T the Court at Osborne House, Isle of Wight, the 19th day of August, 1889.

PRESENT.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty. Lord President. Marquess of Salisbury. Sir Henry Ponsonby.

WHEREAS by Orders in Council dated repectively the twenty-sixth day of June, One thousand eight hundred and seventynine, the thirty-first day of December, One thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, and the twenty-ninth day of November, One thousand eight hundred and cighty-four, provision has been made for the surrender by the Governor of the Straits Settlements to Foreign States, in the case of which the Extradition Act, 1870, does not apply, of persons accused or convicted of the commission of certain crimes and offences within the jurisdiction of such States.

And whereas it is expedient to consolidate and amend the said orders :

Now therefore it is hereby ordered by Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, as follows :-

1. In this Order in Council

"The Governor" means the person for the time being administering the Government of the Straits Settlements.

" The Colony " means the Straits Settlements.

"Protected States" means the States specified in the second schedule to this Order, and the Confederation or Group of States known as the Nêgri Sêmbilan shall be deemed for the purposes of this Order to be one State. "Fugitive Criminal" means any person

accused or convicted of any crime committed either before or after the date of this Order, which, if committed in England or within English jurisdiction would be one of the crimes described in the first schedule to this Order, or of having counselled, procured, commanded, aided, or abetted the commission of, or of being accessory before the fact, to any such crime as aforesaid.

"Fugitive Criminal of a State" means a person accused or convicted of any such crime as aforesaid, or of having counselled, procured, commanded, aided or abetted the commission of, or of being accessory before the fact to any such crime as aforesaid, committed within the jurisdiction of that State.

With reference to each of the Protected States, "fugitive criminal" and "fugitive criminal of a State" include any person accused or convicted of a breach of a contract of service to be performed within the jurisdiction of such State committed either before or after the date of this Order within the jurisdiction of such State which, if it had been committed in the Colony and the contract broken had been a contract to be performed in the Colony would have been punishable under the law of the Colony with imprisonment or with fine and with imprisonment in default of payment of such

fine. "Crime" includes any such breach of con-tract as aforesaid committed within the juris-

diction of any of the Protected States. "Charge" includes "conviction." "The crime charged" includes the crime of which the fugitive criminal is alleged to have been convicted.

"Conviction" and "convicted" do not include or refer to a conviction which under foreign law is a conviction for contumacy, but the term "accused" includes a person convicted for contumacy.

The masculine includes the feminine.

2. For the purposes of this Order every Colony, Dependency and constituent part of a Foreign State shall be deemed to be within the jurisdiction of such Foreign State.

3. If requisition be made to the Governor by any Foreign State in the case of which "The "Extradition Act, 1870," does not for the time being apply, or by any person recognized by him as an authorized Minister or Officer, Consul, or Vice-Consul of such State, or, in the case of any of the Protected States, by any Officer appointed by Her Majesty or by the Governor as British Resident or Superintendent or Secre-. tary to the Government in such State, for the surrender of a fugitive criminal of such State who is or is suspected of being in any part of the Colony, the Governor may issue an order under his hand and seal to any Magistrate or Magistrates of the Colony directing him or them or any of them to inquire into the truth of the charge.

4. The Governor shall not be bound to comply with a requisition for the surrender of a fugitive criminal under this Order, but may at his absolute discretion either comply with any such requisition in accordance with the provisions of this Order with or without conditions, or refuse to comply therewith.

5. Every such order for inquiry shall signify that the requisition for surrender has been made, shall state the nature of the crime charged, the name or designation (if the name be not known) and any other description that may be thought necessary of the fugitive criminal, and shall require the Magistrate or Magistrates to whom it shall be directed, or any of them, to inquire into the truth of the charge and proceed in pursuance of this Order.

6. The order for inquiry shall be a sufficient proof of the requisition having been made, and a sufficient justification for all acts done in pursuance thereof, and upon production thereof to any Magistrate to whom it is directed he shall have the same powers as if the crime charged had been committed within his jurisdiction.

7. If the evidence adduced shall be such as would in the opinion of the Magistrate have justified the apprehension of the fugitive criminal named or designated in the order, if the crime charged had been committed within his jurisdiction he shall issue his warrant for the apprehension of the fugitive criminal.

the apprehension of the fugitive criminal. 8. Any Magistrate of the Colony may issue his warrant for the apprehension of a fugitive criminal without the production of any such order for inquiry as aforesaid, on such information or complaint and on such evidence or after such proceedings as would in his opinion have justified the issue of such warrant if the crime charged had been committed within his jurisdiction.

