HEREAS by the Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873, it was, amongst other things, enacted, that where an arrangement has been made with any foreign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Acts shall apply in the case of such foreign State; and that Her Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent Order, limit the operation of the Order, and restrict the same to fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in the part of Her Majesty's dominions specified in the Order, and render the operation thereof subject to such conditions, exceptions, and qualifications as may be deemed expedient; and that if, by any law made after the passing of the Act of 1870 by the Legislature of any British possession, provision is made for carrying into effect within such possession the surrender of fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in such British possession, Her Majesty may, by the Order in Council applying the said Acts in the case of any foreign State, or by any subsequent Order, suspend the operation within any such British possession of the said Acts, or of any part thereof so far as it relates to such foreign State, and so long as such law continues in force there and no longer:

And whereas by an Act of the Parliament of Canada passed in 1886, and entitled "An Act respecting the Extradition of Fugitive Criminals," provision is made for carrying into effect within the Dominion the surrender of fugitive criminals:

And whereas by an Order of Her Majesty the Queen in Council, dated the seventeenth day of November one thousand eight hundred and eightyeight, it was directed that the operation of the Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873, should be suspended within the Dominion of Canada so long as the provision of the said Act of the Parliament of Canada of 1886 should continue in force and no longer:

And whereas a Convention was concluded on the twelfth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty nine, between Her Majesty and the United States of America, for the mutual extradition of fugitive criminals, which Convention is in the terms following:-

" WHEREAS by the Xth Article of the Treaty concluded between Her Britannic Majesty and the United States of America on the ninth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and fortytwo, provision is made for the extradition of persons charged with certain crimes :

"And whereas it is now desired by the High Contracting Parties that the provisions of the said Article should embrace certain crimes not therein specified, and should extend to fugitives convicted of the crimes specified in the said Article and in this Convention;

"The said High Contracting Parties have appointed as their Plenipotentiaries to conclude a Convention for this purpose, that is to say :

"Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland: Sir Julian Pauncefote, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and

Saint George, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, and Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotientiary of Her Britannic Majesty to the United States;

"And the President of the United States of America, James G. Blaine, Secretary of State of

the United States;

"Who, after having communicated to each other their respective full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon and concluded the following Articles:-

#### "ARTICLE I.

"The provisions of the said Xth Article are hereby made applicable to the following additional crimes:

" 1. Manslaughter when voluntary.

" 2. Counterfeiting or altering money; uttering or bringing into circulation counterfeit or altered

"3. Embezzlement; larceny; receiving any money, valuable security, or other property, knowing the same to have been embezzled, stolen, or fraudulently obtained.

"4. Fraud by a bailee, banker, agent, factor, trustee, or director or member or officer of any Company, made criminal by the laws of both countries.

" 5. Perjury, or subornation of perjury

"6. Rape; abduction; child-stealing; kid-

7. Burglary; housebreaking or shopbreaking.

"8. Piracy by the law of nations.

"9. Revolt, or conspiracy to revolt, by two or more persons on board a ship on the high seas, against the authority of the master; wrongfully sinking or destroying a vessel at sea, or attempting to do so; assaults on board a ship on the high seas, with intent to do grievous bodily harm.

"10. Crimes and offences against the laws of both countries for the suppression of slavery and

slave trading.

"Extradition is also to take place for participation in any of the crimes mentioned in this Convention or in the aforesaid Xth Article, provided such participation be punishable by the laws of both countries.

# " ARTICLE II.

"A fugitive criminal shall not be surrendered, if the offence in respect of which his surrender is demanded be one of a political character, or if he proves that the requisition for his surrender has in fact been made with a view to try or punish him for an offence of a political character.

" No person surrendered by either of the High Contracting Parties to the other shall be triable or tried, or be punished for any political crime or offence, or for any act connected therewith, com.

mitted previously to his extradition.

"If any question shall arise as to whether a case comes within the provisions of this Article, the decision of the authorities of the Government in whose jurisdiction the fugitive shall be at the time shall be final.

#### "ARTICLE III.

"No person surrendered by or to either of the High Contracting Parties shall be triable or be tried for any crime or offence committed prior to his extradition, other than the offence for which he was surrendered, until he shall have had an opportunity of returning to the country from which he was surrendered.

# "ARTICLE IV.

"All articles seized which were in the possession of the person to be surrendered at the time of his apprehension, whether being the proceeds

of the crime or offence charged, or being material as evidence in making proof of the crime or offence, shall, so far as practicable, and if the competent authority of the State applied to for the extradition has ordered the delivery thereof, be given up when the extradition takes place. Nevertheless, the rights of third parties with regard to the articles aforesaid shall be duly respected.

#### " ARTICLE

" If the individual claimed by one of the two High Contracting Parties, in pursuance of the present Convention, should also be claimed by one or several other Powers on account of crimes or offences committed within their respective jurisdictions, his extradition shall be granted to that State whose demand is first received.

"The provisions of this Article, and also of Articles II to IV inclusive, of the present Convention, shall apply to surrender for offences specified in the aforesaid Xth Article, as well as to surrender for offences specified in this Conven-

tion.

#### · "ARTICLE VI.

"The extradition of fugitives under the provisions of this Convention and of the said Xth Article shall be carried out in Her Majesty's dominions and in the United States, respectively, in conformity with the laws regulating extradition for the time being in force in the surrendering State.

#### " ARTICLE VII

"The provisions of the said Xth Article and of this Convention shall apply to persons convicted of the crimes therein respectively named and specified, whose sentence therefor shall not have been executed.

" In case of a fugitive criminal alleged to have been convicted of the crime for which his surrender is asked, a copy of the record of the conviction, and of the sentence of the Court before which such conviction took place, duly authenticated, shall be produced, together with the evidence proving that the prisoner is the person to whom such sentence refers.

#### " ARTICLE VIII.

"The present Convention shall not apply to any of the crimes herein specified which shall have been committed, or to any conviction which shall have been pronounced, prior to the date at which the Convention shall come into force.

#### "ARTICLE IX.

"This Convention shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be exchanged at London as soon

as possible.
"It shall come into force ten days after its publication, in conformity with the forms prescribed by the laws of the High Contracting Parties, and shall continue in force until one or the other of the High Contracting Parties shall signify its wish to terminate it, and no longer.

"In witness whereof, the undersigned have signed the same, and have affixed thereto their

seals.

" Done in duplicate, at the city of Washington, this twelfth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine.

Provided always, and it is hereby further ordered, that the operation of the said Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873, shall be suspended within the Dominion of Canada so far as relates to the United States of America and to the said Convention, and so long as the provisions of the Canadian Act aforesaid of 1886 continue in force, C. HEREAS, by treaty, capitulation, grant, usage, sufferance, and other lawful means, Her Majesty the Queen has power and jurisdiction in relation to Her Majesty's subjects and others in the Ottoman dominions:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf, by "The Foreign Jurisdiction Acts, 1843 to 1878," or otherwise, in Her Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. This Order may be cited as "The Ottoman Order in Council, 1890," and shall be construed as one with "The Ottoman Orders in Council,

1873 and 1882."

2. It shall be lawful, from time to time, for the Secretary of State, or for the Judge or Acting Judge of the Supreme Court, with the assent of the Secretary of State, to nominate and appoint some person qualified for the office of Assistant Judge of the Supreme Court, to be and act as a Judge for the purpose of the trial of any crime or crimes committed, or alleged to have been committed, either before or after the making of this Order, in any part of the Ottoman dominions. A Judge so appointed shall, for the purposes for which he is appointed, have all the powers which could be exercised by the Judge of the Supreme Court upon a trial with a jury or assessors of the like crimes at Constantinople, and may, if in any case, in his opinion, a jury or assessors cannot be obtained, act without a jury or assessors.

The remuneration and expenses of a Judge appointed under this Order shall be paid as the

Secretary of State, with the consent of the Treasury, directs.

And the Most Honourable the Marquis of Salisbury, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions C. L. Feel. herein.

