REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command,

Gentlemen who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levees, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Gentlemen who propose to present others must send in writing the name of such Gentlemen to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, not later than *two days* previous to the Levee, in order that the Lord Chamberlain may submit the names to Her Majesty, when, if they are approved, Presentation Cards will be forwarded. Forms for the purpose can be obtained at the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

Gentlemen who wish to be presented officially should communicate with the heads of their Department, who will provide them with the necessary cards and instructions.

It is particularly requested that the names of the Gentlemen to be presented be *very distinctly written* on the Presentation Cards delivered to the Lord Chamberlain at the Levee, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

THE following Address of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland having been transmitted by His Grace the Lord High

Commissioner, to the Most Honourable the Marquess of Lothian, K.T., Her Majesty's Secretary for Scotland, has been by him laid before the Queen, who was pleased to receive the same very graciously:—

May it please Your Majesty,

WE, Your Majesty's loyal and dutiful subjects, the Ministers and Elders of the Church of Scotland, now met together in General Assembly, beg with all reverence and submission to acknowledge the receipt of Your Majesty's most gracious letter.

We have to return our most grateful thanks for the continued expression which it contains of Your Majesty's attachment to the Church of Scotland, an attachment which has been shown not in word only but repeatedly in deed.

We beg to assure Your Majesty that You have not within all Your dominions a more loyal and devoted body of subjects than the Office Bearers and Members of the Church of Scotland. We render thanks to Almighty God for Your Majesty's long and prosperous reign, and it is our earnest prayer that You may be spared for many years to come to be a continued blessing to this nation, with all its colonies and dependencies, and to the Empire of India.

We hail with much satisfaction the appointment of the Most Noble the Marquis of Tweeddale as Your Majesty's representative to this General Assembly, and have to express our confidence that he will be able to report to Your Majesty a favourable account of our proceedings.

We accept, with all thankfulness, Your Majesty's gift of two thousand pounds for the diffusion of Christian knowledge in the Highlands and Islands, and to assure Your Majesty that we shall be careful to expend it in such a manner as will secure Your Majesty's approval.

May it please Your Majesty, Your Majesty's most faithful and loyal subjects, the Ministers and Elders of the Church of Scotland met in General Assembly.
