#### PRESENT.

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty.

HEREAS by the Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873, it was amongst other things enacted that, where an arrangement has been made with any foreign State with respect to the that, where an arrangement has been made with any foreign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Acts shall apply in the case of such foreign State; and that Her Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent Order, limit the operation of the Order, and restrict the same to fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in the part of Her Majesty's dominions specified in the Order, and render the operation thereof subject to such conditions, exceptions, and qualifications as may be deemed expedient; and that if, by any law made after the passing of the Act of 1870 by the Legislature of any British possession, provision is made for carrying into effect within such possession the surrender of fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in such British possession, Her Majesty may, by the Order in Council applying the said Acts in the case of any foreign State, or by any subsequent Order, suspend the operation within any in the case of any foreign State, or by any subsequent Order, suspend the operation within any such British possession of the said Acts, or of any part thereof, so far as it relates to such foreign State, and so long as such Law continues in force there and no longer:

And whereas by an Act of the Parliament of Canada passed in 1886, and entitled "An Act respecting the Extradition of Fugitive Criminals," provision is made for carrying into effect within the Dominion the surrender of fugitive criminals:

And whereas by an Order of Her Majesty the Order in Council, dated the seventeenth day.

And whereas by an Order of Her Majesty the Queen in Council, dated the seventeenth day of November, 1888, it was directed that the operation of the Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873, should be suspended within the Dominion of Canada so long as the provisions of the said Act of the Parliament of Canada of 1886 should continue in force and no longer;

And whereas a Treaty was concluded on the twenty-seventh day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, between Her Majesty and the President of the Republic of Colombia, for the mutual extradition of fugitive criminals, which Treaty is in the terms

following:-

HER Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and his Excellency the President of the Republic of Colombia, having judged it expedient, with a view to the better administration of justice, and to the prevention of crime within the two countries and their jurisdictions, that persons charged with or convicted of the crimes or offences hereinafter enumerated, and being fugitives from justice, should, under certain circumstances, be reciprocally delivered up, have named as their Plenipotentiaries to conclude a Treaty, that is to say:

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, William John Dickson, Esquire, Her Minister Resident to the

Republic of Colombia; and
His Excellency the President of the Republic
of Colombia, Vicente Restrepo, Minister for Foreign Affairs of the said Republic;

"Su Excelencia el Presidente de la República de Colombia y Su Majestad la Reina del Reino Unido de la Gran Bretaña é Irlanda, habiendo juzgado conveniente, para la mejor administra-ción de justicia y para la prevención del crimen en los dos países y en sus jurisdicciones respectivas, que las personas acusadas ó convictas de los delitos que en seguida se enumeran y que se hallen huyendo de la justicia, sean entregadas reciprocamente en ciertas circumstancias, han nombrado Plenipotenciarios para concluir un Tratado, á saber :

"Su Excelencia el Presidente de la República de Colombia, á Vicente Restrepo, Ministro de Relaciones Exteriores de la misma; y

"Su Majestad la Reina del Reino Unido de la Gran Bretaña é Irlanda, á William John Dickson, su Ministro Residente en la República de Colombia;

Who, after having communicated to each other their respective full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon and concluded the following Articles :-

#### "ARTICLE I.

"The High Contracting Parties engage to deliver up to each other, under the circumstances and conditions stated in the present Treaty, those persons who, being accused or convicted of any of the crimes or offences enumerated in Article II, committed in the territory of the one Party, shall be found within the territory of the other Party.

#### "ARTICLE II.

"Extradition shall be reciprocally granted

for the following crimes or offences:

"1. Murder (including assassination, parricide, infanticide, poisoning), or attempt or conspiracy to murder.

"2. Manslaughter.

- "3. Administering drugs or using instruments with intent to procure the miscarriage of
  - "4. Rape.
- i"5. Unlawful carnal knowledge, or any attempt to have unlawful carnal knowledge, of a girl under 16 years of age, if the evidence produced justifies committal for those crimes according to the laws of both the Contracting Parties.
  - "6. Indecent assault.
- "7. Kidnapping and false imprisonment, child-stealing.
  - "8. Abduction.

"9. Bigamy.

- "10. Maliciously wounding inflicting grievous bodily harm.
  - "11. Assault occasioning actual bodily harm.
- "12. Threats, by letter or otherwise, with intent to extort money or other things of value.
  - "13. Perjury or subornation of perjury.
  - "14. Arson.
- "15. Burglary or housebreaking, robbery with violence, larceny, or embezzlement.
- . "16. Fraud by a bailee, banker, agent, factor, trustee, director, member, or public officer of any company, made criminal by any law for the time being in force.
- " 17. Obtaining money, valuable security, or goods by false pretences; receiving any money, valuable security, or other property, knowing the same to have been stolen or unlawfully obtained.
- "18.—(a.) Counterfeiting or altering money, or bringing into circulation counterfeited or altered money.
- "(b.) Forgery, or counterfeiting or altering, or uttering what is forged, counterfeited, or altered.
- "(c.) Knowingly making, without lawful authority, any instrument, tool, or engine adapted and intended for the counterfeiting of coin, or forgery of any paper money of the respective countries.
  - "19. Crimes against Bankruptcy Law.
- "20. Any malicious act done with intent to endanger the safety of any person travelling or being upon a railway.

"Quienes, despues de haberse comunicado sus respectivos plenos poderes y haberlos hallado en buena y debida forma, han convenido en los Artículos siguientes, y los han estipulado:-

#### "ARTICULO I.

"Las Altas Partes Contratantes se comprometen á entregarse reciprocamente, en las circunstancias y con las condiciones que en el presente Tratado se establecen, todas las personas que, siendo acusadas ó estando convictas de alguno de los delitos enumerados en el Artículo II, cometidos en el territorio de una de las Partes, se hallaren en el territorio de la otra Parte.

#### "ARTICULO II.

"La extradicion se concederá reciprocamente

para los siguientes delitos:-

"1. Homicidio (incluyendo asesinato, parricidio, infanticidio, envenenamiento), ó tentativa ó conspiracion para cometerlo.

"2. Homicidio atenuado.

  - "4. Violación ó forzamiento de mujer.
- "5. Ayuntamiento carnal ilegítimo ó tentativa para tenerlo con una niña de menos de 16 años de edad, si las pruebas que se produzcan justifican el enjuiciamiento por tales delitos conforme á las leyes de ambas Partes Contra--

"6. Ultraje al pudor.

- "7. Secuestro de personas, retención ilegal ó robo de niños.
  - "8. Rapto.

"9. Bigamia.

- "10. Heridas ó lesiones corporales graves
- hechas con intención.
  "11. Asalto que ocasione daño corporal efec-
- "12. Amenazas, sea por cartas 6 de cualquier otro modo, con propósito de estafar dinero ú otras cosas de valor.
  - "13. Perjurio ó soborno de testigos.
  - "14. Incendio voluntario.
- "15. Escalamiento ó forzamiento de habitación con intento criminal, robo ejecutado con violencia ó hurto.
- "16. Abuso de confianza ó defraudación por un depositario, banquero, agente, factor, administrador, director, miembro ó empleado público de una Compañia, que se haga criminal conforme á las leyes vigentes.
- "17. Estafa de dinero ó papel moneda, de prendas valiosas ó de mercancias con falsos pretextos; recibo de dinero ó papel moneda, de prendas valiosas ó de otras propiedades con conocimiento de que han sido robadas ó ilegal-. mente obtenidas.
- "18. (a.) Falsificación ó alteración de moneda ó papel moneda, ó circulación de moneda ó papel moneda falsos ó alterados.
- "(b.) Falsificación, imitación, alteración 6 emisión de lo que ha sido falsificado, imitado 6 alterado.
- "(c.) Construcción, á sabiendas, sin autorización legal de instrumento, utensilio ó aparato adaptado y destinado á la fabricación de moneda falsa, ó á la falsificación de papel moneda de los
- dos paises.
  "19. Delitos contra las leyes sobre bancor-
- "20. Toda acción maliciosa ejecutada con propósito de poner en peligro la seguridad de cualquiera persona que viaje en ferrocarril 6 se halle sobre la linea férrea.

- "21. Malicious injury to property, if such offence be indictable.
  - "22. Crimes committed at sea:-
  - "(a.) Piracy by the law of nations.
- "(b) Sinking or destroying a vessel at sea, or attempting or conspiring to do so.
- "(c) Revolt, or conspiracy to revolt, by two or more persons on board a ship on the high seas against the authority of the master.
- "(d) Assault on board a ship on the high seas with intent to destroy life or to do grievous bodily harm.

"23. Dealing in slaves in such manner as to constitute a criminal offence against the laws of both States.

"The extradition is also to be granted for participation in any of the aforesaid crimes, provided such participation be punishable by the laws of both Contracting Parties.

"Extradition may also be granted at the discretion of the State applied to in respect of any other crime for which, according to the laws of both the Contracting Parties forthe time being in force, the grant can be made.

#### "ARTICLE III.

"Either Government may, in its absolute discretion, refuse to deliver up its own subjects to the other Government.

#### "ARTICLE IV.

"The extradition shall not take place if the person claimed on the part of Her Majesty's Government, or the person claimed on the part of the Government of Colombia, has already been tried and discharged, or punished, or is still under trial in the territory of Colombia or in the United Kingdom respectively, for the crime for which his extradition is demanded.

"If the person claimed on the part of Her

"If the person claimed on the part of Her Majesty's Government, or on the part of the Government of Colombia, should be under examination for any other crime in the territory of Colombia or in the United Kingdom respectively, his extradition shall be deferred until the conclusion of the trial and the full execution of any punishment awarded to him.

#### "ARTICLE V.

"The extradition shall not take place if, subsequently to the commission of the crime, or the institution of the penal prosecution or the conviction thereon, exemption from prosecution or punishment has been acquired by lapse of time, according to the laws of the State applied to.

#### "ARTICLE VI.

"A fugitive criminal shall not be surrendered if the offence in respect of which his surrender is demanded is one of a political character, or if he prove that the requisition for his surrender has, in fact, been made with a view to try or punish him for an offence of a political character.

#### · "ARTICLE VII.

"A person surrendered can in no case be kept in prison, or be brought to trial, in the State to which the surrender has been made, for any other crime, or on account of any other matters, than those for which the extradition shall have taken place, until he has been restored, or has

"Asimismo se concede la extradición por la complicidad en cualquiera de los delitos antedichos, con tal de que esa complicidad sea punible conforme á las leyes de ámbas Partes Contratantes.

"La extradición puede también ser concedida á voluntad del Estado de quién se solicite respecto de cualquiera otro delito por el cual pueda otorgarse de acuerdo con las leyes vigentes de ámbas Partes Contratantes.

#### "ARTICULO III.

"Cualquiera de los dos Gobiernos tendrá absoluta libertad para rehusar la entrega de sus propios súbditos al otra Gobierno.

#### "ARTICULO IV.

"La extradición no tendrá lugar si la persona reclamada de parte del Gobierno de Colombia ò de parte del de Su Majestad Británica ha sido ya juzgada y absuelta ó castigada, ó se halla todavía sometida á juicio en el Reino Unido ó en el territorio de Colombia respectivamente, por el delito que motiva la demanda de extradición.

"Si la persona reclamada por parte del Gobierno de Colombia, ó del de Su Majestad Británica, se hallare procesada por cualquiero otro delito en el Reino Unido ó en el territorio de Colombia respectivamente, se diferirá su extradición hasta la conclusión del juicio y el pleno cumplimiento de cualquier castigo á que haya sido sentenciada.

#### "ARTICULO V.

"No tendrá lugar la extradición si, con posterioridad á la comisión del delito ó á la iniciación de la causa, ó á haberse declarado convicto el individuo, ha quedado éste, por el trascurso del tiempo, exento de enjuiciamiento ó de castigo, conforme á las leyes del Estado á quien se le reclama.

#### "ARTICULO VI.

"El criminal fugitivo no será entregado si el delito respecto del cual se pide su extradición tiene carácter político, ó si él prueba que la demanda para su entrega ha sido hecha positivamente con la mira de juzgarlo ó castigarlo por un delito de carácter político.

#### "ARTICULO VII.

"La persona que haya sido entregada por extradición no podrá en ningún caso ser mantenida en prisión ó sometida á juicio en el Estado á quien se ha hecho la entrega, por ningún otro delito ni en consideración á ninguna otra causa que aquellos por los cuales haya

had an opportunity of returning, to the State by which he has been surrendered.

