THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Board of Agriculture Act, 1889, and The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1886, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, and with reference especially to Article 19 of The Rabies Order of 1887, do hereby license the Local Authority for the West Riding of the county of York to dig up or cause to be dug up, within fourteen days after the date of this Licence, the carcase of a certain dog which was shot and buried on or about the twenty-ninth day of November last at Stainburn, in the township of Stainburn, in the West Riding of the county of York, subject to the following conditions:—

1. When dug up the Local Authority shall forthwith cause the carcase to be examined with a view to ascertain whether the dog was affected with true rabies, and the Local Authority shall then cause the carcase to be re-buried as soon as possible, and shall cause it to be covered with a sufficient quantity of quick lime or other disinfectant.
2. The expenses of and incidental to the digging up, examination, and re-burial of the carcase shall be defrayed by the Local Authority.
3. This Licence is revocable by the Board of Agriculture.

(PLEURO-PNEUMONIA.)

By the Board of Agriculture.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Board of Agriculture Act, 1889, and The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1886, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The following Area (namely),—in the county of Somerset, comprised within the following boundary, that is to say, commencing at Cuttern-lane on the main Evercreech-road, thence along the lane within to Albert Perry's Farm and to Redland's Farm both within, thence by the river Alham to Lovely Farm without, thence by the boundaries of the fields called Butcher's Ground, Rushy Ground, Prime Meads, Godsell, and New Close all within to Lamyatt Church without, thence by Lamyatt-road without to the crossing of the Somerset and Dorset Railway without thence along the line of the Somerset and Dorset Railway without to Evercreech Junction Station without, and thence by the main-road to Evercreech without to Cuttern-lane aforesaid,—which was declared by Order of the Board dated the eighteenth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, to be an Area infected with pleuro-pneumonia, is hereby declared to be free from pleuro-pneumonia, and that Area shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an Area infected with pleuro-pneumonia.
2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the sixth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine.

(SWINE-FEVER.)

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Board of Agriculture Act, 1889, and The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1886, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The following Place (namely),—in the Elloe Division of the Parts of Holland, Lincolnshire, comprising the piggeries of Mr. Joseph Edmund Mawby, in Spalding Marsh, together with the Eldish Paddock and the Eleven Acres Wheat Stubble-field (neither of which adjoins a highway) adjoining and surrounded by other parts of the same Farm,—which was declared by Order of the Board dated the twenty-seventh day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, to be a Place infected with swine-fever, is hereby declared to be free from swine-fever, and that Place shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be a Place infected with swine-fever.
