REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command,

Gentlemen who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levees, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Gentlemen who propose to present others must send in writing the name of such Gentlemen to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, not later than *two days* previous to the Levee, in order that the Lord Chamberlain may submit the names to Her Majesty, when, if they are approved, Presentation Cards will be forwarded. Forms for the purpose can be obtained at the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

Gentlemen who wish to be presented officially should communicate with the heads of their Department, who will provide them with the necessary cards and instructions.

It is particularly requested that the names of the Gentlemen to be presented be *very distinctly written* on the Presentation Cards delivered to the Lord Chamberlain at the Levee, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

THE MUNICIPAL CORPORATIONS ACT, 1882.

THE following scheme for the adjustment of the property, rights, liabilities, &c. of the Local Board of Worthing, and of the West Worthing Improvement Commissioners, and for other purposes, as settled by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, is published in pursuance of the Municipal Corporations Act:—

"WHEREAS by the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, it is enacted that where a Petition for a Charter of Incorporation is referred to the Committee of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and it is proposed by the Charter to extend the Municipal Corporations Acts to the Municipal Borough to be created by the Charter, the said Committee of Council may settle a scheme for the purposes in the said Act named, and containing such provisions as are in the said Act particularized:

"And whereas certain inhabitant householders of the towns of Worthing, and West Worthing, and of certain portions of the parishes of West Tarring and Broadwater, all in the Administrative County of West Sussex, in the month of June 1888 petitioned Her Majesty the Queen, praying for a grant of a Charter of Incorporation:

"And whereas the said Petition for a Charter has been referred to the Committee of Council, and it is proposed to create the Local Government District of Worthing and the Improvement Act District of West Worthing, and the portion of the parish of Heene which is not contained in the Improvement Act District of West Worthing a Municipal Borough, and to incorporate the inhabitants thereof, and by the Charter to extend the Municipal Corporations Acts to the Municipal Borough to be created by the Charter:

And whereas the said Improvement Act District and the said remaining portion of the parish of Heene together comprise the whole of the said parish:

"And whereas the said remaining portion of the parish of Heene is part of the district of and for which the Guardians of the Poor of the East Preston Union in the county of Sussex are the Rural Sanitary Authority:

"And whereas by a local Act of Parliament passed in the first and second years of the reign of King George the Fourth, intituled 'An Act to repeal two Acts made in the forty-third and forty-

ninth years of His late Majesty for paving the town of Worthing in the county of Sussex and establishing a market therein, and for making other provisions in lieu thereof, for erecting groynes, for laying a duty on coals imported into the said town, and for other purposes relating to the improvement of the said town' (herein called the Local Act of 1821), certain Commissioners were established and appointed for putting such Act into execution within the town of Worthing in the said parish of Broadwater, and the said Commissioners were, amongst other things, authorized to order and direct a rate or duty to be paid for all sea coals, culm or other coals, coke cinders, and charcoal, which should be imported and landed in the said town, or otherwise brought or delivered within the limits thereof (hereinafter called the coal duty):

"And whereas by a local Act of Parliament passed in the seventh year of the reign of King George the Fourth, intituled 'An Act for making and maintaining a Turnpike-road from Worthing to Lancing in the county of Sussex, and groynes, embankments, and other sea defences, for protecting such road and the lands adjoining from the further encroachments of the sea' (hereinafter called the Local Act of 1826), certain Trustees were constituted and appointed for putting such Act into execution:

"And whereas by a Provisional Order of the General Board of Health, dated the seventeenth January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, confirmed by the First Public Health Supplemental Act, 1852, the said town of Worthing was constituted a district for the purposes of the Public Health Act, 1848, and the Local Act of 1821 was amended and partly repealed, and certain powers, authorities, duties, property, and liabilities of the said Commissioners constituted under such Act were transferred to the Local Board of Health of such district (hereinafter called the Local Board):

