Pendennis, May 4.
N Thursday last, the Milford and Francis Fregats which came in the Monday before into this Harbor, went off again to sea to cruize upon the coasts; the Merlin Yatcht waits only a fair wind intende If r Ire and. Yesterday in the morning the wind at South-East, all the ships were under sail from the Downs, but the wind ru ning again South forced them back to their old station.

Rome, April 21. On Sunday morning last was with much Solemnity performed in St. Peters Church the Canoniza tion of a New Saint, Rosa, born in Peru, in the year 1586. where the also died in the year 1617, a Nun in the Convent of St. Dominick. The Church was richly hung with Tapeltry, and inscriptions to the honour of the New Saint, her Image placed upon the Altar, and about it the Arms of the Pope, the King of spain, the Ki gdom of Peru, and this Religious Dominican: during the Te Deum which was fing by the A ch-Bishop of Torsus, one of the Cano is of the Cathedral of St. Peter, were fired a greet number of Chambers, the Trumpets founding, Drums beating, and feveral vollies of thor mide by a Squadron of German foor drawn up neer the Church, after which a solemn Mass was lung by fix Quires of Mulick, in the presence of the Cardinals, Arch-Prietts, and many Princes, Princesses and Prelates: In the afternoon His Holiness with many Cardinals, Prelats and persons of Quality heard Vespres in the same Church, where were also present the Ambat adors and. Ministers of foreign Princes; the Evening spent in Lights and Fireworks.

The Popes Gallies are now well Equipped and may in few days put to sea for the affiftance of the Venetians. The Foot which are to be embarked upon them, being already marched thither in order thereunto, Several persons of Quality have engaged themse ves also in this service to accompany Don Vincenzo Raspigliosi, who'tis believed will set sail by

the end of this Month.

From Naples we are told that five Gallies of the Squadron belonging to that Kingdom, departed thence the 14th instant with 600 Italian Foot and 400 Spaniards, with great store of Ammunition for the reinforcement of the Garrisons in the Fores of Tuf any, but meeting with a sudden storm were the same day forced to put in at Bais.

Orders were given out for the leavying a new Tertia of Foot, but syet they have made but little advance thereing expecting first the issue of the Treaty between the two

Crowns.

The Vice-Roy has ordered 18 of the principal Cavaliers about Naples, to put them elves into an Equipage to artend him in an Embally to this Court, but he is not expected here

before the next Autumn.

Dantzig, April 28. The Ambassadors and Ministers of foreign Princes in the Court of His Majesty of Po'and having taken their leaves of the King at his departure form Warfam, were resolved to have diverted themselves during his ab ence in several parts. The French Ambassador intending for this place. The Electer of Brandenburghs Minister for Prussia, with the Duke of Neubargs Ambassadors and the Pores Nuncio in the same Character to Viennas whi her he is ordered by the Pope: but upon second thoughts they have changed their Res lucions, and are still at War-From whence we are also advertised, that the Coslacks under the Command of their General Lorosensko had made themselves masters of almost all Ukrania, Litte being lest unreduced, besides the City of Kiovie upon the Boristhenes.

The F ench party are now labouring to advance the Duke of Neuburgs pret misons to the su cession of the Crown of Po!and, but Lythuania seems rather to favour the Musco-

much Solemnity.

Venice, April 28. On Sunday last arrived here to the great latisfaction of the people, a Tartan lent by the Captain General of the Armata from Candia, bringing with him as a present to the Duke, several Flags and other Trophies of his Victory lately obtained against the Beiler Gallies of the Turks: Since which defeat Captain Molino has taken two other vessels passing from Morea to ards Canea, whereon were embarked a confiderable number of Pioneers and Soldiers; and the Admiral called the Lyon chaced feven other Turkish ships into the Ports of the Isles of Scios as they were failing from Alefandria, laden with So diers and Ammunicion for the reinforcement of the Visiers Army, where he attends their motion with a refolution to enga ethem, of which we thortly expect a good account.

He farther tells us that a French Privateer has in three feveral Encounters taken as many of the Turkish ships passing from Greece, laden with victuals and Ammunition designed for Canca, and that these siccei es have had a great influence upon the belieged, giving them much confiden e that the Turks will find as litt e fu cess in their attempts this year, as they met with the lift. That upon the entry of the rizes into the Port of Candia, where they were rec ived with infinite joy, even in the view of the knemy, and welcomed with the discharge of the Canon. General Villa having observed great numbers of the Tu kaidly gazing upon the Tilumpha of the besieged, suddenly sallied out upon them with a choice party of Officers and Sol iers, forcing them into their Camp, and doing execution on them within their own Redoubts, returni g with about an hundred Turks heads, which with Durach Beys, and several of their Turkish Captains kill'd in their defeat at lea, were placed upon Poles round the walls of the City, to the grettrerror of the ! Turks, and confusion of the Bassa, who was seen to tear his Beard, through impatience, to see all his designs so unexpectedly frustrated.