"This stipulation does not apply to crimes committed after the extradition.

#### "ARTICLE VIII.

"The requisition for extradition shall be made through the Diplomatic Agents of the

High Contracting Parties respectively.

"The requisition for the extradition of an accused person must be accompanied by a warrant of arrest issued by the competent authority of the State requiring the extradition, and by such evidence as, according to the laws of the place where the accused is found, would justify his arrest if the crime had been committed there.

"If the requisition relates to a person already convicted, it must be accompanied by the sentence of condemnation passed against the convicted person by the competent Court of the State that makes the requisition for extradition.

"A sentence passed in contumaciam is not to be deemed a conviction, but a person so sentenced may be dealt with as an accused person.

#### "ARTICLE IX.

"If the requisition for extradition be in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the competent authorities of the State applied to shall proceed to the arrest of the fugitive.

#### "ARTICLE X.

"A fugitive criminal may be apprehended under a warrant issued by any Police Magistrate, Justice of the Peace, or other competent authority in either country, on such information or complaint, and such evidence, or after such proceedings as would, in the opinion of the authority issuing the warrant, justify the issue of a warrant if the crime had been committed, or the person convicted, in that part of the dominions of the two Contracting Parties in which the Magistrate, Justice of the Peace, or other competent authority exercises jurisdiction; provided, however, that in the United Kingdom the accused shall, in such case, be sent as speedily as possible before a Police Magistrate in London. He shall, in accordance with this Article, be discharged, as well in Colombia as in the United Kingdom, if, within the term of thirty days a requisition for extradition shall not have been made by the Diplomatic Agent of his country, in accordance with the stipulations of this Treaty.

"The same rule shall apply to the cases of persons accused or convicted of any of the crimes or offences specified in this Treaty, and committed on the high seas on board any vessel of either country which may come into a port of the other.

#### "ARTICLE XI.

"The extradition shall take place only if the evidence be found sufficient according to the laws of the State applied to, either to justify the committal of the prisoner for trial, in case the crime had been committed in the territory of the same State, or to prove that the prisoner is the identical person convicted by the Courts of the State which makes the requisition, and that the crime of which he has been convicted is one in respect of which extradition could, at the time of such conviction, have been granted

#### "ARTICULO VIII.

 La demanda para la extradición se hare por medio de los Agentes Diplomáticos dálas Altas Partes Contratantes respectivamente.

"La demanda para la extradición de un acusado debe ir accompañada de la orden de arresto expedida pour la autoridad competente del Estado que exija la extradición, y de aquellas pruebas que, conforme á las leyes del lugar donde se encuentre el acusado, hubieran de justificar su aprehensión si el delito hubiese sido cometido allí.

"Si la demanda se refiere á un reo rematado, debe ir acompañada del fallo condenatorio dictado contra la persona convicta por el tribunal competente del Estado que hace la demanda de extradición.

"La sentencia dictada in contumaciam no se considerará como fallo condenatorio; pero la persona sentenciada de esta manera pueda tratarse como cualquier individuo acusado.

#### "ARTICULO IX.

"Si la demanda de extradición estuviere de acuerdo con las anteriores estipulaciones, la autoridad competente del Estado al cual se dirija ésta, procederá á la aprehensión del prófugo.

#### "ARTICULO X.

"Un criminal fugitivo puede ser aprehendido por orden expedida por cualquier magistrado de policia, juez de paz, ú otra autoridad competente en ambos paises, por informes ó quejas, y por pruebas, ó después de procedimientos que, en opinión de la autoridad que dió la orden, justificarian la expedición de ésta, si el delito hubiese sido cometido ó el criminal condenado en aquella parte del territorio de los dos paises contratantes en la cual el magistrado, el juez, ú otra autoridad competente ejerzan jurisdicción; con tal, sin embargo, que en ese caso, en el Reino Unido el accusado sea enviado con la brevedad posible á un magistrado de policia en De acuerdo con este Articulo, el acusado será puesto en libertad, tanto en Colombia como en el Reino Unido, si en el término de treinta dias no se solicitare su ex tradición por el Agente Diplomático de su pais conforme á las estipulaciones de este Tratado.

#### "ARTICULO XI.

"La extradición solo tendrá lugar si las pruebas fueren suficientes conforme á las leyes del Estado de quien se solicita, bien sea para justificar el sometimiento del procesado á juicio, caso que el delito haya sido cometido en el territorio del mismo Estado, ó bien para probar que el reo es la misma persona sentenciada por los Tribunales del Estado que hace la demanda, y que el delito de que ha sido convicta es de aquellos respecto de los cuales podria haber sido concedida la extradición al tiempo de la sen-

by the State applied to; and no criminal shall be surrendered until after the expiration of fifteen days from the date of his committal to prison to await the warrant for his surrender.

#### "ARTICLE XII.

"In the examinations which they have to make in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the authorities of the State applied to shall admit as valid evidence the sworn depositions or statements of witnesses taken in the other State, or copies thereof, and likewise the warrants and sentences issued therein, and certificates of, or judicial documents stating, the fact of a conviction, provided the same are authenticated as follows:—

"1. A warrant must purport to be signed by a Judge, Magistrate, or officer of the other State

"2. Depositions or affirmations, or the copies thereof, must purport to be certified under the hand of a Judge, Magistrate, or officer of the other State, to be the original depositions or affirmations, or to be true copies thereof, as the case may require.

"3. A certificate of, or judicial document stating, the fact of a conviction must purport to be certified by a Judge, Magistrate, or officer

of the other State.

"4. In every case, such warrant, deposition, affirmation, copy, certificate, or judicial document must be authenticated either by the oath of some witness, or by being sealed with the official seal of the Minister of Justice, or some other Minister of the other State; but any other mode of authentication for the time being permitted by law where the examination is taken may be substituted for the foregoing.

#### "ARTICLE XIII.

"If the individual claimed by one of the two High Contracting Parties in pursuance of the present Treaty should be also claimed by one or several other Powers, on account of other crimes or offences committed upon their respective territories, his extradition shall be granted to that State whose demand is earliest in date.