"And whereas by two Provisional Orders of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, both dated the first April, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, and confirmed by the Local Government Supplemental Act, 1859, by a Provisional Order made by the like authority dated the tenth June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and confirmed by the Local Government Supplemental Act, 1853 (No. 2), by a Provisional Order made by the like authority dated the fifteenth February, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, and confirmed by the Local Government Supplemental Act 1867 by two Provisional Orders made by the like authority both dated the eighth June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, and confirmed by the Local Government Act, 1868 (No. 6) the Local Act of 1821 was further amended and partly repealed, and certain further powers were conferred on the Local Board:

"And whereas by the said Local Government Act, 1868 (No. 6), the Local Board were authorized and empowered to supply water within any part of the said parish of Broadwater:

"And whereas by a Provisional Order made by one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, dated the eighth April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, and by the Local Government Supplemental Act, 1869, confirming such Order the Local Act of 1826 was amended and partly repealed, and certain powers, property, and liabilities of the Trustees constituted by such Local Act in relation to sea defences and other matters were transferred to the Local Board, subject to the rights of the Crown in the shore or bed of the sea and to certain powers of the Board of Trade in relation thereto,

and the said Worthing and Lancing turnpike-road as to the part thereof within the district of the Local Board became a street within the meaning of the Public Health Act, 1848, and as to the part lying to the eastward of such district, ceased to be a turnpike-road; and it was provided that the district of the Local Board for the purposes of the Local Act of 1826, so far as the same was not repealed, should as to sea defences extend to the eastward of the district of Worthing to the point in such Provisional Order specified, and should as to certain rates leviable under such Local Act extend to and include certain lands mentioned in the same Act, and the Local Board were authorized to levy an additional rate upon the owners of certain lands mentioned in the said Provisional Order, and certain powers of borrowing money and other powers were conferred upon the Local Board: And it was provided that the owners and occupiers of the said lands mentioned in the Local Act of 1826 should be entitled to vote in the elections of Members of the Local Board in like manner as if such lands were included for all purposes within the district of such Board: And by a Provisional Order made by the like authority dated the eighth July, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, and confirmed by the Local Government Supplemental Act, 1871, further powers of borrowing money for purposes of the Local Government Act, 1858, were conferred upon the Local Board:

"And whereas by a Provisional Order of the Local Government Board dated the twenty-seventh May, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five, and confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (Aberdare, &c.) Act, 1875, the district of the Local Board was extended for all sanitary purposes so as to include the parts of the said parish of Broadwater therein described, and it was amongst other things provided that separate assessments should be made upon that part of the district which theretofore constituted the Local Government District of Worthing for the purpose of levying and making rates in the nature of general district rates to defray the sum of twenty thousand pounds, being part of a certain sum then due and owing and charged upon the general district rate of the said district as theretofore constituted with the interest from time to time accruing thereon so far as might be necessary after credit should be given in respect of the money received from the coal duty, and that when the said sum of twenty thousand pounds should have been fully discharged, the sums receivable from the coal duty should be applicable in such manner as should be then provided for by a further Provisional Order, or by some other means to be prescribed by competent authority in that behalf:

"And whereas by a Provisional Order of the Local Government Board dated the nineteenth June, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, and confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (Bath, &c.) Act, 1876, the district of the Local Board for the purposes of the Local Act of 1826 and the said Provisional Order of the eighth April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, was, as to sea defences, extended to a point one thousand feet eastward of the eastern boundary of their district for sea defences as defined by the last-mentioned Provisional Order; by a Provisional Order made by the like authority dated the second May, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine, and confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (Aspull, &c.) Act, 1879, the Local Act of 1821

was further partly repealed, and the Local Act of 1826, and the said Local Government Supplemental Act, 1869, were altered and amended, and provision was made for the abolition of certain tolls payable under the last-mentioned Local Act; by a Provisional Order made by the like authority dated the tenth May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, and confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 4) Act, 1882, the Local Act of 1821 was further partly repealed, and the Local Act of 1826, and the said Local Government Supplemental Act, 1869, were further altered and amended, and provision was made for, amongst other things, the redemption of the said rates leviable under the last two mentioned Acts, and further powers were conferred upon the Local Board; and by a Provisional Order made by the like authority dated the fourth June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, and confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 7) Act, 1885, the said Local Government Supplement Act, 1859, and the said Local Government Act, 1868 (No. 6), were altered and amended, and provision was made for the repayment of certain then outstanding loans by means of sinking funds in the manner therein prescribed:

