WHEREAS by an Act passed in the forty-fifth and forty-sixth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "The Militia Act, 1882," it is, amongst other things, enacted that, save as therein otherwise provided, the Militia shall be trained and exercised for not less than twenty-one days and not more than twenty-eight days in every year, at such times and at such places in every part of the United Kingdom as

Her Majesty may appoint, and also that Her Majesty may from time to time, with the advice of Her Privy Council, order that the period of training and exercise in any year, of all or any part of the Militia be extended, but so that the whole period of training and exercise be not more than fifty-six days :

And whereas it is expedient that the training of the Yorkshire Artillery Militia, Western Division, Royal Artillery, and the Wicklow Artillery Militia, Southern Division, Royal Artillery, and also of the Royal Anglesea Engineer Militia, Fortress Forces, Royal Engineers, the Royal Monmouthshire Engineer Militia, Fortress Forces, Royal Engineers, and of the several Divisions of the Engineer Militia, Submarine Miners, Royal Engineers, should be extended beyond the period of twenty-eight days for the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety :

Now therefore, Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and direct that the period of training and exercise of the before-mentioned Regiments of Artillery Militia, and Regiments and Divisions of Engineer Militia, shall, for the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety, be extended, under the provisions of the before-cited Act, from twenty-eight days to the number of days in each case herein-after mentioned, that is to say :—

WHEREAS by section seven of "The County Courts Act 1888" it is provided that—

"If the Council of any city or borough, or a majority of the ratepayers of any parish, within the limits of which a court of local jurisdiction, other than a County Court, is established, or into the limits of which city, borough, or parish the jurisdiction of such court of local jurisdiction shall extend, shall petition Her Majesty in Council that the jurisdiction of such court of local jurisdiction may be excluded in any causes whereof the County Court has cognizance and if notice of such petition shall be given two months before it is presented by public advertisement in such city borough or parish and in some newspaper therein circulated, Her Majesty, by Order in Council, may declare the exclusion of the jurisdiction of such court of local jurisdiction throughout the whole or any part of the district assigned or which may hereafter be assigned to such County Court, if no petition against declaring the exclusion is presented and no caveat entered at the Council Office; and if any counter-petition is presented, or any caveat entered, then Her Majesty may refer such petition and counter-petition to the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council, upon whose report Her Majesty may make such Order in Council as she shall be advised touching the matter of the said petitions in respect of excluding the jurisdiction of such court of local jurisdiction, and may award compensation to any persons entitled to appoint officers of such court, or to any officers thereof appointed before the passing of this Act, to be given by the Treasury, who are hereby empowered to pay the same."

And whereas the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the city of York, being the Council of the said city by their petition, dated the sixth day of March one thousand eight hundred and ninety, humbly prayed that Her Majesty would be pleased to issue an Order excluding the jurisdiction of the Court of Record of the city of York in all actions for the recovery of sums not exceeding ten pounds in respect of which the County Court has cognizance, which petition sets forth:—

"That York is a city and county of itself, and possesses a Court of Record, of which Court the Recorder of the city is the Judge.

"That such Court is one of the most ancient institutions of the city, there being records of its proceedings for centuries past. Its procedure is regulated under the Common Law Procedure Acts, and it has jurisdiction in actions of debt and damages to an unlimited amount within the city, but, as a matter of practice, it is chiefly resorted to by tradesmen for the recovery of small debts, very few trials of disputed actions or of cases where important principles are involved taking place owing, in great measure, if not wholly, to the infrequency of the sittings of the Court (the Court only sitting once a quarter), and to the cumbrous and antiquated pleadings under the old Common Law Procedure Acts, which are incident to every action, and necessarily entail considerable cost and delay, without any corresponding advantage to suitors.

"That although the Court is extensively resorted to for the recovery of small debts, yet the advantages gained by plaintiffs are secured at a great and altogether disproportionate cost to the

debtors, the fees and charges incident to the procedure of the Court being exceedingly and unreasonably heavy not only in connection with the issue of the writ, and the proceedings to judgment, but also on the commitment summonses obtained after judgment.

"That the Court fees and solicitors' costs, and also the fees payable to the bailiff of the Court on executing warrants in respect of small debts are much in excess of those allowed by the County Court.

