REGULATIONS TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S DRAWING ROOMS.

By Her Majesty's Command,

The Ladies who propose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing Rooms are requested to bring with them to the Drawing Room two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Queen.

PRESENTATIONS.

The privilege of making presentations to The Queen at a Drawing Room is restricted to those Ladies who have themselves been previously presented to Her Majesty, and who are themselves present at the Drawing Room.

Under such circumstances a Lady has the privilege of presenting one Lady only at a Drawing Room in addition to her Daughters or Daughters-in-law.

This restriction does not apply to Ladies who, from official position or other circumstances, are specially privileged to make presentations to Her Majesty.

The Lady who proposes to present another must send in writing the name of such Lady to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, not later than *two days* previous to the Drawing Room, in order that the Lord Chamberlain may submit the name to Her Majesty, when, if it be approved, presentation cards will be forwarded.

Printed Forms for this purpose can be obtained at the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

It is particularly requested that the names of the Lady to be presented be *very distinctly written* on the presentation cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain at the Drawing Room, in

order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

It is not expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at a Drawing Room, except in attendance on the Ladies of their families.

Any Gentleman who under these circumstances should desire to be presented to The Queen will observe the same regulations as are in force for Her Majesty's Levees.

The State Apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at two o'clock.

WHEREAS in pursuance of "The Bishops Resignation Act 1869" a representation has been made to Her Majesty by the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Edward White by Divine Providence Lord Archbishop of Canterbury Primate of All England and Metropolitan at the instance of the Right Reverend James Colquhoun by Divine Permission Lord Bishop of Bangor, and as such a Bishop of a diocese within and of the Province of Canterbury, that the said Bishop is desirous of resigning his Bishopric by reason that he is incapacitated by age from the due performance of his duties as Bishop.

And whereas Her Majesty is satisfied of such incapacity and that the said Bishop has canonically resigned.

Now therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to declare as it is hereby declared that the said Bishopric of Bangor is vacant, and Her Majesty by and with the like advice is pleased to direct as it is hereby directed that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Bangor.

WHEREAS by Orders in Council made by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty on the twelfth February one thousand eight hundred

and seventy-six, twenty-seventh June one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, ninth December one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, and fifteenth July one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, Her Majesty did, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, order, among other matters, that a Lower Division of the Civil Service should be constituted, to consist of Men Clerks and Boy Clerks engaged to serve in any Department of the State to which they might from time to time be appointed or transferred: that the salaries of such Men Clerks should commence at eighty pounds and should rise by triennial increments of fifteen pounds to two hundred pounds; but that in any office where a regular attendance of seven hours a day was required, the commencing salary might be ninety-five pounds and the maximum salary two hundred and fifty pounds:

And whereas by an Order in Council dated the twenty-first March one thousand eight hundred and ninety it was provided that the Lower Division should thenceforth be called the Second Division and that Second Division Clerks appointed after the twenty-eighth May one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine should give a regular attendance of seven hours a day and commence at a salary of seventy pounds rising by annual increments as thereafter provided:

And whereas it is provided by an Order in Council of the fourth June one thousand eight hundred and seventy that no person shall be appointed to any office or employment in any of Her Majesty's Civil Establishments until a certificate of qualification shall have been issued by the Civil Service Commissioners after examination:

And whereas under clause seven of the said Order in Council of the fourth June one thousand eight hundred and seventy the Civil Service Commissioners may, with the consent of the Commissioners of the Treasury in certain cases, dispense with examination wholly or partially and may grant their certificates of qualification on evidence satisfactory to them:

And whereas it appears that certain Men Copyists were approved by the Commissioners of the Treasury before the twenty-eighth May one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine for appointment to the Lower Division under clause seven of the said Order in Council of the fourth June one thousand eight hundred and seventy, but that certificates of their qualification were not issued by the Civil Service Commissioners before the said twenty-eighth May one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine:

Now therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

Any Man Copyist who was approved by the Commissioners of the Treasury before the twenty-eighth May one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine for appointment to a Man Clerkship of the Lower Division under clause seven of the said Order in Council of the fourth June one thousand eight hundred and seventy, shall on appointment receive the initial rate of salary in force for Men Clerks of the Lower Division before the twenty-eighth May one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, but shall in other respects be subject to the provisions of the Order in Council of the twenty-first March one thousand eight hundred and ninety determining the constitution of the Second Division of the Civil Service.

WHEREAS by an Order in Council bearing date the seventh day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, Her Majesty was pleased to order that a Police Court Division therein defined should be constituted and be assigned to a Police Court to be called the Dalston Police Court which was then to be erected or fitted up at a place which was therein specified. And whereas a Police Court has been erected at such place and is called the Dalston Police Court.

And whereas it has been represented to Her Majesty by divers inhabitants of the division assigned to the said Court that the area over which the said Court has jurisdiction comprises not only the comparatively small district of Dalston but also other large and important parishes and parts of parishes, and that it is desirable that such Court should be henceforth known by the name of "The North London Police Court."

Her Majesty is pleased with the advice of Her Privy Council to order and direct and it is hereby ordered and directed that such Police Court shall henceforth be known and called by the name of "The North London Police Court."

And the Right Honourable Henry Matthews one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by section sixteen of "The Fluoridities Act, 1838," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That whenever it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, with respect to his own diocese, and whenever it shall be represented to him by the Bishop of any diocese, or by the Bishops of any two dioceses, that two or more benefices, or that one or more benefice or benefices, and one or more spiritual sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, in his or their diocese or dioceses, being either in the same parish or contiguous to each other, and of which the aggregate population shall not exceed one thousand five hundred persons, may, with advantage to the interests of religion, be united into one benefice, the said Archbishop of the Province shall inquire into the circumstances of the case; and if on such inquiry it shall appear to him that such union may be usefully made, and will not be of inconvenient extent, and that the patron or patrons of the said benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages respectively, is or are consenting thereto, such consent being signified in writing under the hands of such patron or patrons, the said Archbishop shall, six weeks before certifying such inquiry and consent to Her Majesty as herein after directed, cause with respect to his own diocese, a statement in writing of the facts, and in other cases a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation to be affixed on or near the principal outer door of the church, or in some public and conspicuous place in each of such benefices, sinecure rectories, or vicarages, with notice to any person or persons interested, that he, she, or they, may, within such six weeks, show cause in

"writing under his, her, or their hand or hands, to the said Archbishop, against such union; and if no sufficient cause be shown within such time, the said Archbishop shall certify the inquiry and consent aforesaid to Her Majesty in Council, and thereupon it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make and issue an Order or Orders for uniting such benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, into one benefice, with cure of souls, for ecclesiastical purposes only."