"And whereas by the West Worthing Improvement Act, 1865 (hereinafter called the Local Act of 1865), a body of Commissioners (hereinafter called the Improvement Commissioners) was constituted and appointed for putting such Act into execution within the district of the town of West Worthing in the said parish of Heene adjoining the district of the Local Board, the boundary of which district was defined by the same Act and has from time to time been extended in the manner thereby provided so as to include certain other parts of the same parish:

"And whereas by a Provisional Order of the Local Government Board dated the twenty-seventh May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 6) Act, 1884, the local Act of 1865 was amended and partly repealed and the Improvement Commissioners were authorized to borrow money on the security of their district fund and general district rate, and provision was made for the repayment of the money so to be borrowed by means of a sinking fund, and further powers were conferred upon the Improvement Commissioners: And by a Provisional Order made by the like authority dated the second June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, and confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 7) Act, 1887, the Local Act of 1865 was further amended and partly repealed:

"And whereas under and in pursuance of the Local Acts of 1821 and 1826 and the said Provisional Orders the Local Board have erected, constructed, or are otherwise possessed of a town-hall, offices, recreation grounds, and other lands and premises, works for the sewerage and disposal of the sewage of their district, works for the supply of water to their district, and to part of the said parish of Broadwater without the same, groynes, embankments, and other sea defences within the limits extended as aforesaid for the purposes of such defences, and other works and things for the benefit of their district, and have from time to time borrowed money upon the security of the district fund and general district rates of such district:

"And whereas part of the said sum of twenty thousand pounds mentioned in the hereinbefore

recited Provisional Order of the twenty-seventh May, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five, the repayment whereof with interest is charged upon the coal duty and upon the general district rate, leviable within the district of Worthing as theretofore constituted, and part of certain moneys which were borrowed by the Local Board for the purpose of their said waterworks, the repayment whereof with interest is charged upon the water rates, or rents and charges payable to the Local Board in respect of the supply of water by them and upon the district fund and general district rates of the whole district of Worthing, and the balance of certain other loans, the repayment whereof is charged upon the district fund and general district rates of the said whole district are still outstanding and unpaid, and a sinking fund has been created by the Local Board for the repayment of some part of the said waterworks loan and the other last-mentioned loans:

"And whereas under and in pursuance of the Local Act of 1865, and the said Provisional Orders and Confirmation Acts amending the same, the Improvement Commissioners have erected or constructed, or are otherwise possessed of, offices and other lands and premises, works for the sewerage and disposal of the sewage of their district, groynes, embankments, and other sea defences, and other works and things, for the benefit of such district, and have from time to time borrowed money upon the security of their district fund and the general district rates leviable by them within their district:

"And whereas the owners and occupiers of houses and buildings in the said portion of the parish of Heene which is not included in the district of West Worthing are entitled under the Local Act of 1865 to certain rights of drainage into the sewers of the Improvement Commissioners but the said portion of the said parish is not liable to be rated by the Commissioners towards the cost of such sewers or the repayment of the loans raised by the Commissioners for the construction thereof, which said loans are described in the second schedule to this scheme:

"And whereas the balance of certain loans, the repayment whereof is charged upon the district fund and general district rate of the district of West Worthing, is still outstanding and unpaid, and no sinking fund has been created by the Improvement Commissioners for the repayment thereof:

"And whereas by virtue of the hereinbefore recited Acts and Provisional Orders, the Local Board and the Improvement Commissioners have respectively made Bye-laws which are in force within their respective districts:

"And whereas by the West Worthing Waterworks and Baths Acts, 1884, the West Worthing Waterworks and Baths Company (hereinafter called the Waterworks Company) were incorporated for the purpose of supplying water within the district of the Improvement Commissioners, and the remaining portion of the parish of Heene, and within the adjoining parish of West Tarring, and part of the parish of Broadwater, and have constructed waterworks and baths, and now supply water within the said limits by virtue of such Act and the Acts incorporated therewith:

