

# The London Gazette.

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Whitehall, September 20.

THE following Address has been presented to the King, which his Majesty received very Graciously.

Permit us, Great SIR,

**Y**our Majesties most Loyal and Faithful Subjects, the Field Officers of the several Regiments of the Auxiliaries of Your City of London, in the Name of our Selves and the rest of the Commission Officers in the said Regiments, to approach Your Sacred Person with all the Reverence and Respectful Duty of Subjects, to declare the Transport of Joy, that all our Hearts are filled with, to see Your Majesty safely Returned after so many great Perils and Dangers as Your Majesty hath exposed Your Royal Person too, for Reducing the worst of Rebels in Your Kingdom of Ireland to Their Obedience.

We heartily Congratulate Your Majesties Safe Return, and as Your Majesty hath not thought Your pretious Life so dear to hazard it, to deliver us from Popery and Slavery, and to secure us our Religion, Laws and Liberties, we unfeigned declare to Your Majesty, That we shall nevertheless our Lives too much to venture in Your Majesties Service in the greatest Danger.

May the great God of Heaven Bless abundantly Your Majesties Arms by Sea and Land, giving Your Majesties Victory over all Your Enemies, and a long and happy Reign over us; is the hearty Prayers of

From the Duke of Savoy's Camp near Moncalier, September 3. Our Army is daily reinforced, and in all appearance there will be very quickly some new Action, for so soon as the rest of the Succors (which are expected in few days) have joyned us, we shall march towards the French to dislodge them from Saluses; which they Fortify, burning and destroying the Country round with their accustomed Barbarity. The *Vaudais* in the mean time continue to do the Enemy a great deal of mischief, having, besides their other late Successes, within these three or four days, defeated near *Suse* a French Convoy of 700 Men, who were going to *Pignerol*, of whom they killed 200, and took 300 Mules laden with Ammunition and Provisions.

Turin, Sept. 4. On Thursday last, 10 pieces of Cannon were sent from the Arsenal here to our Army, which is encamped near *Marsalier*. The Regiment of *Lorrains*, consisting of above 2000 Men, is arrived in the Camp, and the rest of the Imperial Succors, with the reinforcement from *Milan* are daily expected. The French Army lies now between *Saviglian* and *Raconiggi*, and Monsieur *Catinat* has his head quarter in the last of these places. He has put 800 Men into *Saluses*, and has Published an Order, requiring the Inhabitants of that Marquisate to bring all their Arms and Ammunition into the Castle of *Saluses*; He has likewise laid a Bridge over the *Po*, near *Casale*; but we hope very suddenly to remove him from those Stations. We are assured from *Pignerol*, That the French had 250 Officers killed and wounded in the late battle of *Staffarde*, and that the Regiment of *Artois*, and the Dragons of *Languedoc*, were quite ruined in that Action.

Venice, September 8. We have advice from the *Morea*, That the Captain General *Cornaro*, after having put a good Garrison into *Napoli di Malvasia*, was gone with the Fleet towards the *Levant*, with a Resolution to attack the Ottoman Fleet, which he heard was at *Scio*. The Duke of *Mantua* arrived here this Week incognito.

Madrid, September 6. On Friday last died here Don *Pedro d'Arragon* in the 84th year of his Age. By his Death are become vacant the Presidentship of the Supreme Council of *Arragon*, and the Captainship of the Dutch Guards; The first it's believed will be given to the Duke de *Villa Hermosa*, now Viceroy of *Catalonia*, and the other to the Marquis de *Montelegre*, Son-in-Law to the Marquis de *los Balbases*. The Conde d'*Orceps* has resigned his Presidentship of *Castile*; and is made President of the Council of *Italy* upon the death of the Duke d'*Alva*; and the Archbishop of *Saragosa* is made Governor (not President) of the Council of *Castile*, which is done in favour to the Conde d'*Orceps*, who keeps the Precedency belonging to the Presidentship of *Castile*. The Viceroyship of *Navaire* is likewise become vacant by the Death of the Duke of *Bourbonville*, in which the Duke d'*Escalona* Maistre de Camp General of the Forces in *Catalonia*, seems the likeliest to succeed. The Popes Nuncio, Signior *Moffi*, had on the 25th past his publick Audience of the King. The new Spain Fleet is not expected at *Cadix*, till towards the end of this year.

Warsaw, September 9. The Letters from *Lemberg* give an account, that the Army of this Crown, consisting of 11000 Foot, and 6000 Horse, with a very good Train of Artillery, decamped the 28th past from *Baritz*, and marched towards the *Niefter*. That the Forces of *Lithuania* were likewise on their march, and that after their Conjunction they would enter into *Moldavia*. We have advice; That the Cham of *Tartary* is gone with a considerable Body of his Forces to joyn the Grand Vicer in *Bulgaria*; and that another party of *Tartars* is marched towards *Transilvania* to assist Count *Teckley*.

Vienna, September 14. On the 12th instant arrived here by Post the Marquis *Doria*, (who with General *Hessler* was taken Prisoner in the late Action near *Cronstadt*) having upon his Parole, obtained leave of Count *Teckley* for 20 days, to sollicite the Ransomes demanded, which are 10000 Ducats for each; with the restoring to *Teckley* his Wife and Children. General *Hessler* was taken by the *Tartars*, who not knowing him, sold him to *Teckley* for 70 Rixdollars.

