REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S DRAWING ROOMS.

By Her Majesty's Command,

The Ladies who propose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing Rooms are requested to bring with them to the Drawing Room two large cards, with their names clearly written thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Queen.

PRESENTATIONS.

The privilege of making presentations to The Queen at a Drawing Room is restricted to those Ladies who have themselves been previously presented to Her Majesty, and who are themselves present at the Drawing Room.

Under such circumstances a Lady has the privilege of presenting one Lady only at a Drawing Room in addition to her Daughters or Daughters-in-law.

This restriction does not apply to Ladies who, from official position or other circumstances, are specially privileged to make presentations to Her

Majesty.

The Lady who proposes to present another must send in writing the name of such Lady to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, not later than tuo days previous to the Drawing Room, in order that the Lord Chamberlain may submit the name to Her Majesty, when, if it be approved, presentation cards will be forwarded.

Printed Forms for this purpose can be obtained at the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

It is particularly requested that the names of the Lady to be presented be very distinctly written on the presentation eards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain at the Drawing Room, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

It is not expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at a Drawing Room, except in attendance on the Ladies of their families.

Any Gentleman who under these circumstances should desire to be presented to The Queen will observe the same regulations as are in force for Her Majesty's Levees.

The State Apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at two o'clock.

W HEREAS by the Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873, it was amongst other things enacted that, where an arrangement has been made with any forcign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Acts shall apply in the case of such foreign State; and that Her Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent Order, limit the operation of the Order, and restrict the same to fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in the part of Her Majesty's dominions specified in the Order, and render the operation thereof subject to such conditions, exceptions, and qualifications as may be deemed expedient; and that if, by any law made after the passing of the Act of 1870 by the Legislature of any British possession, provision is made for carrying into effect within such possession the surrender of fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in such British

possession, Her Majesty may, by the Order in Council applying the said Acts in the case of any foreign State, or by any subsequent Order, suspend the operation within any such British possession of the said Acts, or of any part thereof, so far as it relates to such foreign State, and so long as such Law continues in force there and no longer:

And whereas by an Act of the Parliament of Canada passed in 1886, and entitled "An Act respecting the Extradition of Fugitive Criminals," provision is made for carrying into effect within

the Dominion the surrender of fugitive criminals:

And whereas by an Order of Her Majesty the Queen in Council, dated the seventeenth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, it was directed that the operation of the Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873, should be suspended within the Dominion of Canada so long as the provision of the said Act of the Parliament of Canada of 1886 should continue in force and no longer:

And whereas a Treaty was concluded on the fourteenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six between Her Majesty and The President of the French Republic, for the mutual extradition of fugitive criminals, in the case of which Treaty the above-mentioned Acts of Parliament were applied by an Order in Council of the sixteenth of May, one thousand eight hundred

and seventy-eight:

And whereas an Arrangement was concluded on the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, between the Government of Her Majesty and the Government of the French Republic, acting in the name of the Government of His Highness The Bey of Tunis, for extending the provisions of the said Treaty of August 14, 1876, to Tunis, which Arrangement is in the terms following:—

"THE Government of Her Britannic Majesty on the one part, and the Government of the French Republic, acting in the name of the Government of His Highness the Bey of Tunis, on the other part, with a view to insure as far as possible the arrest and delivery to the competent jurisdiction of criminals who seek to escape by flight from the action of justice, have agreed as follows:—

"The provisions of the Anglo-French Convention of the fourteenth August, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, are extended to Tunis, except that the period of fourteen days, stipulated by Article IX of the said Convention, is prolonged to two months.

is prolonged to two months.
"The present Arrangement shall have the same duration as the Convention of Extradition to

which it relates.

"In witness whercof the Undersigned his Excellency the Earl of Lytton, Her Britannic Majesty's Ambassador at Paris, and his Excellency M. Spuller, Minister for Foreign Affairs of the French Republic, have prepared the present Arrangement, and have affixed thereto their seals.

"Done at Paris, the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine.

