OTICE is hereby given, that The Queen will hold Drawing Rooms at Buckingham Palace, on Wednesday, the 4th, and on Friday, the 13th of March next, at three o'clock.

REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S DRAWING

By Her Majesty's Command, The Ladies who propose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing Rooms are requested to bring with them to the Drawing Room two large cards, with their names clearly written thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Queen.

PRESENTATIONS.

The privilege of making presentations to The Queen at a Drawing Room is restricted to those Ladies who have themselves been previously presented to Her Majesty, and who are themselves present at the Drawing Room.

Under such circumstances a Lady has the privilege of presenting one Lady only at a Drawing Room in addition to her Daughters or

Daughters-in-law.

This restriction does not apply to Ladies who, from official position or other circumstances, are specially privileged to make presentations to Her

Majesty.

The Lady who proposes to present another must send in writing the name of such Lady to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, not later than two days previous to the Drawing Room, in order that the Lord Chamberlain may submit the name to Her Majesty, when, if it be approved, presentation cards will be forwarded.

Printed Forms for this purpose can be obtained

at the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

It is particularly requested that the names of the Lady to be presented be very distinctly written on the presentation cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain at the Drawing Room, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

It is not expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at a Drawing Room, except in attend-

ance on the Ladies of their families.

Any Gentleman who under these circumstances should desire to be presented to The Queen will observe the same regulations as are in force for Her Majesty's Levees.

IT is hereby notified that Her Majesty's Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs has received from the Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary of the Republic of Chile at this Court, a Note, dated the 22nd of January, 1891, stating that the Government of Chile has cancelled the Commission of Mr. Martin Drouilly as Chilian Consul-General in Great Britain.

THE Queen has been pleased, by Letters Patent under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, bearing date the 28th instant, to appoint the Right Honourable Sir James Hannen, President of the Probate, Divorce, and Admiralty Division of the High Court of Justice, to be a Lord of Appeal in Ordinary, under the provisions of "The Appellate Jurisdiction Act, 1876"; and to grant to him the dignity of a Baron for life, by the style and title of Baron Hannen, of Burdock, in the county of Sussex.

THE Queen has been pleased to order a Congé d'Elire to pass the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, empowering the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral and Metropolitical Church of York to elect an Archbishop of that See, the same being void by the death of Doctor William Thomson, late Archbishop thereof; and Her Majesty has also been pleased to recommend to the said Dean and Chapter the Right Reverend Father in God Doctor William Connor Magee, now Bishop of Peterborough, to be by them elected Archbishop of the said See of York.

THE Queen has been pleased by Letters Patent under the Great Seal to appoint Francis Henry Jeune, Esq., one of Her Majesty's Counsel learned in the Law, to be one of the Justices of Her Majesty's High Court of Justice.