"And whereas the Local Board are the Urban Sanitary Authority for their said district of Worthing as extended as aforesaid, the Improvement Commissioners are the Urban Sanitary Authority for their said Improvement Act district of West Worthing, and the Guardians of the Poor of the East Preston Union, in the said county of Sussex, are the Rural Sanitary Authority for

(amongst other places) the said remaining part of the parish of Heene, and such Urban Sanitary Authorities and Rural Sanitary Authority are Local Authorities within the meaning of Part XI of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882:

"And whereas this Scheme was before being settled by the Committee of Council referred for consideration to one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State and the Local Government Board:

"And whereas it is expedient, right, and just that a Scheme should be made and settled pursuant to the said Part XI of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, containing the provisions hereinafter set forth:

"Now, therefore, the said Committee of Council have settled a Scheme containing the following provisions, and do hereby order and declare as follows:—

"1. This Scheme may be cited for all purposes of the Borough of Worthing Scheme, 1890.

"2. This Scheme shall come into operation on the day of the first meeting of the Council of the Municipal Borough created by the Charter above-mentioned, which date is hereinafter referred to as 'the commencement of this Scheme.'

"3. In this Scheme the following expressions shall have the meanings hereinafter assigned to them, that is to say:—

"The Charter' shall mean the said Charter creating the Municipal Borough of Worthing.

"The Borough' shall mean the said Municipal Borough of Worthing created by the said Charter.

"The Borough Sanitary Authority' shall mean the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the said Borough acting by the Council as the Sanitary Authority of the borough.

"4. The borough shall be and is hereby placed immediately from and after the commencement of this Scheme within the jurisdiction of the Borough Sanitary Authority.

"5. The Local Board and the Improvement Commissioners and their respective powers duties obligations and privileges whatsoever shall be deemed to have continued and to continue to exist until the commencement of this Scheme unaffected in any manner whatsoever by the creation of the said borough and as if the charter had not been granted and from and after the commencement of this Scheme the Local Board and the Improvement Commissioners, and their respective districts, shall be and are hereby abolished, and shall thenceforth be dissolved and cease to exist.

"6. The portion of the parish of Heene which was not comprised in the Improvement Act district of West Worthing (hereinafter called the 'portion of Heene') shall be deemed to have continued and to continue until the commencement of this Scheme to form and be part of the rural sanitary district of the East Preston Union just as if the charter had not been granted and from and after the commencement of this Scheme the portion of Heene shall cease to form part of the said Rural Sanitary District, and the Guardians of the said Union shall cease to be the Sanitary Authority for the portion of Heene and to have any power duties rights or obligations in respect of the same.

"7. All the powers, rights, duties, capacities, liabilities, and obligations, and all the property, real and personal, corporeal and incorporeal, immediately before the commencement of this Scheme exercisable by, attaching to, imposed upon, or vested in, the Local Board and the Improvement Commissioners respectively, under, or by virtue of, or in pursuance of the Local

Acts of 1821, 1826, and 1865, and the Provisional Orders and Confirmation Acts hereinbefore recited or referred to, or any of them, or any other local, personal, or general Acts of Parliament, or otherwise, whether or not included under section 310 of the Public Health Act, 1875, shall, subject to all restrictions, savings, and conditions affecting the same, and not being inconsistent with this Scheme, and subject to the provisions of this Scheme, pass and be transferred to the Borough Sanitary Authority, and be exercisable enjoyed and borne (as the case may be) by them and as though the Borough Sanitary Authority were mentioned or referred to therein instead of the Local Board or the Improvement Commissioners, as the case may be: Provided always that the Borough Sanitary Authority shall not exercise or be subject to any powers, rights, or duties under such of the provisions of the said Acts and Orders as are mentioned in the first Schedule to this Scheme, and the said Local Acts and Provisional Orders and Confirmation Acts shall (subject to the proviso aforesaid) be carried into execution by the Borough Sanitary Authority as and being the Urban Sanitary Authority for the borough.

"8. Nothing in this Scheme shall authorize the Corporation to levy the coal duty beyond the limits prescribed by the Local Act of 1821.

