A STATUTE to amend Statute V framed by the Commissioners appointed under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act 1877 (40 and 41 Victoria, c. 48) in relation to the College of the Great Hall of the University commonly called University College in the University of Oxford duly made at an Extraordinary General Meeting of the Master and Fellows being the Governing Body of the said College specially summoned for this purpose held on the thirty-first day of May one thousand eight hundred and ninety and passed at such Meeting by the unanimous votes of those present and voting and submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the study of Modern History is constantly increasing in the University and it is therefore desirable that some portion of the income of the College should be expended in the encouragement of that study. And whereas the College is at present obliged by its Statutes to support five Scholarships for the encouragement of the study of Mathematics for which purpose

four Scholarships would suffice.

We the Master and Fellows of the said College desire to change one of the above-named Scholarships into two Exhibitions for the encouragement of the study of Modern History and for this purpose in exercise of the powers given to us by section 54 of the said Act and by Statute XI of the College Statutes alter and amend Statute V of the College Statutes.

By substituting in clause 1 line two the word "sixteen" for "seventeen" and in line eleven the

word "four" for "five."

By adding to clause 6 the words "Two Exhibitions founded by the College, out of the Linton Fund and called Linton Exhibitions."

By adding in clause 7 line three after the word "Gunsley" the words "and also the Linton Exhibitions."

By inserting between the present clauses 13 and 14 the following clause to be hereafter numbered 14.

The two Linton Exhibitions shall be of the annual value of not less than forty pounds and shall be awarded for special proficiency in Modern History. No person shall be eligible who on the day of election shall have exceeded the age of twenty-one years or have completed the eighth term from that of his matriculation inclusive.

By changing the numbers of the clauses from 14-20 inclusive to 15-21 inclusive.

THE following Statute, made on the twenty-second day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, by the Governing Body of Jesus College, Oxford, has been submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877:—

At a General Meeting of the Governing Body of Jesus College Oxford specially summoned for the purpose on Thursday, the twenty-second of May one thousand eight hundred and ninety, it was decided by not less than two-thirds of the persons present and voting to make an alteration

in the Statute relating to the Meyricke Fund, clause 3, by inserting between "The Principal and Fellows" and "may assign out of the income &c." the following words "shall as a first charge pay annually out of the endowment a sum amounting to the interest (less income tax) of twenty thousand pounds consols for the maintenance of scholars at Intermediate Schools to a Committee elected by the joint Education Committees of Wales and Monmouthshire if and so long as Jesus College has the right to be represented on such Committee, and"