Provided that a Magistrate issuing a warrant under this Order without an order for inquiry shall forthwith send a report of the fact of such issue together with the evidence and information or complaint or certified copies thereof to the Governor, who may, if he thinks fit, order the warrant to be cancelled and the person apprehended on such warrant to be discharged.

9. Every warrant for the apprehension of a fugitive criminal issued under this Order shall be issued in the same manner as if the crime charged had been committed within the jurisdiction of the Magistrate issuing it, and shall contain a memorandum stating that it is issued under this Order and may be executed in any part of the Colony.

10. A fugitive criminal apprehended on a warrant issued under this Order shall be forthwith brought before a Magistrate within whose jurisdiction he shall be apprehended, and such Magistrate shall subject to the provisions of this Order deal with the case in the same manner as if the fugitive criminal were charged with an indictable offence committed within his jurisdiction.

11. A fugitive criminal apprehended on a warrant issued under this Order without an order for inquiry shall be committed by the Magistrate before whom he is brought to some prison in the Colony for detention until an order shall be made with respect to him by the Governor either for enquiry or for his discharge; but such fugitive criminal shall be discharged by the said Magistrate unless such Magistrate within such time as with reference to the circumstances of the case he deems reasonable **receives** from the governor an order for enquiry with respect to such fugitive criminal.

Upon the receipt of such order for inquiry the Magistrate shall proceed in the same manner as if the order for inquiry had preceded the issue of the warrant for the apprehension of the fugitive criminal.

12. If a fugitive criminal shall, in pursuance of this Order be brought before a Magistrate other than the Magistrate who issued the warrant for his apprehension, the depositions and documents upon which the warrant was issued, or copies thereof certified under the hand of the Magistrate by whom the warrant was issued, shall, upon the requisition of the Magistrate before whom the fugitive criminal shall be brought, be forwarded to such last mentioned Magistrate.

13. Depositions, statements on oath, or affirmations taken in a Foreign State, and copies of such original depositions or statements or affirmations and foreign certificates of or judicial documents stating the fact of a conviction may, if duly authenticated, be received in evidence in proceedings under this Order. Such depositions, statements, or affirmations and copies thereof and such certificates or judicial documents shall be deemed to be duly authenticated for the purpose of this Order as follows :--

(1.) If the depositions or statements or affirmations purport to be certified under the hand of a Judge, Magistrate, or Officer of the Foreign State where the same were taken to be the original depositions, statements, or affirmations, or to be true copies thereof, as the case may require.

(2.) If the certificates or judicial documents purport to be certified by a Judge, Magistrate, or Officer of the Foreign State where the conviction took place, and if in every case the depositions, statements, affirmations, copies, certificates, and judicial documents (as the caso may be) are authenticated by the oath of some witness, or by being scaled with the official seal of some Minister of State; and all Courts of Justice and Magistrates in the Colony shall take judicial notice of such official seal.

14. The Magistrate before whom a fugitive criminal accused of a crime shall be brought in pursuance of this Order shall if such evidence is produced as would, according to the law of the Colony justify the committal for trial of the fugitive criminal, if the crime of which he is accused had been committed in the Colony commit him to prison in the Colony, but otherwise shall order him to be discharged.

15. The Magistrate before whom a fugitive criminal of any of the Protected States accused of any such breach of contract as aforesaid shall be brought in pursuance of this Order shall if such evidence is produced as (subject to the provisions of this Order) would according to the law of the Colony have justified the committal for trial of the fugitive criminal if the breach of contract of which he is accused had been an indictable offence and had been committed in the Colony commit him to some prison in the Colony, but otherwise shall order him to be discharged.