#### "ARTICLE XIV.

"If sufficient evidence for the extradition be not produced within two months from the date of the apprehension of the fugitive, or within such further time as the State applied to, or the proper Tribunal thereof, shall direct, the fugitive shall be set at liberty.

#### "ARTICLE XV.

"All articles seized which were in the possession of the person to be surrendered at the time of his apprehension shall, if the competent authority of the State applied to for the extradition has ordered the delivery of such articles, be given up when the extradition takes place; and the said delivery shall extend not merely to the stolen articles, but to everything that may serve as a proof of the crime.

#### "ARTICLE XVI.

"All expenses connected with extradition shall be borne by the demanding State.

#### "ARTICLE XVII.

"The stipulations of the present Treaty shall be applicable to the Colonies and foreign possessions of Her Britannic Majesty, so far as the

#### "ARTICULO XII.

"2. Las declaraciones ó atestaciones ó sus copias deben ser certificadas de puño y letra del Juez, Magistrado ó agente público del otro Estado, con expresión de que son declaraciones originales, ó sus copias fieles según el caso.

"3. Todo certificado de condenacion, ó todo documento judicial en que conste el fallo condenatorio, debe ser certificado por un Juez, Magistrado ó agente miblico del otro Estado.

"4. En cada caso, la ordeu, declaración atestación, copia, certificado, ó documento judicial, debe ser autenticado, ora por el juramento de algun testigo, ora por el sello oficial del Ministro de Justicia ó de algún otro Ministro del otro Estado; pero cualquiera otro modo de autenticación permitido por las leyes vigentes al tiempo de la investigación puede sustituirse por el anterior.

#### "ARTICULO XIII.

"Si el individuo reclamado por una de las dos Altas Partes Contratantes conforme al presente Tratado fuere asimismo reclamado por otro ú otros Gobiernos, con motivo de otros delitos cometidos en sus respectivos territorios, la extradición se concederá al que primero haya hecho la demanda.

#### "ARTICULO XIV.

"Si dentro de dos meses contados desde la fecha de la aprehensión del prófugo no se hubieren producido pruebas suficientes, ó dentro de la prórroga que ordene el Estado de quien se solicita la extradición ó el Tribunal competente de él, entónces el detenido será puesto en libertad.

#### "ARTICULO XV.

"Todos los bienes embargados al tiempo de su aprehensión al individuo reclamado se entregarán también cuando tenga lugar la extradición, si la autoridad competente del Estado de que ésta se solicita lo ordenare; y la entrega no sólo se extenderá á los objetos robados, sino también á todos aquellos que puedan servir como prueba del delito.

#### "ARTICULO XVI.

"Todos los gastos relacionados con la extradición serán de cargo del Estado que la solicitare.

#### "ARTICULO XVII.

"Las estipulaciones del presente Tratado serán aplicables á las Colonias y á las posesiónes extranjeras de Su Majestad Británica, hasta laws for the time being in force in such Colonies and foreign possessions respectively will allow.

"The requisition for the surrender of a fugitive criminal who has taken refuge in any of such Colonies or foreign possessions shall be made to the Governor or chief authority of such Colony or possession by the chief Consular officer of the Republic of Colombia in such Colony or possession.

"Such requisition may be disposed of, subject always, as nearly as may be, and so far as the law of such Colony or foreign possession will allow, to the provisions of this Treaty, by the said Governor or chief authority, who, however, shall be at liberty either to grant the surrender or to refer the matter to his Government.

"Her Britannic Majesty shall, however, be at liberty to make special arrangements in the British Colonies and foreign possessions for the surrender of Colombian criminals who may take refuge within such Colonies and foreign possessions, on the basis, as nearly as may be, and so far as the law of such Colony or foreign possession will allow, of the provisions of the present Treaty.

"Requisitions for the surrender of a fugitive criminal emanating from any Colony or foreign possession of Her Britannic Majesty shall be governed by the rules laid down in the preceding

Articles of the present Treaty.

#### "ARTICLE XVIII.

"The present Treaty shall come into force ten days after its publication, in conformity with the forms prescribed by the laws of the High Contracting Parties. It may be terminated by either of the High Contracting Parties by a notice not exceeding one year and not less than six months.

HEREAS by an Act passed in the thirty-seventh year of your Majesty's reign, chapter 88, intituled "The Slave Trade Act, 1873," it was, amongst other things, provided that where any Treaty in relation to the Slave Trade is made after the passing of that Act, by or on behalf of Her Majesty with any Foreign State, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that as from such date, not being earlier than the date of the Treaty as may be specified in the Order, such Treaty shall be deemed, and that thereupon (as from the said date, or if no date should be specified, as from the date of such Order) such Treaty shall be deemed to be an existing Slave Trade Treaty within the meaning of the Act, and all the provisions of the Act should apply and be construed accordingly.

And whereas on the fourteenth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eightynine, a Treaty for the suppression of the African Slave Trade was concluded between Her Majesty

and His Majesty the King of Italy in the following terms, that is to say: -

"Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and His Majesty the King of Italy, being mutually animated by a sincere desire to co-operate for the extinction of the Traffic in African Slaves, have resolved to conclude a Treaty for the purpose of attaining this object, and with this view have named as their Plenipotentiaries, that is to say:—

say:—
"Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, the Right Honourable Robert Arthur Talbot Gascoyne Cecil, Marquis of Salisbury, Earl of Salisbury, Viscount Cranborne, Baron Cecil, Peer of the United Kingdom, Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, Member of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, &c.;

"And His Majesty the King of Italy, Monsieur Thomas Catalani, Knight Commander of Saints Maurice and Lazare, Chargé d'Affaires of

His Majesty in London;

"Who, having communicated to each other their respective full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon and concluded the following Articles:—

#### "ARTICLE I.

"Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and His Majesty the King of Italy engage to prohibit all Trade in Slaves, either by their respective subjects or under their respective flags, or by means of capital belonging to their respective subjects; and to declare such Traffic piracy. Their Majesties further declare, that any vessel which may attempt to carry on the Slave Trade, shall, by that fact alone, lose all right to the protection of their flag.

