PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

7 HEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of the Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding " of benefices in plurality, and to make better " provision for the residence of the clergy," after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, "hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother " churches to which they belong with great advan-" tage, and places altogether extra-parochial may " in some instances with advantage be annexed to " parishes or districts to which they are con-"tiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for "ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when, with respect to his "own diocese, it shall appear to the Archbishop " of the Province, or when the Bishop of any "diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop "that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or "district within the diocese of such Archbishop, " or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may " be, may be advantageously separated from any " parish or mother church, and cither be consti-" tuted a separate benefice by itself or be united "to any other parish to which it may be more " conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining "tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial, or extra-parochial so as to form a " separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be "constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical " purposes; and the said Archbishop or Bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme "of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said 44 Archbishop for his consideration), describing the " mode in which it appears to him that the altera-"tion may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to e ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, " rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, " and payments, and in respect to patronage and "rights to pews, may be made with justice to all " parties interested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under if his or their hands to such scheme, or to such " modification thereof as the said Archbishop may

"approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full
consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any
such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall
certify the same and such consent as aforesaid,
by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it
shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to
make an Order for carrying such scheme, or
modification thereof, as the case may be, into
effect."

And whereas the Right Reverend William Connor, Lord Bishop of Peterborough, hath represented in a writing dated the fourteenth day of May one thousand eight hundred and ninety to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Edward White, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

"To the Most Reverend Father in God Edward
White Lord Archbishon of Canterbury.

White Lord Archbishop of Canterbury.

"I the Right Reverend William Connor Lord Bishop of Peterborough do hereby represent to your Grace that there is in the town and county of Leicester within my diocese the ancient parish of Saint Margaret's.

"That there is also in the said town of Leicester

the ancient parish of All Saints.

"That the said parishes adjoin and are contiguous to each other and the boundaries thereof are well known and defined.

"That according to the census of one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one the population of the parish of Saint Murgaret's is thirteen thousand and fifty-eight and the population of the parish of All Saints is six thousand three hundred and seventy-one.

"That there is a church in each of the said

parishes

"That the church of Saint Margaret's affords accommodation for eight hundred persons, and the church of All Saints affords accommodation for five hundred and lifty persons.

"That it does not appear that any of the inhabitants or parishioners of the said parishes possess any legal right by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any pews or sittings in either of the said churches.

"That the patronage of both the said churches belongs to me the said William Connor Lord Bishop of Peterborough by virtue of my bishopric.

"That the Reverend Arthur Medland Rendell Clerk is the present vicar or incumbent of Saint Margaret's and the Reverend Hugh Somerville Gedge is the present vicar or incumbent of All Saints.

"That the Reverend Arthur Medland Rendell is desirous of relinquishing and the Reverend Hugh Somerville Gedge is desirous of annexing to All Saints that portion of the parish of Saint Margaret's described in the scheme hereunder written.

"That it appears to me that under the provisions of the Act of Parliament of the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty chapter one hundred and six the portions of the said parish of Saint Margaret's described in the scheme hereunder written may with advantage to the interests of religion be separated therefrom and annexed to the said parish of All Saints for all ecclesiastical purposes.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the said Act of Parliament I have prepared the following scheme which I submit to your Grace to the intent that your Grace may if on full consideration and enquiry you shall be satisfied with such scheme certify the same to Her Majesty

in Council."

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop, and the consents of the patron and of the incumbents of the said benefices are as follows:—

#### " SCHEME.

"That all the outlying portions of the parish of Saint Margaret's which have been united to the parish of All Saints for civil purposes under the Outlying Parochial Boundaries Act' comprising that part of Swan-street extending north from number. thirty-six that part of the west side of Warrington-street extending north from number sixteen that part of Pingle-street extending west on the north side from number nineteen and on the south side from number eighteen that part of Fuller-street extending west on the north side from number thirty-four and on the south side from number thirteen, that part of the west side of Northgate-street extending north from number sixty-two, that part of the west side of Frog Island extending north from the canal bridge to number eighteen Frog Island that part of North Bridge-place extending west on the north side from number three and on the south side from number two and which for the purpose of identification is shown on the plan hereto annexed and surrounded by a yellow verge line shall be for all ecclesiastical purposes separated from the said parish of Saint Margaret's Leicester and annexed to the said parish of All Saints Leicester and the incumbent for the time being of the said parish of Saint Margaret's shall be exempt from all cure of souls within the said part of the parish of Saint Margaret's so proposed to be separated and annexed as aforesaid.

