The Ladies who propose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing Rooms are requested to bring with them to the Drawing Room two large cards, with their names clearly written thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Queen.

#### PRESENTATIONS.

The privilege of making presentations to The Queen at a Drawing Room is restricted to those Ladies who have themselves been previously presented to Her Majesty, and who are themselves present at the Drawing Room.

Under such circumstances a Lady has the privilege of presenting one Lady only at a Drawing Room in addition to her Daughters or

Daughters-in-law.

This restriction does not apply to Ladies who, from official position or other circumstances, are specially privileged to make presentations to Her

Majesty.

The Lady who proposes to present another must send in writing the name of such Lady to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, not later than two days previous to the Drawing Room, in order that the Lord Chamberlain may submit the name to Her Majesty, when, if it be approved, presentation cards will be forwarded.

Printed Forms for this purpose can be obtained

at the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

It is particularly requested that the names of the Lady to be presented be very distinctly written on the presentation cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain at the Drawing Room, in

order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

It is not expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at a Drawing Room, except in attendance on the Ladies of their families.

Any Gentleman who under these circumstances should desire to be presented to The Queen will observe the same regulations as are in force for Her Majesty's Levees.

Now know ye, that We, reposing great trust and confidence in your knowledge and ability, have authorized and appointed and do by these Presents authorize and appoint you the said David Robert Plunket; Sir Austen Henry Layard; Sir Frederic Leighton; George Granville Bradley; Louis John Jennings; and Alfred Waterhouse; to be Our Commissioners for the purposes of the said inquiry.

And for the better effecting the purposes of this Our Commission, We do by these presents give and grant unto you, or any three or more of you, full power to call before you such persons as you shall judge likely to afford you any information upon the subject of this Our Commission; and also to call for, have access to, and examine all such books, documents, registers, and records as may afford you the fullest information on the subject; and to inquire of and concerning the premises by all other lawful ways and means whatsoever.

And We do by these presents authorize and empower you, or any three or more of you, to visit and personally inspect such places as you may deem it expedient so to inspect for the more effectual carrying out of the purposes aforesaid.

And We do further by these presents will and ordain that this Our Commission shall continue in full force and virtue, and that you Our said Commissioners, or any three or more of you, may from time to time proceed in the execution thereof, and of every matter and thing therein contained, although the same be not continued from time to time by adjournment.

And We do further ordain that you or any three or more of you have liberty to report your proceedings under this Our Commission from time to time, if you shall judge it expedient so to do.

And Our further will and pleasure is that you do with as little delay as possible, report to Us, under your hands and seals, or under the hands and seals of any three or more of you, your opinion upon the matters herein submitted for your consideration.

GENERAL ORDER of the Local Government Board: Amending Regulations with respect to Remuneration of Vaccination Officer :-

Vallingford Union.

To the Guardians of the Poor of the Wallingford Union, in the Counties of Berks and Oxford;

And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS We, the Local Government Board, by a General Order bearing date the thirty-first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, made rules and regulations relating to the appointment of Vaccination Officers by Guardians of the Poor of certain Unions and Parishes, including the said Walling-ford Union; and by Article 9 of that Order it

- was provided as follows:—
  "The Guardians shall pay to any Vaccination "Officer such salary or remuneration, and such only, as the Local Government Board
  - " may direct or approve, whether for ordinary
  - " duties or for occasional services; and such " salary or remuneration may be increased or reduced as that Board may from time to
  - "direct or approve."

And whereas it is expedient to amend the said. Order as hereinafter mentioned, so far as regards the said Wallingford Union .

Now therefore, in pursuance of the powers given to Us by the Statutes in that behalf. We hereby Order that, with respect to the said Wallingford Union, the above-cited Article shall be amended by the addition of the following pro-

Provided that the Guardians, with the approval of the Local Government Board, may pay to any Vaccination Officer a reasonable compensation on account of extraordinary services, or other unforeseen circumstances connected with his duties or the necessities of the Union.

GENERAL ORDER of the Local Government Board addressed to Non-Metropolitan Unions and Separate Parishes:-

Financial Statement (Statutory). "The District Auditors Act, 1879." (Poor Law, Public Health, Education, and Highway.)

