

street pay to the incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Saint John the Evangelist-in-the-East the annual sum of one hundred pounds. No other alteration shall be made in the endowments of the said benefices or either of them.

"That no alteration shall be made in the patronage of the said benefices or either of them.

#### " CONSENTS.

We the Right Reverend Frederick Lord Bishop of London being the patron or person entitled in right of the Bishoprick of London to present to the benefice of Saint Matthew Pell-street, in the county of Middlesex and diocese of London the same being now vacant and also to the benefice of Saint John the Evangelist-in-the-East in the same county and diocese if the same were now vacant and I the Reverend George Thomas Cull Bennett Clerk Incumbent of the said benefice of Saint John the Evangelist-in-the-East do hereby respectively signify to Your Grace our consents to the scheme above proposed and set forth and to every matter and thing therein contained.

"In testimony whereof we have hereunto respectively set our hands this eighth day of April one thousand eight hundred and ninety.

And whereas the said scheme hath been transmitted by the said Bishop to the said Archbishop for his consideration;

And whereas the said Archbishop, being satisfied with the said scheme, hath certified the same and the consents aforesaid to Her Majesty in Council, by his report dated the twelfth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, which said report is in the words and figures following:—

"To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Edward White Archbishop of the province of Canterbury do hereby report to Your Majesty in Council:—

"That the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Frederick Lord Bishop of London has represented unto us (amongst other things):

"That there is in the county of Middlesex and diocese of London the benefice (being a vicarage and new parish or perpetual curacy) of Saint Matthew Pell-street within the original limits of the parish of Saint George-in-the-East.

"That there is also in the county of Middlesex and diocese of London the benefice (being a vicarage and new parish or perpetual curacy) of Saint John the Evangelist-in-the-East also within the original limits of the said parish of Saint George-in-the-East.

"That the new parish of Saint Matthew Pell-street consists of two unequal portions one on the north and the other on the south side of a street called Cable-street. The northern portion contains about two thousand people and is contiguous on two sides to the new parish of Saint John the Evangelist-in-the-East aforesaid. The population of this portion of the said new parish of Saint Matthew Pell-street will soon be considerably diminished by the widening of the Blackwall Railway which runs through it.

"That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that under the provisions of the Act first and second Victoria chapter one hundred and six, and of the Act second and third Victoria chapter forty-nine, the said northern portion of the said new parish of Saint Matthew Pell-street may be advantageously separated from that new parish and be annexed to

the said contiguous new parish of Saint John the Evangelist-in-the-East.

"That the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist-in-the-East can without inconvenience receive this accession of population.

"That it is proposed to deal with the remaining portion of the new parish of Saint Matthew Pell-street by a future scheme.

"That the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him the proposed alterations may best be effected and how the changes consequent upon such alterations in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested which scheme together with the consents thereto in writing of the said Lord Bishop as the patron of both the said benefices and of the incumbent of the benefice of Saint John the Evangelist-in-the-East (the said benefice of Saint Matthew Pell-street being now vacant) have been transmitted by the said Lord Bishop to us for our consideration.

"The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consents before referred to are hereunto annexed.

"And we the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said scheme do hereby pursuant to the Act of the first and second years of Your Majesty's reign chapter one hundred and six certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said scheme into effect.

#### PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that for the protection of the public health the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds
