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THE MUNICIPAL CORPORATIONS ACT, 1882.

THE following Scheme for the adjustment of the property, rights, liabilities, &c., of the Local Board of Health for the district of Chatham Extra in the county of Kent, and for other purposes, as settled by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, is published in pursuance of the Municipal Corporations Act:—

“Whereas, by the ‘Municipal Corporations Act, 1882 and 1885,’ it is enacted that where a petition for a Charter of Incorporation is referred to the Committee of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and it is proposed by the Charter to extend the ‘Municipal Corporations Acts’ to the Municipal Borough to be created by the Charter, the said Committee of Council may settle a scheme for the purposes in the said Acts named, and containing such provisions as are in the said Acts particularized;

“And whereas certain inhabitant householders from the Local Government District of Chatham, in the county of Kent, petitioned Her Majesty the Queen praying for the grant of a Charter of Incorporation;

“And whereas, the said petition for a Charter was referred to the Committee of Council, and it was proposed by the Charter to extend the ‘Municipal Corporations Acts’ to the Municipal Borough to be created by the Charter;

“And whereas by a Charter granted by Her Majesty the Queen a district comprising (1) the parish of Chatham (except (a) such parts of the same as are within the boundaries whether by land or by water of the city of Rochester and (b) that part of the said parish situate in Old Brompton which is bounded on the south by a road or path known as the New Cut on the west by the wall of Chatham Dockyard and otherwise by the parish of Gillingham) and (2) all that part of the parish of Gillingham which is known as Hards Town and which is bounded by a line commencing at the thirty-first milestone on the London and Dover Road and proceeding thence in a north-westerly direction along the south-west boundary of the Lines to Cage-lane thence in a south-westerly direction to the boundary of the parish of Chatham and thence in a south-easterly direction along the said parish boundary to the point of commencement before described was created a Municipal Borough by the name of the

‘Borough of Chatham,’ and the said Charter extends the ‘Municipal Corporations Acts’ to the said borough of Chatham;

“And whereas, under and by virtue of the ‘Public Health Act, 1848,’ and the various Acts amending the same, the Local Board of Health for the district of Chatham Extra, in the county of Kent (hereinafter called the ‘Local Board’) was constituted and became invested with various powers and duties, and the same was before the creation of the said borough the Urban Sanitary Authority for the said Local Government District of Chatham;

“And whereas by Provisional Orders made by the Board of Trade known as the Chatham Sun Pier Order, 1863, and the Chatham Pier Order, 1884, confirmed by the Pier and Harbour Orders Confirmation Acts, 1863 and 1884 respectively (26 and 27 Vict., c. 104 and 47 and 48 Vict., c. ccxvi), the Local Board were empowered to purchase, and afterwards maintain a pier, commonly called the Sun Pier, situate within the district of Chatham Extra, and extending from a place in Chatham Extra known as the roadway to the Town Quay, into the River Medway, with the entrance and right of approach to such pier, and any other accommodations or interests, in or in connection with such pier, and all fixtures, fittings, and things in, upon, or about, the same, and were also empowered to provide better, and more extensive accommodation for the traffic passing along and across such pier, and the powers of the Local Board as to the raising of money on the security of the rates, and as to the execution of works, and in other respects were much enlarged and divers powers were conferred thereby upon the Local Board;

“And whereas, it is expedient that provision be made for the continuance, transfer and vesting, and management of the Sun Pier undertaking of the Local Board, and other the property, rights, powers, and privileges conferred by or acquired under the said Pier Orders of 1863 and 1884, as by this scheme mentioned;

“And whereas by a Provisional Order of the Local Government Board, dated the twentieth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, there was formed, under sections one hundred and thirty-one and two hundred and seventy-nine of the ‘Public Health Act, 1875,’ a joint Hospital Board for the establishment and maintenance of a hospital for the use in common of the inhabitants of the Municipal Borough of Rochester and of the Local Government District

of Chatham, such Board to consist of members in defined numbers, ex-officio or elected, as the case might be, to represent the aforesaid Municipal Borough and Local Government District and divers other provisions were made by the said Order;

"And whereas the said Provisional Order was amended by another Provisional Order of the Local Government Board dated the eleventh day of June one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, which Order was confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 11) Act, 1886.

"And whereas, by an Act passed in the 44th and 45th years of the reign of Her present Majesty, the short title of which is the 'Medway Conservancy Act, 1881,' it was declared expedient to preserve and improve the River Medway as a matter of great national importance, and a Conservancy Board was created, the members of which were to be elected by various persons and bodies therein specified and two of such members were to be chosen by the Local Board of Health for the district of Chatham Extra, in the county of Kent, to represent the district of the said Local Board, and the 15th section of the said Act provides that if at any time after the passing of the said Act the district of the Local Board be constituted a Municipal Borough and whatever be the limits of the borough so constituted then on and for ever after such constitution thereof the right under the said Act of the Local Board to appoint Conservators for the purposes of the said Act shall cease and thenceforth the Conservators for the said district shall be from time to time appointed by the Council of the borough so constituted and the provisions of the said Act relating to the appointment of Local Board Conservators shall extend and apply mutatis mutandis accordingly to the Council of the borough so constituted and the appointment and qualification of the Conservators for such borough.