To the Guardians of the Poor of the several Unions and Separate Parishes in England and Wales, except those wholly comprised in the Administrative County of London:-To the District Auditors for the time being authorised to audit the Accounts of the said Unions and Separate Parishes respectively;-And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS by Section 3 of "The District Auditors Act, 1879," it is enacted as follows:—

"Where the accounts of the receipts and ex-"penditure of a Local Authority are audited "by a District Auditor, the Local Authority "shall prepare and submit to the District
"Auditor at every audit (other than an
"extraordinary audit, held in pursuance of
"Section 6 of the Poor Law Amendment "Act, 1866), a Financial Statement in dupli-"cate in the prescribed Form and containing "the prescribed particulars; one of such duplicates shall have the stamp charged "under this Act affixed thereon, and the "Auditor at the conclusion of the audit shall "cancel that stamp, and certify on each "duplicate, in the prescribed Form, the amount in words at length of the expendi-"ture so audited and allowed, and further, "that the regulations with respect to such "statement have been duly complied with, "and that he has ascertained by the audit the correctness of the statement."

And whereas We, the Local Government Board, by Orders dated, respectively, the 25th day of April, 1879, and the 26th day of April, 1879, prescribed the Forms of the Financial Statement to be prepared and submitted to the District Auditor by the Guardians of the Poor of Unions and Separate Parishes respectively:

And whereas it is expedient that a fresh Form of Financial Statement should be prescribed as regards the several Unions and Separate Parishes in England and Wales which are not wholly comprised in the Administrative County of London, and that the said Orders should be rescinded as regards those Unions and Parishes:

Now therefore, We hereby rescind the abovecited Orders, so far as regards the Unions and Separate Parishes in England and Wales which are not wholly comprised in the Administrative County of London, and We hereby Order and prescribe as follows with respect to each of those Unions and Separate Parishes:—

ART. 1. The Financial Statement to be prepared and submitted to the District Auditor in duplicate by the Guardians of the Poor of each of the said Unions and Separate Parishes as a Local Authority, in accordance with the provisions of the Section above recited, shall, for the half-year ended the twenty-fifth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, and thenceforth, be in the Form (A) in the Schedule to this Order, and shall contain the particulars therein specified or referred to so far as they are applicable, and except so far as We may assent to a departure from such Form; and the Certificate of the District Auditor to be appended to each such duplicate shall be in the Form set forth at

the foot of the said Statement.

Provided that if in any case the Accounts of the said Guardians for the half-year ended the twenty-fifth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, are audited before the twenty-eighth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, the Financial Statement to be prepared in such case in respect of the Accounts of the Guardians for that half-year may be in the Form prescribed in the abovecited Order dated the twenty-fifth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine, or in the Form prescribed in the above-cited Order dated the twenty-sixth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine, according as the case may require.

And whereas it is expedient that certain information should from time to time be furnished to Us with reference to loans obtained by the Guardians of the Poor of the said Unions and Separate Parishes under the several Statutes in that behalf:

Now therefore, in pursuance of the powers given to Us, We hereby further Order, with respect to each of the said Unions and Separate Parishes, as follows:-

ART. 2. The Clerk to the Guardians shall prepare at the close of each year ending at Lady Day a Loan Account, which shall be in the Form (B) in the Schedule to this Order so far as it is applicable, and except so far as We may assent to a departure from such Form, and which shall be submitted to the District Auditor at the audit of the Accounts for the half-year ending at that

ART. 3. The District Auditor shall transmit to the Local Government Board the said Loan Account, duly examined and signed by him, together with the stamped duplicate of the Financial Statement certified at the same audit as required by Article 1 of this Order.

ART. 4. In this Order—
The word "Union" includes any Union of
Parishes incorporated or united for the relief or maintenance of the Poor under any Act of Parliament;

The term "Separate Parish" means a Parish or Place which is under a separate Board of Guardians;

The expression "Guardians of the Poor" includes, any Governors, Directors, Acting Guardians, Vestrymen, or other Officers appointed or entitled to act in the distribution or ordering of relief to the Poor from the Poor Rates under any Act of Parliament.

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GENERAL ORDER of the Local Government Board: Ameading Regulations with respect to Remuneration of Collector of the Guardians:— Wallingford Union.