W HEREAS by the twenty-second section of the Sea Fisheries Act, 1868, it is provided that, subject to any exemptions allowed by or in pursuance of any Order in Council made as thereinafter in the said Act mentioned, every British sea fishing boat shall, as required by Articles 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8 of the Convention in the First Schedule to the said Act set forth, be lettered and numbered, and have official papers, and shall for that purpose be entered or registered in a register for sea fishing boats.

Whereas by the twenty-third section of the said Act, it is enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by Order in Council, from time to time to do (amongst others) all or any of the

following things; viz.: ---

(a.) To make regulations for carrying out, enforcing, and giving effect to both the entry and registry of British son fishing boats, and also the said above-mentioned Articles 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8 of the First Schedule to that Act; and

(b.) To adopt in such regulations any then existing system of registry or lettering and numbering of boats, and to provide for bringing such system into conformity with the requirements of the said Convention and that Act, and with the said regulations; and

(c.) To define the boats or classes of boats to which such regulations or any of them are to apply, and to provide for the exemption of any boats or classes of boats from such regulations or any of them, and from the provisions of Part Two of the said Act with respect to entry or registry, and the possession of a certificate of registry and official papers; and

(d.) To apply to the entry and registry respectively of the sea fishing boats so defined, and to all matters incidental thereto, such (if any) of the enactments contained in any Act relating to the registry of British ships, and with such modifications and alterations as

may be found desirable; and

(e.) To impose penalties not exceeding twenty pounds for the breach of any regulations made by any Order in Council for the breach of which a punishment cannot be provided by the application of the enactments contained in any Act relating to the registry of British ships; and

(f.) To alter and revoke an Order so made. And that every such Order in Council shall be of the same force as if it were enacted in that

Act.

And whereas by section eight of the Sea Fisheries Act, 1883, it is enacted (amongst-other things) that sections 22, 23, 24, and 26 of the above in part recited Act shall have effect as if Articles 5 to 12 (both inclusive) of the First Schedule to the Sea Fisheries Act, 1883, were therein referred to in addition to the Articles of the First Schedule to the above in part recited Act in the said sections mentioned, and as if offences under the said Act of 1883 were offences in the said sections mentioned.

And whereas the Sea Fisheries Act, 1883, came into force pursuant to the twenty-ninth section thereof on the fifteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four.

And whereas by an Order in Council made the eighth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, under the twenty-third section of the Sea Fisheries Act, 1883, it was recited and provided as follows:

"And whereas by Article VIII of the Inter-" national Convention for the purpose of regu-" lating the Police of the Fisheries in the North "Sea outside Territorial Waters concluded at the

"Hague on the sixth May, one thousand eight " hundred and eighty-two, and set out in the First

" Schedule to the said Act, it is provided with

"reference to the initial letter or letters of ports to which fishing boats respectively belong and the registry numbers in the series of numbers for such ports (amongst other things) as follows:

"The same letter or letters and numbers shall also be painted on each side of the main also be painted on each side of the main close reef in black oil colour on white or tanned sails and in white oil colour on the black sails."

"And whereas the said recited part of the said VIIIth Article constitutes the fifth paragraph of such article.

"Of such article.

"And whereas the parties to the said Convention of May sixth one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, have considered it useful to modify the tenor of the said fifth paragraph of the VIIIth Article of the said Convention, and have for that purpose at the Hague on the first of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, entered into the Convention or Arrangement following.

# "DECLARATION.

"The Governments signatory to the Convention concluded at the Hague on the sixth May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty two, for regulating the Police of the Fisheries in the North Sea outside territorial waters, having deemed it expedient to modify the terms of paragraph five of Article VIII have agreed to the following.

### "ARTICLÉ I.

'Paragraph five of Article VIII of the Con-"vention of the sixth May, one thousand eight "hundred and eighty-two, is replaced by the fol-"lowing provision:—

"'The same letters and numbers shall also be 'painted in oil colour on each side of the main"'sail of the boat immediately above the close 'reef, and in such a manner as to be plainly 'risible, they shall be painted on white sails in 'black, on black sails in white, and on sails of 'an intermediate shade in black or in white as 'the superior competent authority shall deem 'the more effective.'

### "ARTICLE II.

"The date of the coming into force of the present Declaration shall be fixed on the deposit of the ratifications which shall take place at the Hague as soon as possible, and in the same manner as the deposit was effected of the ratifications of the Convention of the sixth May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two.

"and have affixed thereto the seal of their Arms.

"And whereas the said lastly-recited Conven"tion or Arrangement was duly ratified on the
"twenty-first day of December, one thousand
"eight hundred and eighty-nine, and upon the
"deposit of the ratifications thereof, the twenty"first day of February, one thousand eight hun"dred and ninety, was fixed as the date of the
"coming into force of the same.

"Now therefore, Her Majesty, in virtue of the powers vested in Her by the recited Act, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is hereby pleased to direct that on and after the twenty-first day of February, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, all the provisions of the Sea Fisheries Act, 1883, shall apply to the said Convention or Arrangement of the first of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, and shall have effect in like manner as if the said Convention or Arrangement were set forth in the First Schedule to the Sea Fisheries Act, 1883, and were part of that schedule, and were the Convention referred to in that Act and the second, eighth, and all other sections of the said Act shall apply and refer to the said Convention or Arrangement of February first, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, as well as to the Convention and the Articles thereof in the said sections respectively mentioned."

"in the said sections respectively mentioned."
And whereas by the Vth Article of the Convention set out in the First Schedule to the Sea Fisheries Act, 1868, it is provided (amongst other matters) that "The same letter (or letters) "and number shall also be painted on each side "of the mainsail of the boat in black oil colour "on white sails and in white oil colour on tanned "or black sails."

And whereas, Her Majesty, by Order in Council made the eighteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, was pleased to approve of certain Regulations (set out in the schedule thereto) for the lettering, numbering and registering of British sea fishing boats under Part II of the Sea Fisheries Act, 1868.

And whereas by Regulation numbered 11 of the said last-mentioned Regulations it is provided, amongst other things, as follows "and on sails" (of British sea fishing boats all letters and numbers shall be painted) "in black oil colour on white or grey sails and in white oil colour on tanned or black sails."

And whereas by the VIIIth Article of the Convention set out in the First Schedule to the Sea Fisheries Act, 1883, it is provided (amongst other matters) that "the same letter or letters and "numbers shall also be painted on each side of "the mainsail of the boat immediately above the "close reef in black oil colour on white or tanned "sails, and in white oil colour on black sails."

And whereas the letters and numbers in the said Articles mentioned are respectively the distinguishing letters for the boats belonging to each Collectorship of Customs, port, and place of registry, and the registry numbers in the series of numbers for these Collectorships, ports, and places respectively.

And whereas the said distinguishing letters are set out in the said partly recited Order in Council of eighteenth June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, and in two Orders in Council made under the Sea Fisheries Act, 1868, and

dated respectively May third, one thousand eight | hundred and eighty-two, and March seventh, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven.

. And whereas by reason of the said recited provisions of the said Acts of 1868 and 1883, and the said recited Order in Council made the eighth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, it has become necessary to alter and revoke the said recited provision contained in Regulation numbered 11 of the Regulations set out in the schedule to the said Order in Council of the eighteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, and to substitute therefor fresh provisions relative to the lettering and numbering of the sails of British sea fishing boats and to exempt British sea fishing boats until further order from the parts of Article V of the Convention contained in the schedule to the Sea Fisheries Act, 1868, and Article VIII of the Convention contained in the schedule to the Sea Fisheries Act, 1883, hereinbefore mentioned, and to insure that British Sea fishing boats shall be enabled to observe and shall observe the provisions of the said Convention or Arrangement of February first, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased, in the execution of and pursuant to the powers vested in Her in that behalf, to order, direct, and

declare as follows :-

(1.) The following words contained in the said Regulation numbered eleven of the Regulations set out in the Schedule to the said Order in Council of June eighteenth, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, viz., "and on sails in black oil colour on white or grey sails, and in "white oil colour on tanned or black sails" shall be revoked and cancelled.