"And whereas it is expedient that a Scheme should be made and settled containing the provisions hereinafter set forth;

"And whereas this Scheme before being settled by the Committee of Council was referred for consideration to Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, the Local Government Board, and the Board of Trade.

"Now, therefore, pursuant to the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, and every other power enabling them in that behalf, the said Committee of Council have settled a Scheme containing the provisions hereinafter set forth and do hereby direct, order, and declare as follows:—

"1. This Scheme may be cited for all purposes as the 'Borough of Chatham Scheme, 1890.'

"2. This Scheme shall and shall be deemed to have come into operation on the day of the first meeting of the Council of the Municipal Borough created by the said Charter, and everything thereunder shall be done and had accordingly. This date is hereinafter referred to as the 'commencement of this Scheme.'

"3. The Municipal Borough created by the said Charter shall be placed immediately on, from, and after the day of the first meeting of the Council of the Municipal Borough aforesaid, and thenceforward within the jurisdiction of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Chatham acting by the Council of the borough as the Sanitary Authority of the said borough.

"4. The Local Board, its powers, duties, obligations and privileges shall continue, and shall be deemed to have continued until the commencement of this Scheme unaffected in any

manner whatsoever by the creation of the said borough, and everything done or omitted to be done by the Local Board before such commencement shall be deemed to have been as validly and effectually done or omitted to be done as if no such Charter had been granted before such commencement. Subject to the provisions of this Scheme immediately from and after the commencement of this Scheme, the Local Board shall be, and the same is hereby, abolished and shall thenceforth be dissolved and cease to exist together with all its jurisdiction.

"5. The Pier undertaking of the Local Board, and every power, right, duty, capacity, liability, obligation, interest, or property exercisable by, attaching to, or vested in, the Local Board under the 'Chatham Sun Pier Order, 1863,' and the 'Chatham Pier Order, 1884,' shall pass to, be exercisable by, attach to, and vest in the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Chatham, acting by the Council as the Urban Sanitary Authority of the borough.

"6. Every reference in the said Orders of 1868 and 1884, as altered by any General or Local Act before the commencement of this Scheme, to the Local Board its members officers servants or district shall be and shall be deemed and construed to be a reference to the Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses of the borough of Chatham, acting by the Council as such Sanitary Authority as aforesaid and to its members officers servants and the borough of Chatham.

"7. The interest of the Local Board in the Rochester and Chatham Joint Hospital, under the aforesaid Local Government Board's Orders of 1880 and 1886, and every power, right, duty, capacity, liability, obligation, interest or property exercisable by, attaching to, or vested in the Local Board in virtue of the aforesaid Orders or either of them shall pass to, be exercisable by, attach to, and be vested in the Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses of the borough of Chatham, acting by the Council, as the Sanitary Authority aforesaid.

"8. Every reference in the said Orders of 1880 and 1886, and the Schedule to the Order of 1880 as altered by any General or Local Act (if any) before the commencement of this Scheme to the Local Board its chairman members officers servants or district shall be and shall be deemed and construed to be a reference to the Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses of the borough of Chatham, acting by the Council as the Urban Sanitary Authority aforesaid and the Mayor of the borough and the members officers servants or district of the said Urban Sanitary Authority.

"9. The borough of Chatham created as above mentioned shall be and be deemed to be the Municipal Borough referred to in section 15 of the Medway Conservancy Act 1881, and whose constitution is by the said section contemplated and the said Act shall be construed and have effect accordingly.

"10. All the powers rights duties capacities obligations liabilities interests and property of the Local Board under any general or local Act of Parliament or otherwise howsoever (whether transferred by the Public Health Act 1875 or not) shall be transferred to attach to exercisable by and vest in the Mayor Aldermen and Burgesses of the Borough of Chatham acting by the Council as the Urban Sanitary Authority of the borough and all actions and legal proceedings in respect of or in reference to the said matters may be commenced or continued by or against the said Authority (as the case may be) and in the name of the said Authority.