16. The Magistrate before whom a fugitive criminal alleged to have been convicted of a crime is brought in pursuance of this Order, shall if such evidence is produced as subject to the provisions of this Order would according to the law of the Colony prove that the prisoner was so convicted commit him to prison, but otherwise shall order him to be discharged.

otherwise shall order him to be discharged. 17. Whenever a Magistrate commits a fugitive criminal to prison in pursuance of either the 14th 15th or 16th clause of this Order he shall inform such fugitive criminal that he will not be surrendered until after the expiration of fifteen days, and that during such fifteen days he may appeal to any Judge of the Supreme Court of the Colony. 18. Any person who is committed to prison 1 under the 14th 15th or 16th clause of this Order may within fifteen days from the date of such committal appeal against such committal to a Judge of the Supreme Court of the Colony, and such Judge shall upon hearing such appeal either affirm the order of committal or order the appellant to be discharged from prison, in which latter case no Order shall be made for his surrender to the Foreign State from which the requisition for his surrender proceeded.

19. Every Magistrate who shall commit a fugitive criminal to prison under this Order shall forthwith report the result of his proceedings to the Governor, together with any remarks which he may deem it necessary or proper to make upon the case, and together with a copy of all depositions and documents used before him.

20. Upon receipt of a Magistrate's report of the committal of a fugitive criminal under the provisions of this Order, the Governor may, after the expiration of fifteen days from the date of committal, or after the affirmation of the order of committal by the Judge before whom the appeal of the fugitive criminal is brought, as the case may be, or after such further period as may be allowed in either case by the Governor, by warrant under his hand and seal order the fugitive criminal to be surrendered to such person, as may, in his opinion, be duly authorised to receive the fugitive criminal by the Foreign State from which the requisition for his surrender proceeded, and such fugitive criminal shall be surrendered accordingly.

Provided always, that no fugitive criminal shall be surrendered under this Order if—

(1.) The offence in respect of which his surrender is demanded is of a political character, or if it is shown to the satisfaction of the Governor that the requisition for his surrender has been made with a view to try or punish him for an offence of a political character, nor—

(2.) Unless provision is made by the law of the State from which the requisition for his surrender proceeds, or by arrangement, that he shall not, until he has been restored to Her Majesty's dominions, be detained or tried in that State for any offence committed before his surrender, other than the crime in respect of which he is surrendered.

21. It shall be lawful for the person to whom a fugitive criminal shall be so ordered to be surrendered to receive, hold in custody, and convey within the jurisdiction of the Foreign State from which the requisition for his surrender came such fugitive criminal, and if such fugitive criminal escapes out of the custody of such person it shall be lawful to retake him in the same manuer as any person accused of any crime against the laws of the Colony may be retaken upon an escape from lawful custody.

22. If any fugitive criminal committed to prison under this Order shall not be surrendered and conveyed out of the Colony within two calendar months after his committal, it shall be lawful for any Judge of the Supreme Court of the Colony upon application by or on behalf of the fugitive criminal, and upon proof that notice of the application has been given to the Governor or to the Colonial Sccretary, to order the fugitive criminal to be discharged out of custody, unless sufficient cause is shown to the contrary.

23. The Schedules to this Order annexed shall be taken to be part of this Order.

#### THE FIRST SCHEDULE.

The following list of crimes is to be construed according to the law existing in the Straits Settlements at the date of the alleged crime:---

Murder and attempt and conspiracy to murder.

Manslaughter.

Counterfeiting and altering money and uttering counterfeit or altered money.

Forgery, counterfeiting, and altering and uttering what is forged or counterfeited or altered.

Embezzlement and larceny.

Obtaining money or goods by false pretences. Crimes by bankrupts against bankruptcy law.

Fraud by a bailee, banker, agent, factor, trustee, or director or member or public officer of any Company made criminal by any Act for the time being in force.

Rape.

Abduction.

Child stealing.

Burglary and housebreaking.

Arson.

Robbery with violence.

Threats by letter or otherwise with intent to extort.

Piracy by law of nations.

Sinking or destroying a vessel at sea, or attempting or conspiring to do so.

Assaults on board a ship on the high seas with intent to destroy life or to do grievous bodily harm.

Revolt or conspiracy to revolt by two or more persons on board a ship on the high scas against the authority of the Master.

Kidnapping and false imprisonment.

Perjury and subornation of perjury, whether under Common or Statute Law.

Any indictable offence under the Larceny Act, 1861, or any Act amending or substituted for the same, which is not specifically mentioned in this Schedule.

Any indictable offence under the Act of the Session of the twenty-fourth and twenty-fifth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, "To consolidate and "amend the Statute Law of England and "Ireland relating to malicious injuries to pro-"perty," or any Act amending or substituted for the same, which is not specifically mentioned in this Schedule.