And whereas the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, pursuant to the provisions of the said Act, hath duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a certificate in writing, bearing date the twentieth day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety, in the words following, that is to say:—

"To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Edward White Archbishop of the province of Canterbury Primate of all England and Metropolitan do hereby certify to Your Majesty in Council:—

"That the Right Reverend James Lord Bishop of Hereford as Bishop of the diocese within which are situate the vicarage and parish of Mansel Lacy in the county and diocese of Hereford and the vicarage and parish of Yazor in the same county and diocese having represented unto us that the said benefices being contiguous to each other and of which the aggregate population does not exceed four hundred and twenty persons might with advantage to the interests of religion be united into one benefice we inquired into the circumstances of the case.

"That on such inquiry it appeared to us that such union might be usefully made and would not be of inconvenient extent and that the Reverend George Horatio Davenport of Foxley in the said parish of Yazor being the patron or person entitled to present to the said vicarage of Mansel Lacy if the same were now vacant and being also the patron or person entitled to present to the said vicarage of Yazor the same being now vacant consents to the proposed union.

"That six weeks and upwards before certifying such inquiry and consent to Your Majesty in Council we caused a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation of the said Lord Bishop to be affixed on the principal outer door of the parish church of each of the said benefices with notice to any person or persons interested that he she or they might within such six weeks show cause in writing under his her or their hand or hands to us the said Archbishop against such union and no such cause has been shown.

"The representation of the said Lord Bishop of Hereford our inquiry into the circumstances of the case the statement of circumstances in reply thereto the consent in writing of the patron and the copies of the representation and notice before mentioned are hereunto annexed.

"And we do hereby certify the inquiry and consent aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for uniting the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes.

"As witness our hand this twentieth day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety.

pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the vicarage of Mansel Lacy, situate in the county and diocese of Hereford, and the vicarage of Yazor, situate in the same county and diocese, shall be united into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only. *C. L. Peel.*

WHEREAS by section twenty-six of "The Pluralities Act 1837" after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial may in some instances with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That when with respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or district within the diocese of such Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes: and the said Archbishop or Bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested: and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas by section six of another Act of Parliament passed in the second and third years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne; and for other purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That any such scheme or modification as aforesaid may be drawn up according to the regulations and directions in the hereinbefore in part recited

"Act contained, subject to the consent in writing of the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected thereby, under his or their hands, notwithstanding the vacancy of such benefice or benefices; and it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council thereupon to make an Order for carrying such scheme or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect; and such Order being registered in the registry of the diocese, as directed by the hereinafore in part recited Act, shall come into operation, and shall be forthwith binding on all persons whatsoever, notwithstanding such vacancy or vacancies."

And whereas the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Frederick, Lord Bishop of London, hath represented in a writing dated the eighth April one thousand eight hundred and ninety to the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Edward White, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

"To the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Father in God Edward White by Divine Providence Lord Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury Primate of all England and Metropolitan.

"I, Frederick by divine permission Bishop of London do in pursuance of the twenty-sixth section of an Act of Parliament of the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty chapter one hundred and six hereby represent to your Grace as follows:—

"1. There is in the county of Middlesex and my diocese of London the benefice (being a vicarage and new parish or perpetual curacy) of Saint Matthew Pell-street within the original limits of the parish of Saint George-in-the-East. The net annual value of the said benefice arising from ground rent (ninety-two pounds) Ecclesiastical Commissioners (one hundred and eighty-seven pounds eleven shillings and four pence) and fees (ten pounds) is two hundred and ninety pounds or thereabouts.

"2. There is also in the county of Middlesex and my diocese of London the benefice (being a vicarage and new parish or perpetual curacy) of Saint John the Evangelist-in-the-East also within the original limits of the said parish of Saint George-in-the-East. The net annual value of the said benefice arising from Ecclesiastical Commissioners (two hundred pounds) and fees (ten pounds) is two hundred and ten pounds or thereabouts.

"3. The new parish of Saint Matthew Pell-street consists of two unequal portions one on the north and the other on the south side of a street called Cable-street. The northern portion contains about two thousand people and is contiguous on two sides to the new parish of Saint John the Evangelist-in-the-East aforesaid. The population of this portion of the said new parish of Saint Matthew Pell-street will soon be considerably diminished by the widening of the Blackwall Railway which runs through it.

"It appears to me that under the provisions of the said Act first and second Victoria chapter one hundred and six and of the Act second and third Victoria chapter forty-nine the said northern portion of the said new parish of Saint Matthew Pell-street may be advantageously separated from that new parish and be annexed to the said contiguous new parish of Saint John the Evangelist-in-the-East.

"The said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist-in-the-East can without inconvenience receive this accession of population.

"It is proposed to deal with the remaining portion of the new parish of Saint Matthew Pell-street by a future scheme.

"Both the said benefices are in my patronage in right of my bishoprick.

"The said benefice of Saint Matthew Pell-street is at present vacant. The present Incumbent of the said benefice of Saint John the Evangelist-in-the-East is the Reverend George Thomas Cull Bennett.

"Pursuant to the directions contained in the twenty-sixth section of the first-mentioned Act of Parliament I the said Bishop have drawn up a scheme in writing annexed to the representation describing the mode in which it appears to me the alteration may best be effected and how the changes consequent thereon in respect of Ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithes rent charges and other ecclesiastical dues and payments and in respect of patronage and right to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested and I do hereby submit the same to your Grace together with the consents in writing of myself as the patron of both the said benefices and of the said Reverend George Thomas Cull Bennett the incumbent of the said benefice of Saint John the Evangelist-in-the-East to the intent that if your Grace shall on full consideration and enquiry be satisfied with such scheme you may certify the same and such consents by your report to Her Majesty in Council.

"Given under my hand this eighth day of April one thousand eight hundred and ninety.

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop, and the consents referred to in the said representation are as follows:—

"The SCHEME referred to in the foregoing representation.

"That all that portion of the new parish of Saint Matthew Pell-street which is situate on the north side of Cable-street and is bounded on all sides as follows that is to say on the east and on the north by the new parish of Saint John the Evangelist-in-the-East on the west by the new parish of Saint Mark Whitechapel and upon the south partly by the new parish of Saint Paul Dock-street Whitechapel and partly by an imaginary line extending along the middle of Cable-street aforesaid and which for the purpose of identification is delineated and described in the plan hereto annexed and therein coloured blue shall be separated from the said new parish of Saint Matthew Pell-street and annexed for ecclesiastical purposes to the contiguous parish of Saint John the Evangelist-in-the-East.

"That the incumbent of the benefice of Saint John the Evangelist-in-the-East shall have the sole and exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the same.

"That the inhabitants of the said portion of the said new parish of Saint Matthew Pell-street shall henceforth be entitled to accommodation in the church of the said benefice of Saint John the Evangelist-in-the-East.

