THE following Address of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland having been transmitted by the Right Honourable John Adrian Louis, Earl of Hopetoun, to the Most Honourable Schomberg Henry, Marquis of Lothian, K.T., Her Majesty's Secretary for Scotland, has been by him presented to the Queen, which Address Her Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously :—

### May it please Your Majesty,

WE, Your Majesty's loyal and dutiful subjects, the Ministers and Elders of the Church of Scotland convened in General Assembly, have received with the greatest gratification Your Majesty's most gracious letter.

We are most grateful for the goodwill it expresses, and for the assurances of Royal countenance and support it contains towards the Church of Scotland.

Your Majesty may be assured that there are no more loyal subjects in the British Empire than the Office Bearers and Members of the Church of Scotland ; and Your Majesty's kindly feelings to the Scottish people and the Presbyterian Church, along with Your many good qualities as our Queen, have given Your Majesty a hold on the loyalty of Scotland greater than has ever been possessed by any British Sovereign.


We gratefully accept the grant of two thousand pounds made to us by Your Majesty, and it will

W HEREAS by the provisions of the Patents, Designs, and Trade Marks Act, 1883, it is, amongst other things, provided :--That if Her Majesty is pleased to make any

That if Her Majesty is pleased to make any arrangement with the Government or Governments of any foreign state or states for mutual protection of inventions, designs, and trade marks, or any of them, then any person who has applied for protection for any invention, design, or trade mark in any such state shall, subject to the conditions further provided and set forth in the said Act, be entitled to a patent for his invention or to registration of his design or trade mark (as the case may be) under the said Act in priority to other applicants, and such patent or registration shall have the same date as the date of the protection obtained in such foreign state :-

tection obtained in such foreign state: And whereas it has pleased Her Majesty to make arrangement of the nature contemplated by the said Act by and in virtue of a declaration signed and sealed by Her Majesty's Ambassador at Paris on the seventeenth March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, duly conveying the accession of Great Britain to the International Convention and Protocol for the protection of industrial property, signed by representatives of certain powers on the twentieth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eightythree, and duly ratified on the sixth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, power being reserved to Her Majesty to hereafter accede to the provisions of the said Convention and Protocol on behalf of the Isle of Man, the Channel Islands, and any of Her Majesty's possessions, which Declaration of Accession was duly accepted by the French Government on behalf of the signatory powers by and in virtue of a declaration dated the second of April, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased by an Order in Council dated the twenty-sixth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eightyfour, to declare that the provisions of the said Act hereinbefore specified should apply to the several countries mentioned in the said Order, and it, was further ordered and declared that such Order should take effect from the seventh day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eightyfour:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased by an Order in Council dated the twenty-seventh day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, to declare that the provisions of the said Act hereinbefore specified should also apply to the following country, viz., Santo Domingo, and it was further ordered and declared that such Order should take effect from the date of such Order :

And whereas it has been intimated to Her Majesty's Government that the Government of Santo Domingo has by a note on their behalf dated the fifteenth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, and addressed to the Government of the Swiss Confederation, given notice of the termination of adhesion to the said Convention; and whereas by Article 18 of the said Convention it is provided that the provisions of the said Convention shall remain in force as regards any country so terminating its adhesion till the expiry of one year from the date of such notice :

Now therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, and by virtue of the authority committed to Her by the said Act, doth declare and it is hereby declared that the provisions of the said Act hereinbefore specified shall cease to apply to the said country, viz. :--

Santo Domingo.

WHEREAS the West Indian Incumbered Estates Acts, 1854 to 1872 are in operation in the Island of Jamaica:

And whereas an address from the Legislature of the said Island has been presented to Her Majesty, praying for an Order of Her Majesty in Council to be made in pursuance of the West Indian Incumbered Estates Act, 1886, directing that the West Indian Incumbered Estates Acts,

1854 to 1872, shall cease to be in operation in the said Island :

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the power for that purpose given to Her Majesty by the West Indian Incumbered Estates Act, 1886, it is hereby ordered by Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, as follows:—

I. Subject as in this Order is mentioned, the West Indian Incumbered Estates Acts, 1854 to 1872, shall cease to be in operation in the Island of Jamaica as from the first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, hereinafter referred to as the appointed day.

II. This Order shall not affect the operation of the said Acts prior to the appointed day, nor anything done, nor any right acquired, nor any liability incurred thereunder prior to the appointed day.

III. All proceedings under the said Acts in relation to any land in the said Island, which shall have been commenced before but not completed on or before the appointed day, shall be continued and completed as if this Order had not been made, and for the purpose of continuing and completing such proceedings the powers and authorities and jurisdiction of the West Indian Incumbered Estates Commissioners under the said Acts shall continue until all such proceedings shall be completed.

IV. For the purposes of this Order proceedings under the said Acts shall be deemed to be completed: (1) in the case of an application for sale, when either the application has been refused or the land has been sold, and the conveyance thereof to the purchaser or purchasers has been executed by the said Commissioners, and the purchase money (except any part thereof which is not immediately distributable, or the parties entitled to which cannot be ascertained) has been distributed under the order of the said Commissioners, and all questions or matters incidental to such conveyance or distribution shall have been disposed of by the said Commissioners; and (2), in the case of an application for partition, exchange, or division, when either the application has been refused, or an order for partition, exchange, or division has been made, and all or any conveyances necessary for giving effect to such order shall have been executed, and all questions and matters incidental to such partition, exchange, or division shall have been disposed of by the said Commissioners.

V. When the proceedings under the said Acts in any matter relating to land in the said Island have been completed, the said Commissioners shall, as soon as possible after such completion, or, in case the proceedings shall have been completed on or before the appointed day, as soon as possible after the appointed day, (1) order any money in the Bank of England, and any stocks, funds, or securities (except the stock mentioned in the Schedule to this Order) standing to their account, or held by them to the credit of such matter, to be transferred to the account of Her Majesty's Paymaster General for and on behalf of the Supreme Court of Judicature, to the credit of an account to be entitled, In the matter of the West Indian Incumbered Estates Acts, 1854 to 1886, and in the matter of the particular estate, on account of which such moneys, stocks, funds, or securities were held before such transfer, in trust to attend the orders of the Chancery Division of the High Court of Justice :

(2) order any money in the commissariat chest in Jamaica standing to their account to the credit of such matter to be paid to the Treasurer of Jamaica, and to be placed by him to an account to be entitled. In the matter of the said Acts, and of the particular estate on account of which such moneys were held before such payment, in trust to attend the order of the Supreme Court of Jamaica

VI. The said Commissioners may by any such order declare the trusts affecting the moneys, stocks, funds, or securities to be transferred or paid thereunder, so far as they have ascertained the same, or may state for the information of the Chancery Division of the High Court of Justice or the Supreme Court of Jamaica, as the case may be, the facts or matters found by them in relation to the rights and interests in such moneys, stocks, funds, or securities, and the said Chancery Division or Supreme Court may thereafter make such orders with respect to such moneys, stocks, funds, or securities as the circumstances of the case may require. Provided always, that the Paymaster General shall give effect to any order made by the High Court of Justice or any Judge thereof upon application by summons in Chambers for the payment of the interest or dividends of any stocks, funds, or securities so transferred as aforesaid, confirming any order which shall have been made by the said Commissioners before the transfer thereof.

VII. The said Commissioners shall forthwith cause a notification to be published in the London Gazette and some London daily newspaper, and also in the Jamaica Government Gazette, stating that the stock specified in the Schedule to this Order, or the money invested in the purchase thereof, has been standing to the credit of the account specified in the same Schedule for upwards of twenty-three years without any claim thereto having been established, and that unless a claim thereto is laid before the Commissioners before the first day of November one thousand eight hun-

dred and eighty-nine, and established to their satisfaction, the said stock will be sold, and the proceeds of the sale thereof and any interest which shall have accrued due thereon before such sale will be paid to the Government of Jamaica to be applied as part of the public revenue of Jamaica.

If a claim or claims to the said stock shall be laid before the said Commissioners before the first day of November one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, and shall be established to the satisfaction of the said Commissioners, the said stock and any interest which shall have accrued due thereon shall, subject to the payment thereout of such costs and expenses as the said Commissioners shall direct, be transferred and paid to the person or persons entitled thereto; if no claim to the said stock shall be so made before the said first day of November one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, or if no claim made before that day to the said stock shall be established to the satisfaction of the said Commissioners, then immediately after the said day, or after the claim or all the claims to the said stock shall have been rejected by the said Commissioners, whichever shall last happen, the said Commissioners shall order the said stock to be sold, and shall pay out of the proceeds of such sale the cost of the publication of the said notices, and shall order the balance of such money and any interest which shall have accrued due on the said stock to be paid to the Crown Agents for the Colonies as Agents for the Government of Jamaica, and such balance shall be applied as part of the public revenue of Jamaica.

And one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein C. L. Peel. accordingly.

And whereas an address from the Legislature of the said Island, before it became a part of the Colony of Trinidad and Tobago, has been presented to Her Majesty, praying for an Order of Her Majesty in Council to be made in pursuance of the West Indian Incumbered Estates Act, 1886, directing that the West Indian Incumbered Estates Acts, 1854 to 1872, shall cease to be in operation in the said Island :

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the power for that purpose given to Her Majesty by the West Indian Incumbered Estates Act, 1886, it is hereby ordered by Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, as follows :----

I. Subject as in this Order is mentioned, the West Indian Incumbered Estates Acts, 1854 to 1872, shall cease to be in operation in the Island of Tobago as from the first day of August one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, hereinafter referred to as the appointed day.

VI. The said Commissioners may by any such order declare the trusts affecting the moneys, stocks, funds, or securities to be transferred or paid thereunder, so far as they have ascertained the same, or may state for the information of the Chancery Division of the High Court of Justice the facts or matters found by them in relation to the rights and interests in such moneys, stocks, funds, or securities, and the said Chancery Division may thereafter make such orders with respect to such moneys, stocks, funds, or securities as the circumstances of the case may require. VII. The said Commissioners shall forthwith cause a notification to be published in the London Gazette and some London daily newspaper, and also in the Tobago Government Gazette, stating that the stocks specified in the Schedule to this Order, or the moneys invested in the purchase thereof, have been standing to the credit of the several accounts specified in the same Schedule for upwards of thirteen years without any claim thereto having been established, and that unless a claim thereto is laid before the Commissioners before the first day of November one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, and established to their satisfaction, the said stocks will be sold, and the proceeds of the sale thereof, and any interest which shall have accrued due thereon before such sale, will be paid to the Government of Trinidad and Tobago, to be applied as part of the public revenue of Tobago.

If a claim or claims to the said stocks, or any of them, shall be laid before the said Commissioners before the first day of November one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, and shall be established to the satisfaction of the said Commissioners, the stock to which such claim shall be established, and any interest which shall have accrued due thereon, shall, subject to the payment thereout of such costs and expenses as the said Commissioners shall direct, be transferred and paid to the person or persons entitled thereto; if no claim to the said stocks or any of them shall be so made before the said first day of November one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, or if no claim made before that day to the said stocks or any of them shall be established to the satisfaction of the said Commissioners, then immediately after the said day, or after the claim or all the claims to any of the said stocks shall have been rejected by the said Commissioners, whichever shall last happen, the said Commissioners shall order the said stocks to be sold, and shall pay out of the proceeds of such sale the cost of the publication of the said notices, and shall order the balance of such money, and any interest which shall have accrued due on the said stocks. to be paid to the Crown Agents for the Colonies as Agents for the Government of Trinidad and Tobago, and such balance shall be applied as part of the public revenue of Tobago.

And one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly. C. L. Peel.

### PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by Her Majesty's Order in Council bearing date the twelfth day of February one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six relating to Her Majesty's Civil Service it was provided as follows :--" the salaries of Men Clerks in the Lower Division shall commence at eighty pounds, and shall rise by triennial increments of fifteen pounds to two hundred pounds. Provided that in any office in which a regular attendance of seven hours a day is required, the commencing salary may be ninety pounds, and the maximum salary may be two hundred and fifty pounds."

And whereas by Her Majesty's Order in Council bearing date the fifteenth day of July one thousand eight hundred and eighty one, the words of the above-cited provision including and following the word "provided" were repealed and the following words substituted therefor :--- " Provided that in any office where a regular attendance of seven hours a day is required, the commencing salary may be ninety-five pounds and the maximum salary may be two hundred and fifty pounds."

