EXCHEQUER BILLS.

THE Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury hereby give notice to the holders of Exchequer Bills issued under the authority of the Act 29 V., c. 25, and dated the 11th June, 1886, that the interest thereon for the half year ending on the 11th June, 1890, will be payable at the Bank of England on and after the 11th June next; and that the interest of such Exchequer Bills for the following half year to 11th December, 1890, will be at the rate of Two per centum per annum.

All holders of Exchequer Bills dated the 11th June, 1886, who intend to demand payment of the principal sums therein contained at the expiration of the fourth year of their currency, must leave the said Bills at the Bank of England for examination, not later than the 8th June next, between the hours of ten and two; and payment of the said principal sums will be made at the Bank on and after the 11th day of June next.

GENERAL ORDER of the Local Government Board: Amending Regulations with respect to Remuneration of Collector of the Guardians:—

Nottingham Union.

To the Guardians of the Poor of the Nottingham Union, in the County Borough of Nottingham and County of Nottingham;—

And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS by General Orders bearing date the seventh day of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, and the twenty-seventh day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, the Poor Law Board made rules and regulations relating to the appointment and remuneration of certain Officers, therein named Collectors of the Guardians, by Guardians of the Poor of certain Unions and Parishes, including the said Nottingham Union; and by Article 5. of the Order first above-cited it was provided as follows:—

“The Board of Guardians shall pay to the

“Officer appointed to the office of Collector under this Order such salary, either by a fixed sum or by a poundage, as the Poor Law Board shall from time to time direct or approve; and shall also repay the amount expended or disbursed by him on their behalf according to the account rendered by him, so far as it shall be found to have been duly and properly incurred.”

And whereas it is expedient to amend the said Order as hereinafter mentioned, so far as regards the said Nottingham Union:

Now therefore, in pursuance of the powers given to Us, the Local Government Board, by the Statutes in that behalf, We hereby Order that, with respect to the said Nottingham Union, the above-cited Article shall be amended by the addition of the following proviso:—

Provided that the Guardians, with the approval of the Local Government Board, may pay to any such Officer a reasonable compensation on account of extraordinary services, or other unforeseen circumstances connected with his duties or the necessities of the Union.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Board of Agriculture Act, 1889, and The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1886, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do hereby license the Local Authority for the county of Surrey to destroy, under Article 95 of The Animals Order of 1886 the carcasses of Animals, Horses, Asses, or Mules

(a.) that have died of pleuro-pneumonia, foot-and-mouth disease, sheep-pox, sheep-scab, glanders, farcy, or swine-fever;

(b.) that have been slaughtered in consequence of being affected with sheep-pox, glanders, farcy, or swine-fever;

the same to be destroyed in manner therein prescribed, at the following place (that is to say):—

At certain licensed horse-slaughtering premises in the occupation of Mr. Samuel Boorman and situate at Merton-lane, Mitcham, in the county of Surrey.

This Licence is revocable by the Board of Agriculture.