"That marriages baptisms churchings and burials shall be solemnized and performed in the church of the said benefice of Saint John the Evangelist-in-the-East for the inhabitants of the said separated portion of the new parish of Saint Matthew Pell-street and all fees dues ecclesiastical offerings and emoluments arising therefrom shall henceforth belong to the incumbent of the benefice of Saint John the Evangelist-in-the-East aforesaid.

"That the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England shall out of the annual sum of money payable by them to the incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Saint Matthew Pell-

street pay to the incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Saint John the Evangelist-in-the-East the annual sum of one hundred pounds. No other alteration shall be made in the endowments of the said benefices or either of them.

"That no alteration shall be made in the patronage of the said benefices or either of them.

"CONSENTS.

We the Right Reverend Frederick Lord Bishop of London being the patron or person entitled in right of the Bishoprick of London to present to the benefice of Saint Matthew Pell-street, in the county of Middlesex and diocese of London the same being now vacant and also to the benefice of Saint John the Evangelist-in-the-East in the same county and diocese if the same were now vacant and I the Reverend George Thomas Cull Bennett Clerk Incumbent of the said benefice of Saint John the Evangelist-in-the-East do hereby respectively signify to Your Grace our consents to the scheme above proposed and set forth and to every matter and thing therein contained.

"In testimony whereof we have hereunto respectively set our hands this eighth day of April one thousand eight hundred and ninety.

And whereas the said scheme hath been transmitted by the said Bishop to the said Archbishop for his consideration;

And whereas the said Archbishop, being satisfied with the said scheme, hath certified the same and the consents aforesaid to Her Majesty in Council, by his report dated the twelfth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, which said report is in the words and figures following:—

"To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Edward White Archbishop of the province of Canterbury do hereby report to Your Majesty in Council:—

"That the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Frederick Lord Bishop of London has represented unto us (amongst other things):

"That there is in the county of Middlesex and diocese of London the benefice (being a vicarage and new parish or perpetual curacy) of Saint Matthew Pell-street within the original limits of the parish of Saint George-in-the-East.

"That there is also in the county of Middlesex and diocese of London the benefice (being a vicarage and new parish or perpetual curacy) of Saint John the Evangelist-in-the-East also within the original limits of the said parish of Saint George-in-the-East.

"That the new parish of Saint Matthew Pell-street consists of two unequal portions one on the north and the other on the south side of a street called Cable-street. The northern portion contains about two thousand people and is contiguous on two sides to the new parish of Saint John the Evangelist-in-the-East aforesaid. The population of this portion of the said new parish of Saint Matthew Pell-street will soon be considerably diminished by the widening of the Blackwall Railway which runs through it.

"That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that under the provisions of the Act first and second Victoria chapter one hundred and six, and of the Act second and third Victoria chapter forty-nine, the said northern portion of the said new parish of Saint Matthew Pell-street may be advantageously separated from that new parish and be annexed to

the said contiguous new parish of Saint John the Evangelist-in-the-East.

"That the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist-in-the-East can without inconvenience receive this accession of population.

"That it is proposed to deal with the remaining portion of the new parish of Saint Matthew Pell-street by a future scheme.

"That the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him the proposed alterations may best be effected and how the changes consequent upon such alterations in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested which scheme together with the consents thereto in writing of the said Lord Bishop as the patron of both the said benefices and of the incumbent of the benefice of Saint John the Evangelist-in-the-East (the said benefice of Saint Matthew Pell-street being now vacant) have been transmitted by the said Lord Bishop to us for our consideration.

"The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consents before referred to are hereunto annexed.

"And we the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said scheme do hereby pursuant to the Act of the first and second years of Your Majesty's reign chapter one hundred and six certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said scheme into effect.

"As witness our hand this twelfth day of April one thousand eight hundred and ninety.

Now therefore Her Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of Her Council, is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the said scheme be carried into effect.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that for the protection of the public health the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds

or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas by another Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit:

And whereas the Right Honourable Henry Matthews, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbent and Churchwardens of the parish hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that he is of opinion that the Order of Her Majesty in Council of the eleventh day of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, in so far as it affects burials in the parish of Risca, in the county of Monmouth, should be varied, and that the following directions should be substituted for those contained in the said Order with respect to burials in the said parish, viz., that burials be discontinued as follows:—

RISCA.—That no new burial ground shall be opened in the parish of Risca, in the county of Monmouth, without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials be discontinued forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Risca, in the county of Monmouth; and also in the churchyard, except as follows:—

In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented:

Forthwith and entirely in Bethany Chapel, in the parish of Risca; and also in the chapel-yard, except as follows:—

In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the chapelyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework properly cemented:

Forthwith and entirely in Moriah Chapel, in the parish of Risca; and also in the chapel-yard, except as follows:—

In such vaults and wholly walled graves

as are now existing in the chapelyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented: Forthwith and entirely in Trinity Chapel in the parish of Risca, and in the chapelyard within three yards of any dwelling; and in the rest of the chapelyard except as follows:—

(a) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the chapelyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b) In such reserved grave spaces in the chapelyard as have never before been buried in and which when opened are free from water burials may be allowed of so many of the members of the families to whom they may be allotted as can be buried at or below the depth of five feet.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the sixteenth day of June next:

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parish affected by such representation, one month before the said sixteenth day of June.

In the parish churchyard of Earl's Barton, in the county of Northampton, until the thirtieth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and ninety.

**THE MUNICIPAL CORPORATIONS
 ACT, 1882.**

THE following Scheme for the adjustment of the property, rights, liabilities &c. of the Vestry of the parish of Richmond and for other purposes, as settled by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, is published in pursuance of the Municipal Corporations Act :—

"WHEREAS, by the Municipal Corporations Acts, 1882 and 1885, it is enacted that where a Petition for a Charter of Incorporation is referred to the Committee of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council (in the said Acts and in this Scheme referred to as 'the Committee of Council'), and it is proposed by the Charter to extend the Municipal Corporations Acts to the Municipal Borough to be created by the Charter, the Committee of Council may settle a scheme for the purposes in the said Acts named, and containing such provisions as are in the said Acts particularized :

"And whereas certain inhabitant householders of the parish of Richmond, in the county of Surrey, have petitioned Her Majesty the Queen, praying for a grant of a Charter of Incorporation :

"And whereas the said petition for a Charter has been referred to the Committee of Council, and it is proposed to create the said parish a municipal borough by the name of the borough of Richmond (Surrey), and to incorporate the inhabitants thereof, and by the Charter to extend the Municipal Corporations Acts to the Municipal Borough to be created by the Charter :