"That the inhabitants residing within the said hereinbefore described portion of the parish of Saint Margaret's shall not be entitled to any pews or sittings or other accommodation within the church belonging to the said parish of Saint Margaret's but shall be entitled to accommodation in the said church of All Saints and shall be exempt from all rates charges or assessments to be made for or in respect of the church within and belonging to the said parish of Saint Margaret's but shall be subject to all rates, taxes, charges, or assessments made for or in respect of

the church of All Saints.

"In witness whereof I have hereunto subscribed my name this fourteenth day of May in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety.

"I William Connor Lord Bishop of Peterborough being the patron or person entitled to present to the vicarage of Saint Margaret's Leicester and the vicarage of All Saints Leicester both in the county of Leicester do by this writing under my hand signify to your Grace my consent to the scheme above proposed to your Grace for separating the said portions from the said parish of Saint Margaret's and annexing it to the said parish of All Saints.

"I Arthur Medland Rendell Clerk being the present incumbent of Saint Margaret's Leicester in the county of Leicester do by this writing under my hand consent to the scheme above proposed.

"I Hugh Somerville Gedge Clerk being the present incumbent of All Saints Leicester in the county of Leicester do by this writing under my hand consent to the scheme above proposed.

"Witness my hand this sixteenth day of May in year of our Lord one thousand eight

hundred and ninety.

" Hugh Somerville Gedge."

And whereas the said scheme hath been transmitted by the said Bishop to the said Archbishop for his consideration.

And whereas the said Archbishop, being satisfied with the said scheme, hath certified the same, and the consents aforesaid, to Her Majesty in Council, by his report dated the twenty-eighth day of May one thousand eight hundred and ninety, which said report is in the words and figures following: -

" To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Edward White Archbishop of the province of Canterbury do hereby report to Your Majesty in Council:
"That the Right Reverend William Connor

Lord Bishop of Peterborough has represented unto

us (amongst other things),

That there is in the town and county of Leicester and diocese of Peterborough the ancient parish of St. Margaret's.

"That there is also in the said town of Leicester

the ancient parish of All Saints.

"That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that the portions of the parish of St. Margaret described in the scheme referred to in the said representation and being outlying portions of the parish of St. Margaret which have been united to the parish of All Saints for civil purposes may be advantageously separated from the said parish of St. Margaret and annexed to the said parish of All Saints for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That pursuant to the direction contained in the Act of Parliament of the first and second years of Your Majesty's reign chapter 106 the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him the proposed alteration may best be effected and how the changes consequent upon such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction rent-charges dues rates and payments and in respect to rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested which scheme together with the consents thereto in writing of the patron and incumbents of the benefices to be affected have been transmitted by the said Lord Bishop to us for our consideration.

"The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consents before referred to

are hereunto annexed.

"And we the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said scheme do hereby pursuant to the said Act of Parliament of the first and second years of Your Majesty's reign chapter 106 certify same and such consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may lin case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said scheme into effect.

"As witness our hand this twenty-eighth day of May one thousand eight hundred and ninety.

Now therefore Her Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the said scheme be carried into effect.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her Majesty chapter ninety-four of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her Majesty chapter ninety-four and of the Act of the thirtysecond and thirty-third years of Her Majesty chapter ninety-four duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme or Representation bearing date the first day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety, in

the words and figures following, that is to say:—
"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England acting under the provisions of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four; of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four; and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four; have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme or representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Saint John Coleford, in the county of Gloucester and in the diocese of

Gloucester and Bristol.