(2.) British sea fishing boats shall be exempt until further order from the following provisions:-

(a.) From the words in Article  $\bar{\mathbf{V}}$  of the Convention set forth in the Schedule to the Sea Fisheries Act, 1868, following, viz. :-

"The same letter (or letters) and number shall " also be painted on each side of the mainsail " of the boat in black oil colour on white " sails, and in white oil colour on tanned or " black sails."

(b.) From the words in Article VIII of the Convention set forth in the Schedule to the Sea

Fisheries Act, 1883, following, viz. :-

"The same letter or letters and numbers shall " also be painted on each side of the mainsail "of the boat immediately above the close " reef in black oil colour on white or tanned "sails, and in white oil colour on black "sails."

(3.) British sea fishing boats shall observe the said provision in Article 1 of the said Convention or Arrangement of February first, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine.

(4.) The following Regulations shall apply to and be observed in the case of all British sea

fishing boats:

The boat's distinguishing letters and number shall be painted in oil colour on each side of the mainsail of the boat immediately above the close reef, and in such a manner as to be plainly visible; they shall be painted on white sails in black, and on black sails in white, and where the sails are of an intermediate shade, the said letters and numbers shall be painted in black on sails of light shade, and in white on sails of dark shade; provided that whenever the Collector or Principal Officer of Customs of the boat's

collectorship, port, or place of registry, considers and reports to the Board of Trade that he is in doubt as to the effectiveness, for the purposes of these Regulations, of the colour of the letters and numbers in the case of a boat having any such sail of intermediate shade, or whenever any question may arise as to the effectiveness, for the purposes of these Regulations, of the colour of letters and numbers for any such sail of intermediate shade, the letters and numbers shall be painted in black or in white as the Board of Trade may from time to time direct in each case.

(5.) The Regulations scheduled to the said Order in Council of June eighteenth, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, and the Orders in Council of May third, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, and March seventh, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven (made under the Sea Fisheries Act, 1868), and the Regulations numbered 2, 3, 4, and 5 enacted by the Order in Council of February twenty-sixth, one thousand eight hundred and eighty (made under the Sea Fisheries Act, 1868), shall apply as if they had been made under the Sea Fisheries Act, 1883, and the said Order in Council dated the eighth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and ninety; and the said Regulations shall apply to the Regulations herein contained.

(6.) This Order shall come into force on the date thereof, and shall continue in force from and after that date until altered or revoked by Order C. L. Peel.

HEREAS by Orders in Council made by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty on the twelfth February, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, twenty-seventh June, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, ninth December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, and fifteenth July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, Her Majesty did, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, order, among other matters, that a Lower Division of the Civil Service should be constituted, to consist of Men Clerks and Boy Clerks engaged to serve in any Department of the State to which they might from time to time be appointed or transferred; that no Department throughout Her Majesty's Civil Service should be permanently increased or regulated afresh without providing for the introduction of a system whereby such of its duties as were of a suitable character should be performed by members of such Lower Division; that such situations in Her Majesty's Civil Service as were not suitable to be filled by members of such Lower Division should be excluded from the Orders, and should until declaration of Her Majesty's further pleasure be regulated as there. tofore; that no vacancies should be filled up nor any new appointments made in any Department, except by appointing Clerks of the Lower Division, until the Commissioners of the Treasury had been satisfied that the number of Clerks serving in such Department with higher salaries than those of the Lower Division were not in excess of the number sufficient to perform superior duties; that the salaries of Men Clerks in the Lower Division should commence at eighty pounds, and should rise by triennial increments of fifteen pounds to two hundred pounds; but that in any office where a regular attendance of seven

hours a day was required, the commencing salary might be ninety-five pounds, and the maximum salary might be two hundred and fifty pounds; that extra pay, not exceeding one hundred pounds per annum, might be attached to certain situations open to Clerks of the Lower Division whose duties involved the superintendence of other Clerks, or were otherwise of a more responsible character than such as the generality of their colleagues had to perform; that promotion from the Lower to the Higher Division of the Service should not be made without a special certificate from the Civil Service Commissioners, to be granted exceptionally, after not less than ten years' service, upon a special recommendation from the Head of the Department, and with the assent of the Treasury; that below the Lower Division of Ordinary Clerks (including Boy Clerks) Men and Boy Copyists might be employed for mere copying and for routine work under direct supervision, on the same conditions of service as those then in force for Civil Service Writers;

And whereas by an Order in Council dated the twenty-eighth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, it was provided that Men Clerks appointed after the date of that Order should give a regular attendance of not less than seven hours a day, and that the salaries of such Men Clerks should commence at seventy pounds per annum, and should rise by such increments to such sums as might thereafter be fixed by Order in Council:

And whereas it appears from certain recent Reports made by Sir Matthew White Ridley, Baronet, and others appointed by Her Majesty to be a Royal Commission for inquiring into various questions connected with the organization of Civil Departments of the State, that further Regulations are required in order to improve the organization of the Civil Service:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. The name "Lower Division" is hereby changed to "Second Division;" but Boy Clerks appointed under the Order in Council dated the twelfth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, shall be held not to belong to the Second Division.

2. This Order shall apply only to the Second Division of the Civil Service, as defined by clause one.

3. The salaries of Clerks in the Second Division, for a daily attendance of seven hours, shall commence at seventy pounds per annum, and shall rise by annual increments as follows, viz.:—

From seventy pounds to one hundred pounds by annual increments of five pounds.

From one hundred pounds to one hundred and ninety pounds by annual increments of seven pounds ten shillings.

From one hundred and ninety pounds to two hundred and fifty pounds by annual increments

of ten pounds.

4. A higher grade of the Second Division shall be and is hereby established, with salaries commencing at two hundred and fifty pounds per annum, and rising by annual increments of ten pounds to three hundred and fifty pounds.

5. The annual increments of salary shall not be allowed without an annual certificate from the immediate superior of each Clerk, countersigned by the Head of the Department or such officer as he may designate for the purpose, to the effect that such Clerk's conduct has during the year immediately preceding the date of such certificate been in all respects satisfactory.

When the salary of any Clerk appointed after the twenty-eighth May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, reaches one hundred pounds, a special Report, to be officially recorded in writing, on the competence, character, and diligence of such Clerk, shall be required from the Head of the room, and from the Head of the Division in which, respectively, such Clerk is serving or has served; and until this Report is received and countersigned by the Head of the Department as satisfactory, such Clerk shall not receive any further advance in salary.

When the salary of any Clerk appointed after the twenty-eighth May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, reaches one hundred and ninety pounds, he shall not receive any further increment unless he obtain a Report to be officially recorded in writing from his immediate superiors, confirmed by the Head of the Department, that he is thoroughly competent to perform efficiently work of a superior and more advanced character in the future.

6. Promotion to the higher grade established under clause four of this Order shall be made (subject to the provisions of clause sixteen of this Order) according to positive merit, and not according to seniority.

A promotion to the said higher grade shall be made whenever any Clerk, who is not in receipt of extra pay, shall reach a salary of two hundred and fifty pounds; but, irrespective of this condition, the Head of a Department may recommend, and the Commissioners of the Treasury may sanction, as a very exceptional case, the promotion to the higher grade of a specially meritorious Clerk who is in receipt of a salary less than two hundred and fifty pounds.

7. Clerks who are required to attend seven hours a day shall be allowed a half holiday on alternate Saturdays, provided that the Heads of the Departments in which such Clerks are respectively serving are satisfied that the state of public business will permit.

8. The ordinary annual holidays allowed to Clerks shall not exceed fourteen week-days during each of their first five years of service, and twenty-one week-days thereafter, exclusive in both cases of Christmas Day, Good Friday, the Queen's Birthday, and (subject to the convenience of the public service) the four Bank Holidays. Provided that nothing in this clause shall affect the rights of existing Clerks who, under the Regulations of the respective Departments in which they are serving, are entitled to holidays in excess of those herein prescribed.