Any indictable offence under the Act of the Session of the twenty-fourth and twenty-fifth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter ninety-eight, "To consolidate and "amend the Statute Law of England and Ire-"land relating to indictable offences by forgery," or any Act amending or substituted for the same, which is not specifically mentioned in this Schedule.

Any indictable offence under the Act of the Session of the twenty-fourth and twenty-fifth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter ninety-nine, "To consolidate and amend "the Statute law of the United Kingdom against offences relating to the Coin," or any Act amending or substituted for the same, which is not specifically mentioned in this Schedule.

Any indictable offence under the Act of the Session of the twenty-fourth and twenty-fifth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred, "To consolidate and "amend the Statute Law of England and Ire-"land relating to offences against the person," or any Act amending or substituted for the same, which is not specifically mentioned in this Schedule.

Any indictable offence under the laws for the time being in force in relation to bankruptcy which is not specifically mentioned in this Schedule.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. 7 HEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning "the burial of the dead in England beyond the " limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act " concerning the burial of the dead in the Metro-" polis," it is enacted, that in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burialground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval or (as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burialgrounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require ; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered ; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previcus notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the incumbent and vestry clerk or churchwardens of such parish :

And whereas the Right Honourable Henry Matthews, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbent and the Churchwardens of the parish hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, burials should be discontinued in the Manor Park Cemetery Forest Gate, in the parish of East Ham, except under certain conditions:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the fifth day of July last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the sixteenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that burials be discontinued in the Manor Park Cemetery Forest Gate, in the parish of East Ham, except in accordance with the following regulations, viz. :--

- I. The burial ground shall be effectually fenced, and, if necessary, underdrained to such a depth as will prevent water remaining in any grave or vault.
- II. The area to be used for graves shall be divided in grave spaces, to be designated by convenient marks, so that the position of each may be readily determined, and a corresponding plan kept on which each grave space shall be shown.
- III. No earthen grave shall be dug within one foot of any other grave.
- IV. A register of graves shall be kept in which the name, age, and date of burial in each shall be duly registered.
- V. No body shall be buried in any vault or walled grave unless the coffin be separately entombed in an air-tight manner, that is, by properly cemented stone or brickwork which shall never be disturbed.
- VI. One body only shall be buried in any common earthen grave on the same day unless the bodies be those of members of the same family, and that every coffin be forthwith covered with earth at least a foot thick, which shall be closely rammed down, never to be again disturbed.
- VII. No unwalled family grave shall be reopened within fourteen years after the burial of a person above twelve years of age or within eight years after the burial of a child under twelve years of age, unless to bury another member of the same family; in every case a layer of earth not less than one foot thick shall be left undisturbed above the previously buried coffin; but if, on re-opening any grave, the soil be found to be offensive, such soil shall not be disturbed, and in no case shall human remains be removed from the grave.
- VIII. No coffin shall be buried in any unwalled grave within four feet of the ordinary level of the ground, unless it contains the body of a child under twelve years, when it shall not be less than three feet below that level.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. WHEREAS the Right Honourable Henry Matthews, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has, under the provisions of an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning "the burial of the dead in England beyond the "limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act "concerning the burial of the dead in the "Metropolis," made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein with the following modifications, viz. :--

STANGROUND.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Stanground, in the county of Huntingdon; and also in the churchyard after the thirty-first December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, except as follows :—

(a.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

(b.) In such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

WOODFORD-HALSE. — Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Woodford-Halse, in the county of Northampton; and also in the churchyard after the first January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, except as follows :—

(a.) In such wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

SUNBURY.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church and churchyard of Sunbury, in the county of Middlesex.

SAINT JOHN, WEDNESBURY.—Forthwith and entirely in Saint John's Church, Wednesbury, in the county of Stafford; and also in the churchyard, except as follows :—

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

(c.) In such reserved grave spaces in the churchyard (as have never before been buried in, and which when opened are free from water) burials may be allowed of so many members of the families to whom they may be allotted as can be buried at or below the depth of five feet

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the seventh day of October next.

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the Loudon Gazette; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation one month before the said seventh day of October.

THEREAS by an Act passed in the Session W of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning "the burial of the dead in England beyond the "limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act "concerning the burial of the dead in the Metro-"polis," it is enacted, that in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that for the protection of the public health the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burialground shall be opened in any city or town of within such limits, without such previous approval or (as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burialgrounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifica-tions mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require ; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered ; provided also that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and vestry clerk or churchwardens of such parish :

And whereas by another Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, initialed "An Act further to amend the laws concerning "the burial of the dead in England," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order; shall or shall not have arrive<sup>1</sup>), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit :

And whereas the Right Honourable Henry Matthews, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbent and the churchwardens of the parish hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that he is of opinion that the Order of Her Majesty in Council of the twelfth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and seventysix, in so far as it affects burials in the church and churchyard of Littleborough, in the parish of Rochdale and county of Lancaster, should be varied, and that the following directions should be substituted for those contained in the said Order with respect to burials in the said church and churchyard, viz.:

- That burials be discontinued forthwith and entirely in Littleborough Church, in the parish of Rochdale, in the county of Lancaster, and in the part of the churchyard which lies to the north of the church; and also in the rest of the churchyard, except as follows :--
- In such vaults and wholly walled graves as were existing on the twelfth August, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

WILLIAM CARTER, A.B., of the barque "Gettysburg," of Aberdeen. The following is an account of the services in

The following is an account of the services in respect of which the decoration has been conferred :—

The "Gettysburg" was lost by striking on the Morant Cays on the night between 31st March and 1st April, 1889, whilst on a voyage from Monte Video to Pensacola, seven of the crew being drowned.

The sea during the night washed over the ship and over the remaining nine of the crew, who, however, managed to hang on to the wreck until daylight, when WILLIAM CARTER and seven men managed to reach a rock which was seen above water at the distance of about 500 yards.

The Master of the vessel tried to follow, but was injured and exhausted, and the sea was so strong that he was knocked down, and would have been drowned had not CARTER returned and carried him to the rock.

CARTEE afterwards swam out and secured part of the topmast and yard, lashed them together, and with assistance brought them ashore, where they were formed into a raft.

The nine men left, got on the raft, and with small pieces of wood commenced to paddle to the nearest Island, distant one and a half miles, CARTER and another seaman at times swimming alongside and directing the raft, which was frequently turned off its course and sometimes upset owing to the heavy sea which was running at the time.

CARTER and six others subsequently swam to a larger island a quarter of a mile distant, the former returning the next day, and assisting the Master and a seaman, who were seriously injured, to reach it.

The survivors of the shipwrecked crew remained on the larger Island till the 21st April last, when CARTER and others manufactured a larger raft,

on which two of the crew sailed to Jamaica, a distance of 32 miles, in two days, whereby the rescue of all the men was ultimately effected.

PARCEL POST.

#### TREASURY WARRANT.

WE, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in pursuance of the Acts relating to Her Majesty's Post Office, and in exercise of all powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, made on the representation of Her Majesty's Postmaster-General (testified by his signing the same), and under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, order, direct, and declare as follows :-

#### Reptal.

1. There shall be repealed, revoked, and annulled on and as from the day upon which this Warrant comes into operation the Warrant of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, dated the 6th day of April, 1889, relating to the transmission of Parcels between the United Kingdom and Canada, and so much of the Warrant of the said Commissioners dated the 14th day of February, 1889, as relates to the transmission of Parcels from Canada to places viâ the United Kingdom.

#### Definitions.

2. In this Warrant-

- (1.) The expression "Parcel" means a Postal Packet which is posted as a Parcel in accordance with the provisions of this Warrant, or any Warrant amending the same:
- (2.) The expression "United Kingdom" includes the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man.

#### Places between which Parcels may be transmitted.

3. From and after the date when this Warrant comes into operation Parcels may, subject to the provisions of this Warrant, be transmitted by post between the United Kingdom and Canada and between Canada and places via the United Kingdom.

#### Rotes of Postage.

4. On all Parcels transmitted by Post under this Warrant between Canada and the United Kingdom there shall be charged and paid the rates of postage respectively specified in Part I. of the Schedule hereto.

5. On all Parcels transmitted by post under this Warrant from Canada to any place mentioned or referred to in Part II. of the said Schedule there shall be charged and paid the rates of postage therein respectively specified or referred to. But such last-mentioned rates shall not apply in any case where a special fixed rate of postage is authorised by law in respect of a Parcel so transmitted.

