(PLEURO-PNEUMONIA.)

AT the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 16th day of August, 1889.

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1886, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The following Place (namely),—the whole of Eton Farm, Cobham, in the occupation of Mr. D. Batters,—which was declared by order of the Kingston-on-Thames Committee of the Local Authority for the county of Surrey to be a Place infected with pleuro-pneumonia, is hereby declared to be free from pleuro-pneumonia, and that Place shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be a Place infected with pleuro-pneumonia.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the seventeenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine.

The following Area (namely),—at Cobham, in the county of Surrey, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Stoke-road on the south, Leigh Hill-road and Miles-lane on the west, Littleheath-lane on the north, and the Surbiton and Guildford Branch of the London and South-Western Railway on the east,—which was declared by Order of Council dated the tenth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, to be an Area infected with pleuro-pneumonia, is hereby declared to be free from pleuro-pneumonia, and that Area shall,

as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an Area infected with pleuro-pneumonia.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the seventeenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine.