#### "ARTICLE II.

"In order more completely to accomplish the object of the present Treaty, the High Contracting Parties agree that their ships of war may search every merchant-vessel belonging to the nationality of either of the High Contracting Parties which shall, on reasonable grounds, be suspected of being engaged in the traffic in slaves, or of having been fitted out for that purpose, or of having been engaged in the traffic during the voyage in which she shall have been met with by the said cruizers; and that such cruizers may detain and send or carry away such vessels, in order that they may be brought to trial.

"The said mutual right of search shall not

Moreover, the space within which the exercise of the said right shall be confined, shall be bounded, on the north, by the 32nd parallel of north latitude; on the west, by the eastern coast of America; from the point where the 32nd parallel of north latitude strikes that coast down to the 45th parallel of south latitude; on the south, by the 45th parallel of south latitude, from the point where that parallel strikes the eastern coast of America to the 80th degree of longitude east from the meridian of Greenwich; and on the east, by the same degree of longitude, from the point where it is intersected by the 45th parallel of south latitude up to the coast of India.

#### "ARTICLE III.

"In no case shall the mutual right of search be exercised upon the ships of war or public vessels of the High Contracting Parties, but their cruizers shall mutually afford to each other assistance in all cases where it may be useful that they should act in concert.

#### "ARTICLE IV.

"Whenever a merchant-vessel belonging to the nationality of one of the High Contracting Parties shall have been detained by a cruizer of the other, conformably to the provisions of the present Treaty, such merchant-vessel, as well as the master, the crew, the cargo, and the slaves who may be on board, shall be brought into such place as the High Contracting Parties have respectively designated for that purpose in this Article, and they shall be delivered over to the authorities appointed with that view by the Government which exercises jurisdiction at such place, in order that proceedings may be had with respect to them before the competent tribunals.

"All British vessels which shall be detained on the western coast of Africa by the cruizers of Italy shall be carried and delivered up to the British Jurisdiction at Sierra Leone; or shall be handed over to a British cruizer, if one should be available in the neighbourhood of the capture.

"All British vessels which shall be detained on the eastern coast of Africa, the Red Sea, and coast of Arabia by the cruizers of Italy shall be carried and delivered up to the British Jurisdiction at Suakin, Aden, or Zanzibar, as may be most convenient; or shall be handed over to a British cruizer, if one should be available in the neighbourhood of the capture.

"All Italian vessels which shall be detained by the cruizers of Great Britain on the eastern or western coast of Africa, in the Red Sea, and on the coast of Arabia, shall be sent to the nearest or most accessible Italian Colony, Possession, or Protectorate where a Slave Trade Tribunal exists; or shall be handed over to an Italian cruizer, if one should be available in the neighbourhood of the capture.

#### "ARTICLE V.

"Every merchant-vessel belonging to the nationality of either of the High Contracting Parties which shall be searched and detained in virtue of the provisions of the present Treaty shall, unless proof be given to the contrary, be deemed to have been engaged in the Slave Trade, or to have been fitted out for that Traffic, if there are found on board any slave or slaves other than domestic slaves in attendance on or

in the discharge of the legitimate business of their masters, or slaves bond fide employed in the navigation of the vessel; or if there are found slave-shackles, bolts, or handcuffs; special floorings of mud or sand laid down as a sitting-place for slaves; a larger quantity of water in casks or in tanks than is requisite for the consumption of the crew of such merchant-vessel; a boiler or other cooking-apparatus of unusual size, and larger, or capable of being made larger, than requisite for the use of the crew of such merchant-vessel; or more than one boiler or other cooking-apparatus, of the ordinary size; a quantity of mats or matting, greater than is necessary for the use of such merchant-vessel, unless such mats or matting be entered on the manifest as forming part of the cargo.

"If it is established that a slave or slaves other than those specially excepted in this Article, or that one or more of the articles above specified are on board, or have been on board, during the voyage in which the vessel was captured, that fact shall be considered as prima facie evidence that the vessel was employed in the Traffic.

#### "ARTICLE VI.

"Proceedings shall be immediately taken against the vessel detained, as above stated, her master, her crew, and her cargo, before the competent Tribunals of the country to which she belongs; and they shall be tried and adjudged according to the established forms and laws in force in that country; and if it results from the proceedings that the said vessel was employed in the Slave Trade, or fitted out for that Traffic, the vessel, her fittings, and her cargo of merchandize shall be confiscated; and the master, the crew, and their accomplices shall be dealt with conformably to the laws by which they shall have been tried.

In case of confiscation, the proceeds of the sale of the aforesaid vessel shall, within the space of six months, reckoning from the date of the sale, be placed at the disposal of the Government of the country to which the ship which made the capture belongs, in order to be employed in conformity with the laws of that country.

#### "ARTICLE VII.

"If a slave or slaves, other than those specially excepted by, or any one of the articles specified in, Article V of the present Treaty, is found on board a merchant-vessel, or if such slave or article is proved to have been on board of her during the voyage in which she was captured, no compensation for losses, damages, or expenses, consequent upon the detention of such vessel, shall in any case be granted, either to the master, or to the owner, or to any other person interested in the equipment or in the lading, even though a sentence of condemnation should not have been pronounced against the vessel, as a consequence of her detention.

#### "ARTICLE VIII.

"When, by the sentence of the competent Tribunal, it shall have been ascertained that a merchant-vessel detained in virtue of the present Treaty, was not engaged in the Slave Trade, and was not fitted out for that Traffic, she shall be restored to the lawful owner or cwners. If the competent Tribunal should decide that the seizure, detention, or prosecution was without reasonable ground, the Government

HEREAS by the three hundred and thirtythird section of " The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for every Pilotage Authority, by Bye-law made with the consent of Her Majesty in Council, from time to time to do within its district all or any of the things specified in that behalf in the said section:

And whereas the Boston Pilot Commissioners, being a Pilotage Authority within the meaning of the said Act, have, in exercise of the powers vested in them by that Act, made and submitted for the consent of Her Majesty Bye-laws fixing the rates to be henceforth demanded and received for pilotage, and the Regulations with respect to within the Port and Harbour of Boston, copy of which Bye-laws is set forth in the schedule hereto annexed:

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that the said Bye-laws are reasonable

and proper:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said Merchant Shipping Act, 1854, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to approve of, and signify Her consent to the said Bye-laws, as set forth in the schedule hereto annexed.

