THE Queen has been pleased to grant unto Lieutenant-Colonel Philip Arthur Pleydell Bouverie-Campbell, of Yately, in the county of Southampton, and of Dunoon, in the county of Argyll, and Caroline Mary, his wife, Her Royal licence and authority that they may assume and use the surname of Wyndham in addition to and after those of Bouverie-Campbell, that he the said Philip Arthur Pleydell Bouverie-Campbell may bear the arms of Wyndham quarterly with those of Bouverie and Campbell; and that the said Caroline Mary Bouverie-Campbell may bear the arms of Wyndham only, and that such surnames and arms of Bouverie-Campbell and Wyndham may be taken, borne, and used by their issue; such arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms and recorded in the College of Arms, otherwise the said Royal licence and permission to be void and of none effect:

And to command that this said Royal concession and declaration be recorded in Her Majesty's College of Arms.