"9. So far as the expenses incurred by the Local Board or the Improvement Commissioners in the execution of the powers and duties transferred to the Borough Sanitary Authority by this Scheme, were chargeable on, or their receipts were carried to the account of their district funds and the general district rates leviable by them, the expenses incurred by the Borough Sanitary Authority in the execution of such powers and duties shall be charged on, and their receipts in respect thereof shall be carried to, the account of their district fund and the general district rates leviable by them throughout the borough, under the Public Health Act, 1875, and subject to the adjustment hereinafter mentioned, so far as the liabilities of the Local Board and of the Improvement Commissioners so transferred were charged upon the said district funds and general district rates of the Local Board or the Improvement Commissioners the same shall be charged upon the said district fund and general district rates of the Corporation.

"10. All bye-laws of the Local Board and the Improvement Commissioners in force within their respective districts immediately before the commencement of this Scheme shall continue in force and have operation within the area to which they now apply for the period of one year from the commencement of this Scheme as though the Borough Sanitary Authority and their officers were mentioned or referred to therein instead of the Local Board or the Improvement Commissioners and their respective officers and at the expiration of that period the said bye-laws shall cease to have effect. Provided that all bye-laws made by the Improvement Commissioners shall during such period of one year apply be in force and have full effect within the whole parish of Heene as if the whole of the said parish had formed part of the district of the said Commissioners.

"11. The Local Government Board shall by Order, or a fit person to be appointed by the Local Government Board shall by an award under his hand, make an equitable adjustment respecting the property debts and liabilities transferred by this scheme or by section 310 of the Public Health Act 1875 to the Borough Sanitary

Authority from the Local Board and the Improvement Commissioners respectively and from the said Rural Sanitary Authority and respecting the rates to be assessed by the Borough Sanitary Authority upon the parts of the Borough now constituting respectively the districts of the Local Board and the Improvement Commissioners and upon the portion of Heene and the said parts and the portion of Heene shall be entitled to the benefit of the said property and be subject to the said debts and liabilities in such manner and to such extent as the said order or award shall provide in those behalfs. Provided however that in the adjustment of the said debts and liabilities no part of the principal or interest of the loans described in the second schedule to this scheme shall be charged upon or payable in respect of premises in the portion of Heene. Such adjustment may provide for the application of or other dealing with any such property (including the application of the sinking funds created by the Local Board) for the making assessing and levying of any rates at a greater amount in the pound in certain parts of the borough than in other parts thereof for such time as is provided in the said order or award and for the application of such additional rates and the Local Government Board or the said person shall have regard in the making of provision in such adjustment in respect of the said matters to the value or amount of such property debts and liabilities and the exemption of the portion of Heene from such loans as aforesaid and to the other provisions of this Scheme and to the inclusion of the said districts and the portion of Heene in the borough. Such order or award shall be deemed to be part of this Scheme and be carried out and complied with by the Borough Sanitary Authority and all other persons and bodies as though it had always formed part of and been incorporated in this Scheme and shall be binding and conclusive upon all bodies and persons in respect of the matters to which it refers.

"12. As soon as the Borough Sanitary Authority or the Mayor Aldermen and Burgesses of the borough of Worthing under the powers of section 51 of the Public Health Act, 1875, or otherwise howsoever acquire the waterworks of the West Worthing Waterworks and Baths Company, or so much thereof as are within the borough the powers rights privileges franchises and duties which the Local Board now have possess or are subject to with respect to or in connection with the supply of water in the District of the Local Board and which are by this Scheme intended to be transferred to the Borough Sanitary Authority shall extend and apply to and be in force in the whole of the borough and the Borough Sanitary Authority shall supply water to the inhabitants of the borough upon fair and equal terms and without giving any preference to any part or parts of the borough. Provided always that this clause shall not take effect unless the debts and liabilities of the Local Board in respect of their waterworks by this Scheme transferred to the Borough Sanitary Authority and existing at the date of such acquisition and the cost of such acquisition shall respectively be borne and paid by the whole borough or such part or parts thereof as the Local Government Board by order (which with all necessary directions they are hereby empowered to make) determine to be just.

"In this clause the expression 'waterworks' has the same meaning as in the Public Health Act 1875.