#### SCHEDULE.

1. From and after the promulgation of these Bye-laws all and every the Bye-laws, Rules, Orders, and Regulations heretofore in force with respect to the Pilots and Pilotage of the Port shall be and same are hereby rescinded, and in lieu thereof the Boston Pilot Commissioners do hereby make and ordain the following Bye-laws, namely:

Pilot Superintendent.

2. The duties of the Pilot Superintendent shall be as follows :-

(a.) To exercise supervision and control under the Commissioners over all the Pilots so as to see that the Acts and these Bye-laws are duly observed.

(b.) To obtain from the Pilots a report of all occurrences affecting the services on which the Commissioners or the Superintendent may require information.

(c.) To hear and determine any differences which may arise between the Pilots.

(d.) To prevent the employment of unlicensed Pilots.

(e.) To enquire into complaints made against the Pilots by Masters and Owners of vessels and others interested, and into the circumstances attending cases of grounding, collision, or loss, when vessels have been under the charge of a Pilot.

(f.) To take soundings of the bar and channels once a year or oftener if required (accompanied on each occasion by the Pilots) and especially to draw the earliest attention of the Commissioners to any alterations in the state of the bar or the deep water channels.

(g.) To keep a register of all ships arriving at and leaving the port with entries of the Pilots' earnings, and also a journal in which shall be entered all accidents to vessels (however occurring) while in charge of a Pilot.

(h.) To report to the Commissioners any case of misconduct or insubordination on the part of the Pilots.

(i.) To carry out all orders and regulations of the Commissioners which may be from time to time issued relative to the piloting of Vessels or of other matters within the scope of his duties.

(i.) To report to the Commissioners from time to time on all the above matters, and also on all cases of misconduct or breach of the Byelaws which may come to his knowledge on the part of any of the Pilots.

(k.) All instances of neglect of duty shall be brought before the Commissioners and the Superintendent shall not compromise any offence of a Pilot.

Limits of Pilotage District.

3. The limits of the Pilotage District of the Pilots and Pilotage to be henceforth observed | Port of Boston shall extend to and comprise so

much of the River Witham as runs from the Grand Sluice, in Boston aforesaid, towards and into a certain place called the Scalp, and also the Roads, and all and singular the Deeps, commonly called the Norman Deeps; and also all and all manner of places and parts and watercourses, and the streams of the Washes near and in the parts of Holland, extending to the Haven or place called Wainfleet Haven, and to a certain place called Pullye Heads, and to another place or sand called the Knock, and to another place called the Dog's Head in the Pot, and to the uttermost limits of the flowing and ebbing of the waters aforesaid and every of them, and adjoining to the sea and floods and streams of the borders and confines of the county of Norfolk.

#### Pilots.

4. Pilots are to bear in mind that since the completion of the dock their duties have become much more serious and responsible than they have hitherto been. It is impossible to lay down a set of regulations to guide Pilots in all cases and they must be largely influenced by their own discretion and caution but the Commissioners will expect the following instructions to be strictly observed, viz. :-

(a.) No Pilot is to undertake to pilot a ship where, in his cpinion, there is any nisk of

her grounding in the channel.

(b.) It is no excuse to a Pilot that the Master or other person in charge of a vessel desires that an attempt shall be made to take her up or down the river when it is doubtfu! whether there will be enough water, or agrees to take the rick upon himself. In all doubtful cases, a Pilot is to absolutely refuse to pilot a vessel, and if the Captain or other person unduly presse him to do so or makes the attempt himself without the Pilot's consent, the Pilot is to leave the ship.

(c.) Before commencing the navigation of a vessel all Pilots are to ascertain that she is in a proper navigable condition, and, if a steam vessel, is provided with sufficient steam power in case an increase of speed should be necessary during her progress, and also to make themselves personally acquainted with

her draught of water fore and aft.

(d.) A Pilot before undertaking the navigation of a Vessel of over three hundred and fifty tons register shall recommend the Captain to secure the assistance of a Tidesman, a second Pilot to have the preference should one be at liberty.

(e.) The Pilots are in all cases to strictly obey the orders and instructions of their superin-

5. Every Candidate for the office of Pilot shall have been employed ten years at sea, five of which he must have served in the capacity of able seaman, and be accustomed to the navigation of Steam as well as Sailing Vessels. He shall have attained the age of twenty-five years and must not exceed thirty-five years. He will be required to pass such examination as the Commissioners may prescribe and if approved will be granted a licence which will have to be renewed annually on the first Monday in February. On receiving his licence he will for the first twelve months be allowed by the Superintendent to pilot Vessels not exceeding fifteen feet draught of water into and out of the Port, and if during that period his conduct shall have been in all respects satisfactory he will be permitted to pilot Vessels of every description.

be paid by each Pilot upon receiving his Licence and one pound and one shilling upon each renewal thereof. The fees to be paid by Masters and Mates of Vessels for Certificates granted under section 340 of the "Merchant Shipping Act 1854" shall be two pounds and two shillings for each Certificate, and one pound and one shilling for every renewal thereof. The fees received for licences and certificates and the renewals of the same shall be paid to the Pilots' Superannuation Fund. A Certificate held by a Master or Mate of a vessel shall not be renewed unless application in writing for its renewal is made to the Commissioners seven days at least before it expires. The renewal shall be by endorsement under the hand of the Clerk to the Commissioners.

7. Every Pilot shall in all cases demean himself civilly and respectfully towar's all persons who may require his services and shall maintain strict temperance and sobriety in the exercise of his office. He shall also use his utmost care and diligence to conduct the ships and vessels under his charge without damage or doing injury to others, and shall not leave his ship until she is safely moored in the river, or in the dock, or at her discharging or loading berth, and shall within twenty-four hours after his leaving the ship report to the Pilot Superintendent all accidents, if any, which may have happened to su h vessel while under his direction. He shall always have with him when on duty a copy of these bye-laws and his licence and on taking charge of a vessel he shall, if required, produce the same to the fficer in command. In the case of vessels outward bound from the river or dock he shall be on board at least two hours before high water to ascertain if the vessel of which he is about to take charge is ready for sea and to superintend the unmooring of the vessel from the commencement thereof.