"Whereas by the authority of an Instrument bearing date the sixth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-four pre-pared in pursuance of the provisions of the Act of the fifth and sixth years of Your Majesty, chapter sixty-five and being under the common seal of Your Majesty's late Commissioners for Building New Churches and under the hands and seals of the Right Reverend James Henry then Bishop of the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol and of two of the then Commissioners of Your Majesty's Woods, Forests, Land Revenues, Works, and Public Buildings, certain specified parts of the Forest of Dean and Hundred of Saint Briavels being extra-parochial and situate in the said county of Gloucester and in the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol aforesaid were assigned as ecclesiastical districts to the consecrated church

church of Saint Paul situate within the limits of. the said Forest and the same were called respectively 'The Ecclesiastical District of Christ Church' and 'The Ecclesiastical District of Saint Paul.'

"And whereas by the authority of an Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the fourth day of April in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six and published in 'the London Gazette on the eighteenth day of the same month certain contiguous portions of the parish of Newland in the county and diocese aforesaid and of the said ecclesiastical district of Saint Paul (Forest of Dean) were assigned as a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Peter situate at Clearwell within the limits of the said parish of Newland and the same consolidated chapelry was called 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Clearwell.

"And whereas by the authority of another Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the tenth day of May in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-two and published in the London Gazette on the fourteenth day of the same month a certain other part of the said parish of Newland was assigned as a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint John situate at Coleford in the said parish of Newland and the same district chapelry was called 'The District Chapelry of Saint John Coleford.'

"And whereas the said ecclesiastical district of Christ Church (Forest of Dean) and the said ecclesiastical district of Saint Paul (Forest of Dean) the said consolidated chapelry of Clearwell and the said district chapelry of Saint John Coleford have each of them under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and four, become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act and by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty, chapter thirtyseven, and by the above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas it has been represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the new parish of Saint John Coleford should be altered by way of extension in the

manner hereinafter-mentioned.

" Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles James Bishop of the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint John Coleford shall be altered so that all that portion of the said new parish of Christ Church (Forest of Dean) which is described in the First Schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended and is thereon coloured green shall be dissevered from such new parish and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of Saint John Coleford; and that in like manner all that portion of the said new parish of Saint Paul (Forest of Dean) which is described in the Second Schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the said map or plan hereunto annexed and is thereon coloured yellow shall be dissevered from the lastknown as Christ Church and to the consecrated named new parish and shall be annexed to and

shall in future form part of the said new parish of Saint John Coleford; and that in like manner all that portion of the said new parish of Clearwell which is described in the Third Schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the said map or plan hereunto annexed and is thereon coloured blue shall be dissevered from the last-named new parish and shall be annexed to, and shall in future form part of, the said new parish of Saint John, Coleford.

"And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament

#### "The FIRST SCHEDULE.

"The territory to be dissevered from the new parish of Christ Church (Forest of Dean) and to be annexed to the new parish of Saint John Coleford, both in the county of Gloucester and in the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, being:—

"All that portion of the said new parish of Christ Church (Forest of Dean) which is bounded upon the east by the new parish of Saint John (Cinderford) upon the south by the new parish of Saint Paul (Forest of Dean) both in the county and diocese aforesaid, upon the west by the said new parish of Saint John, Coleford, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the north by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint John Coleford from the new parish of Christ Church (Forest of Dean) aforesaid, at a point in the middle of the road which leads from Staunton to Mitcheldean near to Crabtree Pool and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the said road for a distance of nine chains or thereabouts to the point opposite to a boundary stone inscribed 'C. St. J. N. P. 1890 No. 1' and placed at the western angle of the boundary fence of Coverham Inclosure and extending thence first southward to the said boundary stone and then southward, south-eastward north-eastward, and again southeastward along the fence forming the southwestern boundary of the said inclosure for a distance of forty-five-and-a-half chains or thereabouts to a boundary stone inscribed 'C. St. J. N. P. 1890 No. 2' and placed at the southeastern end of the said boundary fence upon the north-western side of the road which leads from Coleford to Mitcheldean and extending thence first south-eastward to and then north-eastward along the middle of the last described road for a distance of eight chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the milestone which indicates a distance of eighteen miles to Gloucester and of one hundred and twenty-three miles to London and extending thence due east and in a direct line for a distance of one mile and thirty chains or thereabouts thereby passing to the north of Wimberry Colliery to a point on the western side of the line of the Severn and Wye and Severn Bridge Railway about three-and-a-half chains to the north of the junction of the same line of railway with the tramway leading to Wimberry Colliery aforesaid the said point being upon the boundary dividing the said new parish of Christ Church (Forest of Dean) from the new parish of Saint John (Cinderford) aforesaid.