To the Guardians of the Poor of the Wallingford Union, in the Counties of Berks and Oxford;—

And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS by General Orders bearing date the seventh day of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, and the twenty-seventh day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, the Poor Law Board made rules and regulations relating to the appointment and remuneration of certain Officers, therein named Collectors of the Guardians, by Guardians of the Poor of certain Unions and Parishes, including the said Wallingford Union; and by Article 5 of the Order first above-cited it was provided as follows:—

"The Board of Guardians shall pay to the "Officer appointed to the office of Collector "under this Order such salary, either by a "fixed sum or by a poundage, as the Poor "Law Board shall from time to time direct "or approve; and shall also repay the "amount expended or disbursed by him on "their behalf according to the account ren-"dered by him, so far as it shall be found to "have been duly and properly incurred."

And whereas it is expedient to amend the said Order as hereinafter mentioned, so far as regards the said Wallingford Union:

Now therefore, in pursuance of the powers given to Us, the Local Government Board, by the Statutes in that behalf, We hereby Order that, with respect to the said Wallingford Union, the above-cited Article shall be amended by the addition of the following provise:—

Provided that the Guardians, with the approval of the Local Government Board, may pay to any such Collector a reasonable compensation on account of extraordinary services, or other unforeseen circumstances connected with his duties or the necessities of the Union.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WE, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in pursuance of the Acts relating to Her Majesty's Post Office, and in exercise of all powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, made on the representation of Her Majesty's Postmaster-General (testified by his signing the same), and under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, order, direct, and declare as follows:—

Repeal.

1. The Warrants made respectively by the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and mentioned in the first Schedule to this Warrant shall, to the extent in the second column of the said

Schedule mentioned be repeated, revoked, and annulied on and as from the day upon which this Warrant comes into operation.

Definition.

In this Warrant and the Schedules thereto—
 The expression "Parcel" means a Postal Packet which is posted as a Parcel in accordance with the provisions of this Warrant, or any Warrant amending the same:
 The expression "United Kingdom" in-

(2.) The expression "United Kingdom" includes the Channel Islands and the Isle of

Man.

(3.) The expression "British Possession", does not include the Channel Islands or the Isle of Man, but includes all other territories and places forming part of Her Majesty's dominions.

Places between which Purcels may be transmitted.

3. From and after the date when this Warrant comes into operation Parcels may, subject to the provisions of this Warrant, be transmitted by post between the several places and by the routes respectively mentioned in the second Schedule to this Warrant.

Rates of Postage.

4. On all Parcels transmitted by Post under this Warrant there shall be charged and paid the several rates of postage applicable thereto which are specified in the said second Schedule.

Maximum Dimensions and Weight.

5. Except by permission of the Postmaster-General, there shall not be conveyed or tendered for conveyance by post under this Warrant any Parcel the dimensions of which shall exceed in length three feet six inches, or in length and girth measured together six feet (such girth being measured round the thickest part of such parcel), or which shall exceed in weight eleven pounds.

Prepayment.

6. The postage chargeable according to the rates hereinbefore mentioned shall in all cases (except as otherwise provided in this Warrant) be prepaid at the time of posting, and such prepayment shall in the United Kingdom be effected by means of adhesive postage stamps, or at such Post Offices, within such hours, and under and subject to such regulations as the Postmaster-General shall from time to time prescribe; in money.

Times of Posting.

7. Parcels intended to be transmitted by post may, in the United Kingdom, be posted on any day of the week except Sunday, but shall not be posted on Sundays, or in England or Ireland on Christmas Day or Good Friday, and in Scotland on either of the two Sacramental Fast Days, except in the cases next hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:—

Where the delivery of Parcels on Sundays, or any of the other days aforesaid, at certain Post Offices, to addressees calling for the same, may be reafter be specially authorized by the Postmaster-General, the posting of Parcels on Sundays, or such other days as aforesaid, at such offices respectively shall also be permitted within such times and in such manner as may be directed by the Postmaster-General.

Mode of Posting.

8. Except as otherwise provided in this Warrant, all Parcels shall in the United Kingdom be posted by being handed in at a Post Office in the manner hereinafter provided, within the liburaduring which such office shall be open to the public for the posting of Parcels.

Posting at Post Offices.