"And whereas the vestry of the said parish of Richmond (hereinafter called the vestry) was constituted by and by virtue of an Act of Parliament made and passed in and at the second session of the sixteenth Parliament of Great Britain to wit at the Parliament begun and holden at Westminster the eighteenth day of May, A.D. one thousand seven hundred and eighty-four and from thence continued by several prorogations to the twenty-fifth day of January A.D. one thousand seven hundred and eighty-five such Act being intituled 'An Act to repeal part of an Act passed in the sixth year of His present Majesty for the relief and employment of the poor of the parish of Richmond, in the county of Surrey, and other purposes in the said Act mentioned; and for making new provisions for the relief and employment of the poor, for the repairs of the highways, the paving, cleansing, lighting and watching the streets and other places in the town and parish of Richmond aforesaid; for the removal and prevention of annoyances, obstructions, and encroachments therein; for enclosing certain common or waste lands within the said parish for the use of the poor; and to enable the vestrymen of the said parish to erect a workhouse thereon; and to purchase land for a burial ground; and also to enable His Majesty to shut up a lane within the said parish called Love-lane' (hereinafter called the Richmond Local Act 1784), and such vestry is the Sanitary Authority for the Urban Sanitary District of the said parish, and is a Local Authority within the meaning of Part XI. of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882 :

"And whereas under and by virtue of the Richmond Local Act 1784, the vestry among other things appoint the churchwardens and sidesmen and other officers of the parish of Richmond; make lists of persons from which the overseers of the said parish are nominated and appointed, make and collect rates for the relief of

the poor and repairs of the highways, and hold the lands granted to them under the authority of the said Act :

"And whereas under and by virtue of an Act of the twelfth and thirteenth years of the reign of Her Majesty chapter forty-two intituled 'An Act for making the parish of Richmond in the county of Surrey a distinct vicarage by dividing the vicarage of Kingston-upon-Thames and Sheen otherwise Richmond into two separate vicarages and for providing a stipend and residence for the vicar of Richmond aforesaid, and for extinguishing the vicarial tithes in the parish of Richmond, and for other purposes relating to such vicarages' (hereinafter called the Richmond Vicarage Act 1849), the vestry have power to fix, receive and recover the rents in respect of pews in the parish church of Richmond aforesaid, and, by a Treasurer appointed by them, receive the fees in respect of all graves, vaults, monuments, and burials in the church, churchyard or burial ground, of the said parish (except such fees as are payable to the burial board of the parish) and for all tablets affixed to the walls of the said church churchyard or burial ground (except as aforesaid) and are required to apply such rents and fees in making certain payments to the officials of the said church as in the said Act mentioned, and providing the necessary requirements of the said church and an annual stipend to the vicar of the parish in manner in the said Act specified :

"And whereas under and by virtue of certain indentures of lease and release bearing date the twenty-first and twenty-second days of October, one thousand six hundred and sixty-one, (hereinafter called 'the indenture of October 1661,') made between George Bate Doctor in Physic, and Elizabeth his Wife of the first part, the Right Reverend Brian, Bishop of Winchester, of the second part, Richard Chatworth and William Turner, Doctors-in-Law of the third part, and William Bolton, Alderman of London, and seven other persons parishioners of the said parish of Richmond of the fourth part, the vicar of Richmond and the rest of the vestry have power to elect inmates of the Almshouses known as Bishop Duppa's Almshouses :

"And whereas under and by virtue of a certain Order made by the Board of Charity Commissioners for England and Wales, and bearing date the fifth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, (hereinafter called 'Hickey's Charity Order 1884,') the vestry are authorized and required from time to time to appoint two representative Trustees of the Charity known as Hickey's Charity at Richmond :

"And whereas under and by virtue of the Richmond Gas Act, 1867, and the Richmond Gas Act, 1881, the vestry are authorized to maintain a place and apparatus for the testing of gas, and to test the gas supplied in the parish by the Richmond Gas Company, and have certain other powers or duties :

"And whereas under and by virtue of the West Metropolitan Tramways Act, 1882, the vestry have certain rights, powers, and privileges in respect of the tramways laid or to be laid in the road known as the Kew-road in the said parish of Richmond, by the West Metropolitan Tramways Company Limited :

"And whereas by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 5) Act, 1887, the vestry are a Constituent Authority of the Richmond Main Sewerage Board, and the Chairman of the vestry is *ex-officio* a Member of such Board, and the vestry are authorized to elect and have elected five other vestrymen to be

members of the said Main Sewerage Board, and such Main Sewerage Board is a Local Authority within the meaning of Part. XI. of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882:

"And whereas it is expedient right and just that a Scheme should be settled pursuant to Part XI. of the Municipal Corporations Act 1882 containing the provisions hereinafter set forth:

"Now therefore the Committee of Council have settled a Scheme containing the provisions hereinafter set forth and do hereby direct order and declare as follows:—

"1. This Scheme may be cited for all purposes as the 'Borough of Richmond (Surrey) Scheme, 1890.'

"2. This Scheme (when confirmed by Parliament or Order in Council as the case may be) shall be deemed to have come into operation and to be in operation on and from the day of the first meeting of the Council of the Municipal Borough created by the said Charter (which date is hereinafter referred to as 'the commencement of this Scheme'), and shall be construed and have effect accordingly for all purposes.

"3. The municipal borough created by the said charter shall be and is hereby placed immediately on from and after the day of the first meeting of the Council of the municipal borough aforesaid, within the jurisdiction of the Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses of the borough of Richmond (Surrey), acting by the Council as the Sanitary Authority for the said borough.

"4. The vestry shall (subject to the provisions of this Scheme) continue to exist and be constituted as heretofore and shall continue to stand in the place of the vestry of the whole parish of Richmond which existed before the passing of the Richmond Local Act 1784 and shall continue to be invested with all such rights privileges and authorities as before the passing of the Richmond Local Act 1784 belonged to or were used or exercised by the vestry of the whole parish of Richmond (which last-mentioned vestry from and after the passing of the Richmond Local Act 1784 finally ceased and determined) and (subject as may be hereinafter provided) all the rights interests powers duties obligations property and liabilities of the vestry under or by reason of so much of the enactments in the First Schedule hereto referred to as is in and by the said Schedule stated shall continue to be vested in be exercisable by and attach to the vestry and their officers. Section 312 of the Public Health Act 1875 shall continue to apply to the Elective Members of the vestry, but the other provisions of that Act and of the Acts amending the same shall no longer apply to the vestry.

"5. Save as in clause 4 of this Scheme mentioned or declared all rights interests powers duties obligations property and liabilities whatsoever of the vestry and vestrymen under or by virtue of the Richmond Local Act 1784 shall be transferred to vest in attach to and be exercisable by the Mayor Aldermen and Burgesses of the borough of Richmond (Surrey) and the Council of the said borough respectively.

"6. All rights interests powers property liabilities and obligations of the vestry under or by reason of the indenture of October one thousand six hundred and sixty one shall continue to attach to vest in and be exercisable by the vestry.