And whereas the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's 'Treasury have represented unto Her Majesty the advisability of repealing, in respect of Men Clerks in the Lower Division to be hereafter appointed, the aforesaid regulations and of substituting others therefor.

Now therefore Her Majesty by and with the advice of Her Privy Council is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered as follows :-

1. From and after the date of this Order the aforesaid regulations shall, in respect of Men Clerks in the Lower Division appointed after the date of this Order, be, and the same are, hereby repealed.

2. In lieu of the regulations so repealed as aforesaid the following regulations are substituted in respect of Men Clerks appointed after the date of this Order.

Men Clerks in the Lower Division of the Civil Service shall give a regular attendance of not less than seven hours a day.

The salaries of such Men Clerks shall commence at seventy pounds per annum and shall rise by such increments to such sums as may hereafter be fixed by Order in Council. C. L. Peel.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty chapter thirty-seven sections six and eight duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the ninth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eightynine, in the words following, that is to say :

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty chapter thirtyseven sections six and eight have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property formerly belonging to the Treasurership of the Cathedral Church of

T the Court at Windsor, the 28th day of | Honourable and Reverend Frederick Baron Saye and Sele Treasurer of the said cathedral church who died on or about the twenty-sixth day of May in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven all the lands tithes tenements and hereditaments theretofore belonging to the said Treasurership became by virtue of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen absolutely vested in us for the purposes and subject to the provisions applicable to other hereditaments vested in us.

"And whereas our estate in the lands tithes tenements hereditaments and endowments aforesaid consists to a considerable extent of reversions expectant upon the determination of beneficial leases such leases producing only a small annual revenue and partly on that account and partly on account of the character or situation of the property the said lands tithes tenements hereditaments and endowments are unsuitable or inconvenient to be held or applied for the purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable under the Acts by which our proceedings are governed.

"And whereas by an Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and twenty-four power is given to lessees holding under us in the event of our declining to enter into a treaty for the sale of our reversions or the purchase of the leasehold interests to require us to purchase such leasehold interests at a valuation.

"And whereas with a view to the advantageous appropriation of the said lands tithes tenements hereditaments and endowments or of the proceeds thereof for the ultimate improvement of our common fund it is expedient that the said lands titles tenements hereditaments and endowments or such parts thereof as we shall at any time and from time to time think fit should be sold or disposed of and accordingly that we should be empowered to dispose of our interests therein or in any part or parts thereof in such manner as shall appear to us advisable.

"Now therefore we humbly recommend and propose that we may be authorized and empowered by instrument or instruments in writing duly executed, according to law from time to time to sell or dispose of and duly to convey according to the provisions of the said Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty's reign with the consent of the holder or holders thereof (if any) to be testified by his her or their being made parties to such instruments all or any of the said lands tithes tenements hereditaments and endowments formerly belonging to the said Treasurership and so vested in us as aforesaid with their appurtenances and all our estate right title and interest therein or in any part or parts thereof unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same and his her or their heirs executors administrators or assigns or otherwise as he she or they shall direct or appoint and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and enquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable it being our intention to invest the proceeds of such sale from time to time as occasion may arise in the purchase of other lands tithes, rent-charges, tenements, or hereditaments or of some estate or interest therein convenient to be held by us for the purposes of the Acts by which our proceedings are governed as aforesaid and in the meantime to invest the said proceeds in some Government or Parliamentary Stock, or other public securities in England.

" And we further recommend and propose that Hereford and now vested in us. "Whereas by the decease of the Right recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act: and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Hereford. WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the ninth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, in the words following, that is to say :--

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-seven have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes to be taken out of the parish of Mansfield, in the county of Nottingham, and in the diocese of Southwell.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said parish of Mansfield which is hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in the

manner hereinafter recommended and proposed. "And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed district any conse-

crated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship.

"And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district and (when the same shall have become a new parish as aforesaid then) of the said new parish and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereto shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the . London Gazette as aforesaid be assigned to and become absolutely vested in and shall and may be exercised by the said George Bishop of Southwell and his successors for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or to any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said new parish of Homerton which is hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship.