"13. Notwithstanding the incorporation of the borough and the provisions of this Scheme, all

rates, assessments, compositions, charges, mortgages, contracts, leases, conveyances, deeds, documents, acts, matters and things made, entered into, or done before the commencement of this Scheme by, to, or with reference to the Local Board or the Improvement Commissioners, shall be as good, valid, and effectual to all intents and purposes whatsoever for, against, and with reference to the Corporation as if the same had been made, entered into, or done by, to, or with reference to the Corporation instead of the Local Board or Improvement Commissioners, and may be proceeded on and enforced in the same manner in all respects as if the Corporation instead of such Board or Commissioners had been party or privy to the same and been named or referred to therein.

"14. In case any officer of the Local Board or Improvement Commissioners who shall have been employed by the said Board or Commissioners shall not be employed by the Council of the said borough, nor offered by the said Council a position in their employ of a similar character, and of an equal value to that formerly held by him, he shall be entitled to be paid, by way of compensation for the loss of his position, out of the funds of or under the control of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Worthing acting by the Council as the Urban Sanitary Authority for the said municipal borough, such gratuity or annual allowance as on a full consideration of the circumstances of the case may seem to the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury or any two or more of them to be a reasonable and just compensation for the loss of his position, and the said Lords Commissioners in awarding the said compensation shall be guided by the principles which would be applicable in the case of an award of compensation under the provisions of the Superannuation Act, 1859, to a person retiring or removed from the public service, in consequence of the abolition of his office. Provided that no special minute within the meaning of the said Act stating any special grounds for granting such allowance shall be necessary or be made. Provided nevertheless, that if any such officer be so employed by the said Council and discharged by them (otherwise than for misconduct) within two years of the ninth day of November one thousand eight hundred and ninety, he shall be entitled to compensation in the same manner as if he had not been employed by the said Council. Provided that the term 'officer' shall include any persons employed by the Local Board or Improvement Commissioners whose salaries or emoluments are payable at intervals of not less than one month, and no other persons. Provided also that the said Lords Commissioners or any two or more of them shall be the sole judges as to the right title or claim of any officer to any compensation whatever, and as to the amount thereof and the said Lords Commissioners or any two or more of them shall be the only judges upon any question which may arise under this clause, and further every determination of the said Lords Commissioners upon any such right title claim amount or question shall be absolutely final and conclusive, and every such officer shall have such rights only under this clause as the said Lords Commissioners or any two or more of them consider just and reasonable.

"Any determination of the said Lords Commissioners or any two or more of them may be evidenced by writing under the hands of any two of them.

"15. The accounts of the Local Board and of the Improvement Commissioners shall be (as soon as

conveniently may be) audited by the proper officers of the Local Government Board in like manner and subject to the like powers duties provisions and right of appeal as if the Charter had not been granted; the provisions of section 247 of the Public Health Act, 1875, as amended by the District Auditors Act, 1879, and any regulations duly issued by the Local Government Board with respect to the audit of accounts of Local Boards and of their officers shall apply to such audit; and the provisions of this Scheme with respect to the Local Board and Improvement Commissioners shall be construed so as to admit of such exceptions, as may be necessary to enable such audit to be duly made but such exceptions shall be strictly limited in time extent character and operation to the purposes of such audit.

"16. All rights property liabilities or obligations vested in or attached to the said Rural Sanitary Authority of the East Preston Union under the Public Health Act 1875 or any Act amending or enlarging the same solely with respect to or for the purposes of the portion of Heene shall pass to be exerciseable by or against vest in or attach to the Borough Sanitary Authority.

BYE-LAWS and REGULATIONS made by the Stockport and Hazel Grove Carriage and Tramway Company Limited, under the powers conferred on the Company by the Tramways Act, 1870.

1. The Bye-laws and Regulations hereinafter set forth shall extend and apply to all carriages of the Company and to all places with respect to which the Company have power to make Bye-laws or Regulations.

2. Every passenger shall enter or depart from a carriage by the hindermost or conductor's platform, and not otherwise.

3. No passenger shall smoke inside any carriage.

4. No passenger or other person shall while travelling in or upon any carriage play or perform upon any musical instrument.