"All rights interests powers property liabilities and obligations of the vestry under or by reason of Hickey's Charity Order 1884 shall be transferred to vest in attach to and be exercisable by the Mayor Aldermen and Burgesses of the borough of Richmond (Surrey). Provided that the two

vestrymen who at the commencement of this Scheme may be representative trustees of such charity shall continue to hold their offices respectively until their death resignation or removal or the expiration of their term of office (as the case may be).

"7. All rights interests powers duties property obligations and liabilities whatsoever of the vestry under or by virtue of the Richmond Gas Act 1867 the Richmond Gas Act 1881 the West Metropolitan Tramways Act 1882 and any other private or local or personal or local and personal Act (save as aforesaid) or any general Act incorporated into any private or local or personal or local and personal Act shall be transferred to vest in attach to and be exercisable by the Mayor Aldermen and Burgesses of the borough of Richmond (Surrey).

"8. All rights interests powers duties property obligations and liabilities whatsoever of the vestry as such Urban Sanitary Authority as aforesaid and of the vestry under or by virtue of the Public Health Act 1875 and any Act or Acts amending or extending the same and the Sanitary Acts (as by the Public Health Act 1875 defined) and (subject to the provisions of this Scheme) of any local or General Act for purposes the same as or similar to those of the Acts aforesaid or any of them shall be transferred to vest in attach to and be exercisable by the Mayor Aldermen and Burgesses of the borough of Richmond (Surrey) acting by the Council as the Sanitary Authority of the said borough.

"9. Without prejudice to the provisions of this scheme, contained in the foregoing clauses, the lands and tenements described in the second Schedule hereto (being lands and tenements acquired by the vestry before they became an Urban Sanitary Authority, under the provisions of the Public Health Act, 1872) shall be transferred to and vested in the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Richmond (Surrey). Provided always that the piece of land, formerly part of Hill Common, in the said second Schedule mentioned, shall continue to be subject to the provisions of the 63rd section of the Richmond Local Act of 1784, and that the Grove-road Pleasure Ground, in the said second Schedule mentioned, shall continue to be used as a Public Recreation Ground, and for no other purpose. Provided also that the Council shall from time to time provide at the Vestry Hall in the said second Schedule mentioned, or in some other suitable building to be hereafter provided by the Council for their own purposes, such accommodation, rooms, and furniture, as may be necessary and proper for the due transaction of the business and convenient keeping of the records and documents of the vestry.

"10. All books, records, and documents belonging to the vestry at the commencement of the scheme, and relating exclusively to business or property to be retained by the vestry, shall be retained by the vestry, but, save as aforesaid, all books, records, and documents belonging to the vestry, at the commencement of this Scheme, shall be delivered to, and retained by, and be the property of the Council of the said Borough. Provided always that the vestry and its officers authorized by the vestry for this purpose shall have power at all reasonable times to inspect and take copies of, or extracts from, such parts of the books, records, and documents so to be delivered to the said Council, as relate to any business or property retained by the vestry, and to require the same to be produced in any court of law or before any arbitrator or referee.

"11. The Mayor Aldermen and Burgesses of

the borough of Richmond (Surrey) acting by the Council as the Sanitary Authority of the said borough shall be substituted for the vestry in the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 5) Act 1887 and the Richmond Order scheduled thereto and the Mayor of the said borough shall be substituted for the chairman of the vestry on the Richmond Main Sewerage Board and in the said Act and Order. Provided that the vestrymen who at the commencement of this scheme may be elective members of the said Board shall respectively continue to hold their offices until their death resignation or removal or the expiration of their term of office (as the case may be).

"12. All legal proceedings and rights of suit or to commence legal proceedings at the commencement of this Scheme commenced by or against attaching to or vested in the vestry in relation to any rights interests powers duties obligations property or liabilities by this Scheme transferred shall or may be continued or commenced by or against and shall attach to or vest in the Corporation or body to whom such transfer is by this Scheme made.

"13. The accounts of the vestry shall be (as soon as conveniently may be) audited by the proper officers of the Local Government Board in like manner and subject to the like powers, duties, provisions, and right of appeal as if the Charter had not been granted, the provisions of section 247 of the Public Health Act, 1875, as amended by the District Auditors Act, 1879, and any regulations duly issued by the Local Government Board with respect to the audit of accounts of an Urban Authority not being the Council of a borough and of their officers shall apply to such audit; and the provisions of this Scheme with respect to the vestry shall be construed so as to admit of such exceptions as may be necessary to enable such audit to be duly made, but such exceptions shall be strictly limited in time, extent, character, and operation to the purposes of such audit.

"14. All bye-laws before the commencement of this Scheme made by the vestry and confirmed by the Local Government Board under the powers of the Public Health Act 1875 vested in the said bodies respectively and in force within the parish of Richmond immediately before the commencement of this Scheme shall continue in full force and operation notwithstanding the grant of the Charter and the making of this Scheme and as though the Corporation and their officers were or referred to in the said bye-laws instead of the vestry and their officers respectively.

"15. In case any question shall arise in consequence or by reason of the making of this Scheme as to the constitution election qualification or continuance in office of the vestry or any members thereof or as to any vacancies in the vestry or in respect of the matters aforesaid or anything connected therewith or dependent thereon then such question shall be referred to and decided by the Local Government Board whose decision shall be final and conclusive and all things shall be had and done in accordance with such decision.

"16. In case any officer of the said vestry, who shall have been employed by the said vestry for a period of five years, shall lose his office by reason of the grant of the said Charter and the operation of this Scheme and shall not be employed by the Council of the said borough, nor offered by the said Council a position in their employ of a similar character, and of an equal value to that formerly held by him, he shall be entitled to be

paid, by way of compensation for the loss of his position, out of the funds of or under the control of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Richmond (Surrey) acting by the Council as the Urban Sanitary Authority for the said Municipal Borough, such annual allowance and for such period or such gratuity as on a full consideration of the circumstances of the case may seem to the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury to be a reasonable and just compensation for the loss of his position, and the said Commissioners in awarding the said compensation shall be guided by the principles which would be applicable in the case of an award of compensation under the provisions of 'The Superannuation Act, 1859,' to a person retiring or removed from the public service in consequence of the abolition of his office. Provided that no special Minute within the meaning of the said Act stating any special grounds for granting such allowance shall be necessary or be made. Provided, nevertheless, that if any such officer be employed by the said Council in such an office as aforesaid and discharged by them (otherwise than for misconduct) within two years of the ninth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, he shall be entitled to compensation in the same manner as if he had not been employed by the said Council. Provided that the term 'Officer' shall include only persons employed by the said vestry whose salaries or emoluments are payable at intervals of not less than three weeks, and no other persons. Provided also that the said Lords Commissioners shall be the sole judges as to the right or claim of any officer to any compensation whatever, and as to the amount thereof, and the said Lords Commissioners shall be the only judges upon any question whatever which may arise under this clause, and further, every determination of the said Lords Commissioners upon any such right, claim, amount, or question shall be absolutely final and conclusive, and every statement or reference to any matter aforesaid, made at any time in writing, and signed by any two of the said Lords Commissioners for the time being, shall be final and conclusive upon any person claiming under or by virtue of this clause and upon the said Corporation.