"LE Gouvernement de Sa Majesté Britannique d'une part, et le Gouvernement de la République Française, agissant au nom du Gouvernement de Son Altesse le Bey de Tunis, de l'autre, en vue d'assurer autant que possible l'arrestation et la remise à la juridiction compétente des malfaiteurs qui cherchent à se soustraire par la fuite à l'action de la justice, sont convenus de ce qui suit:—

"Les dispositions de la Convention Franco-Anglaise du 14 Août, 1876, sont étendues à la Tunisie, sauf que le délai de quatorze jours stipulé par l'Article IX de la dite Convention est porté à deux mois.

"Le présent Arrangement aura la même durée que la Convention d'Extradition à laquelle il se

rapporte.

En foi de quoi les Soussignés, son Excellence le Comte de Lytton, Ambassadeur de Sa Majesté Britannique à Paris, et son Excellence M. Spuller, Ministre des Affaires Étrangères de la République Française, out dressé le présent Arrangement, et y ont apposé leurs cachets.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, and in virtue of the authority committed to Her by the said recited Acts, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the sixteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, the said Acts shall apply in the case of Tunis in conformity with the said Arrangement with the French Republic.

Provided always, and it is hereby further ordered that the operation of the said Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873, shall be suspended within the Dominion of Canada so far as relates to Tunis and to the said Arrangement, and so long as the provisions of the Canadian Act aforesaid of 1886 continue in force, and no longer.

WHEREAS by "The Merchant Shipping (Colonial) Act, 1869," it is (amongst other things) enacted, that where the Legislature of any British Possession provides for the examination of, and grant of Certificates of Competency to, persons intending to act as Masters, Mates, or Engineers on board British ships, and the Board of Trade reports to Her Majesty that they are

satisfied that the examinations are so conducted as to be equally efficient as the examinations for the same purpose in the United Kingdom under the Acts relating to Merchant Shipping, and that the certificates are granted on such principles as to show the like qualification and competency as those granted under the said Acts, and are liable to be forfeited for the like reasons, and in the like manner, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by Order in Council:—

- To declare that the said certificates shall be of the same force as if they had been granted under the said Acts.
- 2. To declare that all or any of the provisions of the said Acts which relate to Certificates of Competency granted under those Acts

shall apply to the certificates referred to in the said Order.

3. To impose such conditions and to make such regulations with respect to the said certificates, and to the use, issue, delivery, cancellation, and suspension thereof, as to Her Majesty may seem fit, and to impose penalties not exceeding fifty pounds for the breach of such conditions and regulations.

And that upon the publication in the London Gazette of any such Order in Council as last aforesaid, the provisions therein contained shall, from a date to be mentioned for the purpose in such Order, take effect as if they had been contained in the Act, and that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to revoke any Order made as aforesaid.

And whereas by Order in Council dated the nineteenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, Her Majesty, in pursuance of the powers vested in Her by the said first-recited Act, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, was pleased to declare that the Colonial Certificates of Competency granted by the Governor of the Possession of the Straits Settlements from and after the first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, to persons intending to act as First Class Engineers and Second Class Engineers of sea-going British ships, in pursuance of the provisions of an Ordinance No. II of one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, made by the Legislature of the said Straits Settlements, and intituled "An Ordinance to repeal and re-enact, with alterations, the Steam Vessels Ordinance of 18.3," should, subject to the provisions (save as therein excepted) of the Acts relating to Merchapt Shipping which relate to Certificates of Competency granted thereunder and subject to certain regulations set out in the Schedule A thereto, numbered one to twelve respectively, be of the same force as if they had been granted in the United Kingdom under the Acts relating to Merchant Shipping:

And whereas the said Legislature of the British Possession of the Straits Settlements has by Ordinance No. II of one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two aforesaid, further provided for the examination in the said Possession of persons intending to act as Masters and Mates on board British ships, and for the grant to such persons by the Governor of the said Possession of Certificates of Competency as Masters, First Mates, or Second Mates for sea-going British ships, which certificates are hereinafter also denominated Colonial Certificates of Competency, and the Board of Trade have reported to Her Majesty that they are satisfied that the said examinations are so conducted as to be equally efficient as the examinations for the same purpose in the United Kingdom under the Acts relating to Merchant Shipping, and that the Certificates are granted on such principles as to show the like qualifications and competency as those granted under the said Acts to Masters, First Mates, and Second Mates, and are liable to be forfeited for the like reasons and in like manner :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers vested in Her by the first recited Act, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased-

1. To declare that the Colonial Certificates of Competency granted by the Governor of the Possession of the Straits Settlements on and after the first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, to persons intending to act as Masters, First Mates, and bered in consecutive order.

Second Mates of sea going British ships shall be of the same force as if they had been granted in the United Kingdom under the Acts relating to Merchant Shipping.

v 2. To declare that all the provisions of the said Acts which relate to Certificates of Competency for the foreign trade granted under those Acts, except so much of the one hundred and thirty-ninth section of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," and of the tenth section of "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862," as requires the delivery by the Board of Trade to any Master, Mate, or Engineer of a copy of any Certificate to which he appears to be entitled as therein mentioned, and except so much of the third sub-section of the twenty-third section of the said last-mentioned Act as requires, at the conclusion of a case relating to the cancelling or suspending of a certificate, such certificate, if cancelled or suspended, to be forwarded to the Board of Trade, and except the whole of the provisions of the fourth sub-section of the same section, shall apply to such Colonial Certificates of Competency

3. To impose and make the regulations set out in the Schedule hereto, numbered 1 to 12 respectively, with respect to the said Colonial Certificates of Competency, and to the use, issue, delivery, cancellation, and suspension thereof, and to impose for the breach of such regulations the penalties therein mentioned.

SCHEDULE.

REGULATIONS with respect to the use, issue, cancellation, and suspension delivery, Colonial Certificates of Competency.

Interpretation Clause.

In the construction and for the purposes of these regulations, the following terms shall have the respective meanings hereinafter assigned to them, that is to say :-

"Colonial Certificate of Competency" shall mean a Certificate of Competency granted by the Legislative authority of a British Possession to persons intending to act as Masters, Mates, or Engineers of British ships.

"Authority" shall mean the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, Administrator, Head of the Government, Minister, Board, Body, or Corporation of or in any British Possession for the time being authorized by the Legislature of such Possession to grant Colonial Certificates of Competency.

REGULATIONS.

Form of Certificate.

1. A Colonial Certificate of Competency shall be on parchment, and as nearly as possible similar in shape and form to the corresponding Certificate of Competency for the Foreign Trade granted by the Board of Trade under the Acts relating to Merchant Shipping.

Name of Possession to be inserted.

2. A Colonial Certificate of Competency shall have the name of the British Possession in which the same is granted, inserted prominently on its face and back.

Certificates to be numbered consecutively.

3. The Colonial Certificates of Competency granted in each British Possession shall be numLists of Certificates granted, cancelled, &c., to be sent to Registrar-General of Seamen.

4. The Authority in each British possession shall furnish the Registrar-General of Seamen in London, from time to time, with accurate lists of all such Colonial Certificates of Competency as may be granted therein or as may for any cause whatsoever be cancelled, suspended, renewed, or re-issued; and shall also furnish him with duplicates of the applications for examination made by the persons to whom such Certificates are granted.

Certificates to be granted only upon proof of service at sea.

5. A Colonial Certificate of Competency shall be granted only upon proof that the previous service at sea of the person applying for the same has been such as is required by the regulations for the time being in force in the United Kingdom with respect to certificates of the like grade.

Certificates of Competency granted contrary to this regulation, or upon any false, incorrect or insufficient proof, certificate, or report of service, qualification, conduct, or character shall be

regarded as improperly granted.

Certificates not to be granted when former are cancelled.

6. A Colonial Certificate of Competency shall not be granted to any person who may have had a certificate, whether granted by the Board of Trade or by the Government of a British Possession, cancelled or suspended under the provisions of the said Acts or of any Act or Ordinance for the time being in force in any part of Her Majesty's dominions, unless—

(i.) in accordance with the next following

Regulation;

(ii.) or the same is a certificate of a lower grade than the one so cancelled or suspended, and is issued upon the recommendation of the Court or Authority which cancelled or suspended the original certificate;

(iii.) or the period of suspension has expired;
(iv.) or intimation has been received from the Board of Trade or the authority by whom the cancelled or suspended certificate was originally granted to the effect that no objection to the grant of such Colonial Certificate is known to exist.