"And whereas under the provisions of 'Lady Slaney's (Trust) Estate Act 1869' the Wardens and Commonalty of the Mystery of Grocers of the City of London hereinafter termed the Grocers' Company are now prepared to build a new church within the limits of the said proposed district.

"And whereas the said proposed district is such a district as is contemplated by section seven of the lastly-mentioned Act being a district, no part of which is situate at a greater distance than six miles (measured in a straight line) from the cathedral church of Saint Paul in the said city of London and the same proposed district has accordingly been selected by the said Grocers' Company and approved by the Bishop of London for the purposes of the said last-mentioned Act and section.

"And whereas under the circumstances aforesaid we have accepted the said bond as being a sufficient compliance with the terms of the Act secondly hereinbefore mentioned.

"And whereas the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district (and when the said district shall become a new parish then of the same new parish) will under the provisions of section thirtern of the said thirdly hereinbefore mentioned Act vest in the Grocers' Company aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Frederick Bishop of the said diocese of London (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and scaled the same with his episcopal seal) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said new parish of Homerton which is described in the schedule hereunder written (all which part together with the boundaries thereof is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed) shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Paul Lower Homerton.'

"And we further recommend and propose that the minister of the said proposed district and (when the said district shall have become a new parish as aforesaid) the incumbent of such new parish shall be permanently endowed in manner hereinbefore specified that is to say with the permanent endowment which after the determination of the obligation created by the said bond is to be provided as aforesaid by the said Grocers' Company under section nine of the said thirdly hereinbefore mentioned Act.

"And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district and (so soon as the said district shall have

become a new parish as aforesaid then) of the said new parish and of the nomination of the minister of the said proposed district or (as the case may be) of the incumbent of the said new parish shall be (as contemplated by section thirteen of the said thirdly hereinhefore mentioned Act) assigned to and absolutely vested in and exercised by the said Grocers' Company and their successors for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or to any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any other Act of Parliament.

### "The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing

that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

**REGULATIONS** made by the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, dated 31st May 1889, prescribing Regulations relating to the Preparation, Issue, and Cancellation of Treasury Bills, under the Acts 40 Vict. c. 2, and 52 Vict. c. 6 :--

THE Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury hereby rescind the existing regulations relating to the preparation, issue, and cancellation of Treasury Bills; and they proceed to lay down in lien thereof the following regulations in pursuance of the powers conferred upon them by section 9 of the Treasury Bills Act, 1877, and section 5 of the National Debt Act, 1889, viz. :--

I. Whenever it is required to exercise the powers conferred by the Treasury Bills Act, 1877 (40 Vict. c. 2) the Treasury will issue Treasury Bills in one of the following ways, or partly in one way and partly in another way.

A. The Treasury may invite tenders for Treasury Bills.

(1.) Notice that such tenders will be received at the office of the Chief Cashier of the Bank of England on a given day shall be published in the London Gazette not less than five clear days before the date on which tenders are to be delivered, and shall specify the period (not exceeding 12 months) for which, and the terms and conditions subject to which, the Bills are to be issued.

(2.) The principal of such Bills shall be repaid at the date mentioned in each Bill.

(3.) The Treasury will from time to time instruct the Bank of England as to the form in which the tenders are to be made, and as to any other necessary proceedings in relation thereto.

(4.) The Treasury reserves to itself the right of refusing tenders, if it should think proper to do so.

(5.) The tenders for Treasury Bills shall be opened at the Bank of England in the presence of such person or persons as the Treasury shall from time to time direct.

B. The Treasury may also issue Treasury Bills with a fixed rate of interest to the Commissioners for the Reduction of the National Debt, or to such other person or persons as may be willing to buy the same.

(1.) The rate of interest of the Bills so issued shall be fixed by the Treasury.
(2.) The currency of the Bills shall be for

(2.) The currency of the Bills shall be for any period not exceeding 12 months.

(3.) The principal of such Bills shall be repaid at the date mentioned in each Bill.

II. The name of the Permanent Secretary for

the time being to the Treasury will be engraved on Treasury Bills, which will be printed on a special description of paper to be previously approved by the Treasury, and will be numbered in arithmetical order throughout each financial year, commencing with new numbers in each year.