8. In case any Pilot in charge of a vessel shall by the law of quarantine, or at the request of the Master or Owner of the vessel, be detained on board thereof, from any cause whatever, beyond the time necessary for safely berthing such vessel, or outward bound longer than twentyfour hours, he shall be paid by the Master or Owner for such detention, over and above his pilotage at the rate of ten shillings per day, and also have his provisions supplied to him.

9. One half of the number of Pilots shall always be at the upper station and the other half at the lower station, or as required by the Super-

intendent.

10. The signal for a Pilot shall be the usual one, namely, by day a Jack at the fore-top masthead and by night a lantern.

11. The Pilots on duty at the upper station taking vessels from the town shall continue their

charge to Boston Toft or High Horn.

12. The Pilots on duty at the lower station shall make for all vessels coming in from sea at High Horn or Boston Toft, and take charge of them (unless impracticable), at either of those limits, and shall bring the vessels up to the town if the same can be accomplished in one tide, and the Masters require it.

13. Pilots in charge of outward bound ships or vessels shall on no account whatever except by permission of the Masters of such ships or vessels (unless such Master decide to anchor in Clayhole when such permission shall not be requisite) leave or quit them, by allowing themselves to be put ashore or on board a Pilot's boat, before their arrival at the proper outward compulsory Pilotage every description. limits of the port, namely, High Horn or Boston 6. A fee of two pounds and two shillings shall Toft. On proof to the satisfaction of the Commissioners of any infringement of this Bye-law or in the event of any of the lower station Pilots failing at any time, when practicable, to board inward bound ships or vessels at High Horn or Boston Toft aforesaid, every such Pilot shall for each offence forfeit the sum of one pound to the Commissioners, to be deducted from the share of the earnings of the Pilot so offending.

14. In no case whatever shall the lower station be left without a Pilot being on board the Pilot sloop to attend to all ships and vessels coming in from sea; and the Superintendent is empowered to send down to the lower station any of the upper station Pilots in all cases when any of the lower station Pilots are incapable of discharging their duties or the number of vessels exceed the number of Pilots on the station.

15. No Pilot shall leave his station or be absent from duty under any pretence whatever without the leave of the Superintendent.

16. Each Pilot shall make a return every fourteen days to the Superintendent of all ships and vessels piloted by him with the amount of pilotage in each case.

17. When any Pilot shall by accident or otherwise lay any ship or vessel aground which he shall have in charge, such Pilot shall not of his own accord under any pretence whatever leave the ship until she shall be afloat and in safety.

18. Every Pilot shall conform himself strictly to all directions which shall from time to time be given to him by the Harbour and Dock Master touching the mooring, unmooring, placing or removing of any ship or vessel under his charge as long as such ship or vessel shall be lying and situate within the limits of the authority of such Harbour and Dock Master.

19. Every Pilot who shall observe any alteration in the sands or channels or that any of the buoys or beacons placed within the jurisdiction of the Commissioners are driven away, broken down, or out of place, shall forthwith inform the Superintendent thereof. The Pilots shall also accompany the Superintendent on his taking soundings of the bar and channels and render him

all necessary assistance.

20. If any Pilot in charge of any ship by wilful breach of duty or by neglect of duty or by reason of drunkenness does any act tending to the immediate loss, destruction, or serious damage of such ship; or tending immediately to endanger the life or limb of any person on board such ship; or if any Pilot, by wilful breach of duty, or by neglect of duty, or by reason of drunkenness, refuses or omits to do any lawful act proper and requisite to be done by him for preserving such ship from loss, destruction, or serious damage, or for preserving any person belonging to or on board of such ship from danger to life or limb, the Pilot so offending shall for each such offence, he liable to suspension or dismissal by the Commissioners.

21. All vessels whether inward or outward bound to or from Boston shall be free from the payment of pilotage in the event of such vessels not being able to obtain the services of a Pilot; and in the event of any vessel inward bound arriving without a Pilot opposite Bleak House the employment of a Pilot shall be entirely optional with the Master of the vessel so arriving.

22. The rates of Pilotage shall be those specified in Rule 27 and shall be collected by an Officer appointed by the Commissioners. These rates shall be paid over every fourteen days to the Pilots in equal shares or in such proportions as they may for the time being be respectively entitled (having regard to the provisions of Rules)

24 and 25), subject to a percentage to be fixed by the Commissioners to cover the expenses of collection, which shall not exceed five per cent., and to such other deduction as may from time to time be necessary to meet the premiums to become payable in respect of the annuity policies hereinafter mentioned, which shall not exceed five per cent. on the share of each Pilot holding an annuity policy.

Pilot Boats.

23. The Commissioners shall provide a suitable vessel to be moored in Clayhole for the use of the Pilots on the lower station, but all other necessary boats, and appliances, shall be provided and maintained by the Pilots out of their earnings. The vessel provided by the Commissioners shall not be taken away from her moorings by the Pilots without the permission of the Superintendent. Every Pilot boat must be distinguished by the characteristics stated in the 346th section of the "Merchant Shipping Act, 1854."

Superannuation of Pilots.

24. The Superintendent shall not allow any Pilot to be absent from duty on account of illness unless the same shall be certified in writing by some known medical practitioner, and any Pilot so absent shall produce a similar certificate fortnightly, and at the end of three months from the date of the first certificate he shall, if still unable to discharge his ordinary duty, and on production of a certificate to that effect from a medical practitioner to be named by the Commissioners, be put upon half-pay, and at the end of six months he shall, if entitled to the annuity hereinastermentioned, cease to be a pilot.

25. If the Pilot be not entitled to an annuity he shall remain on half-pay for twelve months, after which his pay shall cease, and if unable to resume his duties within two years from the date of his first medical certificate he shall cease to be

a Pilot of the port.

26. A fund shall be established to be called "The Pilots' Superannuation Fund" which shall be vested in and managed and distributed by the Commissioners.