Colonial Certificates of Competency granted contrary to this regulation shall be regarded as improperly granted.

Certificates which may be granted after a Certificate has been cancelled or suspended.

7. It shall be lawful for the Governor or person administering the Government of the British Possession in which a Certificate has been cancelled or suspended if, after full investigation of all the circumstances, he thinks the justice of the case requires it, to return any Certificate which has been cancelled or suspended, or to shorten the time for which it is suspended, or to grant or to request the proper authority in such British possession to grant a new Certificate of the same or any lower grade in place of any Certificate which has been cancelled or suspended, and such authority may grant a certificate accordingly.

In all cases in which powers given by this regulation are exercised, a report of the case shall be sent by the Governor or person administering the possession in which the powers are exercised to the authority by whom the cancelled or suspended

certificate was granted.

Certificates improperly granted may be cancelled without formal investigation.

8. A Colonial Certificate of Competency which

appears from information subsequently acquired, or otherwise, to have been improperly granted, may be cancelled by the authority by which the same was granted, or by the Board of Trade in the United Kingdom, without any formal investi-gation, under "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," and the holder of such certificate shall thereupon deliver it to the Board of Trade cr such authority, or as they or either of them may direct, and in default thereof shall incur a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds, which shall be recoverable in the same manner as penalties imposed by the Acts relating to Merchant Shipping are thereby made recoverable, or in such other summary proceedings as the law of any British possession where the holder may be may allow or permit to be brought for the recovery thereof.

Cancellation, &c., of a Certificate shall involve cancellation of all the other Certificates possessed by its Owner.

9. Every decision with respect to the cancellation or suspension of a certificate pronounced by any board, court, or tribunal under the provisions of the said Acts, shall unless otherwise directed, extend equally to all the Colonial Certificates at the time possessed by the person in respect of whom the decision is made.

Certificates believed to be fraudulent may be demantet.

10. Any officer of the Board of Trade, or the Registrar-General of Seamen, or any of his Officers, or a Superintendent of a Mercantile Marine Office, or a Consular Officer, or duly appointed Shipping Officer in a British Possession, may demand the delivery to him of any Colonial Certificate of Competency which he has reason to believe has been improperly issued, or is forged, altered, cancelled, or suspended, or to which the person using it is not justly entitled, and may detain such Certificate for a reasonable period for the purpose of making inquiries respecting such issue, forgery, alteration, cancellation, suspension or possession, and any person who, without reasonable cause, neglects or refuses to comply with such demand shall incur a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds or its equivalent in local currency, which shall be recoverable in the same manner as penaltics imposed by the Acts relating to Merchant Shipping are thereby made recoverable.

Suspended Certificates to be re-issued only by Colony by which originally granted.

11. Subject to these regulations a Colonial Certificate of Competency which has from any cause been cancelled or suspended, shall be renewed or re-issued only by the authority by which the same was originally granted.

Colonial Certificates, when cancelled or suspended, to he sent to the Authority which granted them.

12. So much of section 23 of the Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862, as relates to the transmission to the Board of Trade of a cancelled or suspended certificate, with a report upon the case, shall, in the case of a Colonial Certificate, be varied, as follows:—

A copy of the report which is sent to the Board of Trade shall be sent to the Authority by whom the Certificate was granted, and the Certificate shall, in such case, be forwarded to that Authority, and not to the Board of

Trade.

W HEREAS by the thirtieth section of "The Weights and Measures Act, 1889," it is enacted that Her Majesty the Queen may, from time to time, on the application of the local authority for any area, and on being satisfied that the provisions made by or under any Local Act in force at the commencement of "The Weights and Measures Act, 1889," with respect to the sale of coal in that area, are more stringent than the corresponding provisions of the said Act, by Order in Council exempt that area from the provisions of the second part of the Act to such extent, and under such conditions, as may appear to Her Majesty in Council expedient:

And whereas it has been made to appear, and Her Majesty has been satisfied, that the provisions of the eighty-sixth section of "The Nottingham Improvement Act, 1874," with respect to the distance to which coals in carts may be required to be carried to be re-weighed are more stringent than the corresponding provisions of "The Weights

and Measures Act, 1889":