9. Sick leave may be granted by the Head of a Department to any Clerk serving in such Department, but subject to the following conditions, viz.:—

(1.) After two days' continuous absence, a certificate by a duly qualified medical practitioner shall be required.

(2.) If the number of days during which any Clerk in any year is absent without such medical certificate shall exceed seven in the aggregate, the number of days by which such aggregate period of absence exceeds seven shall be deducted from the amount of ordinary annual holidays which may be allowed under clause eight of this Order.

(3.) Continuous sick leave on full salary shall not be granted for any period longer than six months, but at the expiration of such six months the Head of the Department may at his discretion grant further leave, with salary at half the ordinary rate, for any period not exceeding six months. After twelve months' continuous sick leave no Clerk shall be paid any salary, except

with the consent of the Commissioners of the | Treasury, who may at their discretion, in special circumstances, allow payment of salary during any further period of sick leave to a Clerk at a rate not exceeding the amount of pension (if any) for which, at the expiration of twelve months' sick leave, the Clerk would have been qualified.

(4.) Cases of repeated but not continuous sick leave amounting in the aggregate to upwards of twelve months during any period of eighteen months shall be reported to the Commissioners of the Treasury, who shall decide the payments in respect of salary to be made during such sick leave.

10. An Attendance Book shall be kept in every Department, in which the times of arrival and departure of every Clerk shall be daily recorded.

11. No Clerk shall be allowed to accept any part in the management of any Society, or any trading, commercial, or financial Company of whatever description, which would require the attendance of such Clerk at any time between the hours of ten a.m. and six p.m.

12. Clause eighteen of the Order in Council of the twelfth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, shall be read as if the words "eight years' service" were substituted for

the words "ten years' service."

- 13. All Clerks appointed after the twentyeighth May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, and all Clerks appointed before that date who shall be promoted to the higher grade of the Second Division established by clause four of this Order, shall be required to give a regular attendance of not less than seven hours daily; and, as regards all other Clerks appointed before the twenty-eighth May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, who are giving, at the date of this Order, an attendance of six hours only, the hours of attendance shall be extended to seven, so soon as circumstances will permit, on the conditions specified in clause fourteen of this Order, subject, in each case, to agreement between the Commissioners of the Treasury and the Heads of the respective Departments in which such Clerks are serving as to the date of such extension of hours, and the reduction in the numbers of such Clerks to be made consequent
- 14. Clerks who were appointed before the twenty-eighth May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty nine, and who may be called upon at any time antecedent to their promotion to the higher grade of the Second Division to attend seven hours instead of six, shall be granted an increase of salary of fifteen pounds per annum from the date on which the extension of hours takes place; but Clerks who at the date of their promotion to such higher grade are giving six hours' attendance only shall, on promotion, give an attendance of seven hours without any such increase of salary.

15. Clerks appointed before the twenty-eighth May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, shall be placed upon the new scale of salary sanctioned in this Order under the following conditions :-

(1.) They shall retain the salary with extra pay, if any, which they are receiving at the date of this Order.

(2.) They shall receive as from the first April, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, an increment of salary equal to the proportion of their triennial increment of fifteen pounds (omitting any fraction of a pound sterling) which may have accrued up to that date.

(3.) The next increment after that described

in the preceding paragraph shall accrue on the first April, one thousand eight hundred and ninety; and this and all following increments shall depend upon the rate of salary, exclusive of extra pay, and shall be determined according to clause three of this Order.

Provided always, that if a Clerk be in receipt of extra pay, and his total emoluments are not less than two hundred and fifty pounds, he shall receive no further increment unless he be certified by the Head of the Department in which he is serving to be thoroughly competent; and if he be not in receipt of extra pay, and his salary be not less than two hundred and fifty pounds (or two hundred pounds in case he be a Clerk who is required to give a daily attendance of six hours only), he shall receive no further increment unless he be promoted under clause six of this Order.

Provided further, that under no circumstances shall a Clerk, with or without extra pay, who is transferred to the new scale under this Order, be allowed to rise beyond a maximum of three

hundred and fifty pounds.

16. Any Clerk who is in receipt of extra pay shall, when his total emoluments reach two hundred and fifty pounds, be forthwith placed in the higher grade established under clause four of this Order, if he be certified by the Head of the Department in which he is serving to be thoroughly competent; after which he shall rise to a maximum of three hundred and fifty pounds, including extra pay, but no more.

17. Clause one of the Order in Council of the twelfth February, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, shall be read, from and after the date of this Order, as if the words, "and of boy

Clerks," were omitted therefrom.

18. Clause five of the Order in Council of the twelfth February, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, shall be read, from and after the date of this Order, as if the words, "of the Lower Division," following the words, "for boy Clerks," were omitted therefrom.

19. Clause fourteen of the Order in Council of the twelfth February, one thousand eight hundred

and seventy-six, is hereby repealed.

20. Clauses sixteen and seventeen of the said. Order in Council, authorizing and regulating the grant of extra pay, are hereby repealed.

"We the undersigned Edward White Archbishop of the province of Canterbury Primate of all England and Metropolitan do hereby certify to Your Majesty in Council:—

"That the Right Reverend Edward Lord Bishop of Lincoln as Bishop of the diocese within which are situate the rectory of Covenham Saint Bartholomew and the rectory of Covenham Saint

Mary both in the county of Lincoln having represented unto us that the said benefices being contiguous to each other and of which the aggregate population does not exceed one thousand five hundred persons might with advantage to the interests of religion be united into one benefice we inquired into the circumstances of the case.

"The representation of the said Lord Bishop of Lincoln our enquiry into the circumstances of the case the statement of circumstances in reply thereto the consent in writing of the patron and the copies of the representation and notice before mentioned are hereunto annexed.

"And we do hereby certify the enquiry and consent aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for uniting the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes.

"As witness our hand this eighteenth day of December in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine.

WHEREAS by section twenty-six of "The Pluralities Act 1838" after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, "chapelries, and other places or districts may "be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and places altogether extra paro-"chial may in some instances with advantage " be annexed to parishes or districts to which they "are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That when with " respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the "Archbishop of the Province, or when the " Bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said "Archbishop that any such tithing, hamlet, " chapelry, place or district within the diocese of "such Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, " as the case may be, may be advantageously

" separated from any parish or mother church and "either be constituted a separate benefice by "itself or be united to any other parish to which " it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any " other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, " or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to " form a separate parish or benefice, or that any "extra-parochial place may with advantage be "annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous " or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesias-"tical purposes: and the said Archbishop or "Bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the " said Archbishop for his consideration) describing "the mode in which it appears to him that the " alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect " to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, " rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, " and payments, and in respect to patronage and " rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested: and if the patron or patrons " of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such " alteration shall consent in writing under his or " their hands to such scheme, or to such modifica-"tion thereof as the said Archbishop may ap-"prove, and the said Archbishop shall, on full " consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any " such scheme or modification thereof, and shall " certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, "by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it " shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to " make an Order for carrying such scheme, or "modification thereof, as the case may be, into " effect."

And whereas by another Act of Parliament passed in the second and third years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to "make better provision for the Assignment of " Ecclesiastical Districts to Churches or Chapels " augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of "Queen Anne; and for other purposes," it is, amongst other things, further enacted, "That "when by any Order of Her Majesty in Council, " as aforesaid, a separate parish for ecclesiastical "purposes is constituted, the same shall, on regis-" tration thereof, and with the consent in writing " of the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice or benefices to be thereby affected, become a 5 perpetual curacy and benefice, and the minister "thereof, duly nominated and licensed thereto, "and his successors, shall be a body politic and "corporate, with perpetual succession, and may " receive and take to himself and his successors " all such lands, tenements, tithes, rent-charges, " and hereditaments as shall be granted unto him " or them, and such perpetual curate shall thence-" forth have within the limits of the district 56 parish formed under the Church Building Acts, " for the church of such perpetual curacy, sole "and exclusive cure of souls, and shall not in " anywise be subject to the control or interference " of the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice "or benefices to be affected by such Order, if he " or they shall have consented to such Order as " aforesaid."