Upon the arrival of this News the Senators immediately atten ed the Duke to congratulate him for these happy successes; and with the foreign Ministers, the Popes Nuncio and Spanish Ambassador, and a great Train of the Nobility, went to the Church of St. Mark, where they heard Te Deum, and went in prorections as is usual upon the like occasion.

That Evening t e said C ptain General Morosini w s by the Senate honoured with Knighthood, and leveral honors were likewise conferred upon his Relationes and rewa de ordered to be distributed amongst such persons as had signalized themselves by their eminent services in that Angagement

From Vienna we are told that the warm reports of the great preparations made by the Turk's with a defign to have mirched into Dalmatia, are fince grown cold, having not any delign in appearance to disturb that Countrey, the forces which they had drawn together being only about 6000 which were to be fent into Candia for the reinforcement of the Grand Viliers Army, whereupon the forces which the Entperour had defigned to have funt to Count Serini to oppole them, are countermanaed.

'Tis laid the Turks feem much to favour Prince Michael Abassi of I ransy vania in his pretensions against Prince Ra getski, encouraging him to a rupture, promiting great affiltance to him to loon as he that have entred in the War, but 'tis not believed that Prince will be easily it duced to a violent

proceeding.

Bruges May 16, The Marquis de Crequy with the Army under his Command, having agreed with the Countrey for the in me of fifty five thousand Floring to save them harmless from their Incussions, is retired to his Post: The ders.

We have not yet any farther news of the arrival of Ton Juan. Count Marfin is still at the Fort Strikene expecting his arrival; but the Marquis de Castel-Rodrigo has given first Orders to all Governors and Officers within the Spannish Jurit siction to seite the person of the said Count, it they can find him southin illess Limits.

The French during their appearance in these parts have. in the Generalise been phorized to behave themselves of-derly towards the people, discharging what persons were taken by any of their Souldiers, and session what kories and Canal were taken away and confidera ion whereof the Governor of this place immediately discharged the French Priloners which the Country people had feifed as-they found them ftragling from their Colours

Paris, May 16. The Peace being now concluded at Aix; la Chapelle, and nothing now wanting, but the Ratification from Spain, which may be speedily-expected; His Majesty is resolved upon the Re o mation of his Army to disband his lite Augmentations of his Regiments which harintends to reduce from 50 Companies of 50 men apiece, to 24 Companies and 100 men apiece; the Captains and Lieutenants which are reformed to have halfe pay allowed them; the same Method is also to be observed in the Reformation of the Harle; but all Corners and Enligns for the future to be taken away.

His Majetty has dispatch'd away a Courier to the Pope to Communicate to him a Copy of the Treaty signed at Aix la Chapelle, (as 'tis faid to assure him that 10000 men sh 11 be ordered to affift the Venetians in the defence f Candia, but that they are to be sent under the Popes Name, 'tis thought the Command of them will be given to Monsieur

de Bellefonds.

Tis faid there is a private Negotiation now on foot for the exchange of some places which are by the late Treaty given

up to His Majesty, particularly, the County of Alest for Cambray, and other places; of weach we may heresites have more certain is tormation.

His Majesty has ordered new Live ies with blew Calfocks to be made for the Guards of the Body, valued at 700

livres a piece.

'Tis laid his Majesty for the ease of the People, intends to reduce the Officers employed in his Revenue ariling from Sat, and to abate 4 Crowns upon each Minor, or meafure of four French bushels of Salt: and to reduce all o the Tailies to the same proportion as they were in the Reign of Henry the Fourth.

The Earl of Clarendon having ome time fince suffered a notorious Violence in his Lodgings at Eureux, as he was on his way from Reven to Bourbon, from leveral Engish entertained in the service of His Most Christian Ma elly, and then quartered in that place, feveral of the Accomplices were in wediately apprehended, and have been fince arraign. ed for the Fact, and 4 of them by particular di ections from this King, executed; two of which were broken upon the Wheel, and the other two hanged.

At Malines they are forming a Process against several Officers of Franche-Comte, for not making a longer opposition again if the French Forces; but 'tistaid his Majesty having taken them under his protection, will also take care sup e-

ferve them from any levere animadvertion.

London, May 9. This day Thomas Limmerick, Fdward Cotton, Peter Messenger and Richard Beally, four of the persons formerly apprehended in the Tumult duting the Easter-holidays, haying upon their Trial at Hicks-Hall been found guilty, and fince fentenced as Traytors, were accordingly Drawn, Hang'd and Quartered at Tyburn, where they shewed many signs of their Penitence, their Quarters permitted Burial, ontumme is fince laid as a General Tax upon all Plaun-ty Two of their Heads ordered to be fixt upon a London-Briage.
