Plymouth, Feb. 6.

Esterday the Nightingal brought into this Port two Frenchmen, the one from Dublin, loaden with Herrings; bound for Bourdeaux, the other from Briftot, laden with Commodities of good value, bound to Rochel.

Persmouth, Feb. 8. The Infection is at Gofpard, and some places near the Town, but in it all are in good health, both Seamen and Soldiers; and at Southampton, none have

died these thirty days.

Offend, Feb. 7. Six or feven thousand Soldiers are come lately to Dunkirk; and the Spaniards on the other fide, furnish the Garrisons that border upon France with fresh additions of Soldiers. The Dutch it feems can get together but eighty ships against the Spring, and these they would have the people believe, will be sufficient to give the English Battel, who are not easily perswaded to that Faith, having had so late experience how their Fleet was baifled, that confisted of a far greater number.

Ditto, Irb. 11. Stilo Novo, The delign of the Holland Fleet is supposed only to keep their men on board, and to take what they can, coming this way; when the Fleet of Eighty Ships, intended for the Spring, are ready, these are

The Hollanders have twenty eight Ships now loading at Bourdesux; without Convoy, which are ordered to return Northwards, and may in fourteen or twenty days, fet out. There hath not appeared above one man of War in these parts these two or three days, the rest are to lye farther

Northwards, and are to goe West of Newport.

Dantaith, Jan. 22. We hear every day of great complaints of the rude behaviour of the Soldiers. The Bishops are now proceeding to Anathematise them. The King hath ordered Commissioners into Prussia, to look into the crimes and delinquencies both of Soldiers and Officers. There will be a Convention of the Estates of that Province, on the tenth of February, where those Articles are to be examined, which must asterwards be more throughly handled at the general Dier, on which depends the fafety of that Nation.

Seville fan. 19. At Cadiz the Spanish Armado is fitting but as fast as they are able, they will be in all about twenty, or twenty two fail; some suppose to goe to Barcelona, to attend the Infanta in her voyage to Germany. The Generals place at Sea is still vacant, since the death of the Duke of Avero; whose Duchels, three days since, attended on the water by two Gallies, came into this River, and landed five Leagues short of this City, and past by, to avoid the Ceremonies that arrend visits, and proceeded on her journey to Madrid.

Brussels, Feb. 9. Stile Nove. A Colonel of the Bishop of Murster, with four Companies of Foot new raised in Liege, and one Troop of Horse, deligned the surprize of Walkenbourgh; but his intent being discovered to the Enemy, they drew our Forces out of Maestricht, by whom being over-powred, he was forced to retire with the lois of some

Foot, and is marched towards Munster.

Antwerp, Feb. 10. The Marquis de Clermont arrived here with his Equipage from Paris two days ago on his way towards Holland; and not being willing to hazard himself the ordinary way by Land, where the Munsterist Forces make continual excussions, and had particularly, inferms, laid.

The 8 of this moneth their Highnesser Royal came to this place towards the evening, the next day they went to Valde Grace, to assist at the folemn service that Monsiege halt caused to be made there for the Queen-Mother, with all

pomp imaginable.

The 10 instant, the Sieur de Saintet, Master of the Ceremonies, clad in a mourning Habit, the Heralds and King at Arms going before him, and followed by all the Crients in mourning, went to the great Convent of the Augustins, to invite the Assembly General of France to a Service which was performed the rainflant, in the Abby Church of st. Denis, for the Queen-Mother 3 and to another Service tobe afterwards performed in the great Church of Noftre Dame.