And whereas the Right Reverend George Howard, Lord Bishop of Truro, hath represented in a writing dated the twentieth day of December one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Edward White, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows: -

"To the Most Reverend Edward White by Divine providence Lord Archbishop of Canter-

Bishop of Truro do hereby represent to your Grace as follows:-

"1. There is in the county of Cornwall and our diocese of Truro the vicarage of Saint Gluvias which comprises the parish of Saint Gluvias and the chapelries of Penryn and Budock the boundaries of which parish and chapelries respectively are well known and defined.

" 2. According to the last census the population of the said parish of Saint Gluvias with the chapelry of Penryn is four thousand five hundred and three and the population of the said chapelry of Budock is one thousand five hundred and

The said chapelry of Budock has its own church for the exclusive use and accommodation of its own inhabitants and has also its own churchwardens and parish officers and baptisms churchings marriages and burials and all ecclesiastical parochial offices have from time immemorial been and are now performed in the church of the same chapelry for the inhabitants thereof.

"4. The church of the said chapelry of Budock is distant from the parish church of Saint Gluvias two miles or thereabouts.

" 5. There is a residence house belonging to the said vicarage of Saint Gluvias situate within that parish and the endowments of the said vicarage consist (besides the said residence house) of the vicarial rent-charges in lieu of tithes arising within the parish of Saint Gluvias commuted at the sum of two hundred and sixty-nine pounds and sixpence of the vicarial rent-charges, in lieu of tithes arising within the chapelry of Penryn commuted at the sum of seventy pounds of the vicarial rent-charges in lieu of tithes arising within the chapelry of Budock commuted at the sum of four hundred and twenty pounds and of glebe land situate in the parish of Saint Gluvias containing fourteen acres one rood sixteen perches or thereabouts.

"6. The Bishop of Truro in right of his see is the patron of the said vicarage and the Reverend Alexander Allen Vawdrey is the incumbent thereof.

"7. It appears to us that under the provisions of the Acts of Parliament of the first and second years of Her present Majesty chapter one hundred and six and the second and third years of Her said Majesty chapter forty-nine the said chapelry of Budock may be advantageously separated from the parish of Saint Gluvias and chapelry of Penryn and be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy and benefice.

"8. Pursuant to the direction contained in the twenty-sixth section of the said first-mentioned Act of Parliament we have prepared the following scheme which together with our consent in writing as the patron of the said benefice and the consent in writing of the said Alexander Allen Vawdrey as the incumbent of the said benefice we submit to your Grace to the intent that your Grace may if on full consideration and inquiry you shall be satisfied with the said scheme certify he same to Her Majesty in Council.

"Given under our hand this twentieth day of December one thousand eight hundred and eighty-" Georg. H. Truron.

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the consents referred to in the representation are as follows:-

# "SCHEME.

"That the whole of the chapelry of Budock be bury.
"We George Howard by Divine permission separated from the vicarage and parish of Saint Gluvias and chapelry of Penryn and be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy and benefice by the name or style of the perpetual curacy of Budock of which the church within the same chapelry of Budock shall be the parish church and that the vicar of Saint Gluvias-with-Penryn shall be discharged from all cure of souls within the limits of the said separate parish of Budock.

"That the proposed separate parish and benefice of Budock shall be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said vicarage of Saint Gluvias-with-Penryn and the incumbent of such separate parish and benefice shall have the exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the same.

"That the whole of the vicarial rent-charges in lieu of tithes payable in respect of lands within the said chapelry of Budock commuted at the sum of four hundred and twenty pounds shall belong and be annexed to the proposed separate parish and benefice of Budock and be held received and enjoyed by the incumbent thereof for ever.

"That baptisms, churchings, marriages, burials, and all other parochial ecclesiastical offices shall as heretofore be performed in the church and separate parish of Budock and that the fees for all such offices performed within the same church and separate parish and all Easter offerings and other ecclesiastical dues and fees if any arising within the same shall belong to the incumbent of

the same church and separate parish.

"That except as aforesaid and except also the patronage or right of nomination of or to the said proposed separate benefice of Budock all the vicarial rent-charges in lieu of tithes, residence house, glebe lands and all other the endowments and emoluments and the patronage of Penwerris and all other patronage (if any) now belonging to the said vicarage of Saint Gluvias with the chapelries of Penryn and Budock shall continue to belong to the said vicarage of Saint Gluvias and chapelry of Penryn as separated from the proposed perpetual curacy of Budock and shall be held received and enjoyed by the vicar thereof for ever and the church within the said parish of Saint Gluvias shall continue to be the parish church of the same parish and of the chapelry of Penryn.

"That one moiety of the first fruits, tenths, and other ecclesiastical dues now payable by the incumbent of Saint Gluvias with the chapelries of Penryn and Budock annexed shall henceforth be payable by the incumbent of Saint Gluvias with the chapelry of Penryn as separated from the said chapelry of Budock, and the other moiety thereof shall henceforth be payable by the incumbent of

the said parish and benefice of Budock.

"That churchwardens shall continue to be annually chosen as heretofore in and for the said parishes and chapelries of Saint Gluvias, Penryn,

and Budock respectively.

"That subject to the provisions of the Church Rates Abolition Act thirty-one and thirty-two Victoria chapter one hundred and nine the inhabitants of the parish of Saint Gluvias-with-Penryn as separated from the said parish of Budock shall be exclusively liable for the maintenance of the parish church of the same parish and the inhabitants of the said separate parish of Budock shall be exclusively liable for the maintenance of the parish church thereof and the parishioners and inhabitants of the said proposed separate parish of Budock shall not be entitled to any accommodation in the parish church of Saint Gluvias not shall the parishioners and inhabitants of the parish and chapelry of Saint Gluvias and

Penryn be entitled to any accommodation in the parish church of Budock.

"That the patronage or right of nomination of or to the said proposed separate benefice of Budock shall be vested in and exercised by the Bishop of Truro and his successors for ever.

#### " CONSENTS.

"We George Howard, Lord Bishop of Truro the patron now entitled to present or nominate to the vicarage and parish church of Saint Gluvias with the chapelries of Penryn and Budock do hereby as such patron and I the Reverend Alexander Allen Vawdrey as the incumbent of the same vicarage do hereby as such incumbent consent to the scheme above proposed for separating the said chapelry of Budock from the said vicarage and parish of Saint Gluvias and chapelry of Penryn and for constituting the said chapelry of Budock a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy and benefice.

"In witness whereof we the said Bishop and the said Alexander Allen Vawdrey have subscribed the same the twentieth day of December one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine.

" A. A. Vawdrey."

And whereas the said scheme hath been transmitted by the said Bishop to the said Archbishop for his consideration;

And whereas the said Archbishop, being satisfied with the said scheme, hath certified the same and the consents aforesaid to Her Majesty in Council, by his report dated the second day of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, which said report is in the words and figures following:—

"To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Edward White Archbishop of the province of Canterbury, do hereby report to Your Majesty in Council:—

That the Right Reverend George Howard Lord Bishop of Truro has represented unto us

(amongst other things):

"That there is in the county of Cornwall and diocese of Truro the vicarage of Saint Gluvias which comprises the parish of Saint Gluvias and the chapelries of Penryn and Budock the boundaries of which parish and chapelries respectively are well known and defined.

"That the said chapelry of Budock has its own church for the exclusive use and accommodation

of its own inhabitants.

"That the church of the said chapelry of Budock is distant from the parish church of Saint Gluvias two miles or thereabouts.

"That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that the said chapelry of Budock may be advantageously separated from the said parish of Saint Gluvias and chapelry of Penryn and be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy and benefice.