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers vested in Her by the said "Weights and Measures Act, 1889," by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct that from and after the date of this Order, the area comprised in the said borough of Nottingham shall be exempted from the following provisions (subsection [a]) of the twenty-seventh section of "The Weights and Measures Act, 1889," namely:—

No seller of coal or person in charge of a vehicle in which coal is carried shall be required under this section to carry coal beyond such distance, not exceeding half a mile, as may be prescribed in that behalf by the Local Authority.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her Majesty chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; and the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty chapter thirty-nine; and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her Majesty chapter one hundred and fourteen, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the sixth day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-nine and of the Acts therein mentioned that is to say the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen and the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-nine and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and fourteen have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership after the next two turns of presentation of the advowson

or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called 'the said benefice') of the consolidated chapelry of Saint John the Baptist Holland-road Kensington in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint John the Baptist, Holland-road, Kensington, is vested saving the next two turns of presentation in the Bishop of the said diocese of London and his successors.

"And whereas the Reverend George Booker of number six, Addison-gardens, North Kensington, in the said county of Middlesex Clerk in Holy Orders, has paid over to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners a sum of one thousand pounds for application by us towards the cost of the erection of the church of the said benefice of Saint John the Baptist Holland-road Kensington upon the understanding and condition that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint John the Baptist Holland-road Kensington now vested saving the next two turns of presentation in the said Bishop of the said diocese of London and his successors shall be transferred to and be vested in the Reverend Robert James Wilson Clerk in Holy Orders Warden of Keble College in the University of Oxford the Right Reverend Edward Bishop of the diocese of Lincoln the Right Honourable Frederick Earl Beauchamp Henry Hucks Gibbs of Bishopsgate-street, in the city of London Esquire and John Archibald Shaw Stewart of number seventy-one, Eaton-place in the county of Middlesex Esquire their heirs and assigns for ever.

"And whereas the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Frederick now Bishop of the said diocese of London is willing in consideration of the payment of the said sum of one thousand pounds as aforesaid that the transfer of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint John the Baptist Holland-park Kensington, now vested in him saving the next two turns of presentation as aforesaid as such Bishop should be made to the said Robert James Wilson Edward Bishop of Lincoln, Frederick Earl Beauchamp, Henry Hucks Gibbs and John Archibald Shaw Stewart their heirs and assigns for ever and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary he the said Frederick Bishop of the said diocese of London has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Edward White Archbishop of Canterbury is consenting to the transfer of patronage hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed and in token of his consent thereto (which by the Acts in the hereinbeforementioned Act recited or by some or one of them is in this case made necessary) he the said Archbishop has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas under the circumstances thus set forth it appears to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England that the transfer of the advowson of the same benefice saving the next two turns which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter proposed will tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage or advowson so recommended and pro-

posed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists that is to say in the consolidated chapelry of Saint John the Baptist Holland-road, Kensington. . "Whereas by the authority of an Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the twenty-seventh day of July in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three and published in the London Gazette upon the twenty-eighth day of the same month a part of the parish of Saint Mary the Virgin Nottingham in the said town and county of the town of Nottingham and at that time in the diocese of Lincoln, but now in the diocese of Southwell aforesaid was assigned as a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Luke situate within the limits of the said parish and the same district chapelry was called 'The District Chapelry of Saint Luke Notting-

"And whereas by the authority of another Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the eighteenth day of May in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five and published in the London Gazette on the day following another part of the said parish of Saint Mary the Virgin Nottingham was assigned as a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Ann situate within the limits of the same parish, and the said last-mentioned district chapelry was called 'The District Chapelry of Saint Ann Nottingham.'

"And whereas by another Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the fourteenth day of January in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine and published in the London Gazette on the day following, a part of

the parish of Snenton, in the said town and county of the town of Nottingham and at that time in the said diocese of Lincoln but now in the diocese of Southwell aforesaid, was assigned as a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Matthias situate near to the Carlton-road in the said parish of Snenton, and the same district chapelry was called 'The District Chapelry of Saint Matthias Snenton.'

