By the Board of Agriculture.

THE Bound of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Board of Agriculture Act, 1889, and The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1886, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The following Area (namely),—the borough of Grantham,—which was declared by Order of the Privy Council dated the twenty-third day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-ninc, to be an Area infected with swine-fever, is hereby declared to be free from swine-fever, and that Area shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an Area infected with swinefever.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the fifth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine.

In witness whereof the Board of Agriculture have hereunto set their Official Seal this fourth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine.

THE RABIES (AMENDMENT) ORDER OF 1889.

By the Board of Agriculture.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Board of Agriculture Act, 1889; and The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1886, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1.—(1.) Any Local Authority may make, from time to time, such Regulations as they think fit for the following purposes, or any of them, that is to say :


For providing for the disposal (including slaughter) of stray dogs, or of dogs not muzzled, or of dogs not being kept under control in the manner prescribed by any Regulations made by the Local Authority under the authority of Article 12 of The Rabies Order of 1887.

(2.) The Rabies Order of 1887 shall be read and have effect as if the above purposes were included amongst the purposes specified in Article 12 of that Order.

2. Any dogs which have been or may hereafter be seised and detained under the authority of any Regulations made by a Local Authority before the date of this Order under Article 12 of The Rabies Order of 1887, or under the authority of Article 7 of The Rabies (City and Metropolitan Police Districts) Order of 1889, and which have not been claimed by their owners within three days after such seisure or detention may be slaughtered or otherwise disposed of by the Local Authority or by the police or person by whom the aforesaid Regulations or Orders are being executed or enforced.

3. This Order may be cited as THE RABIES (AMENDMENT) ORDER OF 1889.

THE Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice, that the following Regulations have been approved by the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, viz. :-- SFRCIAL REGULATIONS (Supplementary to the General Regulations issued 5th April, 1872, and amended by subsequent Notices in the London Gazette) respecting Open Competitive Examinations for the situation of Assistant Surveyor in the Royal Engineer Department of the War Office.

N.B.—These Regulations are liable to alteration for future Examinations.

I. The limits of age for this situation are 21 and 30, and Candidates must be of the prescribed age on the first day of the competitive Examination. Persons already serving as Temporary Clerk of Works will be eligible in respect of age if their service commenced when they were under 30, if their age does not at the date of the examination exceed 40, and if their service has been continuous up to the same date.

II. Candidates will be required to show what technical education and practical training they have undergone to qualify themselves for a situation of this nature. They must show (1) that they have served for at least three years in a public or private office under an Architect, Builder, Civil Engineer, or Surveyor; (2) that the works on which they have been engaged during those years were such as to afford them the opportunity of gaining a satisfactory knowledge of their profession ; and (3) that they have fully profited by their practical training, and possess the necessary qualifications and experience. Evidence on these points must be sent in at such times and in such manner as the Civil Service Commissioners may appoint. If such evidence should prove prima facie satisfactory, the Candidate will be admitted to examination, subject, in the case of his being successful in the competition, to such further inquiry, and the production of such further evidence, as may be necessary.

III. The examination will consist of two parts, and will be in the following subjects, viz. :--

PART I.-PRELIMINARY.

- 1. Handwriting and Orthography.
- 2. English Composition, as tested by writing letters from rough notes.

- 2. Theory of Construction.
- 3. Strength and quality of materials, and description of workmanship, tools, and plant.
- 4. Analysis of prices.
- 5. Measurement and estimate of Builders' Work, including taking off quantities from Drawings and preparing the Abstracts and Bills of Quantities.
- 6. Sanitary Engineering.
- In addition to the above six subjects a Candidate may take up any of the following optional subjects :--
 - A. Euclid (the first three Books).
 - B. Algebra, including quadratic equations.

- C. Plane Trigonometry.
- D. Geometrical Drawing and Freehand Sketches in outline.
- E. Chemistry and Mineralogy relating to Building Mat-rials.

IV. A fee will be required from every Candidate attending the Examination, according to the scale laid down under the Order in Council of 22nd March, 1879, by notice in the London Gazette of 29th April, 1881.

> NOTICE TO MARINERS. (No. 351 of the year 1889.) AFRICA-EAST COAST. MOUTHS OF RIVER ZAMBESI.

Information Concerning River Chinde.

THE following information concerning River Chinde (the branch of the delta of the Zambesi, which runs from Chinde Village to the river called Inhaombe on the charts) has been received from Lieutenant and Commander A. F. Balfour, Her Majesty's surveying-vessel "Stork," the result of an exploration made in July, August, 1889:-

River Chinde Entrance lies in (approximately) lat. 18° 34' S., long. 36° 32' E.; at the outer bar-between reefs on which the sea breaks-its breadth is about eight cables, decreasing to about two cables at Mitaone Point, on the northern I,

side of the entrance. Foot Point, on the southern side of the entrance is about two miles south-west of Mitaone Point.

The outer bar had at the time of examination a depth of seven feet at low water spring tides, the inner bar (between the outer bar and Mitaone Point) a depth of eight feet. It is high water full and change about 4h. 30m., spring tides rise 12 feet. Velocity of the ebb stream in the river about two knots (dry season).

Two beacons have been crected on Mitaone Point about one cable apart, which kept in line, bearing N. $20\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ W., lead into the river; they consist of poles, one surmounted by a white triangle, the other by a white disc with a black ball in the centre.

DIRECTIONS .- Approaching the river entrance, keep the western of four palms on Mitaone Point bearing N.W. by N., until the beacons come in line bearing N. $20\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ W.; cross the bars and proceed with the beacons in line till about one cable distant from Mitaone Point, when the course should be altered along the northern bank of the river, till Foot Point bears S.W. by S.; a course S.W. by W. should then be steered, and anchorage taken up in about three fathoms at low water, with Foot Point bearing S.E. by E. 1 E., distant about eight cables.

The "Stork" proceeded up the River Chinde a distance of 18 miles to its junction with the River Zambesi (in lat. 18° 34' S., long. 36° 15' E., approx.) and the least depth was 12 feet at low water. Thence she proceeded five miles up the Zambesi, where it became barred by rocks. Her boats ascended 120 miles to Morambala on the Shiré.

NOTE.-As the bars at the mouths of the Zambesi are subject to considerable change, the depths given are not to be depended on.

PALAWAN ISLAND-SOUTH-EAST COAST. (1.) Amended Position and Particulars of Shoal

Eastward of Ursula Islet.

WITH reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 242, of 9th July, 1889, on the existence of a shoal (on which the British steam-vessel "Wakefield" struck on 4th May, 1889), with $3\frac{1}{2}$ fathoms water on it, lying about 26 miles eastward of Ursula Islet, south-east coast of Palawan Island :-

The following additional particulars have been received through the Board of Trade :-

The shoal (Wakefield Shoal), of coral and sand, appeared to extend from 1 to $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles in an E.N.E. and W.S.W. direction, with a breadth of about 2 cables; the shoal spot $(3\frac{1}{2}$ fathoms) is on its south-west side, and close around the shoal the lead gave no bottom at 90 fathoms; it lies

Mantalingalian Hill, N. 28° W. Position, lat. 8° 21' N., long. 117° 55¹/₂' E., or about 2 miles westward of that previously given.

NOTE .- The means by which the position of

Circe Shoal (about 5 miles northward of Wakefield Shoal, as charted) was ascertained not being known, it is not improbable the shoals may be identical.

(2.) Shoal North-East of East Islet.

Information has also been received, of the existence of a shoal lying about 9 miles northeast of East Islet, south-east coast of Paláwan Island :-

This shoal (Altnacraig Shoal), on which the ritish steam-ship "Altnacraig" struck at British 7h. 25m. A.M. on 14th July, 1889, and became a total wreck, is stated to lie in lat. 9° 0' N., long. 118° 21' E.; or about 4 miles N. by W. from the charted position of the shoal reported by Marabout in 1885, and it is considered not improbable that these shoals may also be identical.

CAUTION .---- It should be borne in mind that the greater portion of the Sulu Sea is but imperfectly sounded : and considering the number of reported dangers that are but approximately charted, as also the probability that many others exist in a locality so studded with isolated rocks and shoals, Mariners are enjoined to use extreme caution when navigating the unsurveyed portions of the sea, especially between Philippine Islands and Bálábac Strait.

The red buoy within the bar, $2\frac{1}{10}$ miles S. $\frac{3}{4}$ W. from Tangalane Point Lighthouse, has been withdrawn.

A black buoy is moored about 4 cables N. $\frac{3}{4}$ W. from the position previously occupied by the red buoy above mentioned, but as Tangalane Bank here dries at low water, vessels should pass about

1¹/₂ cables westward of the buoy. The western entrance of Militáo Channel has shifted bodily to the southward, Pequena Island Bank having extended and Militáo Bank receded. That portion of Militáo Bank marked "nearly always dry" has now a cluster of mangroves on it.