"11. In case any officer of the Local Board who shall have been employed by the Local Board for a period of five years shall not be employed by the Council of the said borough, nor offered by the said Council a position in their employ of a similar character and of an equal value to that formerly held by him, he shall be entitled to be paid, by way of compensation for the loss of his position, out of the funds of or under the control of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the Borough of Chatham, acting by the Council as the Urban Sanitary Authority for the said Municipal Borough, such gratuity or annual allowance as on a full consideration of the circumstances of the case may seem to the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, or any two or more of them, to be a reasonable and just compensation for the loss of his position, and the said Commissioners in awarding the said compensation shall be guided by the principles which would be applicable in the case of an award of compensation under the provisions of 'The Superannuation Act, 1859,' to a person retiring or removed from the public service in consequence of the abolition of his office. Provided that no special minute within the meaning of the said Act, stating any special grounds for granting such allowance shall be necessary or made. Provided nevertheless, that if any such officer be so employed by the said Council and discharged by them (otherwise than for misconduct), within two years of the first day of November, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, he shall be entitled to compensation in the same manner as if he had not been employed by the said Council. Provided that the term 'Officer' shall include only persons employed by the Local Board whose salaries or emoluments are payable at intervals of not less than one month, and no other persons. Provided also that the said Lords Commissioners, or any two or more of them, shall be the sole judges as to the right title or claim of any officer to any compensation whatever, and as to the amount thereof, and the said Lords Commissioners, or any two or more of them, shall be the only judges upon any question which may arise under this clause. And further, every determination of the said Lords Commissioners upon any such right title claim amount or question shall be absolutely final and conclusive, and every such officer shall have such rights only under this clause, as the said Lords Commissioners, or any two or more of them consider just and reasonable. Any determination of the said Lords Commissioners, or any two or more of them, may be evidenced by writing under the hands of any two of them.

"12. The accounts of the Local Board and its officers shall be (as soon as conveniently may be) audited by the District Auditor of the Local Government Board in like manner, and subject to the like powers, duties, provisions, and right of appeal as if the Charter had not been granted. The provisions of sections 247 and 250 of 'The Public Health Act, 1875,' as amended by 'The District Auditors Act, 1879,' and any regulations duly issued by the Local Government Board with respect to the audit of accounts of Local Boards and of their officers, shall apply to such audit, and the provisions of this Scheme with respect to the Local Board shall be construed so as to admit of such exceptions as may be necessary to enable such audit to be duly made, but such exceptions shall be strictly limited in time, extent, character and operation, to the purposes of such audit.

"13. All Bye-laws or Orders made under or in pursuance of the Public Health Act 1875 or of the said Orders or any of them shall continue in force and be enforced in the said borough to the same extent in which they are now in force and enforceable within the district of the said Local Board substituting only the said Mayor Aldermen and Burgesses of the Borough of Chatham as the Sanitary Authority aforesaid and their officers and the borough aforesaid for the Chatham Local Board and their officers and district."

POSTAL PACKETS TO AND FROM ZANZIBAR BY GERMAN PACKET, AND TO AND FROM THE GERMAN POSTAL AGENCIES AT BAGAMOYO AND DAR ES SALAAM.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WE, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of all powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this Warrant, made on the representation of Her Majesty's Postmaster-General (testified by his signing the same), and under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, order, direct, and declare as follows:—

1. In this Warrant—

The term "postal packets" means and includes all letters, post cards, reply post cards, newspapers, packets of commercial papers, packets of printed papers, and pattern or sample packets.

2. All Treasury Warrants at any time heretofore made relating to the conveyance by post of postal packets between the United Kingdom on the one hand, and Zanzibar and the German Postal Agencies at Bagamoyo and Dar es Salaam on the East Coast of Africa on the other hand, and also between any British Colony or foreign country and Zanzibar, and the said Postal Agencies are hereby annulled to the extent to which such Warrants respectively relate to the several matters comprised in this Warrant.

3. The rates of postage and additional sum for registration now chargeable and payable by the authority of the Treasury Warrants of the 14th day of January, 1880, the 15th day of June, 1880, and the 9th day of March, 1885 (the last-mentioned Warrant relating to post cards), on postal packets conveyed or delivered for conveyance by post between Zanzibar and any other country or place affected by the provisions of the said Warrants and forwarded by land through France, and by sea by means of French packet, and all regulations and conditions now in force as to the posting, forwarding, conveyance, and delivery of postal packets between Zanzibar and any other country or place as aforesaid by the said route shall extend and apply to all postal packets conveyed or delivered for conveyance by post between Zanzibar and any other country or place affected by the provisions of the said Warrants, and forwarded by land through any country or countries in Europe, and by sea by means of German packets.

4. The rates of postage and additional sum for registration hereinbefore authorized by this Warrant, or now chargeable and payable by the authority of any of the Warrants hereinbefore-mentioned on postal packets conveyed or delivered for conveyance by post between Zanzibar and any other country or place affected by the provisions of any of the said Warrants, and all regulations and conditions as to the posting, forwarding, conveyance, and delivery of postal packets conveyed or delivered for conveyance by post between Zanzibar and any other country or place as aforesaid, shall extend and apply to all postal packets conveyed or delivered for conveyance by post between the German postal agencies at Bagamoyo and Dar es Salaam and any other country or place affected by the provisions of any of the said Warrants as if the said postal agencies had been named and referred to therein in the same manner as Zanzibar is named or referred to therein.

5. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one.

REDUCTION OF LETTER POSTAGE.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WE, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of all powers given to us by the Post Office Acts, or any of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this Warrant, made on the representation of Her Majesty's Postmaster-General (testified by his signing the same) and under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, order, direct, and declare as follows:—

Definitions.

1. In this Warrant—

(1.) The expression "British India" includes the whole Continent of India, British Burmah, Aden, and the Indian Post Offices at places on or near the Persian Gulf.

(2.) The expression "United Kingdom" includes the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man.

Rates of Postage.

2. On every letter transmitted by post between the United Kingdom and British India there shall be charged and paid (in lieu of any rates now payable) for every half of an ounce in weight of such letter or fractional part of half of an ounce in weight, a rate of postage as follows, that is to say:—

From the United Kingdom to British India,
two pence halfpenny.

From British India to the United Kingdom,
two and a half annas.

Application of Provisions of other Warrants.

3. All such Letters as are hereinbefore referred to shall, subject to the provisions of this Warrant, be posted, forwarded, conveyed, and delivered under and subject to the provisions of any Treasury Warrant now or for the time being in force applicable thereto.

Commencement of Warrant.

4. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Board of Agriculture Act, 1889, and The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1890, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. Notwithstanding anything in Article 12 of The Pleuro-Pneumonia Order of 1891, cattle landed from Ireland at a port or place in a Scheduled District declared by the Board of Agriculture under the said Order may be moved out of the Scheduled District to any place of destination not being within the limits of a Scheduled District on the following conditions:—

- (a.) When landed the cattle shall be moved forthwith by the most direct available route to the nearest available railway-station (such station being within the Scheduled District) on the line of railway by which the cattle are to be moved to their place of destination.
- (b.) The cattle shall be kept at the said railway-station until trucked, and shall then be moved through and out of the Scheduled District without untrucking.

2. This Order may be cited as THE PLEURO-PNEUMONIA (SUPPLEMENTAL) ORDER OF 1891.

3. This Order shall commence and take effect from and immediately after the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety.

4. In this Order terms have the same meaning as in The Pleuro-Pneumonia Order of 1891.

**THE RABIES (MUZZLING OF DOGS)
ORDER OF 1889, AMENDMENT No. 5.**

By the Board of Agriculture.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Board of Agriculture Act, 1889, and The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1890, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

*Exemption from Muzzling of Dogs with Collars
&c. in certain Districts.*

1. From and after the commencement of this Order, The Rabies (Muzzling of Dogs) Order of 1889 shall in its application to the Districts and parts of Districts of Local Authorities mentioned in the Schedule to this Order be read and have effect as if the following paragraph were inserted at the end of Article 6 (*Muzzling of Dogs*) of the said Order of 1889, namely

(c.) Dogs which have on a collar with the name and address of the owner of the dog legibly engraved on such collar,

and the requirements as to muzzling contained in the said Article 6 shall not apply to such dogs as aforesaid in those Districts or parts of Districts.

*Saving as to Application of the Muzzling Order
in other Districts.*

2. Nothing in this Order shall in any way

amend or affect The Rabies (Muzzling of Dogs) Order of 1889, in its application to any District or part of a District of a Local Authority which is not mentioned in the Schedule to this Order.

Short Title.

3. This Order may be cited as THE RABIES (MUZZLING OF DOGS) ORDER OF 1889, AMENDMENT No. 5.

Commencement.

4. This Order shall commence and take effect from and immediately after the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety.

NOTICE is hereby given, that the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the County Borough of Salford, as the Corporation of the said County Borough in Council, on the 3rd day of December, 1890, in pursuance of certain powers vested in them by "The Tramways Act, 1870," and "The Salford Tramways and Improvement Act, 1875," duly made certain Bye-laws, Rules, and Regulations with respect to carriages used upon tramways, and the owners, drivers, and conductors thereof, and with regard to the travelling in or upon such carriages, and for divers other purposes within the said County Borough, a copy of which said Bye-laws, Rules and Regulations is hereunder set forth and published, and the said Corporation intend on the expiration of one calendar month after the publication of this notice to apply to the Local Government Board for confirmation by such Board of such Bye-laws, Rules, and Regulations as aforesaid. A copy of the proposed Bye-laws will be kept at my office, in the Townhall, Salford, and will be open during office hours for the inspection of any rate-payer without fee or reward.

The said Corporation also in Council, on the said 3rd December, 1890, resolved that all Bye-laws and Regulations, having reference or relating to tramway carriages or the owners and conductors thereof in force within the said county borough, prior to coming in force of the said first mentioned Bye-laws within such county borough, should be absolutely rescinded and repealed.

BYE-LAWS AND REGULATIONS as to Tramway carriages, and the Owners, Drivers, and Conductors thereof.

WHEREAS, "The Tramways Act, 1870," and "The Salford Tramways and Improvement Act, 1875," empower the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the county borough of Salford to make bye-laws, rules, and regulations with respect to carriages used upon tramways, and the owners, drivers, and conductors thereof, and with regard to the travelling in or upon such carriages, and for divers other purposes. Now, we, the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the said county borough, hereinafter referred to as "the Corporation," under, or by virtue, and in pursuance of the powers for that purpose given by the said Acts, in Council assembled, on the 3rd day of December, 1890, do hereby make the following bye-laws, namely:—

Bye-laws, extent of.

1. The bye-laws and regulations hereinafter set forth shall extend and apply to all carriages of the Lessees, for the time being, of the several tramways constructed by the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses within the said county borough, hereinafter referred to as "the Lessees," and to all places with respect to which the Council and the Lessees have power to make bye-laws or regulations.

Tramway Carriage not to ply for hire without being Licensed.

2. The owner, or owners, of any carriage shall not permit such carriage to be used as a tramway

carriage, plying for hire, nor shall any person ply for hire with any such carriage, until such owner, or owners, shall have first obtained a licence from the Council authorizing such carriage to be so used. The Council shall grant such number of licences for tramway carriages as they may from time to time deem requisite and necessary.

Tramway Carriage to be in good order.

3. The owner or owners of every tramway carriage plying for hire shall have the same in good order, well painted and varnished, inside and outside, and also constructed, provided, and appointed in such manner as the Council shall deem requisite, and shall have a bell attached thereto, to enable the conductor to communicate with the driver when such conductor desires to stop or start such carriage, and also a brake or brakes of sufficient power to enable the driver thereof to control the speed of and stop such carriage.

Fees to be paid, and duration of Licence.

4. The fee to be paid for every such tramway carriage licence granted by the Council shall be any sum not exceeding five shillings, or as the Council may direct; and every such licence shall remain in force for one year from the date thereof, or until the next General Licensing Day for tramway carriages, if any such day shall be appointed.

Owners' Names and Number of Licence to be painted on Carriages.

5. The owner or owners of any tramway carriage, plying for hire, shall have painted thereon, on both sides of the outside of such carriage, in figures and letters of not less than two inches in height, and of proportionate breadth, the number of the licence of such carriage, his or their Christian name and surname, or Christian names and surnames, or the name or style of the firm to which such carriage belongs, together with the word "Salford," and shall continue the same legible and undefaced during the time such carriage shall ply for hire.

Unlicensed Drivers and Conductors not to be employed.

6. The owner or owners of any tramway carriage licensed by the Council shall not permit any unlicensed person to act as the driver or conductor of any such carriage plying for hire, nor any driver or conductor whose licence may have been suspended or revoked.

Tramway Carriage Licences suspended or revoked.

7. The Council may suspend or revoke the licence of any tramway carriage, the owner or owners of which may have been twice convicted under these Bye-laws, or any Act of Parliament relating to tramway carriages; and whenever such licence is suspended or revoked, the owner or owners thereof shall, within one day thereafter, deliver the licence for the same to the inspector of hackney carriages, at the Townhall, Salford.

Animals to be fit and sufficient for the draught of Carriages.

8. The owner or owners of any tramway carriage plying for hire, shall not use, or suffer to be used, in the draught or service of any such carriage, a less number of animals than shall be in the opinion of the inspector of hackney carriages, requisite and necessary for the due and proper draught and service thereof, or any animal unfit to be used in such draught or service.

Carriages to be submitted for inspection.

9 Every tramway carriage licensed by the

Council shall be submitted for inspection at such place, and on such day, and at such reasonable time as the Council may direct and appoint.

Table of Fares to be posted in Carriages.

10. The owner of any tramway carriage shall cause a table of fares authorized to be taken from passengers to be posted in or upon such carriage, when plying for hire, in such manner and position as the Council may approve, and the fare to be taken from passengers shall be for all the distance such passengers shall travel one way, after entering such carriage, either in going or returning, and shall be at a rate not exceeding one penny per passenger per mile for every person who may ride in or upon such carriage, provided that the distance travelled does not exceed three miles beyond the boundary of the County Borough, and that the owner or conductor of any such carriage, shall not be compelled to accept a less fare than two pence from any passenger who may be carried thereon or therein.

Number of Passengers to be painted on Carriages.

11. The owner of every tramway carriage plying for hire shall cause to be painted thereon or therein, in figures and letters not less than two inches in height, and of proportionate breadth, in such manner and position as the Council may require, the number of passengers such carriage is licensed to carry.

Drivers and Conductors to be Licensed.

12. The Council shall grant licences to as many drivers and conductors of tramway carriages as the Council may deem requisite, and may charge any fee not exceeding one shilling for any such licence. No person shall act as the driver or conductor of any tramway carriage without having first obtained a licence from the Council, authorizing him so to act.

Applicants for Licences to fill up a Form.

13. Every person when applying for any such licence shall fill up a form, and state therein his true Christian name, surname, place of abode, age, previous employment, and such other particulars as the Council may require.

Age of Drivers and Conductors.

14. No person under the age of twenty-one years shall act as the driver of any tramway carriage, nor, under the age of sixteen years, as a conductor of any such carriage.

Drivers and Conductors to be sober, &c.

15. Every driver or conductor of a tramway carriage plying for hire shall be sober, conduct himself in a respectful manner, and obey the reasonable request of any passenger in or upon such carriage; and shall not make use of profane, abusive, or insulting language to or in the presence of any person or persons.

Drivers and Conductors to Wear Badges.

16. Every such driver or conductor, plying for hire, shall wear a badge, to be provided by the Council, having such number marked thereon, and of such style or design as the Council may approve, outside the front of his hat or cap, or in such position as the Council may direct, so that the same may be plainly seen.