"That section one hundred and seventeen of the County Courts Act, 1888, reduces the costs payable in actions for sums under ten pounds to the County Court scale in those cases only where a verdict is recovered, but the costs in actions settled out of Court, or in which judgment is obtained by default, are allowed according to the scale of the Court of Record. These latter actions are by far the more numerous, and consequently the beneficial operation of the above section is only limited in extent.

"That numerous complaints have been made to your petitioners by debtors of the great hardships suffered by them owing to the excessive costs imposed upon them in actions brought in the Court.

"That if the powers of the Court of Record were restricted to actions of ten pounds and upwards, the hardships referred to in the case of small debts would be removed, and the recovery thereof would consequently be sought for in the County Court where the costs are allowed in more reasonable proportion to the amount at issue."

And whereas notice of the said petition was duly given two months before it was presented by public advertisement in the said city and county, and in a newspaper therein circulated;

And whereas no petition against declaring the exclusion prayed has been presented, and no caveat has been entered at the Council Office;

And whereas the provisions of the County Courts Act one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight have been in all respects observed and complied with;

Her Majesty having taken the said petition into consideration is pleased by and with the advice of Her Privy Council to accede to the prayer thereof, and to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared that from and after the thirtieth day of June one thousand eight hundred and ninety the jurisdiction of the said Court of Record of the city of York shall be excluded throughout the whole of the district assigned, or which may hereafter be assigned, to the County Court of Yorkshire holden at York in all causes whereof the said County Court hath, for the time being, by law cognizance, and wherein the debt or damages sought to be recovered shall not exceed the sum of ten pounds. Whereof the Judge and Officers of the said Court of Record, and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

Board, being the Harbour Trust or Body Corporate owning or exercising jurisdiction upon the waters of the River Mersey, was pleased to make certain Rules, set forth in the schedule thereto, concerning the lights or signals to be carried, and concerning the steps for avoiding collision to be taken, by vessels navigating the River Mersey.

And whereas the said Mersey Docks and Harbour Board have applied to Her Majesty in Council to make, and have submitted for approval, certain new Rules concerning the lights or signals to be carried, and concerning the steps for avoiding collision to be taken, by vessels navigating the River Mersey, to be substituted for and in lieu of the Rules set forth in the schedule to the said recited Order in Council of the third day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight; and in such new Rules there are embodied, subject to certain exceptions and additions therein mentioned; the "Regulations for Preventing Collisions at Sea," made in pursuance of "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862," and which may from time to time be in force.

And whereas the new Rules so submitted as aforesaid appear to be reasonable and proper.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers in Her vested by the said recited Act, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to revoke the said Order so made on the third day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, and is pleased to make in lieu of the Rules to the said Order annexed the said new Rules which are set forth in the schedule hereto, and Her Majesty doth hereby direct that the same shall come into operation from the date of the present Order.

SCHEDULE.

RULES concerning the Lights or Signals to be carried, and concerning the steps for avoiding Collision to be taken, by Vessels navigating the River Mersey.

1. Every vessel exceeding ten tons measurement, including river craft, while navigating, or anchored, or moored in any part of the River Mersey, shall, on and after the seventeenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, observe and obey the "Regulations for Preventing Collisions at Sea," made in pursuance of "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862," and which may from time to time be in force, with the exceptions and additions mentioned in the following Rules.

2. Canal flats and all other vessels without masts, whilst being towed, shall carry the lights prescribed for sailing vessels by Article 6 of the said "Regulations for Preventing Collisions at Sea."

3. In addition to the lights for a steam vessel towing another vessel, prescribed by Article 4 of the said Regulations, such steam vessel shall carry a bright white light showing astern as a guiding light to the vessel or vessels being towed.

4. Every vessel when at anchor shall carry the white light prescribed by Article 8 of the said Regulations, at a height not exceeding twenty feet above the hull, suspended from the forestay, or otherwise near the bow where it may be best seen, and, in addition to the said light, all vessels having two or more masts shall exhibit another similar white light at double the height of the bow light, at the main or mizen peak, or on the boom topping lift, or other position near the stern, where it can be best seen.

5. Every vessel, whether over or under ten tons net register, having on board any explosive, except ship's ammunition, shall also, when at

anchor, exhibit a red light, in a globular lantern not less than ten inches in diameter, over the forward light white prescribed by Article 8 of the said Regulations.

6. Instead of the light prescribed by Article 11 of the said Regulations, a bright white light shall be shown continuously between sunset and sunrise in all weathers, on board every vessel while under way and in motion. Such light shall be of such a character as to be visible on a dark night with a clear atmosphere at a distance of at least one mile; it shall be so constructed as to show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of twelve points of the compass, and it shall be so fixed as to throw the light right astern and for six points therefrom on each quarter of the vessel.

7. A vessel anchored to mark the position of a wreck or other obstruction, shall carry in all weathers from sunset to sunrise, two bright white lights, in globular lanterns of not less than eight inches in diameter, and so constructed as to show a clear, uniform, and unbroken light visible all round the horizon for at least one mile, which lights shall be placed horizontally on a cross yard on the foremast, at a height not exceeding twenty feet above the hull and twenty feet apart, and the said vessel shall carry, in all weathers between sunrise and sunset, two black balls placed as hereinbefore ordered with regard to the lights afore-mentioned.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting under the provisions of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Your Majesty, chapter ninety-four, of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Your Majesty, chapter ninety-four, and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty, chapter ninety-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme or Representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Christ Church Lower Nutfield, in the county of Surrey and in the diocese of Rochester.

"Whereas by an instrument bearing date the twenty-second day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight and being under the common seal of us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners and under the hand and seal of the Right Reverend Anthony Wilson, Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester a part of the parish of Nutfield in the said county of Surrey, and diocese of Rochester aforesaid, was assigned as a particular district to the consecrated church of Christ Church Lower Nutfield situate at Lower Nutfield within the limits of such parish and the same district was called 'The Particular District of Christ Church Lower Nutfield.'

"And whereas the said particular district of Christ Church Lower Nutfield has under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act and by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and by the above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty, chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas it has been represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the new parish of Christ Church Lower Nutfield should be altered in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Anthony Wilson Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries of the said new parish of Christ Church Lower Nutfield shall be altered so that all that isolated and detached portion of the parish of Blechingley in the county and diocese aforesaid which is described in the Schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended and is thereon coloured pink shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of Christ Church Lower Nutfield.

"And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore-mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory to be annexed to the new parish of Christ Church, Lower Nutfield, in the county of Surrey, and in the diocese of Rochester, being:—

"All that isolated and detached portion of the parish of Blechingley (wherein the farm house and buildings belonging to Ham Farm are situate) in the said county and diocese, which portion is bounded upon all sides as follows, that is to say:—upon the north and upon the east by the said new parish of Christ Church, Lower Nutfield, and upon the south, and upon the west, by the parish of Horley, in the county and diocese aforesaid."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme or representation have been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbents of the cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such scheme or representation and such patrons and incumbents have respectively signified their assent thereto.

And whereas the said scheme or representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct

that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Rochester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Chrysostom situate as aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Henry Bishop of the said diocese of Worcester (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of All Saints Birmingham which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Chrysostom situate as aforesaid and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Chrysostom, Birmingham.'

"And with the like consent of the said Henry Bishop of the said diocese of Worcester (testified as aforesaid) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Chrysostom situate as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that so long as the Reverend Percival Ewen Wilson, Clerk in Holy Orders the present rector or incumbent of the rectory of the said parish of All Saints Birmingham shall continue to be such rector or incumbent all the fees which may be received in respect of such publication, solemnization, or performance at the said church of Saint Chrysostom situate as aforesaid shall be paid over by the Minister thereof to the said Percival Ewen

Wilson; and, provided also, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto, as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Chrysostom, Birmingham, being:—

"All that part of the parish of All Saints Birmingham in the county of Warwick and in the diocese of Worcester wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls which is bounded upon the north-east by the new parish of Saint Michael Handsworth upon the north by the new parish of Saint James Handsworth upon the west by the new parish of Saint Matthew Smethwick all in the county of Stafford and in the diocese of Lichfield upon part of the south by the new parish of Saint Cuthbert Birmingham in the said county of Warwick and in the diocese of Worcester aforesaid and upon all other sides that is to say upon the remaining part of the south and upon the south-east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Cuthbert Birmingham from the parish of All Saints Birmingham aforesaid at the point where Foundry road Winson Green-road and Handsworth New-road all join and extending thence northward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of sixty yards or thereabouts to its junction with Lodge-road and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of fifty chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries the same road over the Soho Branch of the Birmingham and Wolverhampton Canal and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the said branch canal for a distance of nine chains or thereabouts thereby crossing the Birmingham Wolverhampton and Dudley Line of the Great Western Railway, to the north-eastern end of the same branch canal at Soho Wharf and continuing thence still north-eastward to and along the middle of Wharf-lane for a distance of five chains or thereabouts to its junction with Park-road, and continuing thence in precisely the same direction and in a straight line for a distance of nine-and-a-half chains or thereabouts (thereby passing between the houses called or known respectively as Number 239 Park-road and Number 241 Park-road, and crossing the Coal Depot of the London and North-Western Railway Company) to the boundary which divides the said parish of All Saints Birmingham from the new parish of Saint Michael Handsworth aforesaid."