" SCHEDULE I.

" Extent to which the vestry is to continue entitled to or bound by the Act or to exercise carry out or use the provisions thereof as mentioned in Clause 4 of the Scheme.

"All such parts of Sections 22 to 28 (inclusive) 38, 39, 40 to 46 (inclusive) as relate to the poor rate and poor and are in force before the date of this Scheme and all such powers duties liabilities obligations and rights contained in or consequential upon the said sections as relate to the poor rate and poor and are in force before the date of this Scheme.

"Sections 47, 48, 49, 51, 52, 53, 54, 55, 56, 57, 58, 59, 60, 61, 65, 66, 69, 70, 71, 72, 73, 74, 75, and 76 so far as the same are still in force and so far as the same relate to the vestry or their officers or property.

"Section 50, so far as it relates to officers or property of the vestry.

"Sections 62 to 64 inclusive (except so far as they relate to the property mentioned in clause 9 of the Scheme).

"The Richmond Vicarage Act, 1849. "The whole Act."

SCHEDULE II.

"1. All that piece or parcel of land formerly part of a common known as Hill Common, containing nine acres and three roods or thereabouts, lying on the side of the Hill in Richmond in the county of Surrey, and adjoining N.E. upon the Upper Highway leading from the town of Richmond to Richmond Park and the village of Petersham, and containing in length on this side 256 yards S.W. in part upon the lower highway leading from Richmond to Petersham, and containing in length so far as it adjoins the said lower highway 173 yards, and in other part on the public pleasure ground known as the Terrace Gardens and containing in length so far as it adjoins the said pleasure grounds 109 yards N.W. on the Terrace Gardens aforesaid, and containing in length so far as it adjoins the said garden 133 yards and 84 yards S.E. upon certain freehold (formerly copyhold) coach-houses stable and garden ground formerly in the occupation of the Duke of Buccleuch, and upon a freehold (formerly copyhold) messuage and garden ground formerly in the occupation of Elizabeth Hunt, and upon a freehold (formerly copyhold) messuage coach-houses stables and garden of the Trustees of William Hickey (deceased) devised by him for charitable uses and containing in length on this S.E. side from the said Upper Highway to the said Lower Highway 214 yards which said piece of land was (with another property then known as Pesthouse Common) granted to the vestry by his late Majesty King George III and his Royal Consort Queen Charlotte by Deed dated the 18th day of October 1786 and enrolled the 8th day of November, 1786.

"2. All that piece or parcel of land situate in and abutting on Grove-road, Richmond aforesaid formerly part of certain common or waste lands called Pesthouse Common granted to the vestry as aforesaid, but some time since separated therefrom and appropriated for and now used and enjoyed as a public pleasure ground and called or known as the Grove-road Pleasure Ground, and

containing by estimation 1 acre 0 roods 39 poles or thereabouts.

"3. All that piece or parcel of land situated in and abutting on Paradise-road, Richmond aforesaid with the erection or building thereon known as the Vestry Hall, and also the cottage or tenement with the outbuildings and yard in the rear thereof, and the garden attached thereto on part whereof is erected the parish mortuary, which last-mentioned land was acquired by the vestry in or about the year 1790.

THE following scheme for the adjustment of the property, rights, privileges &c. of the Bournemouth Commissioners and for other purposes, as settled by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, is published in pursuance of the Municipal Corporations Act 1882:—

"Whereas by the Municipal Corporation Act, 1882, it is enacted that where a petition for a Charter of Incorporation is referred to the Committee of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and it is proposed by the Charter to extend the Municipal Corporation Acts to the Municipal Borough to be created by the Charter, the said Committee of Council may settle a scheme for the purposes in the said Act named and containing such provisions as are in the said Act particularized.

"And whereas certain inhabitant householders of the town of Bournemouth, in the county of Southampton, have petitioned Her Majesty the Queen, praying for the grant of a Charter of Incorporation.

"And whereas the said petition for a Charter has been referred to the Committee of Council, and it is proposed to create the said town within the limits set forth in the Charter in that behalf a Municipal Borough, and to incorporate the inhabitants thereof, and by the Charter to extend the Municipal Corporation Acts to the Municipal Borough to be created by the Charter.

"And whereas by the Bournemouth Improvement Act, 1856, it was enacted amongst other things that that Act should be carried into execution by means of thirteen Commissioners to be called 'The Bournemouth Commissioners,' and to be incorporated by the name of 'The Bournemouth Commissioners.' And that the limits within which the said Act shall be put in force shall be as is therein specified.

"And whereas the said limits have from time to time by authority of Parliament been extended, and the said limits are co-extensive with the limits of the Municipal Borough created by the said Charter.

"And whereas by the said Act, power was given to the said Commissioners to make and maintain a pier and works as therein mentioned, and to levy from every person who should land from, or embark in any boat or vessel at or from the pier (other than Government packets), and from any person who should be upon, or who should otherwise use the said pier, or should lade or unlade thereat any of the goods, articles, or things mentioned in the Schedule A to the said Act annexed such sum as they should appoint not exceeding in any case the sums mentioned in the said Schedule A. And also to demand and receive from the owner or other person having the control of any boat or vessel making fast to, or remaining

at the said pier any sum not exceeding the sum specified in Schedule B to the said Act annexed.

"And whereas the said Commissioners were empowered by the said Act to borrow not exceeding five thousand pounds for the purpose of the said pier and works on mortgage of the General Improvement Rate, and, all tolls thereby authorized to be levied. And whereas by the said Act power was given to the Commissioners to provide markets. And the sections of the Markets and Fairs Clauses Act, 1847, with respect to the holding of the market or fair, and the protection thereof and with respect to weighing goods or carts, and with respect to the stallages, rents, and tolls to be taken by the undertakers, and with respect to the Bye-laws to be made by the undertakers were incorporated with the said Act. And power was given to the Commissioners to levy from every person using any market house or market place established by them such sums as they should appoint not exceeding in any case, the sums mentioned in the Schedules C and D to the said Act annexed. And power to let such markets and tolls.

"And whereas by Indenture bearing date, the seventh day of February, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, and made between the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty of the first part, the Honourable Charles Alexander Gore, the Commissioner of Her Majesty's Woods, Forests, and Land Revenues to whom the management and direction of certain parts of the Land Revenues of the Crown including among other parts thereof the land and hereditaments thereafter described together with the duties and powers appertaining thereto had been assigned by order under the hands of two of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury on behalf of Her Majesty of the second part, and the Bournemouth Commissioners incorporated by The Bournemouth Improvement Act of the third part. All that piece, or parcel of land, being part of the bed or shore of the sea below low water mark, situate at Bournemouth in the county of Southampton and extending in a direct line to a distance of 250 yards or thereabouts, and being of the width of 120 ft. or thereabouts, which piece or parcel of land was delineated and coloured red on the plan of the Indenture now in recital. Together with the rights, members, and appurtenances to the hereditaments and premises expressed to be thereby granted belonging or appertaining, was conveyed unto and to the use of the said Bournemouth Commissioners, their successors and assigns for ever for the purposes of the said Bournemouth Improvement Act.