Deposit to be made for Badges.

17. Every such driver and conductor shall, when obtaining a badge, deposit with the inspector of hackney carriages, such sum not exceeding two shillings, as the Council may direct, to be deposited for such badges, and such driver or conductor shall, when he returns such badge to such inspector, be entitled to demand and receive whatever amount he may have previously deposited for

such badge, provided only that such badge is returned undamaged, undefaced, and fit for further use.

Damaged Badges to be given up.

18. Whenever any badge has become damaged or defaced, so that the number or design shall not be distinctly legible, the driver or conductor to whom such badge has been issued, shall deliver the same to the inspector of hackney carriages, at his office at the Townhall, Salford; and shall receive another badge in lieu thereof, upon depositing the amount directed by the Council to be deposited for such badges.

Unlicensed persons not to wear Badges.

19. No driver or conductor to whom any badge has been issued, shall lend, permit, or suffer any other person to use or wear such badge, and no person, other than a duly licensed driver or conductor, shall use or wear any such badge, and every driver or conductor shall, within three days from the date upon which his licence expires, or the same is suspended or revoked, deliver up his badge to the inspector of hackney carriages at his office at the Townhall, Salford.

Drivers and Conductors to Notify Change of Abode.

20. Whenever any such driver or conductor changes his place of abode, he shall, within twenty-four hours after such change of abode has taken place, give notice thereof to the inspector of hackney carriages, at the Townhall, Salford; and shall at the same time produce his licence, for for the particulars of such change of abode to be endorsed thereon.

Drivers and Conductors not to Smoke if objected to.

21. The driver or conductor of any tramway carriage shall not smoke any tobacco, or other thing, therein, or thereon, if any passenger therein, or thereon, object thereto.

Drivers and Conductors to be decently Clothed, &c.

22. Every driver or conductor of any tramway carriage shall be cleanly in person and decently clothed when acting as the driver or conductor of any such carriage plying for hire.

Drivers and Conductors to deliver up Licences.

23. Every such driver or conductor, whose licence may be suspended or revoked, shall within one day from the date upon which such licence was suspended or revoked, deliver up the same to the inspector of hackney carriages, at the Townhall, Salford.

Conductor not to take greater fare than authorized.

24. The conductor of any tramway carriage shall not demand or take from any passengers who may be carried therein or thereon, a greater amount for the fare thereof than is authorized to be demanded or taken, under the terms of the licence of such carriage, these Bye-laws, or any Act of Parliament relating to such carriages.

Plying for Hire on Sundays, &c.

25. If the driver or conductor of any tramway carriage plying for hire with such carriage on Sunday, Christmas Day, Good Friday, or any day appointed for a public fast, he shall do so subject to the provisions of any Act of Parliament, relating to such carriages, and these Bye-laws respectively.

Every Driver and Conductor to have a copy of Bye-laws.

26. The driver and conductor of every tramway carriage plying for hire shall have a copy of these Bye-laws in his possession, and shall produce the same on the request of the inspector of hackney carriages, or of any passenger in or upon

such tramway carriage, and shall, in case of dispute, point out to such passengers any Bye-law in reference thereto.

Not to solicit passengers.

27. No person whatever, except the driver or conductor of any tramway carriage, shall canvass for fares, or solicit passengers for any such carriage; and no driver or conductor of any tramway carriage, shall leave such carriage for any such purpose, nor solicit any person to become a passenger, to the annoyance of such person.

Lamps to be provided and lighted.

28. The owner of every tramway carriage shall provide a sufficient number of lamps for lighting the inside and outside of such carriage in a suitable and proper manner and always keep them ready for lighting, and the driver or conductor of such carriage shall light the same, and keep the same lighted, from sunset to sunrise, whilst such carriage shall ply for hire.

Persons suffering from Contagious Disease not to be carried.

29. The driver or conductor of every tramway carriage shall not knowingly carry or permit to be carried therein or thereon, any person suffering from any contagious or infectious disease.

Drivers and Conductors to comply with Regulations.

30. The driver or conductor of any tramway carriage shall comply with all orders or regulations made by the mayor or the police, for regulating the traffic in the streets on any special occasions, and shall when taking up or setting down passengers, at or near any place of public meeting, or large assemblage of people within the county borough, act under the direction of the inspector of hackney carriages, or any constable of the county borough as to the manner in which such carriage shall proceed or stop, or where any such carriage shall stand when waiting to take up passengers at any such place.

Licences may be suspended or revoked.

31. The Council may suspend or revoke the licence of any such driver or conductor who may have been twice convicted of any offence under these Bye-laws, or any Act of Parliament relating to the drivers and conductors of tramway carriages; and every such driver or conductor whose licence may have been suspended or revoked, shall within one day from the date upon which such licence was suspended or revoked deliver such licence to the inspector of hackney carriages, at his office, at the Townhall, Salford.

Drivers and Conductors not to deceive as to route, &c.

32. The driver or conductor of any tramway carriage plying for hire shall not wilfully deceive any person as to the route or destination of such carriage, or for the purpose of taking up or setting down passengers, nor except in case of accidents or other unavoidable necessity, stop such carriage at any place where foot passengers usually cross the carriage-way.

