

above high water, and should be visible in clear weather from a distance of 12 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is of the fifth order. The lighthouse, circular in shape, is constructed of red brick, surmounted by a black lantern. The keeper's dwelling, situated 30 feet southward of the lighthouse, has its lower part constructed of red brick, and its upper part of wood, unpainted.

Position, lat.  $41^{\circ}32'5''$  N., long.  $71^{\circ}20'40''$  W.

Also, that on the same date, a fog signal would be established at the above lighthouse:—

The signal is a bell, which, during thick or foggy weather, will be struck by machinery once every fifteen seconds.

*Automatic Signal Buoy South-westward of  
Fox Rock.*

THE United States Government has given notice, dated 27th May, 1889, that a buoy has been placed to mark Fox Rock, Orford Reef, south-westward of Cape Orford (Blanco):—

This buoy is an automatic whistle buoy, giving from 20 to 30 blasts every minute, painted red, with the words "Fox Rock" on it in white letters. It is moored in 43 fathoms, nearly five-eighths of a mile S.W. by S. from Fox Rock, with Cape Orford Lighthouse bearing N. by E.  $\frac{3}{4}$  E., distant about  $5\frac{1}{4}$  miles; and Tichenor Rock, north point of Port Orford, E.  $\frac{1}{4}$  N.

Position, lat.  $42^{\circ}45'$  N., long.  $124^{\circ}38'$  W.

[The bearings are magnetic. Variation  $19^{\circ}$  Easterly in 1889.]

(1.) *Amended Position of Sunken Wreck.*