9. The following provisions shall apply to the posting of Parcels at any Post Office in the United Kingdom, that is to say :-

(1.) It shall be the duty of a person bringing a Parcel to hand it to an officer on duty at

the counter in such office.

(2.) Such Parcel must be accompanied by or have affixed to it a declaration of such kind, and stating the contents of the Parcel in such manner and form and with such other particulars as the Commissioners of Customs and the Postmaster-General may prescribe.

(3.) Such Parcel shall be measured and weighed by such officer, and (if such Parcel do not exceed the limits of measurement or weight hereinbefore mentioned) the postage thereof, according to the rates hereinbefore mentioned shall, subject as hereinbefore men-tioned, be prepaid as hereinbefore provided, and shall be verified by such officer, and no such Parcel shall be forwarded by the post without the before-mentioned requirements being complied with; and if any such Parcel shall be left at a Post Office without such requirements being complied with, such Parcel shall be detained, and may be returned or given up to the sender thereof or otherwise dealt with or disposed of in any manner authorized by this Warrant.

Collection of Parcels.

10. The Postmaster-General may, if he think fit, from time to time authorize such officers as he may direct to receive Parcels for the Post under such regulations and conditions as he may from time to time prescribe.

Irregular Posting of Parcels.

11. Any Packet transmissible by Parcel Post from the United Kingdom which, from any words or marks thereon, or other external evidence, appears to have been intended for transmission as a Parcel, but which has not been tendered for transmission as a Parcel, but has been posted in a Post Office letter-box, or otherwise than according to the manner hereinbefore prescribed for the posting of Parcels, may, in the discretion of the Postmaster-General, either be detained or returned or given up to the sender, or if the said Packet is fully prepaid with the Letter or Book rate of postage, and otherwise conforms to the Regulations as to the Letter or Book Post, the same may be forwarded as a Letter or Book Packet (as the case may be).

Return and Disposal of Undelivered Parcels.

12. With regard to-

(a.) Parcels which are addressed to a Post Office in the United Kingdom to be called for, or to a place in the United Kingdom beyond the limits of the free postal delivery of any town or district, or to a ship at any port in the United Kingdom, and which are not called for or delivered within such reasonable times as the Postmaster-General may from time to time prescribe; and

(6.) Parcels which cannot be delivered in the United Kingdom for want of a true direction, or by reason that the addressee is dead, or cannot be found, or has refused the same, or has refused to pay any charges thereon, or

for any other sufficient reason;

The following provisions shall (subject to the provisions of the Warrant of the said Commisaioners of the 12th day of December, 1888, 2 relating to Foreign and Colonial Parcels) apply (that is to say):-

(1.) The Parcel shall, as the Postmaster-General may from time to time direct, be retained at or forthwith forwarded to such place as the Postmaster-General may from time to time appoint, and may, if necessary,

be there opened and examined.

(2.) Where the name and address of the sender can be ascertained from the Parcel or the declaration accompanying the same, notice shall be given by post to the sender through the Post Office of the place in which the Parcel was posted that the Parcel will, in default of any claim on the part of the addressee, be given up to the sender or his agent upon personal application at such place as aforesaid, or at the request of the sender will be forwarded to a corrected address or returned to him by post in either case upon the conditions hereinafter mentioned.

(3.) Where the name and address of the sender cannot be ascertained from the Parcel, notice shall be publicly given (by affixing the same at such place or places, or in such other manner as the Postmaster-General may direct), and notice shall also be given to the Post Office of the place in which the Parcel was posted that the Parcel will, in default of any claim on the part of the addressee, and upon payment of such charges as are hereinafter mentioned, be given up upon the personal application of the sender or his agent, or be returned to the sender by post.

(4.) In any case the notice shall state that, in default of the receipt by the Postmaster-General of an application for the Parcel during a period to be specified in such notice from some person who, in the Postmaster-General's judgment, is entitled to receive the Parcel, it will be disposed of in such a manner as the Postmaster-General may direct.

(5.) The Postmaster-General may, in his discretion, specify in any such notice, or otherwise, the periods during which Parcels may be returned to the senders thereof, and in so doing may have regard to the nature and contents of Parcels.