There shall be repealed, revoked, and annulled on and as from the day upon which this Warrant comes into operation so much of the Warrant of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, dated the 22nd day of October, 1888, as relates to the transmission of Parcels by way of the United Kingdom between New South Wales, Victoria, and Western Australia, and any country or place mentioned in the said Warrant, or in the Schedule thereto.

Definition.

2.—(1.) In this Warrant the expression "Parcel" means a Postal Packet which is posted as a Parcel in accordance with the provisions of this Warrant, or any Warrant amending the same.

(2.) The expression "United Kingdom" includes the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man.

Places between which Parcels may be transmitted.

3. From and after the date when this Warrant comes into operation Parcels may be transmitted by the Post by way of the United Kingdom between any place mentioned in the first column of the schedule hereto and any country or place mentioned in the second column of the said schedule.

Rates of Postage.

4. On all Parcels transmitted by the Post under this Warrant from any place mentioned in the first column of the said schedule to any country or place mentioned in the second column of such schedule there shall be charged and paid the several rates of postage specified opposite the names of such last-mentioned countries or places respectively in the said schedule.

Maximum Dimensions and Weight.

5. Except by permission of the Postmaster-General there shall not be conveyed or tendered for conveyance by Post under this Warrant any Parcel exceeding in length two feet, or in length and girth measured together four feet (such girth being measured round the thickest part of such Parcel), or the maximum weight of which shall exceed that mentioned against the names of the several countries or places specified in the second column of the said schedule.

Mode of Posting.

6. Subject to the provisions of this Warrant, all Parcels shall be posted, forwarded, conveyed, and delivered, under and subject to the provisions

of the Warrants respectively relating to the Parcel Post between the United Kingdom and the place in which the Parcel is posted and to the Parcel Post between the United Kingdom and the country or place to which the Parcel shall be addressed, so far as such provisions are applicable.

7. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety.

The Court having, on the requisition of His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, considered the advisability of appointing, under the provisions contained in "The Isle of Man Harbours Act, 1883" (being an Act of the Imperial Parliament), the payment of a duty on passengers carried for hire by vessels entering or leaving the harbours of Douglas, Ramsey, Laxey, Port St. Mary, and Peel, at which harbours improvements have been made for which it is considered reasonable to charge such duty—

Resolved:—

That, subject to the approval of the Committee of Her Majesty's Privy Council for Trade, from and after the expiration of one calendar month after the publication of this resolution in the London Gazette, the following duty shall be payable by the owner or owners or master of each vessel entering or leaving any of the said harbours, that is to say:—

For every passenger carried for hire and embarked or disembarked at any of the said harbours, the sum of one penny:

Provided always, that as to vessels carrying passengers for hire between any one of the said harbours and any place being at a distance of not more than ten nautical miles from such harbour (such distance being calculated on the length of voyage), the duty payable in respect of each passenger shall be the sum of one halfpenny only:

Provided also, that such duty shall not be payable in respect of ferry or pleasure boats used or plying in or about any of the said harbours or any of the bays of Douglas, Ramsey, Laxey, Port St. Mary, and Peel, and licensed by the Isle of Man Harbour Commissioners:

Provided also, that as to any vessel carrying passengers for hire on any single voyage or

trip which begins and ends at any one of the said harbours the said duty shall be payable in respect of disembarkation only: and that as to any voyage between any two of the said harbours, the said duty shall be payable at each place in respect of disembarkation only: Provided also, that in the case of a voyage, usually termed a voyage or trip round the Island, the same shall, as to passengers who make the whole voyage, be considered as a single voyage or trip, notwithstanding that stoppages may be made and passengers permitted to land or embark during the course of the voyage at any place other than that at which the trip commences and ends.