" The SECOND SCHEDULE.

"The territory to be dissevered from the said new parish of Saint Paul (Forest of Dean) and to be annexed to the new parish of Saint John, Coleford, aforesaid being:—

"All that portion of the said new parish of Saint Paul (Forest of Dean) which is bounded upon the south-west by the new parish of Clearwell, in the county and diocese aforesaid upon the west by the said new parish of Saint John. Coleford upon the north by the portion of the said new parish of Christ Church (Forest of Dean) which is described in the First Schedule to the foregoing scheme or representation and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the east and upon the south-east by an imaginary line commencing at the point in the middle of the line of the Severn and Wye and Severn Bridge Railway aforesaid, near to the Speech House-road Station where the same line. of railway is crossed by the road leading from Coleford to Cinderford and where the boundaries of the said new parish of Christ Church (Forest of Dean) of the said new parish of Saint John (Cinderford) and of the said new parish of Saint Paul (Forest of Dean) all meet, and extending thence southward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of sixty-six chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the mile post which indicates a distance of six miles to Lydney and extending thence south-westward and in a straight line for a distance of one mile and thirty-one chains or thereabouts across the southernmost of the two Cannop Ponds, across the tramway from the Bixhead Quarries, and across Nagshead Inclosure, thereby passing to the south-east of Nagshead Lodge, to the point where the road leading from Coleford to Parkend is crossed by the line of the Coleford Branch of the said Severn and Wye and Severn Bridge Railway upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Paul (Forest of Dean) from the new parish of Clearwell aforesaid.

#### "The THIRD SCHEDULE.

"The territory to be dissevered from the said new parish of Clearwell and to be annexed to the new parish of Saint John Coleford aforesaid, being:—

"All that portion of the said new parish of Clearwell which is bounded upon the north by the new parish of Saint John Coleford aforesaid upon the north-east by the portion of the said new parish of Saint Paul (Forest of Dean) which is described in the Second Schedule to the foregoing scheme or representation, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say upon the south-east upon the west, and upon the south by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Paul (Forest of Dean) from the new parish of Clearwell aforesaid at the point last-mentioned in the said Second Schedule to the foregoing scheme or representation where the road leading from Coleford to Parkend is crossed by the said Coleford branch line of the Severn and Wye and Severn Bridge Railway and extending thence first south-westward then westward and then north-westward along the middle of the same line of railway for a distance of fifty-one chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries Milkwall-road over the same branch line of railway and extending thence westward along the middle of the said road for a distance of thirty-one chains or thereabouts to the boundary at, or near to the junction of the same road with the road leading from Clearwell to Coleford, which boundary divides the said new parish of Clearwell from the new parish of Saint John Coleford aforesaid."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme or representation have been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbents of the cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such scheme or representation and such patrons and incumbents with the exception of the Reverend John Joseph Ebsworth the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the new parish of Saint Paul (Forest of Dean) have respectively signified their assent to such scheme or representation.

And whereas the said John Joseph Ebsworth has offered certain objections to the said scheme

or representation.

And whereas notwithstanding such objections the said scheme or representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the respective Registrars of the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol at Bristol and Gloucester.

VESSELS arriving from ports or places on the coast between Alicante and Tarragona (including both those ports), as well as arrivals from the Balearic Islands, are to be subjected on their arrival to a quarantine of seven days, a rigorous medical visit still being enforced on arrival from all other Spanish ports.

This quarantine will be imposed provided the vessel arrives after a healthy voyage and in per-

fectly normal conditions.

Should this not be the case, the further treatment will be decided on by the Marine Board, to whom the facts are to be reported without delay.
