BYE-JAW providing for a Minimum Pilotage Charge in the Port and Harbour of Waterford to be treated as an addendum to Schedule (B.) Part II, of the Act thirty-seven and thirty-eight Victoria Chapter one hundred and sixteen.

Minimum Inword and Outward.

Provided always, that where any vessel does not exceed thirty tons net register tonnage, such vessel shall be charged pilotage rates on one half of the gross register tonnage.

W HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the eleventh day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety, in

the words following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Your Majesty, chapter eighty-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for apportioning the income of the benefice and united rectory of All Hallows Lombard-street with Saint Benet Gracechurch Saint Leonard Eastcheap and Saint Dionis Backchurch, in the city of London, and in the diocese of London, between that benefice and the benefice (being a rectory) of Saint George the Martyr with Saint Mary Magdalene, Canterbury, in the county of Kent and in the diocese of Canterbury.

"Whereas the Dean and Chapter of the Metropolitical Church of Christ at Canterbury are the patrons of both the aforesaid benefices and have requested us to recommend to Your Majesty in Council the apportionment hereinafter recom-

mended and proposed.

"And whereas under the provisions of an Order of Your Majesty in Council dated the twenty-third day of October in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, and published in the London Gazette on the twenty-seventh day of the same month, the endowments or some portion thereof of the benefice and united rectory of All Hallows Lombard-street with Saint Benet Gracechurch Saint Leonard Eastcheap and Saint Dionis Backchurch, are subject to the payment now or in future of certain annual rentcharges in favour of certain benefices or cures specified in the same Order of Your Majesty in Council.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that the said benefice of Saint George the Martyr with Saint Mary Magdalene Canterbury Mary Magdalene Canterbury is at present insufficiently endowed and that the

said benefice and united rectory of All Hallows Lombard-street with Saint Benet Gracechurch Saint Leonard Eastcheap and Saint Dionis Backchurch has endowments of such an amount as that after allowing for the several charges specified in the said Order of Your Majesty in Council dated the twenty-third day of October in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, and for the other charge hereinafter recommended and proposed to be made upon the same endowments, the lastly-mentioned benefice will still be sufficiently endowed.

"And whereas the said benefice and united rectory of All Hallows Lombard-street with Saint Benet Gracechurch, Saint Leonard Eastcheap and Saint Dionis Backchurch is now full of a clerk.

" Now therefore with the consent of the said Edward White, Archbishop of Canterbury (in testimony whereof he hath to this scheme set his hand and affixed his archiepiscopal Seal) and with the consent of the said Frederick, Bishop of the said diocese of London, acting as such Bishop (in testimony whereof he hath to this scheme set his hand and affixed his episcopal seal) and with the consent of the said Dean and Chapter of the Metropolitical Church of Christ at Canterbury as the patrons of each of the said two benefices as aforesaid (in testimony whereof they have to this scheme affixed their common or corporate seal) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and as from the day of the date at which the said benefice and united rectory of All Hallows Lombard-street with Saint Benet Gracechurch Saint Leonard Eastcheap and Saint Dionis Backchurch shall from whatever cause be next voided all the tithes or annual sums in lieu of tithes glebe lands and all (if any) other the endowments which shall at the date of the next avoidance of the said benefice and united rectory of All Hallows Lombard - street, with Saint Benet Gracechurch, Saint Leonard Eastcheap and Saint Dionis Backchurch or which may thereafter belong to the same benefice and united rectory shall be charged and for ever thereafter be chargeable in favour of the incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Saint George the Martyr with Saint Mary Magdalene Canterbury with the further annual sum or yearly charge hereinafter mentioned that is to say a clear annual sum or yearly charge of one hundred pounds to be as from the day last aforesaid due and payable to the incumbent of the said benefice of Saint George the Martyr with Saint Mary Magdalene Canterbury and to be apportionable between any outgoing incumbent of the said benefice of Saint George the Martyr with Saint Mary Magdalene Canterbury or his representa-

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same incumbency on the other hand, and to be receivable by the incumbent in whose favour it is charged as aforesaid by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of

November in every year.

"And we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England further recommend and propose that the incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Saint George the Martyr with Saint Mary Magdalene Canterbury shall have the following powers for recovering the said rentcharge of one hundred pounds per annum hereby proposed to be created in favour of the benefice of which he is incumbent as aforesaid (that is to say) power if and whenever any part of the said rent-charge shall at any time be unpaid for twenty - one days after any of the times appointed for the payment thereof (although there shall not have been any legal demand made thereof) to enter into the receipt of the endowments charged therewith or any part thereof and to receive and take the same until he shall thereby or otherwise be paid and satisfied the same rent-charge and the arrears thereof due at the time of such entry or afterwards to become due during his being in possession of the same premises, together with all costs and expenses occasioned by the non-payment thereof, and for the purpose of collecting receiving and recovering such rent-charge or any part thereof to use exercise and enjoy all such powers and remedies for collecting recovering and enforcing payment thereof and of the annual sums payable for or towards the raising or making up the same as may be statutably exercised or exercisable by him under the law then in force.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of

Parliament."
