Turin, Novemb. 18. The French have taken *Susa*; the little Resistance the Garrison made not giving the Duke of Savoy time to march to their Relief; for which reason the Governor, and some of the principal Officers, were, upon their arrival here, made Prisoners by his Royal Highness's Order. But to ballance the loss of this place, the Marquis de *Pavelle*, Lieutenant-General of the Duke's Forces, has made himself Master of a very considerable Post, called *Coches Dauphin*, being a Pass at the Entrance into *Dauphine*; it was defended by about 150 men, who were forced to surrender at Discretion. On Sunday last 400 *Vaudois*, who are come from *Wirtemberg*, arrived at *Rivole*, and 300 more are daily expected. On Monday a Regiment of 800 French Protestants passed through this place, in their march to joyn the Marquis de *Pavelle*: And the same day in the evening the Duke of *Savoie* arrived here from the Camp. We hear, that Monsieur *Catinat* is going to put his Troops into Winter-quarters; and we shall quickly do the like on our side.

Venice, Novemb. 18. A Vessel is arrived here from *Valona*, whence she came on the 25th of the last month, but brings no other News, than that the Fleet was on its departure for *Corfu*, to winter there. By an Express from *Rome* we have advice of the Pope's having, on Monday last, filled the two vacant Places in the College of Cardinals, by the Promotion of Signior *Barbarini*, Auditor of the Chamber, and the Abbot *Altieri*, to that Dignity; which the Cardinals, that are in the Emperor's Interests, seem much dissatisfied at, for that his Imperial Majesty pretended to have had one of these Caps given at his Nomination. The Advices from the *Levant* speak of a Bloody Contest which happened at *Mitela* between the Turks and Algerines, that were engaged in the late Sea Fight against the Venetians, each reproaching the others; Cowardice in that occasion; in which they say 2 or 3000 Turks and Algerines were killed.

Vienna, Novemb. 18. On Sunday last arrived here an Officer of the Regiment of *Erbeville*, with Letters of the 3d instant from Prince *Louis*, giving an account, That on the 23d of the last month, leaving all his Foot and Baggage at *Meages*, and ordering all the Passes on the left Hand in the Country of *Georgia* or *Girgio* to be shut up and well guarded, he advanced only with the Horse towards *Treckley*; and marching in one day 6 Hungarian Leagues, came so suddenly upon him, that he had hardly time to escape; however it was with much contention that he retired by the Pass of *Bozza* into *Valachia*, through which he was so closely pursued by our Forces, that they took part of his Baggage, and it's said, that he himself is fled to *Tergomista*. On the first instant our Army divided, 8 Regiments remaining near *Cronstadt*, under the command of General *Veterani*, whose Lieutenant-Generals are the Prince of *Hannuer* and Count *Pace*; and Prince *Louis* marching with 6 Regiments towards *Glausenburgh* in Expectation of the Emperor's Orders about their Winter-quarters. The Island near *Orsova* holds out still; and it's said, that the Germans and Radziens, that are posted there, have taken a great many Vessels laden with Provisions and Ammunition which the Turks were conducting to *Belgrade*. But from *Upper Hungary* we hear, that a Body of 10 or 12000 Turks, who were detached from the Grand Villiers Army after the taking of *Belgrade*, have relieved *Temeswar* and *Gyula*, and taken *Lippa*, the Garrison whereof after a Resistance of 8 or 9 days, made Conditions, to be conducted with their Arms and Baggage to *Segedin*. Yesterday arrived here the Regiment of *Becke* from the Empire, which will be forthwith sent to *Hungary*; and two Regiments of Foot more, and 1000 Horse, are daily expected from thence. The Commissary-General *Caraffa* has obtained of the Elector of *Bavaria* an Assistance of 4000 men, who are to serve the next Campaign in *Hungary*. General *Aprenont* continues still a Prisoner, and the several Officers that escaped from *Belgrade* are ordered to give in an exact Relation of all that passed in the Siege of that place.

Vienna, Novemb. 23. The last Letters from *Esbeck*, where Count *Guido* of *Staremberg* commands at present, give an account, that they had already levelled all the Works made by the Turks during the Siege, and that the Parties sent out by the Governor to observe the Enemies Motions, reported that the Turks retired in such a Contention, that they broke down all the Bridges behind them. The Grand Vicer's Army is marched from *Belgrade*, having (as 'tis believed,) first supplied, and reinforced the Garrisons of *Temeswar* and *Great Waradin* in *Upper Hungary*. The Town of *Buda* is now, by the diligence of the Baron d' *Arceyaga*, in a good condition of Defence, and the Breaches all repaired. Since the Surrender of *Lippa*, the Garrisons of *Karanseres* and *Lugars* are retired into *Transylvania*, after having demolished those places. The Palatin of *Hungary* has offered to raise, for the Emperor's Service, 6000 men of that Nation, to be maintained at the Charge of the Countrey, and 4000 more to receive the Emperor's Pay. At the same time Commissions are given out here for few Levies; the Emperor resolving to have an Army of above 50000 effective

five men in Hungary the next year, without reckoning the Troops of that Kingdom, and those it will be necessary to keep in Transylvania, towards the making up of which Forces the Elector of Bavaria will furnish 4000 men, 6000 Imperialists are recalled from the Empire, 12000 will be raised by the Hereditary Countries, the rest are now in Hungary and Transylvania, or will be raised by the Emperor this Winter. The Count de Lodron, the Emperors Ambassador Extraordinary to the Swiss Cantons, parted from hence on Wednesday last with full Instructions to raise the 4000 men granted the Emperor some time since by the Cantons.

Mentz, Novemb. 29. General Thungen, who commands here, having advice, that 15000 French were drawn together near Keyserlautern, and that they had some design upon this place, has reinforced our Garrison with 4 Regiments of Hesse, by which we believe the Enemy are disappointed in their Enterprize.

Cologne, Decemb. 1. General Swartz, who commands the Frontier Troops, has at last received Orders to remain with five Regiments in this Diocese, where they are to have their Winter-quarters. The French Troops are in Motion on the Moselle. The Deputies from Basle, of the 24th Inst, tell us, That the Deputies of the 13 Cantons have, in their General Diet held at Baden, unanimously resolv'd not to suffer the French to go on with their new Works at Hunningen, and that they had communicated this Resolution to the French Ambassador, who had desired three weeks time to receive the Kings his Masters Directions thereupon; and in the meantime had promised, that a Stop should be put to the said Works.

Paris, Novemb. 27. The French King has lately put out an Edict, declaring, That the Excessive Expences he is engag'd in for the defence of the Kingdom against so many Enemies, having oblig'd him after the great Alienations he has been forc'd to make of his Revenues, to have recourse to extraordinary ways, for the raising of Monies, he had thought fit to create two new Presidents a mortier, a third Advocate or Attorney General, 16 Counsellors, and divers other inferior Officers in the Parliament of Paris. The said Presidents paying each 500000 Livres, the Advocate-General 300000, the Counsellors 100000, and the other Officers proportionably; which by computation will bring into the Kings Coffers two Millions six hundred Livres; and it's believed a like augmentation of Officers will be made in all the other Courts of Judicature. The Letters from Savoy give an account that Monsieur Cabinas being come before Susa, the Town submitted on the 12th instant, and the next day the Governor of the Cittadel capitulated, and the Garrison, consisting of 700 men, march'd with their Arms and Baggage, and 3 pieces of Cannon to Turin, where the Governor was secur'd for not better defending the place; the French having only fired 3 pieces of Cannon, and 3 Bombs against it, and had their Trenches open but 18 hours. About the same time the Marquis de Parede with 4000 men of the Duke's Forces, took Chastellon-Dauphin situated at the entrance into Dauphine, the French in Garrison there being forc'd, after a stout resistance, to surrender at discretion. We hear since that Monsieur Caron has separated his Troops, in order to put them into their Winter-quarters in Dauphine, Provence, and Languedoc. The Marechal de Lorge who commanded the French Army in Germany under the Dauphin, is returned hither, having left the Marquis d'Uxelles to command in Alsace. Signior N. colini the Pope's Nuncio is likewise arriv'd here, but has not yet appear'd in publick. The Duke of Luxemburg has, it's said, orders to return to Holland.

Brussels, Decemb. 5. The French, by their motions on our Frontiers, seem to have some design in hand; their Garrisons are crowded with men, and they make great provision of Forage between the Samore and the Meuse. The Marquis de Boufflers, who commands in the absence of the Duke of Luxemburg, having been to view Thion on the Sambre (which place the French are fortifying with great diligence) and their other frontier Garrisons, is come to Tournay, where he held on the 2d instant a great Council of War. Our Governour-General at the same time is reinforcing our frontier Garrisons, and has given Orders for the fortifying several Posts for the greater security of our Frontiers. There is a discourse that the Prince of Liege is treating with to raise 4000 Foot, 400 Horse, and 500 Dragoons, for the service of these Countries.

Hague, Decemb. 5. Great Preparations are making here for the Reception of His Majesty of Great Britain. The Deputies of the States and those from the Admiralties continue their Conferences about the Sea Affairs. Prince Waldeck is still at Masfricht.

Dublin, Novemb. 21. The Lord Justices have issued a Proclamation for Regulating the Quarters of the Army, and determining the Rates to be allow'd for the Soldiers Dyet, the Taxes of Provisioners, and the manner how the Inhabitants that trust them shall be paid for the same. Their Lordships have likewise issued a Proclamation for preventing the Mischief occasion'd by the Rapparees. We have an account from the County of Wicklow, that Captain Archer, with 20 of the Militia, had, on the 13th instant, taken upon a Party of Rapparees, but finding them much stronger than

he expected, was forc'd to retire with the loss of 4 of his men, upon which he immediately rais'd some more of the Militia, and the next morning by break of day again engag'd the Rapparees, and put them to flight, killing and wounding about 100 of them, and taking 20 Prisoners.

Portsmouth, Novemb. 27. This day Sir Cloudfly Shovel sail'd from St. Helens, with Their Majesties Ships under his Command, to the Westward.