Two beacons, leading through Militáo Channel have been erected on the eastern bank of the river, $1\frac{2}{10}$ miles north of Tangelane Point Lighthouse; they are about one cable apart, and kept in line bearing E. & S., S'ly, lead over the south-east tail of Pequena Island Bank in 16 feet at low water, and about 10 yards clear of the south-west tail of the bank in 30 feet at low water. The beacons consist of poles, about 18 feet high, the eastern one is surmounted by a white disc with black centre, the western by a white triangle.

BYE-LAWS and Regulations made by the Bradford Tramways and Omnibus Company Limited (hereinafter called "the Company") under the powers conferred by the Tramways Act, 1870.

Whereas the Bradford Tramways and Omnibus Company Limited, acting by its Board of Directors at a meeting held on Saturday, the 28th day of September instant, did in pursuance of the powers conferred on the Company by the Tramways Act, 1870, make the undermentioned Bye-laws and Regulations for preventing the commission of any nuisance in or upon any carriage used upon the

tramways leased by the Company, and for regulating the travelling in or upon any carriage used upon the tramways leased by the Company, that is to say :---

1. The Bye-laws and Regulations hereinafter set forth shall extend and apply to all carriages of the Company used upon the tramways, and to all places with respect to which the Company have power to make Bye-laws or Regulations.

2. Every passenger shall enter or depart from a carriage by the hindermost or conductor's platform, and not otherwise.

3. No passenger shall smoke in the saloon or lower compartment of any carriage.

4. A person in a state of intoxication shall not be allowed to enter or mount upon any carriage, and if found in or upon any carriage shall be immediately removed by or under the direction of the conductor.

5. No person shall swear or use obscene or offensive language whilst in or upon any carriage, or commit any nuisance in or upon or against any carriage, or wilfully interfere with the comfort of any passenger.

6. No person shall wilfully cut, tear, soil, or damage the cushions or the linings, or remove or deface any number plate, printed or other notice in or on the carriage, or break or scratch any window of or otherwise wilfully damage any carriage. Any person acting in contravention of this Regulation shall be liable to the penalty prescribed by these Bye-laws and Regulations in addition to the liability to pay the amount of any damage done.

7. A person whose dress or clothing might, in the opinion of a conductor of a carriage, soil or injure the linings or cushions of a carriage or the dress or clothing of any passenger, or a person who, in the opinion of the conductor, might for any other reason be offensive to passengers, shall not be entitled to enter or remain in or upon any carriage, and may be prevented from mounting any carriage, and shall not mount any carriage after having been requested not to do so by the conductor, and if found upon any carriage shall, on the request of the conductor, leave the carriage upon the fare (if previously paid) being returned.

8. Each passenger shall, upon demand, pay to the conductor or other duly authorized officer of the Company the fare legally demandable for the journey.

9. Each passenger shall show his ticket (if any) when required so to do to the conductor or any duly authorized servant of the Company, and shall also, when required so to do, either deliver up his ticket or pay the fare legally demandable for the distance travelled over by such passenger.

10. A passenger, not being an artisan, mechanic, or daily labourer, within the true intent and meaning of the Acts of Parliament relating to the Company, shall not use, or attempt to use, any ticket intended only for such artisans, mechanics, or daily labourers.

11. Personal or other luggage (including the tools of artisans, mechanics, and daily labourers) shall, unless otherwise permitted by the conductor, be placed on the front platform of the car, and not in the interior or on the roof of any carriage.

12. No passenger or other person, not being a servant, shall be permitted to travel on the steps or platforms of any carriage, or stand either on the roof or in the upper compartment or saloon, or sit on the outside rail on the roof of any carriage, and shall cease to do so immediately on request by the conductor.

13. No person, except a passenger or intending passenger, not being an official of the Company,

shall enter or mount any carriage, and no person | In the High Court of Justice. - Chancery Division. shall hold, or hang on by or to, any part of any carriage, or travel therein otherwise than on a seat provided for passengers.

14. When any carriage contains the full number of passengers which it is licensed to contain, no additional person, not being an official of the Company, shall enter, mount, or remain in or on any such carriage when warned by the conductor not to do so.

15. The conductor shall not permit any passenger beyond the licensed number to enter, or mount, or remain in or upon any part of a carriage.

16. No person shall enter, mount, or leave, or attempt to enter, mount, or leave, any carriage whilst in motion.

17 No dog or other animal shall be allowed in or on any carriage.