As to the present State of Affairs in *Transilvania*, we have this account of it, as well by the Marquis *Doria*, as the first Letters from those parts, That *Teckley* (with whom was the Hospodar, or Prince of *Valachia*) was advanced no farther than *Cronstadt*, and had not yet been able to possess himself of one fortified place for want of Cannon. But that he had written to the States of *Transilvania*, (who were assembled with the young Prince *Abasti* at *Clausenburg*, to consider how to defend themselves) that if they did not by the fourth of this Month, acknowledge him for their Prince, he would destroy the Country with Fire and Sword. But this Term was expired before the Marquis *Doria* came away, and the States instead of complying with *Teckley*, had resolved to do all they could to oppose him.

In the mean time Prince *Louis of Baden* is hastning to their Assistance. Yesterday came in an Express from him with an account, that he passed the *Danube* the 4th instant, 2 Miles from *Semandria*, and took his march with the Imperial Army directly towards *Caransebes*; having sent General *Aspremont* with four Regiments to *Belgrade*, where he is to Command.

The same Express brought an account, That the Garrisons of *Nissa* and *Widin* make a very brave and vigorous defence, and that the Turks had been repulsed in an Assault they made on the 31st past upon the Outworks of the first of these places, with very great loss.

The Imperialists have built a strong Fort in an Island of the Danube, between Orsova and Widin, and have placed in it a Garrison of 200 Soldiers, and 1000 Natives, with 24 pieces of Cannon, and have also laid a Chain across the River to hinder the Turkish Boats from coming higher.

From the Blockade of Great Waradin, the Letters of the first instant tell us, That the Count de Schlick, who at present Commands there, had received Orders from the Marquis de Negre, to quit and demolish the Castle of Bihar, (which till then had been the Head quarter of the Blockade) and to post himself with his Troops on this side the River Bereth; That there were daily Rencontres between our Parties and the Garrison, in which generally the Imperialists had the advantage, and that in the last they brought off 8 Turkish Heads, and as many Prisoners.

On the 9th instant, my Lord Paget, Envoy Extraordinary from His Majesty of Great Britain, had Audience of the Emperor, and this day of the Empress, to condole the Death of the late Elector Palatin. The present Elector (who is now here) has likewise received the Compliments of the whole Court on this occasion. Their Imperial Majesties are gone to Ebersdorf to pass some time there.

Brissac, September 14. The French Army, after having retired from four several Camps, upon the Imperialists advancing towards them, are now posted at Endingen, about 4 Leagues from hence; whither Troops are daily marching to reinforce them; and those that were lately detached towards the Moselle, are returned to the Camp. The Dauphin has ordered all the Bridges on the River Elz to be broken down.

Heidelberg, September 13. The Confederate and French Armies continue according to our last advices within 3 or 4 hours march of each other; the first being encamped near Offenburg, and the Enemy behind the River Elz, where they lie posted so advantageously, that they can hardly be forced to a Battle.

Frankfort, September 20. The Swedish Succors are arrived in our Neighborhood. Yesterday part of the Fleet passed the Main in Boats at Rumpfenheim, about two Miles from hence, the rest followed this day, and to-morrow two Regiments of Horse will pass through this City; both Horse and Foot taking their march towards the Palatinate.

Cologne, September 22. The Mansfer and Neuburg Troops which decamped the 15th from Enskirchen, are come to Ayrberg, within an hours march of the Luxemburgers and Hessens, who lie near Narnberg and Pirmenburgh. They write from Trier, that the Marquis de Boufflers, and the Count de Tilly, continued with their Army near Pfanden in the Country of Luxemburg. The Letters from the Upper Rhine tell us, That the Confederate Army advanced still towards the Enemy, and that the two Electors had resolved to attack them in their Camp. We hear just now that the Dauphin is removed from Endingen nearer to Brissac.

Liamburg, September 22. We hear from Holstein, that they are making Preparations for the Reception of the King of Denmark, who is expected to-morrow at Remsburg, and on Tuesday at Glückstadt, where he will take a review of his Forces quartered thereabouts.

Brussels, September 24. The Elector of Brandenburg came hither on Tuesday last, and is lodged at Mr. Eckerts, the King of England's Minister at this Court. To-morrow his Electoral Highness will return to his Camp at Wankies. Prince Waldeck continues to have his at Lembergh; and the Elector is at Lefines. The last Letters from Vienna say, That Prince Louis had on the 4th instant passed the Danube near Semandria, and that he was marching with all possible diligence towards Transylvania, where Tockley had made but very little progress since his success at Grinshat. Nissa and Widin make a very vigorous defence.

Hague, September 26. On the 20th instant, the Baron de la Torre, Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of Savoy, had his public Audience of the States General, to which he was conducted with the Ceremonies observed to the Ministers of Crown'd Heads. The States of Holland are still assembled, being busied about letting the Farms of the Customs and Excise. The Letters from Germany say, That the Imperial and French Armies are now about Brissac, the French having given back before the first for 30 Leagues together. But when these Letters came away the two Armies were so near each other, that 'twas thought they could hardly part without a Battle.

Plimouth, September 16. Yesterday in the Evening Sir Clement Skerrett, with the Squadron under his Command, Sailed from hence to the Westward.

Perthmouth, September 18. The English and Dutch

Fleet Sailed yesterday, and by 5 a Clock in the Afternoon was clear of St. Helens, standing to the Westward, the Wind at N. E.

Whitehall, September 18.