Drivers and Conductors to comply with Bye-laws and Regulations.

33. The drivers and conductors of tramway carriages plying for hire shall comply with these Bye-laws and Regulations, or any other Bye-laws and Regulations that may be in force or hereafter come into force; and every person using any such carriage shall comply therewith, and obey the reasonable directions of such driver or conductor in all matters relating thereto, and no person shall obstruct, prevent, or hinder any such driver or

conductor in or from complying with such Bye-laws and Regulations, or cause such driver or conductor to commit a breach of the same, and any such driver or conductor may remove from any such carriage any person not complying with such Bye-laws, and may call to his aid any constable of the County Borough to assist him in so doing.

Drivers and Conductors to be in Attendance.

34. The driver or conductor of any tramway carriage shall be in constant attendance of the same whilst plying for hire, except reasonable cause be shown for being absent therefrom.

Property found in Tramway Carriages.

35. In case any property shall be left in any tramway carriage by any person who may have used the same, the conductor thereof shall, without delay, after such property shall have been found by him, or delivered into his care, take, or cause to be taken, such property in the state in which it was found, or delivered into his care, to the office of the inspector of hackney carriages, and there deposit it for reclamation, and such conductor shall thereupon be entitled to receive such fee, not less than nine pence, as the Council may direct to be paid in such case. The inspector of hackney carriages may then demand and receive from the person claiming such property any fee which may have been paid to the conductor, and shall not be compelled to deliver up such property until such fee has been paid.

Drivers' and Conductors' Licences, when to expire.

36. Any licence granted by the Council to any tramway carriage driver or conductor shall remain in force until the 1st day of July next ensuing after the date upon which such licence shall have been granted to any driver or conductor, subject, nevertheless, to the same being suspended or revoked, upon any such driver or conductor being twice convicted for any offence against these Bye-laws and Regulations, or any other Bye-laws and Regulations relating to the drivers and conductors of tramway carriages, or any Act of Parliament relating thereto.

Notice Boards to be attached to Carriages.

37. The owner of every tramway carriage shall have attached thereto a suitable notice board, having painted thereon such particulars as the Council may require, or deem necessary, to indicate the route upon which such carriage plies for hire.

Carriages to carry Coloured Lamps if required.

38. The owner of every tramway carriage shall, if required by the Council, have the lamps attached to such carriage fitted up with glass of different colours, so as to indicate the route upon which such carriage plies for hire, or the destination of such carriage.

The Inspector and his Duties.

39. The inspector of hackney carriages shall be the inspector of tramway carriages, and shall from time to time examine all such carriages, and see that these Bye-laws and Regulations are duly observed, and any such inspector shall have power to prohibit the use of any such carriage which, upon examination, shall not be in a cleanly or proper state, and in strict compliance with these Bye-laws, or in case the animal or animals attached thereto shall not be, in his opinion, in a fit and proper state for work; and every owner, driver, and conductor shall comply with the reasonable orders and directions of any such inspector as to any of the matters aforesaid, or otherwise in relation to the Bye-laws and Regulations in force for the time being, or any Act of Parliament relating

thereto; and no owner, driver, conductor, or other person shall obstruct or hinder any such inspector in the execution of his duties, or refuse to comply with any lawful direction of any such inspector in relation to any Bye-law, Regulation, or Act of Parliament.

Speed of Carriage.

40. No tramway carriage shall be driven at a less rate than five miles, nor more than eight miles in the hour upon the average.

Distance from other Carriages.

41. No tramway carriage shall be driven so as to follow a preceding carriage at a less distance than thirty yards along any portion of the line of tramway, except at a siding or place appointed by the Council as a stand for such carriages.

Stopping for Passengers.

42. Every driver or conductor of a tramway carriage shall stop the same, when required so to do by any passenger desirous of leaving such carriage, or by any person desirous of travelling by such carriage, and for whom there is room.

Passengers Getting On and Off.

43. Every passenger shall enter, or mount upon, or depart from, or get off a tramway carriage by the hindermost or conductor's platform, and not otherwise.

Smoking.

44. No person shall smoke in the interior, or on the conductor's platform of any tramway carriage.

Musical Instruments.

45. No passenger or other person shall, while travelling in or upon any tramway carriage, play or perform upon any musical instrument.

Interference with Passengers.

46. No person shall wilfully interfere with the comfort of any passenger, or commit any nuisance in, upon, or against, any tramway carriage.

Intoxicated Persons and Improper Language.

47. No person in a state of intoxication shall be allowed to enter or mount upon any tramway carriage, and no person shall use any profane, obscene, or abusive language in or upon any such carriage. Every person offending against this bye-law shall, in addition to the penalty hereinafter prescribed by these bye-laws and regulations, be prevented entering, or mounting, or be summarily removed from such carriage, by or under the direction of the conductor.

Willful Damage.