III. The Treasury will from time to time give directions to the Bank of England for the preparation, in the Form A. hereto annexed, of such Treasury Bills as are required.

IV. When any tender or tenders for Treasury Bills shall have been accepted by the Treasury, or when the National Debt Commissioners or other person or persons shall have signified their willingness to buy Treasury Bills carrying a fixed rate of interest, a Treasury Warrant, drawn in the terms of one of the Forms B. or C. annexed to these regulations, will be transmitted for the counter-signature of the Comptroller and Auditor-General, authorizing the Bank of England to prepare and issue such number of Treasury Bills, and for such amounts, as are specified in the Warrant.

V. The Bills when ready for issue will, upon the receipt of the sums therein specified, be delivered by the Bank of England, under the authority of the Treasury Warrant, to the order of the person or persons entitled thereto.

VI. The amounts received by the Bank for Treasury Bills sold will be carried to the account of Her Majesty's Exchequer, as provided by the fifth section of the said Act.

VII. When the consideration allowed for the money advanced on Treasury Bills takes the form of interest prepaid, it will be necessary to make provision for showing in the public accounts the amount of such consideration. Accordingly, the Treasury will direct the issue to the Bank of England from the Exchequer of the amount of the prepaid interest, which will be paid by the Bank to the Exchequer account, together with the sums actually received for the Bills, thereby rendering the amount paid to the Exchequer, and thus brought to account as money raised, equal to the nominal amount of the Bills.

VIII. The principal sums of Treasury Bills will be payable at the Bank of England on the dates specified in the Bills, without grace, and the discharge for the payment of such Bills shall be an acknowledgment of receipt, to be given on the back of the Bills, or on a schedule of the numbers and amounts of the Bills.

1X. When Trensury Bills have been paid off by the Bank of England, they will be cancelled in such manner as may be determined upon by the Governor and Deputy Governer of the Bank, and the Treasury will from time to time, upon an application from the Bank, direct cancelled Treasury Bills to be destroyed, and the Chief Cashier of the Bank shall certify to the Treasury the particulars of the Treasury Bills so destroyed.

X. When, upon any representation made by any holder of a Treasury Bill, the Treasury has reason to believe that a Bill has been lost, destroyed, or defaced, the Treasury will cause a warrant to be prepared authorizing the issue of a duplicate of such Bill, and will give directions for the delivery of such duplicate Bill to the person or persons applying for the same, upon the execution by them of the usual bond of indemnity. Sub Surface Current Floats.

In connection with this current work, Lieutemant Pillsbury will set adrift a number of sub- quence of an unsuccessful search having been

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surface current floats, each consisting of a  $1\frac{1}{2}$  inch square white painted pine staff, about eight feet long, projecting from one to two feet above the surface, surmounted by a simple tin wind vane, and with four 'galvanized sheet iron wings at the lower end to receive the impulse of the ocean currents at a depth of six or seven feet below the surface, and cause it to drift with the sub surface currents and be substantially exempt from the influence of winds or surface currents. The staff carries five glass watertight tubes, each held in a mortise by easily unfastened copper wire. Each tube incloses an envelope, addressed to "The Superintendent Coast and Geodetic Survey, Washington, D. C.," containing a leaflet printed in English, German, Spanish, and French, showing the date and locality of the first launching of the float, and giving instructions to the finder as to filling the blanks with the date and locality at which he found it. Any person finding one of the floats is respectfully and earnestly requested to remove from it one of the glass tubes and immediately set the float adrift again, so that it may continue to float with currents until intercepted again and another tube removed by some other finder, and so on until it is finally lost or all its tubes removed. Each finder should break or open the tube carefully, read, and follow the directions of the printed leaflet, by writing in the proper blank spaces the date and locality at which he found it, either afloat or ashore, appending his own signature and address, inclosing it in the accompanying envelope, and forwarding it to the nearest United States Consul, or to the Superintendent of the Coast and Geodetic Survey, as addressed. In view of the importance, to safety of navigation, of all items of information as to the direction and velocity of ocean currents, all mariners and people along shore are urgently requested to contribute to the success of this feature of their investigation by intercepting and relaunching a float wherever seen, and carefully complying with the foregoing suggestions.