"That pursuant to the direction contained in the Act of Parliament of the first and second years of Your Majesty's reign chapter one hundred and six the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him the proposed alteration may best be effected and how the changes consequent upon such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithe rent-charges dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested which scheme together with the consents thereto in writing of the said Lord Bishop

of Truro the patron of the said vicarage and parish church of Saint Gluvias with the said chapelries of Penryn and Budock if the same were now vacant and the Reverend Alexander Allen Vawdrey, the incumbent of the same vicarage have been transmitted by the said Lord Bishop to us for our consideration.

"The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consents before referred to

are hereunto annexed.

"And we the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said scheme do hereby pursuant to the said Act of Parliament of the first and second years of Your Majesty's reign chapter one hundred and six certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said scheme into effect.

"As witness our hand this sec nd day of January one thousand eight hundred and ninety. "Edw. Cantuar."

Now therefore Her Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the said scheme be carried into effect.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, and of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty chapter seventy-seven, and of the Act of the thirty seventh and thirty-eighth years of Her Majesty chapter sixty-three duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the twenty-eighth day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, in the words following, that is to say;

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth chapter seventy-seven, and of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen and of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty chapter seventy-seven and of the Act of the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth years of Your Majesty chapter sixty-three have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a new archdeaconry within the diocese of Saint Asaph and for endowing the said new Archdeaconry in the manner and to the extent hereinafter mentioned.

"Whereas there are now within the said diocese of Saint Asaph two Archdeaconries and no more to wit the Archdeaconry of Saint Asaph and the archdeaconry of Montgomery which two Archdeaconries together comprise the whole area of the said diocese.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Alfred George, Bishop of the said diocese of Saint Asaph has proposed to us and has represented to us that

it is in his opinion desirable that a new arch-deaconry within the same diocese should be constituted and should be taken parily out of the said Archdeaconry of Saint Asaph and partly out of the said Archdeaconry of Montgomery and should comprise and consist of those portions of the said two Archdeaconries of Saint Asaph and of Montgomery respectively which are described in the schedule to this scheme annexed and that the said new archdeaconry should be endowed in the manner hereinafter set forth:—

"And whereas it is a part of the proposals made to us as aforesaid by the said Bishop that the Reverend David Howell, Clerk in Holy Orders, vicar of the parish of Wrexham in the said diocese of Saint Asaph (which parish is one of those to be comprised within the said archdeaconry) and Canon of the Canonry Residentiary of Meliden in the Cathedral Church of Saint Asaph shall be the first archdeacon of the said proposed archdeaconry and that the canonry of Meliden aforesaid shall be annexed to the same Archdeaconry as the endowment thereof and he the said David Howell as the incumbent of the same canonry has consented to such annexation and executes this scheme in token of that his consent.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that the said proposals of the said Bishop should be carried into effect in the manner hereinafter

recommended and proposed.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Alfred George Bishop of the said diocese of Saint Asaph (in testimony of which consent he hath set his hand and affixed his episcopal seal to this scheme) we the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day on which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette there shall be constituted within the said diocese of Saint Asaph one new archdeaconry to be called "The Archdeaconry of Wrexham" which said new Archdeaconry shall comprise and consist of those rural deaneries now portion of the said present Archdeaconry of Saint Asaph and of those rural deaneries now portion of the said present Archdeaconry of Montgomery, the names of which are set forth in the schedule to this scheme annexed.

" And we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England with such consent of the said Bishop as aforesaid and also with the consent of the said David Howell, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme, further recommend and propose that upon and from the day aforesaid the Canonry Residentiary of Meliden in the Cathedral Church of Saint Asaph now held by the said David Howell as aforesaid shall be permanently annexed and united to the new Archdeaconry of Wrexham and be held by the archdeacon of the same archdeaconry for time being so that every future Archdeacon of the same Archdeaconry of Wrexham shall as such archdeacon be entitled to installation to the said canonry and so long as he shall remain such archdeacon shall be invested with and shall hold and enjoy all the rights privileges and emoluments of a Canon Residentiary of the said Cathedral Church of Saint Asaph.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from hereafter recommending and proposing any other matter or thing relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any

other Act of Parliament.

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen; and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of your Majesty chapter eighty-four have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for apportioning the income of the benefice (being a new parish) of Christ Church, Lee Park, in the county of Kent and in the diocese of Rochester between that benefice and a certain other benefice, namely the benefice (being a consolidated chapelry) of the Good Shepherd, Lee, which said last-named benefice is also situate in the said county of Kent and in the said diocese of Rochester.

" Whereas the Rector for the time being of the parish of Saint Margaret, Lee, in the said county of Kent and diocese of Rochester (of which parish both the said new parish of Christ Church Lee Park and also the said consolidated chapelry of the Good Shepherd Lee were originally parcel) is as such Rector the patron of the said two benefices of Christ Church, Lee Park, and the Good

Shepherd, Lee and of each of them.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that the said benefice of the Good Shepherd, Lee, is at present insufficiently endowed, and that the said benefice of Christ Church, Lee Park, has emoluments of such an amount as that after the recommendations and proposals to be made by this scheme shall have been carried into effect sufficient

provision will still remain for the said benefice of Christ Church, Lee Park.

"And whereas by a certain deed bearing date the first day of September in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four and made between the then Rector of the said parish of Saint Margaret Lee, of the first part; the then Bishop of London of the second part, the then Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain (the patron in right of the Crown of the rectory of the said parish of Saint Margaret Lee) of the third part, and the then Incumbent of the said new parish (in the same deed described as a district chapelry) of the fourth part which said deed was expressed to be made under a certain Act of Parliament being the Act of the first and second years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth chapter forty-five, an annual sum of fifty pounds sterling was charged upon all the glebe lands tithe rent-charges and other hereditaments whatsoever to the said rectory belonging in favour of the incumbent of the said district chapelry (now a new parish as aforesaid) of Christ Church, Lee Park to whom and to his successors the same annual sum was by the said deed granted with certain remedies in the same deed specified for the recovery thereof.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Anthony Wilson Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester is, and we are, of opinion that it is desirable that additional provision should be made for the cure of souls within the consolidated chapelry of the Good Shepherd Lee, aforesaid by means of that apportionment of the income of the said benefice of Christ Church Lee Park, which is hereinafter

recommended and proposed.

"And whereas the said benefice of Christ Church, Lee Park, is now full of a Clerk, the incumbent thereof being the Reverend Lewis

Arthur Smith, Clerk in Holy Orders.

" Now therefore with the consent of the said Right Reverend Anthony Wilson, Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester acting as such Bishop and with the consent of the Reverend Frederick Henry Law Clerk in Holy Orders the now rector of the said parish of Saint Margaret Lee and as such rector the patron of each of the said two benefices as aforesaid (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this scheme the said Bishop sealing the same with his episcopal seal) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and as from the day of the date at which the said benefice of Christ Church Lee Park shall next become vacant the said charge of fifty pounds per annum which was created by the said deed of the first day of September one thousand eight hundred and fiftyfour in favour of the said benefice of Christ Church Lee Park shall be transferred to the said benefice of the Good Shepherd, Lee, and shall enure in favour of the said benefice of the Good Shepherd, Lee, and the incumbent thereof and his successors and not in favour of the said benefice of Christ Church, Lee Park, or the incumbent thereof and his successors and that all the powers of recovering the same charge of fifty pounds per annum which by the said deed of the first day of September one thousand eight hundred and fiftyfour are given to the incumbent of the said benefice of Christ Church Lee Park and all provisions as to time and manner of payment and receipt of the same charge and all other provisions clauses and declarations in the said deed contained shall as from the date aforesaid be applicable to

and as between the rector of the benefice of Saint Margaret Lee and his successors on the one hand and the incumbent of the said benefice of the Good Shepherd, Lee, and his successors on the other hand as if the same benefice of the Good Shepherd, Lee, and the incumbent thereof had been named in the said deed instead of the benefice of Christ Church Lee Park and the incumbent

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parlia-

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of C. L. Peel. Rochester.