48. No person shall wilfully cut, tear, soil, or otherwise damage the cushions, curtains, or linings, or wilfully mark, scratch, or break any window of, or remove or detach any number plate, printed or other paper or notice in or on any tramway carriage, or otherwise wilfully damage any such carriage. Every person acting in contravention of this regulation shall be liable to the penalty prescribed by these Bye-laws and Regulations, in addition to the liability to pay the amount of any damage done.

Offences Clothing.

49. No person whose dress or clothing will, in the opinion of the conductor of a tramway carriage, soil or injure the linings or cushions of such carriage, or the dress or clothing of any passenger, and no person who, in the opinion of the conductor, may for any other reason be offensive to passengers, shall be allowed to enter or remain in the interior of such carriage, and may be prevented from entering the interior thereof; and shall not enter the interior thereof, after having

been requested not to do so by the conductor, and, if found in the interior of any carriage, shall, on the request of the conductor, leave the interior of the carriage upon the fare (if previously paid) being returned.

Payment of Fares.

50. Each passenger shall upon demand pay to the conductor or other duly authorized officer of the Lessees, the fare legally demandable for the journey.

Tickets or Checks.

51. Each passenger shall show his ticket or check (if any) when required so to do to the conductor, or any duly authorized servant of the Lessees, and shall also, when required so to do, either deliver up his ticket or check, or pay the fare legally demandable for the distance travelled over by such passenger.

Artizans' Special Carriage

52. No person, not being an artisan, mechanic, or daily labourer, within the true intent and meaning of "The Salford Tramways and Improvement Act, 1875," shall use or attempt to use any special carriage for the labouring classes intended only for such artizans, mechanics, or daily labourers, as aforesaid.

Personal Luggage.

53. Every person about to enter or mount upon any carriage, or being a passenger, and in either case having any luggage (including the tools of artizans, mechanics, and daily labourers), shall, if so requested by the conductor, place such luggage on the driver's platform, and shall not take, put, or convey the same in the interior or on the roof of the carriage, unless permitted by the conductor so to do.

Standing on Steps, Staircase, or Platform.

54. No passenger or other person, not being a servant of the Lessees, shall be permitted to stand either on the roof or in the interior, or sit on the outside rail on the roof of any carriage, and shall not travel on the steps, staircase, or platform of any carriage without the permission of the conductor of such carriage.

Holding on, or Hanging to, any part of Carriage.

55. No person other than a servant of the Lessees, except a passenger or intending passenger, shall enter or mount any carriage, and no person shall hold or hang on by or to any part of any carriage, or travel therein otherwise than on a seat provided for passengers.

Carriage Full.

56. When any carriage contains the full number of passengers, which it is licensed to contain, no additional person shall enter, mount, or remain in or on any such carriage when warned by the conductor not to do so.

Licensed Number not to be Exceeded.

57. The conductor shall not permit any passenger or intended passenger beyond the licensed number to enter, mount, or remain in or upon any part of a carriage.

Entering or Leaving Carriage in Motion

58. No person shall enter, mount, or leave, or attempt to enter, mount, or leave, any carriage whilst in motion except at such person's own risk.

Dogs or other Animals.

59. No dog or other animal shall be allowed in or on any carriage, except by permission of the conductor, nor in any case in which the conveyance of such dog or other animal might be offensive or an annoyance to any passenger. No person shall take a dog or other animal into any carriage after having been requested not to do so by

the conductor or any passenger. Any dog or other animal taken into or on any carriage in breach of this regulation shall be removed by the person in charge of such dog or other animal from the carriage immediately upon the request by the conductor, and, in default of compliance with such request, may be removed by or under the direction of the conductor.

Loaded Firearms.

60. No person shall enter or get upon, or travel in or on, any carriage with loaded firearms or with any article or thing which may, in the opinion of the conductor, be dangerous or offensive to any passenger.

Obstructing Officers of Lessees.

61. No passenger shall wilfully obstruct or impede any officer or servant of the Lessees in the execution of his duty upon or in connection with any carriage or tramway of the Lessees.

Enforcing Bye-laws.

62. The conductor of each carriage shall enforce or prevent the breach of these Bye-laws and Regulations to the best of his ability.

Penalty.

63. Any person offending against or committing a breach of any of these Bye-laws or Regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings.

Conductor.

64. The expression "conductor" shall include any officer or servant in the employment of the Lessees having charge of a carriage.

Copy of Bye-laws.

65. The conductor of each carriage shall carry with him a copy of these Bye-laws, and shall on request of any passenger produce the same to and

shall permit the same to be perused by such passenger; and the Lessees shall affix and keep affixed in each of their offices and waiting-rooms within the County Borough a printed copy of the same for the use of the public.

When Driver to act as Conductor.

66. Nothing in these Bye-laws and Regulations contained shall prevent the driver of any tramway carriage from being licensed to act as a conductor, provided such driver shall not act as a conductor unless he shall have first deposited at the office of the inspector of hackney carriages, at the Town-hall, Salford, the licence he holds authorizing him to act as a driver, nor shall he act as a driver, unless he first deposit at the aforesaid office the licence he holds authorizing him to act as a conductor.