5. A person in a state of intoxication shall not be allowed to enter or mount upon any carriage, and if found in or upon any carriage shall be immediately removed by or under the direction of the conductor.

6. No person shall swear or use obscene or offensive language whilst in or upon any carriage, or commit any nuisance in or upon or against any carriage, or wilfully interfere with the comfort of any passenger.

7. No person shall wilfully cut, tear, soil, or damage the cushions or the linings, or remove or deface any number plate, printed or other notice, in or on the carriage, or break or scratch any window of, or otherwise wilfully damage, any carriage. Any person acting in contravention of this Regulation shall be liable to the penalty prescribed by these Bye-laws and Regulations, in addition to the liability to pay the amount of any damage done.

8. A person whose dress or clothing might, in the opinion of the conductor of a carriage, soil or injure the linings or cushions of the carriage, or the dress or clothing of any passenger, or a person who, in the opinion of the conductor, might for any other reason be offensive to passengers, shall not be entitled to enter or remain in the interior of any carriage, and may be prevented from entering the interior of any carriage, and shall not enter the interior of any carriage after having been requested not to do so by the conductor, and if found in the interior of any carriage shall, on request of the conductor, leave the interior of the carriage upon the fare, if previously paid, being returned.

9. Each passenger shall, upon demand, pay to the conductor, or other duly authorized officer of the Company, the fare legally demandable for the journey.

10. Each passenger shall show his ticket (if any) when required so to do to the conductor, or any duly authorized servant of the Company, and shall also, when required so to do, either deliver up his ticket or pay the fare legally demandable for the distance travelled over by such passenger.

11. A passenger not being an artisan, mechanic, or daily labourer, within the true intent and meaning of the Acts of Parliament relating to the Company, shall not use or attempt to use any ticket intended only for such artisans, mechanics, or daily labourers.

12. Personal or other luggage (including the tools of artisans, mechanics, and daily labourers) shall, unless otherwise permitted by the conductor, be placed on the front or driver's platform, and not in the interior or on the roof of any carriage.

13. No passenger or other person not being a servant of the Company, shall be permitted to travel on the steps or platforms of any carriage,

or stand either on the roof or in the interior, or sit on the outside rail on the roof of any carriage, and shall cease to do so immediately on request by the conductor.

14. No person, except a passenger or intending passenger, shall enter or mount any carriage, and no person shall hold or hang on by or to any part of any carriage, or travel therein otherwise than on a seat provided for passengers.

15. When any carriage contains the full number of passengers which it is licensed to contain, no additional person shall enter, mount, or remain in or on any such carriage when warned by the conductor not to do so.

16. When a carriage contains the full licensed number of passengers, a notice to that effect shall be placed in conspicuous letters and in a conspicuous position on the carriage.

17. The conductor shall not permit any passenger beyond the licensed number to enter, or mount, or remain in or upon any part of a carriage.

18. No person shall enter, mount, or leave, or attempt to enter, mount, or leave, any carriage whilst in motion.

19. No dog or other animal shall be allowed in or on any carriage except by permission of the conductor, nor in any case in which the conveyance of such dog or other animal might be offensive or an annoyance to passengers. No person shall take a dog or other animal into any carriage after having been requested not to do so by the conductor. Any dog or other animal taken into or on any carriage in breach of this Regulation shall be removed by the person in charge of such dog or other animal from the carriage immediately upon request by the conductor, and in default of compliance with such request may be removed by or under the direction of the conductor.

20. No person shall travel in or on any carriage of the Company with loaded firearms.

21. No passenger shall wilfully obstruct or impede any officer or servant of the Company in the execution of his duty upon or in connection with any carriage or tramway of the Company.

22. The conductor of each carriage shall enforce or prevent the breach of these Bye-laws and Regulations to the best of his ability.

23. Any person offending against or committing a breach of any of these Bye-laws or Regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings.

24. The expression "Conductor" shall include any officer or servant in the employment of the Company and having charge of a carriage.

25. There shall be placed and kept placed in a conspicuous position inside of each carriage in use a printed copy of these Bye-laws and Regulations.

26. These Bye-laws shall come into force on the 17th day of August, 1890.