THE following Statutes, made by the Governing Body of King's College, Cambridge, on the 1st day of February, 1890, and sealed with the Common Seal of the College, on 27th February, 1890, have been submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council, and notice of their having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act,

STATUTES to alter Statutes made by the Commissioners appointed under The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge, Act 1877 (40 and 41 Victoria Chapter 48) in relation to The King's College of Our Lady and Saint Nicholas in Cambridge duly made at a general meeting of the Governing Body of the said College specially summoned for this purpose, held on the first day of February one thousand eight hundred and ninety and passed at such meeting by the votes of not less than two-thirds of the number of persons present and voting and submitted for the approval of Her Majesty the Queen in Council.

Whereas by Statute F made by the Commissioners under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act 1877 (40 and 41 Victoria Chapter 48) in relation to The King's College of Our Lady and Saint Nicholas in Cambridge it is

enacted as follows:

1. There shall be forty-eight Scholarships in the College, of which twenty-four shall be called Eton Scholarships, and twenty-four shall be called Open Scholarships.

2. Both the Eton and the Open Scholarships shall be divided into Entrance and Undergraduate

Scholarships.

3. An Eton Entrance Scholarship shall be tenable for four years, and an Open Entrance Scholarship shall be tenable in the first instance for two years, but may be prolonged by the Council for any further period not exceeding two years, the tenure being in each case reckoned from the first day of the term in which the holder of the Scholarship commenced residence in the University. Any Entrance Scholarship shall be vacated by the election of the holder to an Undergraduate Scholarship or a Fellowship.

4. An Undergraduate Scholarship shall be tenable until the holder completes six years from the twenty-fifth day of March in the academical year in which he commenced residence in the University, or is sooner elected to a Fellowship.

- 5. No Scholarship shall be tenable with any office or emolument on the foundation of any other College in the University, or of any College in the University of Oxford or of Trinity College, Dublin.
- 6. Every candidate for a Scholarship, not being already a member of the College, shall bring a satisfactory certificate of moral character.

7. The time and manner of examinations for Scholarships and the day or days of election and admission thereto, shall from time to time be fixed

by the Governing Body.

8. At any election a Scholarship which is not actually vacant but which will necessarily be vacated on or before the first day of the Michaelmas Term then next following, may be treated as a vacant Scholarship.

- 9. The electors to Scholarships shall be the Provost or in his absence the Vice-Provost, and two or more Fellows to be appointed annually by the Council, who may also appoint any examiners to assist the electors.
- 10. No person shall vote at the election to any Scholarship who has not taken part in the examination for the same.

11. The electors shall not be bound to elect to a Scholarship any candidate whom they shall not. consider of sufficient merit for election; and they shall have power to require from any candidate a declaration that he intends to devote himself exclusively to the studies of the University during the whole of the time preceding his admission to

his first degree.

- 12. Every candidate elected to a Scholarship shall be admitted a Scholar, and (if not already a member of the College) commence residence at such time as shall be prescribed by the Governing Body, and shall thereupon be entitled to the emoluments of his Scholarship, which emoluments shall commence, in the case of an Entrance Scholarship, from the first day of the term in which the Scholar is admitted, and, in the case of an Undergraduate Scholarship, from the day of election, provided that no holder of an Entrance Scholarship shall, upon election to an Undergraduate Scholarship, he required to be again admitted a Scholar; provided also, that any person elected to a Scholarship under the eighth section of this chapter shall not be entitled to any emolument thereof until the same has become actually
- 13. The Council shall, from time to time, make such regulations as they shall think proper with respect to the University and College examinations that the Scholars shall be required to undergo, and any Scholar who shall fail to conform to such regulations, or shall not make reasonable progress in the studies preparatory for such examinations, may be deprived of his Scholarship by the Council.
- 14. Every Scholar shall proceed to his degree of Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Laws, or to some equal degree, at his regular time, except with the approval of the Council, given for illness or other grave cause, and any Scholar failing so to proceed may be deprived of his Scholarship by the Council.

15. The following provisions shall apply to

Eton Scholarships only:

(a.) At least six Scholarships shall be offered every year, of which at least four shall be offered as Entrance Scholarships, but it shall not be necessary to offer more than six Scholarships in any year, and, subject thereto, the Council shall determine in each year how many Scholarships shall be offered in that year, and what number shall be offered as Entrance and Undergraduate Scholarships respectively:

(b.) The Entrance Scholarships shall be open to all candidates receiving education at Eton School, whether on the foundation or not, who on the twenty-fifth day of March nearest to the commencement of the examination are under nineteen years of age, or such less age as shall from time to time be fixed by the Annual Congregation with the consent of the Governing Body of Eton

School:

(c.) The Undergraduate Scholarships shall be open to all Undergraduates of the College in their first, second, and third years of residence, who have been educated at Eton School, whether on the foundation or not:

(d.) The emoluments of an Eton Scholarship shall be eighty pounds per annum, with tuition,

and with commons during residence, and with rooms rent free until the Scholar takes his first degree; and the Council may, if they think fit, assign rooms rent free to any Eton Scholar after taking his first degree, if he shall, with their permission, reside in College.

16. The following provisions shall apply to

Open Scholarships only:

(a.) At least six Scholarships shall be offered every year, but it shall not be necessary to offer more than six in any year, and subject thereto, the Council shall determine in each year how many Scholarships shall be offered in that year, and what numbers shall be offered as Entrance and Undergraduate Scholarships respectively:

(b.) The Entrance Scholarships shall be open to all candidates who at the commencement of the examination are under nineteen years of age, or such less age as shall from time to time be fixed

by the Annual Congregation:

(c.) 17. If under the foregoing provisions of this Statute the number of Eton Scholarships or Open Scholarships be in any year increased beyond twenty-four, then not more than six such Scholarships shall be offered in any subsequent year until their number is again reduce I to twenty-four.

And whereas by Statute M chapter IV. made by the said Commissioners it is enacted as

Each Exhibition shall be open to all Undergraduates of the College in their first or second year of residence, and to such other candidates as are at the commencement of the examination under the age of nineteen years and bring satisfactory certificates of moral character, pro-vided that no Exhibition shall be tenable with any Scholarship or Fellowship of the College, and that in the event of any person not a member of the College obtaining any Exhibition, he shall forthwith become a member of the College:

(d.) Each Exhibition shall be tenable for two

years with power of prolongation by the Council for a further period not exceeding two years.

(e.) No exhibition shall exceed in value the emoluments of an Open Entrance Scholarship, and any surplus income shall be carried to a Capital account, and accumulated for the purpose of forming a fund for a future Exhibition or Exhibitions, similar to the Exhibition or Exhibitions from the surplus income of which such accumulation shall have accrued and so toties

(f.) The Exhibitions shall be awarded by the Council, who shall have power to appoint such examiners and make such regulations for conducting the examinations as they may think fit.

2. All other property (not being part of the general endowment of the College) held by the College upon any trusts, conditions or directions, which might lawfully have been modified by these Statutes, shall continue to be administered as heretofore, unless and until some other mode of administering the same shall be prescribed by some alteration of these Statutes, or by other competent authority.

And whereas it appears to us the Provost and Scholars of the said College (being the Governing Body thereof) that it is expedient to alter the said Statutes F. and M. chapter IV. in manner hereinafter appearing. Now therefore we the Provost and Scholars of the said College do hereby in exercise of the powers given us by the fifty-fourth section of the said Act alter and amend the said Statute F. hereinbefore set out by substituting therefor the following (that is to say)

1. There shall be forty-eight Scholarships in the College, of which twenty-four shall be called Eton Scholarships, and twenty-four shall be called Open Scholarships; but the Honorary Scholarships mentioned in section eighteen (a) of this chapter shall not be reckoned in this number.