(6.) Where in the case of a Parcel which cannot be delivered for want of a true direction, the sender corrects the address of the Parcel, the Parcel shall be forwarded to the corrected address, subject to the following conditions:

(a.) Where the corrected address of the Parcel is within the same free delivery as the original address, and the Parcel is not at the time of such correction lying at a Returned Letter Office, no new charge shall be made with respect to the delivery of the Parcel.

(b.) Where the corrected address of the Parcel is not within the same free delivery as the original address, or the Parcel at the time of such correction is lying at a Returned Letter Office, there shall be paid a new and distinct rate of postage equal in amount to the rate of postage which would have been chargeable on such Parcel as an Inland Parcel.

(7.) A Parcel shall not be given up or returned by post to the sender except upon payment by him of any charge for re-direction or other charge to which the Parcel has become liable under the provisions of this Warrant, or of any such Regulations as are referred to in section 14 of "The Post Office (Parcels) Act,

1882."

(8.) Where the sender requests a Parcel to be returned to him by post, such Parcel shall not be returned to the sender except upon payment by him of a new and distinct rate of postage, according to the rates fixed by this Warrant, and in such case the said rate of postage and all other charges to which the Parcel has become liable, if not pre-paid by the sender, shall be collected on the delivery of the Parcel to him.

(9.) The Postmaster-General may require proof to his satisfaction that an applicant for a Parcel is entitled to receive the same.

(10.) Where no application is made for a Parcel within the period specified in any such notice as aforesaid, or an applicant fails to prove to the satisfaction of the Postmaster-General that he is entitled to receive the Parcel, or refuses or fails to pay the charges to which the Parcel has become liable under this Warrant, the Parcel may be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize.

Re-direction to places out of United Kingdom.

13. Any Parcel may be re-directed from its original address, or any substituted address, within the United Kingdom, to any country or place with which a Parcel Post to or from the United Kingdom or Cyprus or Egypt, is established, and in every case of such re-direction there shall be charged on such Parcel in respect of such re-direction a new and distinct rate of postage according to the rates for the time being payable in respect of the transmission of a like Parcel from the United Kingdom to the country or place to which it may be re-directed, and such postage, if not paid at the time of such re-direction, shall be collected on the delivery of the Parcel to the addressee.

#### Re-direction to places within United Kingdom.

14. Any Parcel may be re-directed from its original address, or any substituted address, within the United Kingdom to any other address within the United Kingdom, and in every case of such re-direction there shall be charged on such Parcel in respect of each such re-direction, and (if not previously paid) paid by the addressee thereof in money upon the delivery of such Parcel, a new and distinct rate of postage, equal in amount to the rate of postage which would have been originally chargeable on such Parcel as an Inland parcel.

#### Remission of Re-direction Rates.

15. The Postmaster-General may wholly remit the rate of postage for re-direction on any Parcel addressed to the United Kingdom which may, on the request of the addressee thereof, be redirected by an Officer of the Post Office, and again forwarded by post to the same person at any address within the limits of the same free postal delivery as the address from which such Parcel was so re-directed.

#### Prohibitions.

16. There shall not be posted or conveyed or delivered by post any Parcel-

(1.) Exceeding in value, if addressed to Egypt,

the sum of fifty pounds.

(2.) Consisting of or containing any indecent or obscene print, painting, photograph, lithograph, engraving, book or card, or any indecent or obscene article whether similar to the above or not; or

(3.) Having thereon or on the cover thereof

any words, marks, or designs of an indecent, obscene, or grossly offensive character.

(4.) Containing or bearing, if addressed to Egypt, any letter or communication in the nature of a letter, except a circular transmissible by book-post.

(5.) Containing any article or thing not authorized by the Customs or other laws of the United Kingdom or Cyprus or Egypt.

(6.) Consisting of or containing:-

(a.) Any explosive substance.

(b.) Any dangerous substance.(c.) Any filth.

(d.) Any noxious or deleterious substance.

(e.) Any sharp instrument not properly protected.

(f.) Except with the special permission of the Postmaster-General any living creature.

(g.) Any article or thing whatsoever which is likely to injure other Parcels in course of conveyance, or any receptacle in which the same are conveyed, or an officer of the Post Office or other person who may deal with such Parcel.

Any such Parcel, if posted or tendered for conveyance by post, may be detained, and either returned or given up to the sender thereof or dealt with or disposed of in such other manner as may be authorized by the Postmaster-General.

