that has been opened with the approval of the Secretary of State under the Burial Acts. C. L. Peel.

14th December, 1888. POST OFFICE (MONEY ORDERS) ACTS, 1848 to 1883.

REGULATIONS MADE UNDER THE POST OFFICE (MONEY ORDERS) ACTS, 1848 TO 1883.

WHEREAS "The Post Office (Money Orders) Act, 1880," provides that, subject to the Post Office Regulations, the Postmaster-General with the consent of the Treasury may, for the purpose of the transmission of small sums through the Post Office, authorize his Officers, or any of them, to issue Orders (hereinafter referred to as Postal Orders) in the form set forth in the schedule to that Act, subject nevertheless to the provisoes contained in the said Act.

And whereas by the Post Office (Money Orders) Acts, 1848 and 1880, the Postmaster-General is authorized, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, to make Post Office Regulations relating to Money Orders and to the persons by or to whom Money Orders shall be paid and to the times at which and the mode in which the same shall be paid.

And whereas by "The Post Office (Moncy Orders) Act, 1883," certain alterations in the form of Postal Orders as set forth in the schedule to "The Post Office (Money Orders) Act, 1880," are sanctioned, and the Postmaster-General is empowered, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, to prescribe by Post Office Regulations further modifications of the form of Postal Orders and the several amounts (not exceeding 20s.) of such Orders, and the sums of poundage (not exceeding 2d.) to be taken in respect of such Orders, and it was amongst other things provided that where an arrangement is made with the Government of any British Possession for the transmission of small sums through the Post Offices of the United Kingdom and such British Possession by means of Money Orders of a like character to those issued under "The Post Office (Money Orders) Act, 1880," as amended by that Act, the said Act as amended by that Act should, so far as is consistent with the tenor thereof and subject to the prescribed modifications apply in like manner as if an Order issued

in pursuance of such arrangement whether by an Officer of the Post Office or of such British Possession was an Order under the said Act as amended by that Act, and that such portions of the said Act as enact punishment should apply accordingly.

And whereas an arrangement has been made with the Government of Newfoundland for the issue in Newfoundland, and for the payment in the United Kingdom and in Constantinople, of Postal Orders in the form and subject to the

Regulations hereinafter mentioned.

Now, therefore, I, the Right Honourable Henry Cocil Raikes, Her Majesty's Postmaster-General, in pursuance of the said Acts, and of all other powers enabling me in this behalf, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, do hereby order as follows:—

1. These Regulations shall come into operation on the first day of January, one thousand eight

hundred and eighty-nine.

2. Subject to the provisions of these Regulations, Postal Orders issued at any Post Office in Newfoundland may be paid in the United Kingdom and at Constantinople by any officer or person for the time being there authorized to pay Postal Orders issued in the United Kingdom.

3. Every Postal Order issued in Newfoundland shall be in the form and of one of the amounts specified in the Regulations made under the Post Office (Money Orders) Acts, 1818 to 1883, and dated the 28th day of January, 1881, or any other Regulations for the time being in force with reference to Postal Orders issued in the United Kingdom, and all the provisions of the said Regulations shall apply to Orders issued in Newfoundland so far as the nature of the case admits.

On every letter transmitted by post between the United Kingdom and the Australasian Colonies, wholly by sca, whether direct or via Suez by British Contract Packet Boat, there shall be charged and paid (in lieu of any rates now payable) for every half of an ounce in weight of such letter or fractional part of half of an ounce in weight a rate of postage of four pence.

Unpaid and insufficiently prepaid Letters.

3. Any letter posted in the United Kingdom addressed to either of the Australasian Colonies, or posted in either of those Colonies, addressed to the United Kingdom, upon which the postage chargeable under this Warrant is wholly or in part unpaid, shall be charged over and above the deficient postage with one additional rate of postage of four pence.

Application of Provisions of other Warrants.

4. All such letters as are hereinbefore referred to shall, subject to the provisions of this Warrants, be posted, forwarded, conveyed, and delivered, under and subject to the provisions of any Treasury Warrant now or for the time being in force applicable thereto.

Post Cards.
Rates of Postage.

5. On every post card transmitted by post between the United Kingdom and the Australa-lasian Colonies there shall be charged and paid, if transmitted via Brindisi or Naples, a rate of postage of three pence, and if transmitted wholly by sea, whether direct or via Suez by British Contract Packet Boat, a rate of postage of two pence.

Insufficiently prepaid Postcards.

6. Any Post Card posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to either of the Australasian Colonies, or posted in either of those Colonies, addressed to the United Kingdom, upon which the postage is partly but not wholly prepaid, shall be charged over and above the deficient postage with one additional rate of postage of three pence if transmitted vià Brindisi or Naples, and if otherwise transmitted as mentioned in this Warrant with an additional rate of postage of two pence.

Address only to be written on stamped side of Card.

7. The address and nothing else shall be written, printed, or otherwise impressed on the side of the Post Card which bears the impressed stamp, and no part of the address shall be written, printed, or otherwise impressed across such stamp.

Letters, &c., may be written, printed, &c., on unstampe l side of Card.

8. Anything (including a letter) may be written, printed, or otherwise impressed on the side of the post card which does not bear the impressed stamp.

Nothing to be attached to Card.

9. Nothing whatever shall be in any manner attached to a Card except a postage stamp or stamps in part prepayment of postage, nor shall a Post Card be cut or folded or otherwise altered.

Disposal of Cards not in Conformity with Warrant,

10. If any Post Card is sent by post otherwise than in conformity with this Warrant, it shall be detained and returned or given up to the sender thereof.

Newspapers.

11. Any Newspaper or Packet of Newspapers posted in the United Kingdom addressed to either of the Australasian Colonies, or posted in either of such Colonies addressed to the United Kingdom,

upon which the postage chargeable thereon is prepaid to the extent of one penny, but is nevertheless insufficiently prepaid, may, in lieu of being detained and returned to the sender thereof, be forwarded charged with double the amount of the deficient postage.

12. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of January, one thousand eight