2. Both the Eton and the Open Scholarships shall be divided into Entrance and Undergraduate

Scholarships.

- 3 An Eton Entrance Scholarship shall be tenable for four years, and an Open Entrance Scholarship shall be tenable in the first instance for two years, but may be prolonged by the Council for a further period or further periods, provided that the total period of prolongation shall in no case exceed two years, the tenure being in each case reckoned from the first day of the term in which the holder of the Scholarship commenced residence in the University. Any Entrance Scholar hip shall be vacated by the election of the holder to an Undergraduate Scholarship or a Fellowship.
- 4. An undergraduate Scholarship shall be tenable until the holder completes four years from the twenty-fifth day of March in the academical year in which he commenced residence in the University. But such a scholarship may be prolonged by the Council for a further period or further periods, provided that the total period of prolongation shall in no case exceed two years. Any Undergraduate Scholarship shall be vacated bo the election of the holder to a Fellowship.
- 5. No Scholarship shall be tenable with any office or emolument on the foundation of any other College in the University, or of any College in the University of Oxford, or of Trinity College, Dublin.
- 6. Every candidate for a Scholarship, not being already a member of the College, shall bring a satisfactory certificate of moral character.
- 7. The time and manner of examinations for Scholarships, and the day or days of election and

admission thereto, shall from time to time be

fixed by the Governing Body.

8. At any election a Scholarship which is not actually vacant but which will necessarily be vacated on or before the first day of the Michaelmas Term then next following, may be treated as a vacant Scholarship.

9. The electors to Scholarships shall be the Provost, or in his absence the Vice-Provost, and two or more Fellows to be appointed annually by the Council, who may also appoint any

examiners to assist the electors.

10. The manner of electing to Scholarships and all proceedings relating to the election shall be in the discretion of the electors; provided that no candidate shall be elected a Scholar without the concurrence of at least one-half of the electors present, the Provost, or in his absence the Vice-Provost, or in the absence of both the senior elector present, having a second or casting vote in case of an equality of votes; provided also that no person shall vote at an election to Entrance Scholarships who has not taken part in the examination for the same.

11. The electors shall not be bound to elect to a Scholarship any candidate whom they shall not consider of sufficient merit for election; and they shall have power to require from any candidate a declaration that he intends to devote himself exclusively to the studies of the University during the whole of the time preceding his admission to

his first degree.

- 12. Every candidate elected to a Scholarship shall be admitted a Scholar, and (if not already a member of the College) commence residence at such time as shall be prescribed by the Governing Body, and shall thereupon be entitled to the emoluments of his Scholarship, which emoluments shall commence, in the case of an Entrance Scholarship, from the first day of the term in which the Scholar is admitted, and, in the case of an Undergraduate Scholarship, from the day of election; provided that no holder of an Entrance Scholarship shall, upon election to an Under-graduate Scholarship, be required to be again admitted a Scholar; provided also, that any person elected to a Scholarship under the eighth section of this chapter shall not be entitled to any emolument thereof until the same has become actually vacant.
- 13. The Governing Body shall, from time to time, make such regulations as they shall think proper with respect to the University and College examinations that the Scholars shall be required to undergo, and with respect to their residence and studies; and any Scholar who shall fail to conform to such regulations, or shall not make reasonable progress in his studies, may be deprived by the Council of his Scholarship, or of the whole or part of the pecuniary emoluments of the same.
- 14. Every Scholar shall proceed to his degree of Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Laws, or to some equal degree, at his regular time, except with the approval of the Council, given for illness or other grave cause, and any Scholar failing so to proceed may be deprived of his Scholarship by the Council.

15. The following provisions shall apply to

Eton Scholarships only:

(a) At least six Scholarships shall be offered every year, of which at least four shall be offered as Entrance Scholarships, but it shall not be necessary to offer more than six Scholarships in any year, and subject thereto, the Council shall determine in each year how many Scholarships shall be offered in that year, and what number

(b) Any Scholar may at any time signify in writing to the Provost his wish not to receive the pecuniary emoluments of his Scholarship during his tenure of the same, and thereupon such emoluments shall cease to be paid to him and he shall thenceforth be entitled an Honorary Scholar.

(c.) Any Scholar may signify in writing to the Provost his wish not to receive the pecuniary emoluments of his Scholarship during any period of his tenure of the same, and thereupon such emoluments shall not be paid to him during such

Lincoln College, Oxford. Amendments to the College Statutes passed in a Special Meeting, held on 24 January, 1890, by the Governing Body of Lincoln College, Oxford, under the provisions of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877 (40 and 41 Vict. cap. 48).

1. In cap. 4, § 1, to omit the words 'et quod eligendus...partem sociorum.

2. In cap. 4, § 3, to omit the words in

sacerdotio constitutus et.'

3. In cap. 4, § 4, to omit the words 'Licebit autem...non volumus' and to substitute the following:

'Subject to the general provisions of these statutes, a Fellow shall hold his Fellowship for ten years from the date of his admission as "Collega perpetuus."

' He shall then vacate his Fellowship, and shall not be eligible for re-election, unless during any six years after such admission he shall have served the College in the office of Tutor, Lecturer, or Bursar.

In that case, it shall be lawful for the College, by a majority of two-thirds of the voters present at a meeting held in full term and specially summoned by a notice issued at least a month before, to re-elect him for a further period of ten years without a probationary year; provided always that every Fellow so re-elected, if he shall cease to serve the College in the office of Tutor, Lecturer, or Bursar, within six years from the date of his re-election, shall thereupon vacate his Fellowship; provided also that there shall not be in the College at any one time more than three Fellows holding Fellowships after such re-election.

'It shall further be lawful for the College to reelect for a further period of ten years, under the same conditions, persons who have been re-elected

under the provisions of this clause.

Nothing in these Amendments shall operate to alter the conditions of tenure under which existing Fellows hold: but it shall be lawful for the College, at the end of the tenure of any existing Fellow, to re-elect him under the provisions of these Amendments, provided that he has while Fellow fulfilled their conditions.

4. In cap. 12, after § 2, to insert:—
6 But the Rector and Fellows may, with the consent of the Rector, undertake the management of this Estate as an ordinary College Estate, and, after securing the stipend assigned to the Chaplain, and deducting all expenses of management and repairs, and all other liabilities hitherto attaching to the Rector, may pay him the remainder of the rent.'

These alterations if approved of will be by the insertion in Statute 24 of the following clause (b) in lieu of the clause b of the said Statute and by

repealing Statute 78 altogether.
(B.) There shall always be resident in rooms in the College during the usual College terms at: least three persons charged with the maintenance of discipline of whom one shall always be a Tutor or Assistant Tutor and the other two either Tutors Assistant Tutors Lecturers or Officers of the College. Australia—North-East Coast.—Inner ROUTE-HOWICK GROUP. Non-Existence of Harrington Rock.

THE following information has been received from Lieutenant and Commander G. C. Frederick, Her Majesty's-surveying vessel "Dart," relative to a search made in December, 1889, for Harrington Rock, reported in 1874 as lying southward of Coquet Island, Howick Group, and to have less than 6 feet of water on it:-

The "Dart" was anchored 3 cables southeastward of the reported position of Harrington Rock (lat. 14° 33 $\frac{1}{2}$ ′ S., long. 145°  $1\frac{1}{2}$ ′ E.), and the boats sounded closely around for a distance of 7 cables, without any evidence of shoal water being

observed.

The soundings show the bottom as evenly sloping from 61 fathoms near the track recommended on the west to 8 fathoms on the east, and no appearance of shoal or discoloured water was seen from the masthead. Subsequently the "Dart" steamed over the reported position.

On two previous occasions the "Dart" had passed close to the reported position, without any

indication of shoal water being seen.

Considering that in the original report there was no positive evidence of a rock, and that had one existed, it would probably ere this have been again reported; this examination of "Dart" is considered to disprove the original report, and Harrington Rock has therefore been removed from the Admiralty Charts.