"And whereas by indenture dated the fifth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and made between Sir George Elliott Meyrick Tapps Gervis of the first part, Sir Richard Frederick and Owen John Augustus Fuller Meyrick of the second part, the said Owen John Augustus Fuller Meyrick and Edward Leigh Pemberton of the third part, and the Bournemouth Commissioners (incorporated under the Bournemouth Improvement Act, 1856), of the fourth part. All that strip of Sea Beach and piece of land situate on the east side and at and near the mouth of the Bourne Stream at Bournemouth in the parishes of Christchurch and Holdenhurst, or one of them in the county of Southampton delineated with the measurements and abutments on the plan or map in the margin of the Indenture now in recital and thereon coloured red and containing one acre two roods and twenty-eight poles, being part of the lands numbered 1, 2, 3, and 4 on the said map or plan, and in the book of reference relating to the said pier deposited in the office

of the Clerk of the Peace for the said county of Southampton, together with the appurtenances, was conveyed unto the said Bournemouth Commissioners, their successors and assigns for ever.

"And whereas the said Commissioners duly constructed a pier and works in connection therewith, as authorized by the said Act, upon the said pieces or parcels of land so as aforesaid conveyed to them under or by virtue of the said two herein before recited Indentures, or on some part thereof, And whereas the said Commissioners borrowed the principal sum of five thousand pounds for the purpose of the said pier upon mortgage of the General Improvement Rate and the tolls by the said Act authorized to be levied, and which sum has since been wholly paid off.

"And whereas in the year 1867, the Commissioners adopted the Local Government Act, 1858.

"And whereas by virtue of the Local Government Supplemental Act, 1869, and the Local Government Boards Provisional Orders Confirmation (Bilborough, &c.) Act, 1876, the number of the said Commissioners has been increased from thirteen to seventeen.

"And whereas the Bournemouth Commissioners are an Urban Sanitary Authority under the Public Health Act, 1875, and the District for which they act is an Urban Sanitary District.

"And whereas by a Provisional Order under the Seal of the Local Government Board bearing date the fourth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight, and confirmed by the Local Government Boards Provisional Orders Confirmation (Bournemouth, &c.) Act, 1878, after reciting that in consequence of the damage caused to the said pier by storms, it was desirable to construct a new pier in its place, power was given to the said Commissioners to construct and maintain on a site, and according to plans and sections approved or to be approved by the Board of Trade, a pier and works connected therewith in lieu of the said pier and works connected therewith so as aforesaid constructed by them, and might, subject to the sanction of the Local Government Board, borrow on the security of the General District Rate of their district such amount as might be required for the purpose, not exceeding in the whole thirty thousand pounds. And it was provided that the provisions in the said Bournemouth Improvement Act, 1856, contained and the provisions of other Acts incorporated therewith, including the power to levy tolls, rates, and charges should apply to the said new pier, and the works connected therewith, in lieu of the pier in the said Improvement Act mentioned.

"And whereas the said Commissioners have constructed a new pier and works connected therewith, upon the site of the old pier, or upon some part thereof, in lieu of the said pier and works mentioned in the said Improvement Act, in accordance with the powers conferred by the said Provisional Order of 1878, and the said confirming Act of 1878. And the said Commissioners have borrowed for that purpose on the security of the General District Rate, sums amounting in the whole to twenty-eight thousand three hundred and eighty pounds.

"And whereas on the twenty-fifth day of March last, the principal sum of twenty-two thousand three hundred and sixty pounds six shillings and sevenpence, part of the said sum of twenty-eight thousand three hundred and eighty pounds only was due upon such security.

"And whereas by another Provisional Order under the Seal of the Local Government Board,

bearing date the fourth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, and confirmed by the Local Government Boards Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 6) Act, 1884, power was given to the said Commissioners to make Bye-laws for the purpose of regulating bathing in the sea without machines, and for requiring the proprietors or persons in charge of bathing machines, to provide boats and other apparatus for the preservation of persons from drowning. And power was thereby also given to the Commissioners to erect and maintain on the said pier, shelters for the accommodation of visitors.

"And by the same order power was given to the said Commissioners to erect and maintain in the public pleasure grounds band-stands, and such other erections as might be necessary for the more convenient use and occupation of the said grounds and also to provide and maintain at a reasonable cost or contribute a reasonable sum towards providing and maintaining a band for the performance of music on the said pier and in the said public pleasure grounds.

"And whereas the said Commissioners have duly constructed such shelters on the said pier, and have also erected in the public pleasure grounds certain band-stands and other erections, for the more convenient use and enjoyment of the said grounds.

"And whereas by a Provisional Order under the Seal of the Local Government Board, bearing date the twenty-eighth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, and confirmed by the Local Government Boards Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 7) Act, 1887, powers were given to the said Commissioners to make Bye-laws and Regulations, with respect to carriages plying for hire and carrying passengers at separate fares, within the said district.

"And whereas the said Commissioners have recently obtained an Act of Parliament entitled 'The Bournemouth Park Act, 1889,' providing for the acquisition and regulation of certain lands within and near the district of the said Commissioners for the purposes of Public Recreation Grounds.

"And whereas the said Commissioners constitute a local authority within the meaning of Part XI of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882.

"And whereas it is expedient right and just that a scheme should be settled, pursuant to Part XI of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, containing the provisions hereinafter contained.

"Now therefore the said Committee of Council have settled a scheme containing the provisions hereinafter set forth and do hereby direct order and declare as follows :

"(1.) This scheme may be cited for all purposes as the 'Borough of Bournemouth Scheme, 1890.'

"(2.) This scheme shall come into operation on the day of the first meeting of the Council of the municipal borough created by the charter above referred to, or at the date of the confirmation of this scheme by Parliament or Order in Council, whichever is later, and this date is hereinafter referred to as 'the commencement of this scheme.'

"(3.) The municipal borough created by the said charter shall be placed immediately on from and after the day of the first meeting of the Council of the municipal borough aforesaid and thenceforward shall be within the jurisdiction of the Mayor Aldermen and Burgesses of the borough of Bournemouth acting by the Council of the said municipal borough as the sanitary authority of the said borough.

