

Last night the Troop fallen upon Limerick, proceeded to Cork, arriving from Cork to Limerick, and that he had 1000 men, and taken 3 Prisoners. And heretofore, that they have cut off a Rapperry Col. 5, with 500 of his Men. It is confirmed by several persons arrived from Limerick, that the French are all gone from Cork, and that the Irish are in a very ill condition, notwithstanding how to subserve this Winter. Sir John Limerick is come to this side the Shannon, upon notice of which, Sir John Lester marched with his Horse to Loyal Lieutenant-General Douglas, and probably this Action may have happened, great shooting having been heard this afternoon towards Birr, where Lieutenant-General Douglas and Sir John Lester were, by the last news we had of them. Last night two Drifts were sent out to look after a Party of Rapperies, who had killed three of our Foragers in this neighbourhood.

*Limerick, September 20.* On the 16th instant the Right Honourable the Lord-Vice-Admiral, and Thomas Collet, Esq; R.N. took the usual Oaths of Office of General Commissioners of the Royal Navy before the Council Chamber of the Great Seal, attended by the Knights of Honour so accustomed, and the next day their Lordships received the Commissions of the Queen of the Nobility as were in the Civil, as also of the Lord Mayor and Magistrates, and of the Clergy, who were introduced by the Lord Archdeacon of Limerick. The University made their Compliment in two Speeches, the one in Latin, the other in English; and thereafter the Streets were filled with Bonfires, and other Expessions and Demonstrations of Joy, for the Establishment of the Civil Government. Their Lordships the same day applied themselves to consider of the Settlement of the Affairs of the Kingdom in good Order, that so make it most useful, in order to which, there having been Committees of Array already raised into the Several Counties under Their Majesties Obedience, their Lordships have sent Letters to those Commissioners, for a speedy account of such Officers as they think fit to propose to command the several Troops and Companies, which shall be necessary to be raised for the defence of the respective Counties, and of what Arms they have already received from the Irish, in pursuance of His Majesty's Proclamation in that Behalf, or such as they are otherwise furnished withal, and what will be further wanting conveniently to arm the Troops and Companies so to be raised. And in the mean time, Directions are given to the Gentlemen every where, to use their utmost Care to prevent the increase and suppress the Infidelity of the Rapperies or Tories, which, it is hoped, will have a very good Effect.

Their Lordships have likewise published four several Proclamations:

I. Prohibiting all Persons, under pain of Imprisonment, not to absent themselves from the Parish where they dwell to more than one mile of the Lord's Justices, the General of their Majesties Forces, or some one Justice of the Peace, unless it be to the next Market Town, and upon a Month Day, except as that during this time of Harass they may travel on such like occasions as above mentioned, where they dwell, but no farther. And the Officers of the Peace are required to give License to none, but such as they previously know to be of good Department, and who have passed a Place of Arms within 5 miles of the Head-quarters of the Justices giving such License, and who shall make One and three days appearance for their demanding such License. At which Qualifications are to be inserted in the License, and a sum of money not less than 5 months to such Persons as shall be appointed to receive the same, and no Justice is to exact any Person committed in pursuance of this Proclamation, without first acquainting the Lord's Justices, and expecting their Directions thereto.

II. Prohibiting the carrying any Persons reporting to the Markets of Dublin, or to Ports, any Horse within ten miles of the said City, without Special Warrant of the Lord's Justices.

III. Prohibiting all Ships and Mariners that shall be employed in transporting Coals from any part of England or Wales to the City of Dublin.

IV. Prohibiting all Masters and Owners of Vessels, and Seamen, to take on Board, in order to Transport beyond the Seas, any Officer, or Soldier, or other Person whatsoever, except noted Merchants and Traders, and Persons of known Quality not belonging to the Army, or such as shall have License of the Lord's Justices, or the said General of Their Majesties Armies in Ireland.

IV. Prohibiting all Persons, to travel from Limerick to Cork, or from Cork to Limerick, without a Permit of the said General of Their Majesties Armies in Ireland, and that the Returner and other shall pay the Penance to His Majesty a Pardon of £100, or £1000 of the Red Chancery. His Majesty received their Apparatus, and was pleased to assure them of His Protection and Royal Favour upon all Occasions.