"And whereas the said district chapelry of Saint Luke Nottingham and the said district chapelry of Saint Ann Nottingham and the said district chapelry of Saint Matthias Snenton, have each of them under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and four become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act and by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and by the abovementioned Act of the thir:y-second and thirtythird years of Your Majesty, chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas it has been represented to us and

it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the new parish of Saint Luke Nottingham and of the said new parish of Saint Ann Nottingham and of the said new parish of Saint Matthias Snenton should be altered in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

"And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent: us from representing recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore-mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The FIRST SCHEDULE.

"The territory to be dissevered from the new parish of Saint Ann Nottingham in the town and county of the town of Nottingham and in the diocese of Southwell, and to be annexed to the new parish of Saint Luke Nottingham in the same town county and diocese, being :-

"All that portion of the said new parish of Saint Ann Nottingham which is bounded upon the south-east by the new parish of Saint Matthias I representation have been transmitted to the

Snenton in the said town county and diocese, upon the south-west by the new parish of Saint Luke Nottingham aforesaid, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the north-west and upon the north-east by an imaginary line, commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Luke Nottingham, from the new parish of Saint Ann Nottingham, aforesaid at the junction of Alfred-street South with the passage which extends along the rear of the houses and premises situate on the north-western side of Stewart-place and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the said passage for a distance of two and a half chains or thereabouts to its north-eastern end at the wall or fence forming the south-western boundary of the house and premises called or known as No. 34, Stewartplace, and extending thence north-westward along the said wall or fence for a distance of five feet or thereabouts to its junction with the wall or fence forming the north-western boundary of the same house and premises, and extending thence north-eastward along the last-described wall or fence for a distance of one chain and a quarter or thereabouts to its north-eastern end on the south-western side of the passage or footway in rear of the houses known as Nos. 34, 35, 36, 37, 38, 39, 40, 41, 42, 43, 44, 45, 46, 47, and 48, Stewart-place, and extending thence first north-eastward to and then south-eastward along the middle of the last-described passage or footway for a distance of three and a quarter chains or thereabouts to its junction with Long. Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued, as follows; viz.:—

SAINT ANDREW, BOLAM. — Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Saint Andrew, Bolam, in the county of Northumberland; and also in the churchyard after the thirty-first of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, except as follows:—

(a:) In such partly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of this Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

(b.) In such reserved grave spaces in the churchyard (as have never before been buried in and which when opened are free from water) burials may be allowed of so many members of the families to whom they may be allotted as can be buried at or below the depth of five feet.

COLEBROKE. — Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Colebroke, in the county of Devon; and also in the old part of the churchyard, except as fellows:—

(a.) In such vaults as are now existing burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) KIRKBURTON.—Forthwith and entirely in Christ Church, New Mill, in the parish of Kirkburton, in the county of York; and also in the churchyard after the thirty-first of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, except as follows:—

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now-existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of this Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

Hadlow. — Forthwith and entirely in the Baptist Chapel in the parish of Hadlow, in the county of Kent; and also in the chapelyard, except as follows:—

WALSHAM-LE-WILLOWS.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Walsham-le-Willows, in the county of Suffolk; and also in the churchyard after the thirtieth of June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, except

as follows :-

(a.) In such vaults as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork

properly cemented.

(b.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of this Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

(c.) In such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those buried therein at the date of this Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

WICKHAMBROOK.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Wickhambrook, in the county of Suffolk; and also in the churchyard after the thirty-first October, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, except as follows:

(a.) WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning "the burial of the dead in England beyond the "limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act "concerning the burial of the dead in the Metro-"polis," it is enacted, that in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation

of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that for the protection of the public health the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burialground shall be opened in any city or town or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burialgrounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and vestry clerk or churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas by another Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning " the burial of the dead in England," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit:

And whereas the Right Honourable Henry Matthews, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbent and the churchwardens of the parish hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that he is of opinion that the Order of Her Majesty in Council of the fifteenth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight, in so far as it affects burials in the Old Cemetery of Newport, Monmouthshire, should be varied, and that the following directions should be substituted for those contained in the said Order, with respect to burials in the said

Cemetery, viz.:-

That with the exception of the portion of the Cemetery Company's land distinguished by a green colour on the plan deposited at the Home Office burials shall be discontinued forthwith and entirely in the Old Cemetery, Newport, in the county of Monmouth.