"(4.) The Bournemouth Commissioners and their powers duties rights obligations liabilities and privileges shall continue to exist until the commencement of this scheme unaffected in any manner whatsoever by the grant of the said charter or the creation of the said borough and the said Commissioners shall from the date of the grant of the charter until such commencement be deemed to have continued and continue to enjoy, be subject to and exercise the said powers duties rights obligations liabilities and privileges as if no such charter had been granted and all their acts from the date of the grant of the said charter until the commencement of this scheme shall be and be deemed to have been as valid and effectual as if no such charter had been granted.

"(5.) Immediately from, and after the commencement of this scheme, the Bournemouth Commissioners shall be, and the same are hereby abolished, and shall thenceforth be dissolved and cease to exist together with such of their powers, rights, privileges, jurisdiction, franchises, exemptions, duties and obligations, as are not by this scheme or otherwise by law or statute transferred to the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Bournemouth.

"(6.) All property possessed by, or vested in the Bournemouth Commissioners, or any person or body in trust for them, or any of their members, as such, or applicable for the benefit or under the direction of the Bournemouth Commissioners or any of their members as such (and not dealt with or transferred by or under any other part of this scheme) shall vest in the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Bournemouth, and shall be held and applied for the municipal and public purposes of the said borough.

"(7.) All liabilities which immediately before the commencement of this Scheme attached to, and were enforceable against the Bournemouth Commissioners, or the property thereof shall attach to, and be enforceable against the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Bournemouth.

"(8.) Any investigation, legal proceeding, or remedy in respect of any debt, liability, penalty, or forfeiture, due to or incurred by or on behalf of the Bournemouth Commissioners before the commencement of this Scheme, may be continued prosecuted or enforced by or against the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Bournemouth.

"(9.) The term property in this Scheme means and includes all property real and personal, and all things in action and all rights of common or commonable rights, and rights to toll, and all franchises, privileges, and rights which have any pecuniary value, and all charters, records, deeds, books and documents, and all rights, and all claims to relief and all rights to avoid contracts, or otherwise, and includes any estate or interest, legal or equitable, in or in respect of any property so defined.

"(10.) Nothing contained in this scheme shall prejudice or affect the rights, interest, powers, authorities or privileges transferred to the management of the Board of Trade by the Crown Lands Act, 1866, neither shall anything in this scheme contained extend to take away prejudice diminish or alter any of the estates, rights, privileges, powers or authorities vested in, or enjoyed or exercisable by the Queen's Majesty, Her heirs or successors.

"(11.) All the rights, property, powers, authorities, privileges, duties and liabilities conferred upon, vested in, devolving upon, or exercisable by the Bournemouth Commissioners by for the

purposes of pursuant to or under the said Bournemouth Improvement Act of 1856, and the Acts incorporated therewith and any Act or Acts amending the same, and the Bournemouth Park Act 1889 and any Provisional Order or Orders confirmed by Parliament, as the same now exist, including all property referred to or mentioned in the recitals to this Scheme, shall go to vest in, be exercisable by, and attach to, and be enforceable by or against (as the case may be) the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Bournemouth. And the said Mayor Aldermen and Burgesses of the borough of Bournemouth shall be substituted for the Bournemouth Commissioners in and under the said Acts and Orders and in relation to the matters aforesaid and all Bye-laws or Orders made under or in pursuance of the Public Health Act, 1875, of the said Local Acts or Orders or any of them shall continue in force and be enforced in the said borough to the same extent in which they are now in force and enforceable within the district of the said Commissioners substituting only the said Mayor Aldermen and Burgesses of the borough of Bournemouth and their officers for the Bournemouth Commissioners and their officers.

"(12.) All rights interests powers duties property obligations and liabilities whatsoever of the Bournemouth Commissioners as the Urban Sanitary Authority of their district and under or by virtue of the Public Health Act 1875 and any Act or Acts amending or extending the same and the Sanitary Acts (as by the Public Health Act 1875 defined) and of any local or general Act for purposes the same as or similar to those of the Acts aforesaid or any of them shall be transferred to vest in attach to and be exercisable by the Mayor Aldermen and Burgesses of the borough of Bournemouth acting by the Council as the Sanitary Authority of the said borough and all bye-laws and orders made under the said Acts or any of them shall continue in force and to be enforced in the said borough to the same extent to which they are now in force and enforceable within the district of the said Commissioners substituting only the said Mayor Aldermen and Burgesses of the borough of Bournemouth and their officers for the Bournemouth Commissioners and their officers.

"(13.) Nothing in this Scheme shall in any way or respect abridge affect or diminish the operation of Section three hundred and ten of the Public Health Act, 1875.

"(14.) The accounts of the Bournemouth Commissioners and of their officers shall be (as soon as conveniently may be) audited by the proper officer of the Local Government Board in like manner and subject to the like powers duties provisions and right of appeal as if the charter had not been granted; the provisions of Sections two hundred and forty-seven and two hundred and fifty of the Public Health Act 1875 as amended by the District Auditors Act 1879 and any regulations duly issued by the Local Government Board with respect to the audit of accounts of Improvement Commissioners and of their officers shall apply to such audit; and the provisions of this Scheme with respect to the said Commissioners shall be construed so as to admit of such exceptions as may be necessary to enable such audit to be duly made but such exceptions shall be strictly limited in time extent character and operation to the purposes of such audit.

"(15.) In case any of the officers of the Bournemouth Commissioners, who shall have been employed by them for a period of at least five years, shall not be employed by the Council of

the said borough, nor offered by the said Council a position in their employ of a similar character, and of an equal value to that formerly held by him, he shall be entitled to be paid by way of compensation for the loss of his position out of the funds of, or under the control of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Bournemouth, acting by the Council, as the Urban Sanitary Authority for the said Municipal Borough, such annual allowance or gratuity as on a full consideration of the circumstances of the case, may seem to the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, to be a reasonable and just compensation for the loss of his position, and the said Commissioners in awarding the said compensation, shall be guided by the principles which would be applicable in the case of an award of compensation, under the provisions of the Superannuation Act, 1859, to a person retiring or removed from the public service in consequence of the abolition of his office, provided that no special minute within the meaning of the said Act, stating any special grounds for granting such allowance shall be necessary or be made, and provided, nevertheless that if any such officer be so employed by the said Council, and discharged by them for any other cause than inefficiency, breach of duty, or misconduct, within two years after the commencement of this scheme, he shall be entitled to compensation in the same manner as if he had not been employed by the said Council. Provided also that the term 'Officer' shall include only all salaried persons employed by the Bournemouth Commissioners, whose salaries or emoluments are payable at intervals of not less than one month.

"The said Lords Commissioners shall be the sole and final judges of any question whatever which may arise under this clause, whether as to the amount, character of, or right to, any compensation or otherwise howsoever, and no officer shall have any right or claim, except such as the said Lords Commissioners may decide he has. Any determination of the said Lords Commissioners made or certified by any two of them shall be final, unquestionable, and conclusive."
