THE following Address of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland having been transmitted by the Right Honourable John Adrian Louis, Earl of Hopetoun, to the Most Honourable Schomberg Henry, Marquis of Lothian, K.T., Her Majesty's Secretary for Scotland, has been by him presented to the Queen, which Address Her Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously:—

May it please Your Majesty,

WE, Your Majesty's loyal and dutiful subjects, the Ministers and Elders of the Church of Scotland convened in General Assembly, have received with the greatest gratification Your Majesty's most gracious letter.

We are most grateful for the goodwill it expresses, and for the assurances of Royal countenance and support it contains towards the Church of Scotland.

Your Majesty may be assured that there are no more loyal subjects in the British Empire than the Office Bearers and Members of the Church of Scotland; and Your Majesty's kindly feelings to the Scottish people and the Presbyterian Church, along with Your many good qualities as our Queen, have given Your Majesty a hold on the loyalty of Scotland greater than has ever been possessed by any British Sovereign.

Your Majesty expresses a confident assurance in the prudence and discretion of the General Assembly. Your Majesty need not doubt that we shall endeavour in this General Assembly to advance in every way we can the highest welfare of the people of Scotland.

We welcome as Your Majesty's representative, for the third time, the Right Honourable the Earl of Hopetoun, who has already as Lord High Commissioner won all hearts by his ability and courtesy, his interest in our Church's welfare, and his kindness to ourselves.

We gratefully accept the grant of two thousand pounds made to us by Your Majesty, and it will

be our endeavour so to employ it as to promote the best interests of the population for whose benefit it is designed.

It is our most earnest prayer that the God and Father of Our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, who has already preserved Your Majesty so long among us, may spare you still for many years, in personal health and amid family mercies; and that these blessings of earth may be followed by the blessings of Heaven.

May it please Your Majesty, Your Majesty's most faithful and loyal subjects, the Ministers and Elders of the Church of Scotland met in this General Assembly.

WHEREAS by the provisions of the Patents, Designs, and Trade Marks Act, 1883, it is, amongst other things, provided:—

That if Her Majesty is pleased to make any arrangement with the Government or Governments of any foreign state or states for mutual protection of inventions, designs, and trade marks, or any of them, then any person who has applied for protection for any invention, design, or trade mark in any such state shall, subject to the conditions further provided and set forth in the said Act, be entitled to a patent for his invention or to registration of his design or trade mark (as the case may be) under the said Act in priority to other applicants, and such patent or registration shall have the same date as the date of the protection obtained in such foreign state:—

And whereas it has pleased Her Majesty to make arrangement of the nature contemplated by the said Act by and in virtue of a declaration signed and sealed by Her Majesty's Ambassador at Paris on the seventeenth March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, duly conveying