- (a.) The two present junior Pilots, viz.: George Taylor Dawson and Thomas Shephard, and every Pilot hereafter licensed, shall each be required to effect an insurance with Her Majesty's Postmaster-General, or some other Assurance Office to be approved by the Commissioners, to entitle him to an annuity of £25 per annum to become payable on his attaining the age of 60, the necessary premiums to be paid by the Commissioners out of the Pilots' Superannuation Fund, and repaid out of the earnings of the Pilots so insured, the policies to be held by the Commissioners: Provided that the Commissioners shall from time to time contribute one-half of the premiums to become payable in respect of the said annuity policies so long as the Pilots shall continue in the service.
- (b.) In the event of any Pilot referred to in the preceding sub-section, becoming permanently disabled by reason of some casualty occurring when on duty as a Pilot before attaining the age of sixty, the Commissioners shall upon production of such evidence thereof as they shall deem conclusive, pay the whole or such part of the annual premium for keeping on foot such Pilot's Annuity Policy as they may determine until he shall be entitled to receive the annuity secured thereby.
- (c.) The Commissioners shall from time to time out of the tonnage dues authorized to

be levied by them pay to the Pilots' Superannuation Fund such sums of money as may be necessary for all or any of the purposes aforesaid.

Rates of Pilotage.

27. The following pilotage rates shall be paid for piloting ships, vessels, or barges between High Horn or Boston Toft, and Boston Town, or any intermediate distance, namely:—

Complaints - How to be made.

28. All complaints of offences against the Acts of Parliament or the foregoing Bye-laws, or any of them, shall be made in writing, signed by the party aggrieved, and delivered to the Clerk to the Commissioners as soon as practicable, and the Clerk shall summon all such persons as the Commissioners or any Committee may desire to examine to attend a meeting of the Commissioners or Committee.

Penalty for Breach of Bye-laws.

29. Every Pilot offending against or contravening any of the preceding Bye-laws, shall for every such offence forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding five pounds, or be suspended from his office of a Pilot during the pleasure of the Commissioners, or have his licence cancelled and the Commissioners are hereby empowered to cancel such licence accordingly.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of the Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding " of benefices in plurality, and to make better " provision for the residence of the clergy," after reciting that, "Whereas from the increase of " population, or from other circumstances, it may " be expedient that two or more benefices which "have been heretofore united or which may be "hereafter united under the provisions of this "Act should be disunited," it is amongst other things enacted, "That when two or more benefices "shall have been united, or may be hereafter "united into one benefice, and with respect to " his own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop " of the Province, or the Bishop of any diocese " shall represent to the said Archbishop of the "Province, that one or more of the benefices " within his diocese, of which such united benefice "shall consist, may be separated therefrom with advantage to the interests of religion, the said "Archbishop shall inquire into the circumstances " of the case; and if on such inquiry it shall ap-

"benefices, he shall, six weeks at least before "certifying such inquiry to Her Majesty as here-inafter directed, cause, with respect to his own "diocese, a statement, in writing, of the facts, "and in all other cases a copy, in writing, of "the aforesaid representation to be affixed on or "near the principal outer door of the church " or in some public and conspicuous place in " each of the benefices forming part of the united " benefice, with notice to any person or persons "interested that he, she, or they may within such "six weeks show cause, in writing, under his, her, "or their hands to the said Archbishop against "any such disunion; and if no sufficient cause " be shown within such time, the Archbishop shall " certify the inquiry and consent, when the patron's " consent is necessary, to Her Majesty in Council, " and thereupon it shall be lawful for Her Majesty "to issue an Order for separating such last-" mentioned benefice or benefices from such united " benefice, and for declaring the rights of patronage " of the several patrons, if there be more than one " patron, and such Order shall be registered in the registry of the diocese to which such united " benefice shall belong, which Order the Registrar " of such diocese, immediately on the receipt " thereof, is hereby required to register accordingly, " and thereupon immediately if such united benefice "shall be then vacant, otherwise on the first " avoidance thereof, such union shall be ipso facto " dissolved, so far only as regards such benefice or "benefices so proposed to be separated from such "united benefice, but in all other respects shall " remain in full force and effect, and thenceforward " such last-mentioned benefice or benefices shall be "and be deemed and taken to be a separate and " distinct benefice or benefices to all intents and pur-" poses whatever as if no such union had taken place, " and the patron or patrons thereof shall and may " according to the terms of such Order present or " nominate thereto respectively, and so from time " to time upon each and every avoidance of the " same: Provided always, that no benefices which "have been united for more than sixty years " before the passing of this Act shall be disunited "without the consent in writing of the patron or " patrons thereof."

And whereas by the hereinbefore in part recited. Act, it is, amongst other things, further enacted that "it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in " Council, on the recommendation of the Arch-" bishop of the Province, with the consent of "the patron or patrons of such benefices "respectively (such consent to be signified in "writing under the hands of such patron or "patrons) to assign and attach such portion of "the globe lands, tithes, moduses, rent-charges, " and other endowments or emoluments be-"longing to or arising or accruing within the "limits of such united benefice to each of such "benefices respectively, as to Her Majesty in "Council shall seem fit, notwithstanding such "proportion of glebe land, tithes, rent-charges, " moduses, or other endowments or emoluments, "or any part thereof, may not arise, or accrue, within the limits of the benefice to which the " same shall be so assigned and attached as afore-" said, or may not have belonged thereto; and also "to divide and apportion between such benefices " all such charges and outgoings as before the "disunion thereof were imposed upon the whole united benefice."

Bishop of Llandaff as Bishop of the diocese within which is situate the united benefice consisting of the vicarage of Aberavon and the perpetual curacy of Baglan in the county of Glamorgan having represented unto us that the disunion of the said united benefice by the separation of the vicarage of Aberavon from the perpetual curacy of Baglan may be made with advantage to the interests of religion we enquired into the circumstances of the case.

the proposed disunion.

"That six weeks and upwards before certifying such inquiry and consent to Your Majesty in Council we caused a copy in writing of the afore-said representation of the said Lord Bishop to be affixed on the principal outer door of each of the parish churches of the said united benefice with notice to any person or persons interested that he she or they might within such six weeks shew cause in writing under his her or their hand or hands to us the said Archbishop against such disunion and no such cause has been shewn.

"The representation of the said Lord Bishop of Llandaff our enquiry into the circumstances of the case the reply thereto the consent in writing of the patron and the copies of the representation and notice before mentioned are hereunto annexed.

"And we do hereby certify the enquiry and consent aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an order for separating the said vicarage of Aberavon from the said perpetual curacy of Baglan and in accordance with the consent in writing of the patron above referred to we recommend that each benefice when disunited shall retain its own original endowments and emoluments and bear its own charges and outgoings.