Resolved—

That, on the foregoing Resolution commencing and taking effect, the Resolution of this Court, dated the 17th day of July, 1885, appointing a duty on passengers at Douglas and Ramsey, shall be and stand revoked.

Isle of Man Harbours Acts, 1874 and 1884.

THE following Resolution of the Court of Tynwald of the Isle of Man, was, on the 10th May, 1890, approved by the Committee of Her Majesty's Privy Council for Trade:—

At a Tynwald Court, holden at Douglas, the 11th day of March, 1890:—

This Court having, on the requisition of his Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, considered the advisability of appointing, under the provisions contained in the Isle of Man Harbours Act, 1874, and in the Isle of Man Harbours Act, 1884 (both being Acts of the Imperial Parliament), the payment of dues by vessels entering the harbours of this Isle, or on goods landed from vessels in any harbour, or any quay or pier—

Resolved:—

(1) That this Resolution shall relate to such parts only of the several Harbours of Castletown, Douglas, Peel, Ramsey, Port St. Mary, and Laxey, as are hereinafter described (that is to say):—

Castletown Harbour. The whole of the South Pier, commonly called the New Pier, and that part of the harbour which lies inside a straight line due north to the shore from the outer extremity of the said pier;

Douglas Harbour. The whole of the Victoria and Battery Piers, and that part of the harbour which lies inside a straight line drawn from the south-east end of the Victoria Pier to the north-west corner of the Battery Pier;

Peel Harbour. The whole of the outer Breakwater, and that part of the harbour which lies inside a straight line drawn from the outer end of the Breakwater, and at right angles to such Breakwater, in a southerly direction, to the shore;

Ramsey Harbour. The whole of the new Iron Pier, and of the South and North Piers, and that part of the harbour which lies within a straight line drawn from the extreme outer end of the South Pier to the extreme outer end of the North Pier;

Port St. Mary Harbour. The whole of the Alfred Pier, and that part of the harbour which lies within a straight line drawn from the extreme outer end of the said pier, north-west or thereabouts, to the gate entering into Chapel Bay;

Laxey Harbour. The whole of the existing pier,

and that part of the harbour lying within the line of the south side of such pier produced until it meets at right angles a line drawn through the iron beacon on the Carrick Rock;

all such parts of the said respective harbours hereinbefore described being hereinafter called or referred to as "the said harbours":

(2) That, subject to the approval of the Lords of the Committee of Her Majesty's Privy Council for Trade, from and after the expiration of one calendar month after the publication of this Resolution in the London Gazette, the following dues shall be payable by vessels entering any of the said harbours, or using any of the said piers, or on goods landed from any vessel in any of the said harbours, or on any of the said piers (that is to say):—

For each vessel not landing cargo and not landing or embarking passengers, and not being a windbound vessel or a fishing vessel, per ton, two pence.

For each vessel windbound, and not discharging cargo, or being a fishing vessel, per ton, one halfpenny.

For each fishing vessel, for each year, commencing on the first day of April, one pound.

For every vessel other than a fishing vessel laid up or lying in a harbour longer than six months, in addition to the entrance dues or dues on goods landed, for every additional six months, per ton, six pence.

On all goods landed from any vessel other than a fishing vessel, per ton, three pence.

Provided always that with respect to the said dues, the words "cargo" and "goods" shall respectively mean cargo and goods bona fide shipped or consigned for or to one of the said harbours or cargo or goods which may be bona fide carried by any vessel for freight or in the usual course of trading, and not being the stores or ballast of such vessel:

Provided always that the tonnage of vessels in respect of which dues shall be payable shall be the registered tonnage or the tonnage ascertained in the like manner as the registered tonnage, and that this Resolution shall not apply to any vessel used in navigation which is propelled solely by oars, and which is of a burden of less than five tons, or to any vessel exempt by law from the payment of dues:

Provided also that in the case of fishing vessels, the yearly dues payable shall, as provided by law, be considered as payable for all the said harbours and not for each harbour:

Provided also that this Resolution shall not apply to any vessel for which a composition in lieu of the dues hereinbefore referred to shall have been paid during the time for which such composition shall extend:

Resolved also,—That on the foregoing Resolution commencing and taking effect, the Resolution of this Court dated the 16th day of December, 1884, appointing the payment of dues by vessels and on goods at the harbours of Castletown, Douglas, Peel, Ramsey, and Port St. Mary shall be and stand revoked.