#### Maximum Dimensions and Weight.

6. Except by permission of the Postmaster-General, there shall not be conveyed or tendered for conveyance by post under this Warrant any Parcel the dimensions of which shall exceed in length two feet, or in width or depth one foot, or which shall exceed in weight five pounds.

#### Prepayment.

7. The postage chargeable according to the respective rates specified in the said schedule shall in all cases (except as otherwise provided in this Warrant) be prepaid at the time of posting, and such prepayment shall in the United Kingdom be effected by means of adhesive postage stamps, or at such Post Offices, within such hours, and under and subject to such regulations as the Postmaster-General shall from time to time prescribe, in money. Provided that any Parcel posted in the United Kingdom addressed to British Columbia or Vancouver's Island insufficiently prepaid which is prepaid to an amount equal to the postage which would have been payable thereon if the same had been addressed to any other parts of Canada, shall be forwarded, charged with the amount of the deficient postage, together with an additional postage of one penny.

#### Times of Posting.

8. Parcels intended to be transmitted by post may, in the United Kingdom, be posted on any day of the week except Sunday, but shall not be posted on Sundays, or in England or Ireland on Christmas Day or Good Friday, and in Scotland on either of the two Sacramental Fast Days,

except in the cases next hereinafter mentioned, that is to say :---

Where the delivery of Parcels on Sundays, or any of the other days aforesaid, at certain Post Offices, to addressees calling for the same, may hereafter be specially authorized by the Postmaster-General, the posting of Parcels on Sundays, or such other days as aforesaid, at such offices respectively, shall also be permitted within such times and in such manner as may be directed by the Postmaster-General.

#### Mode of Posting.

 $\cdot$  9. Except as otherwise provided in this Warrant, all Parcels shall in the United Kingdom be posted by being handed in at a Post Office in the manner hereinafter provided, within the hours during which such office shall be open to the public for the posting of Parcels.

#### Posting at Post Offices.

10. The following provisions shall apply to the posting of Parcels at any Post Office in the United Kingdom, that is to say :---

- (1.) It shall be the duty of a person bringing a Parcel to hand it to an officer on duty at the counter in such office.
- (2.) Such Parcel must be accompanied by or have affixed to it a declaration of such kind, and stating the contents of the Parcel in such manner and form and with such other particulars as the Commissioners of Customs and the Postmaster-General may prescribe.
- (3.) Such Parcel shall be measured and weighed by such officer, and (if such Parcel do not exceed the limits of measurement or weight hereinbefore mentioned) the postage thereof, according to the rates specified in Part I. of the said schedule shall, subject as hereinbefore mentioned, be prepaid as hereinbefore provided, and shall be verified by such officer, and no such Parcel shall be forwarded by post without the before-mentioned the requirements being complied with; and if any such Parcel shall be left at a Post Office without such requirements being complied with, such Parcel shall be detained, and may be returned or given up to the sender thereof or otherwise dealt with or disposed of in any manner authorized by this Warrant.

#### Collection of Parcels.

11. The Postmaster-General may, if he think fit, from time to time authorize such officers as he may direct to receive Parcels for the Post under such regulations and conditions as he may from time to time prescribe.

#### Irregular Posting of Parcels.

12. Any Packet transmissible by Parcel Post from the United Kingdom which, from any words or marks thereon, or other external evidence, appears to have been intended for transmission as a Parcel, but which has not been tendered for transmission as a Parcel, but has been posted in a Post Office letter-box, or otherwise than according to the manner hereinbefore prescribed for the posting of Parcels, may, in the discretion of the Postmaster-General, either be detained or returned or given up to the sender, or if the said Packet is fully prepaid with the Letter or Book rate of postage, and otherwise conforms to the Regulations as to the Letter or Book Post, the same may be forwarded as a Letter or Book Packet (as the case may be). Return and Disposal of Undelivered Parcels. 13. With regard to—

- (a.) Parcels which are addressed to a Post Office in the United Kingdom to be called for, or to a place in the United Kingdom beyond the limits of the free postal delivery of any town or district, or to a ship at any port in the United Kingdom, and which are not called for or delivered within such reasonable times as the Postmaster-General may from time to time prescribe; and
- (6.) Parcels which cannot be delivered in the United Kingdom for want of a true direction, or by reason that the addressec is dead, or cannot be found, or has refused the same, or has refused to pay any charges thereon, or for any other sufficient reason,

The following provisions shall (subject to the provisions of the Warrant of the said Commissioners of the 12th day of December, 1888, relating to Foreign and Colonial Parcels) apply (that is to say):--

- (1.) The Parcel shall, as the Postmaster-General may from time to time direct, be retained at or forthwith forwarded to such place as the Postmaster-General may from time to time appoint, and may, if necessary, be there opened and examined.
- (2.) Where the name and address of the sender can be ascertained from the Parcel or the declaration accompanying the same, notice shall be given by post to the sender through the Post Office of Canada, that the Parcel will, in default of any claim on the part of the addressee, be given up to the sender or his agent upon personal application at such place as aforesaid, or at the request of the sender will be forwarded to a corrected address or returned to him by post in either case upon the conditions hereinafter mentioned.
- (3.) Where the name and address of the sender cannot be ascertained from the Parcel, notice shall be publicly given (by affixing the same at such place or places, or in such other manner as the Postmaster-General may direct), and notice shall also be given to the Post Office of Canada that the Parcel will, in default of any claim on the part of the addressee, and upon payment of such charges as are hereinafter mentioned, be given up upon the personal application of the sender or his agent, or be returned to the sender by post.
- (4.) In any case the notice shall state that, in default of the receipt by the Postmaster-General of an application for the Parcel during a period to be specified in such notice from some person who, in the Postmaster-General's judgment, is entitled to receive the Parcel, it will be disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may direct.
- (5.) The Postmaster-General may, in his discretion, specify in any such notice, or otherwise, the periods during which Parcels may be returned to the senders thereof, and in so doing may have regard to the nature and contents of Parcels.
- (6.) Where in the case of a Parcel which cannot be delivered for want of a true direction, the sender corrects the address of the Parcel, the Parcel shall be forwarded to the corrected address, subject to the following conditions:---
  - (a.) Where the corrected address of the Parcel is within the same free delivery as the original address, and the Parcel is not

at the time of such correction lying at a Returned Letter Office, no new charge shall be made with respect to the delivery of the Parcel.

- (3.) Where the corrected address of the Parcel is not within the same free delivery as the original address, or the Parcel at the time of such correction is lying at a Returned Letter Office, there shall be paid a new and distinct rate of postage equal in amount to the rate of postage which would have been chargeable on such Parcel as an Inland Parcel.
- (7.) A Parcel shall not be given up or returned by post to the sender except upon payment by him of any charge for re-direction or other charge to which the Parcel has become liable under the provisions of this Warrant, or of any such Regulations as are referred to in section 14 of "The Post Office (Parcels) Act, 1882."
- (8.) Where the sender requests a Parcel to be returned to him by post, such Parcel shall not be returned to the sender except upon payment by him of a new and distinct rate of postage, according to the rates fixed by this Warrant, and in such case the said rate of postage and all other charges to which the Parcel has become liable, if not prepaid by the sender, shall be collected on the delivery of the Parcel to him.
- (9.) The Postmaster-General may require proof to his satisfaction that an applicant for a Parcel is entitled to receive the same.
- (10.) Where no application is made for a Parcel within the period specified in any such notice as aforesaid, or an applicant fails to prove to the satisfaction of the Postmaster-General that he is entitled to receive the Parcel, or refuses or fails to pay the charges to which the Parcel has become liable under this Warrant, the Parcel may be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize.

#### Re-direction to places out of United Kingdom.

14. Any Parcel may be re-directed from its original address, or any substituted address, within the United Kingdom, to any country or place with which a Parcel Post to or from the United Kingdom or Canada is established, and in every case of such re-direction there shall be charged on such Parcel in respect of such re-direction a new and distinct rate of postage according to the rates for the time being payable in respect of the transmission of a like Parcel from the United Kingdom to the country or place to which it may be re-directed, and such postage, if not paid at the time of such re-direction, shall be collected on the delivery of the Parcel to the addressee.

#### Re-direction to places within United Kingdom.

15. Any Parcel may be re-directed from its original address, or any substituted address, within the United Kingdom to any other address within the United Kingdom, and in every case of such re-direction there shall be charged on such Parcel in respect of each such re-direction, and (if not previously paid) paid by the addressee thereof in money upon the delivery of such Parcel, a new and distinct rate of postage, equal in amount to the rate of postage which would have been originally chargeable on such Parcel as an Inland parcel.

#### Remission of Re-direction Rates.

16. The Postmaster-General may wholly remit the rate of postage for re-direction on any Parcel addressed to the United Kingdom which may, on the request of the addressee thereof, be redirected by an Officer of the Post Office, and again forwarded by post to the same person at any address within the limits of the same free postal delivery as the address from which such Parcel was so re-directed.

#### Prohibitions.

17. There shall not be posted or conveyed or delivered by post any Parcel-

- (1.) Consisting of or containing any indecent or obscene print, painting, photograph, lithograph, engraving, book or card, or sny indecent or obscene article whether similar to the above or not; or
- (2.) Having thereon or on the cover thereof any words, marks, or designs of an indecent, obscene, or grossly offensive character.
- (3.) Containing any article or thing not authorised by the Customs or other laws of the United Kingdom or Canada respectively.
- (4.) Consisting of or containing :-
  - (a.) Any explosive substance.
  - (b.) Any dangerous substance. (c.) Any filth.

  - (d.) Any noxious or deleterious substance.
  - (e.) Any sharp instrument not properly protected.
  - (f.) Except with the special permission of the Postmaster-General any living creature.
  - (g.) Any article or thing whatsoever which is likely to injure other Parcels in course of conveyance, or any receptacle in which the same are conveyed, or an officer of the Post Office or other person who may deal with such Parcel.

Any such Parcel, if posted or tendered for conveyance by post, may be detained, and either returned or given up to the sender thereof or dealt with or disposed of in such other manner as may be authorized by the Postmaster-General.

18. There shall not be posted or conveyed or delivered by post any Parcel consisting of or containing two or more Parcels or other Postal Packets (of the same or of different descriptions) addressed to different persons at different addresses, and any such Parcel, if posted or tendered for conveyance by post, may be detained and either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or dealt with or disposed of as the Postmaster-General may authorize.

#### Non-compliance with Regulations.

19. In any case not in this Warrant expressly provided for, where any Parcel shall be posted or tendered for conveyance by post which in any respect infringes or fails to comply with the regulations in this Warrant contained, or any of them, such Parcel may, at the option of the Postmaster-General, either be dealt with as in this Warrant provided, with reference to Parcels which cannot be delivered, or be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize.

#### Provision for Safety of Parcels.

20. In any case where any officer of the Post

Office may find it necessary or expedient for the safety or protection of Parcels that any Parcel should be forwarded or delivered by some later despatch or delivery than that for which the same was posted or despatched, or intended to be posted or despatched respectively, he may delay the despatch or delivery of such Parcel, or make such other and special arrangements as to the despatch or delivery thereof, not, however, involving a greater delay than 24 hours in the whole, as may be deemed by such officer necessary or expedient in the circumstances of the case.

### Parcels not to interfere with Letter Post.

21. Where the despatch or delivery from a Post Office in the United Kingdom of letters would be, delayed by the despatch or delivery therefrom at the same time of Parcels, such Parcels, or any of them, may be detained in the Post Office until the despatch or delivery next following that hy which they would ordinarily be despatched or delivered.

#### Postmaster- General not liable for Loss or Damage.

22. Nothing contained in or done under or in pursuance of this Warrant shall render the Postmaster-General liable, either personally or in his official capacity, to any action or other legal procceding in respect or in consequence of any loss or damage of any Parcel, whether such loss or damage be occasioned by or arise from any act or neglect of any officer of the Post Office or any other person.

#### Customs Regulations.

23. Parcels intended to be transmitted by post under the provisions of this Warrant shall not be posted, forwarded, conveyed, or delivered, except subject to such Regulations as are referred to in section 14 of "The Post Office (Parcels) Act, 1882."

#### Remission of Postage.

24. The Postmaster-General may, in any case in which he may consider it just or reasonable so to do, remit any postage or any sum made payable under this Warrant.

#### · Commencement of Warrant.

25. All Parcels transmitted by post under this Warrant between Canada and places viû the United Kingdom shall be posted, forwarded, conveyed, and delivered under and subject to the provisions of this Warrant and to the Warrants respectively relating to the Parcel Post between the United Kingdom and the place to which the Parcel shall be addressed so far as such provisions are applicable.

26. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine.
