

Canterbury, in the words and figures following, that is to say :—

“To the Most Reverend Edward White Lord Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury.

“I Richard Lord Bishop of Llandaff do hereby represent to your Grace that it appears to me that the disunion of the united benefice of Aberavon-with-Baglan in the county of Glamorgan and my diocese of Llandaff by the separation of the vicarage of Aberavon from the perpetual curacy of Baglan may be made with advantage to the interests of religion.

“Witness my hand this seventeenth day of June in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine. “*R. Llandaff.*”

And whereas, on the second day of July one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, the said Archbishop enquired into the circumstances of the case.

And whereas, on the twenty-seventh day of September one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, the said Archbishop certified to Her Majesty in Council as follows that is to say :—

“To the QUEEN’S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

“We the undersigned Edward White Archbishop of the province of Canterbury Primate of all England and Metropolitan do hereby certify to Your Majesty in Council.

“That the Right Reverend Richard Lord Bishop of Llandaff as Bishop of the diocese within which is situate the united benefice consisting of the vicarage of Aberavon and the perpetual curacy of Baglan in the county of Glamorgan having represented unto us that the disunion of the said united benefice by the separation of the vicarage of Aberavon from the perpetual curacy of Baglan may be made with advantage to the interests of religion we enquired into the circumstances of the case.

“That on such enquiry it appeared to us that such union might be usefully dissolved and that Madelina Georgina Llewellyn of Baglan Hall in the county of Glamorgan Widow being the patron or person entitled to present to the said united benefice if the same were now vacant consents to the proposed disunion.

“That six weeks and upwards before certifying such inquiry and consent to Your Majesty in Council we caused a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation of the said Lord Bishop to be affixed on the principal outer door of each of the parish churches of the said united benefice with notice to any person or persons interested that he she or they might within such six weeks shew cause in writing under his her or their hand or hands to us the said Archbishop against such disunion and no such cause has been shewn.

“The representation of the said Lord Bishop of Llandaff our enquiry into the circumstances of the case the reply thereto the consent in writing of the patron and the copies of the representation and notice before mentioned are hereunto annexed.”

“And we do hereby certify the enquiry and consent aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an order for separating the said vicarage of Aberavon from the said perpetual curacy of Baglan and in accordance with the consent in writing of the patron above referred to we recommend that each benefice when disunited shall retain its own original endowments and emoluments and bear its own charges and outgoings.

“As witness our hand this twenty-seventh day

of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine.

Now therefore Her Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the said united benefice consisting of the vicarage of Aberavon and the perpetual curacy of Baglan shall be disunited by separating the said vicarage of Aberavon from the said perpetual curacy of Baglan.

And Her Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is further pleased, on the recommendation of the said Archbishop, to assign and attach to each of such benefices respectively its own original endowments and emoluments, and to direct that each benefice shall bear its own charges and outgoings. *C. WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the thirty-first day of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, in the words following, that is to say :—

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for annexing certain land to the residence house of the deanery of the cathedral church of Chester.

“Whereas by the twenty-eighth section of the said Act it is provided that any small portion of land situate within the limits and precincts of any cathedral or collegiate church or in the vicinity of any residentiary house, may be reserved to such church or permanently annexed to such residentiary house by the authority in the said Act after provided, that is to say, by a scheme prepared by us, and by an Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same.

“And whereas the piece of land particularly described in the schedule annexed to this scheme containing about eighteen perches more or less is situate within the precincts of the said cathedral church of Chester and is now vested in us in fee simple in possession.

“And whereas the said piece of land adjoins the residence house of the deanery of Chester, and has for a considerable number of years been occupied in connection with the said residence house, part thereof being garden ground which has been made a part of the garden of the said house, and other part thereof being the site of certain stables which were formerly used by the occupiers of the said house, but are now no longer required.

“And whereas the said piece of land was when it became vested in us held by a lease for a term of years expiring in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three which lease is more particularly described in the schedule annexed to this scheme and which lease became vested in the Very Reverend John Lionel Darby the present Dean of Chester.

“And whereas the said John Lionel Darby has lately with a view to the annexation of the said piece of land to the said residence house surrendered to us voluntarily and without valuable consideration
