

sive cure of souls which is comprised within and is bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Saint Mary Leicester from the new parish of Saint Paul Leicester in the county and diocese aforesaid at the point where Hinckley-road is joined by Great Holme-street, and by the road called or known as Braunstone-gate, and extending thence first eastward and then north-eastward along the middle of the last-mentioned road for a distance of thirteen chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of Braunstone-gate Bridge over the River Soar, and extending thence generally southward to and along the middle of the said river for a distance of fifty-six chains or thereabouts to a point at the southern end of Bede House Meadows; where the same river becomes a part of the Leicestershire and Northamptonshire Canal, such point being upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Saint Mary Leicester from the new parish of Saint Andrew Leicester in the county and diocese aforesaid, and extending thence south-westward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of forty-two chains or thereabouts, thereby following the course of the said canal to a point opposite to the south-eastern angle of the buildings called or known as Saint Mary's Mills, where the said last-mentioned boundary is joined by the boundary which divides the said parish of Saint Mary Leicester from the parish of Glenfield-cum-Braunstone and Kirby-Muxloe in the county and diocese aforesaid and extending thence first north-westward then northward and then eastward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of one mile and seventy-two chains or thereabouts to its junction, at a point on the northern side of Hinckley-road aforesaid nearly opposite to the lodge gates forming the northern entrance to Braunstone Park at which point the said last-mentioned boundary joins the boundary dividing the said parish of Saint Mary Leicester from the extra-parochial territory called or known as New Parks, and extending thence north-eastward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of nine chains or thereabouts thereby following the northern side of Hinckley-road aforesaid to the point where the same boundary diverges from that road, and extending thence that is from the said boundary first southward to, and then north-eastward and eastward along the middle of the said Hinckley-road for a distance of sixty-four chains or thereabouts to a point a little to the east of the southern end of Carlisle-street upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Saint Mary Leicester from the new parish of Saint Paul Leicester aforesaid, and extending thence south-eastward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of forty-two chains or thereabouts thereby continuing to follow the middle of Hinckley-road aforesaid, to the first-described point where the same road is joined by Great Holme-street and by the road called or known as Braunstone-gate at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the secondly herein-before-mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patron and to the incumbent of the parish of Saint Mary, Leicester, out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such patron and incumbent have respectively signified their assent to such scheme:

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her

Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Peterborough.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-four; of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-four; and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme or Representation, bearing date the twentieth day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting under the provisions of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Your Majesty, chapter ninety-four; of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Your Majesty, chapter ninety-four, and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty, chapter ninety-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme or Representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Saint Luke Nottingham of the new parish of Saint Ann Nottingham and of the new parish of Saint Matthias Snenton all in the town and county of the town of Nottingham and in the diocese of Southwell.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the twenty-seventh day of July in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three and published in the London Gazette upon the twenty-eighth day of the same month a part of the parish of Saint Mary the Virgin Nottingham in the said town and county of the town of Nottingham and at that time in the diocese of Lincoln, but now in the diocese of Southwell aforesaid was assigned as a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Luke situate within the limits of the said parish and the same district chapelry was called 'The District Chapelry of Saint Luke Nottingham.'

"And whereas by the authority of another Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the eighteenth day of May in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five and published in the London Gazette on the day following another part of the said parish of Saint Mary the Virgin Nottingham was assigned as a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Ann situate within the limits of the same parish, and the said last-mentioned district chapelry was called 'The District Chapelry of Saint Ann Nottingham.'

"And whereas by another Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the fourteenth day of January in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine and published in the London Gazette on the day following, a part of