17. There shall not be posted or conveyed or delivered by post any Parcel consisting of or containing two or more Parcels or other Postal Packets (of the same or of different descriptions) addressed to different persons at different addresses, and any such Parcel, if posted or tendered for conveyance by post, may be detained and either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or dealt with or disposed of as the Postmaster-General may authorize.

Non-compliance with Regulations.

18. In any case not in this Warrant expressly provided for, where any Parcel shall be posted or tendered for conveyance by post which in any respect infringes or fails to comply with the regulations in this Warrant contained, or any of them, such Parcel may, at the option of the Postmaster-General, either be dealt with as in this Warrant provided, with reference to Parcels which cannot be delivered, or be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize.

Provision for Safety of Parcels.

19. In any case where any officer of the Post Office may find it necessary or expedient for the safety or protection of Parcels that any Parcel should be forwarded or delivered by some later despatch or delivery than that for which the same was posted or despatched, or intended to be posted or despatched respectively, he may delay the despatch or delivery of such Parcel, or make such other and special arrangements as to the despatch or delivery thereof, not, however, involving a greater delay than 24 hours in the whole, as may be deemed by such officer necessary or expedient in the circumstances of the case.

Parcels not to interfere with Letter Post.

20. Where the despatch or delivery from a Post Office in the United Kingdom of letters would be delayed by the despatch or delivery therefrom at the same time of Parcels, such Parcels, or any of them, may be detained in the Post Office until the despatch or delivery next following that by which they would ordinarily be despatched or delivered.

Postmaster-General not liable for Loss or Damage. 21. Nothing contained in or done under or in

22. Parcels intended to be transmitted by post under the provisions of this Warrant shall not be posted, forwarded, conveyed, or delivered, except subject to such Regulations as are referred to in section 14 of "The Post Office (Parcels) Act, 1882."

Remission of Postage. 23. The Postmaster-General may, in any case

WITH reference to Notice to Mariners, Nos. 11, 57, and 74 of 1890, on the existence of two dangerous sunken wrecks in the North Sea-the following particulars are now promulgated for the guidance of Mariners, until more precise information can be given :-

The two large steamers "Gaw Quan Sia" and "Leerdam" collided in a fog on 16th December. 1889, both steamers eventually sinking within a mile of one another, after floating for about twelve hours.

From the circumstances of weather, and drift, the positions were very doubtful, and they have since been reported as follows, by different passing vessels >

I. Lat. 52° 10' N., long. 3° 14' E.

2. Lat. 52° 24' N., long. 3° 21' E.
3. Lat. 52° 27' N., long. 3° 2' E.
4. Lat. 51° 58' N., long. 3° 2' E.

The last position is however undoubtedly the most accurate, having been obtained by the salvage steamer "John Dixon," on 8th January, 1890, when she observed a latitude at noon alongside the wreck of the "Gaw Quan Sia," the longitude being by dead reckoning.

The topmasts of both vessels, and the "Leer-dam's" topsail yard, were at first out of water, but by the time Her Majesty's ship "Penguin," sent especially in January to accurately fix the positions, arrived, these had been broken off, and nothing remained to show their positions. "Penguin" was therefore unable to carry out this service.

There is now however no doubt that the heads of the four lower masts, which are of iron, present a great danger to shipping, as the depth of these below the surface at low water cannot be much more than 15 feet, and may be considerably less, both vessels having lower masts of 100 feet from keel to cap. The stumps of the topmasts probably also project above the caps.

The report of Messrs. Gann, who have been waiting for fine weather to attempt to find the "Gaw Quan Sia," and commence salvage opera-

tions, is as follows:-

"'Leerdam' lies about a mile N.N.W. of 'Gaw Quan Sia.' Both vessels are quite upright. Depth alongside 'Gaw Quan Sia' 19 fathoms, and about one fathom less alongside 'Leerdam.'

"A spar, lying flat on the water, was moored as a buoy close to the 'Gaw Quan Sia' on 8th

January, but has not since been seen."

The wreck of "Gaw Quan Sia" has been placed on Admiralty Charts in lat. 51° 58′ N., long. 3° 2′ E. The other wreck one mile to N.N.W.; and a note "one fathom over iron masts, position approximate," written against them.
