This restriction does not apply to Ladies who, from official position or other circumstances, are specially privileged to make presentations to Her Majesty.

The Lady who proposes to present another must send in writing the name of such Lady to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, not later than *two days* previous to the Drawing Room, in order that the Lord Chamberlain may submit the name to Her Majesty, when, if it be approved, presentation cards will be forwarded.

Printed Forms for this purpose can be obtained at the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

It is particularly requested that the names of the Lady to be presented be *very distinctly written* on the presentation cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain at the Drawing Room, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-nine; and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; and of the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-nine; and of the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the fifteenth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-nine and of the Acts therein mentioned that is to say the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen and of the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-nine and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and fourteen have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called 'the said benefice') of Shirehampton in the county of Gloucester and in the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Shirehampton is now vested in the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the parish of Westbury-on-Trym in the said county of Gloucester and in the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol.

"And whereas the Reverend William Cartwright now vicar or incumbent of the said parish of Westbury-on-Trym is desirous that the next turn of presentation to the said benefice of Shirehampton shall be assigned to and be vested in the Reverend Alfred James Harvey (now vicar or incumbent of the same benefice) his heirs and assigns and that saving such next turn of presentation the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Shirehampton now vested in him the said William Cartwright as aforesaid as such vicar or incumbent should be transferred to and be vested in the Bishop for the time being of the diocese within which the said benefice shall from time to time be situate.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Charles John now Bishop of the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol (being the diocese within which the said benefice of Shirehampton is now situate as aforesaid) is willing to accept such transfer saving the next turn of presentation as aforesaid and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Acts recited or by some or one of them is made necessary, he the said Charles John, Bishop of the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas a sum of money has been paid over to us in augmentation of the income of the said benefice of Shirehampton but upon the understanding that the patronage of the same benefice shall be transferred as is hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas under these circumstances we are of opinion that the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of Shirehampton which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage or advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists that is to say in the parish of Shirehampton.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said William Cartwright now vicar or incumbent of the said parish of Westbury-on-Trym acting as such vicar or incumbent (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) and with the consent of the said Charles John Bishop of the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the next turn of presentation to the said benefice of Shirehampton shall be assigned to and vested in the said Alfred James Harvey his heirs and assigns and that saving such next turn of presentation the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Shirehampton now vested in the said William Cartwright as such vicar or incumbent of the said parish of Westbury-on-Trym as aforesaid shall be transferred from him the said William Cartwright and from his successors vicars or incumbents of the said parish of Westbury-on-Trym to the Bishop for the time being of the diocese within which the said benefice of Shirehampton shall from time to time be situate, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and such right of patronage shall and may from time to time be exercised by the Bishop for the time being of the diocese within which the said benefice of Shirehampton shall from time to time be situate.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the respective Registrars of the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol at Bristol and at Gloucester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her Majesty chapter ninety-four of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her Majesty chapter ninety-four and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her Majesty chapter ninety-four duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme or Representation bearing date the twenty-ninth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England acting under the provisions of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four, of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Your Majesty, chapter ninety-four; and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme or representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Saint Fagan, Aberdare, in the county of Glamorgan, and in the diocese of Llandaff.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the twenty-eighth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six and published in the London Gazette upon the first day of August following a part of the parish of Aberdare in the county and diocese aforesaid was assigned as a district to the consecrated church of Saint Fagan situate within the limits of the said parish of Aberdare and the same district was called 'The District Chapelry of Saint Fagan Aberdare.'

"And whereas the said district chapelry of Saint Fagan Aberdare has under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and four, become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act and by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and by the above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas by the authority of another Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the seventeenth day of March in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five and published in the London Gazette on the nineteenth day of the same month the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Fagan Aberdare were altered so as to comprise within its limits another part of the said parish of Aberdare and so as to dis sever from the said new parish of Saint Fagan Aberdare a certain portion thereof and to reannex such portion to the said parish of Aberdare.

"And whereas it has been represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Fagan Aberdare should be further altered in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Richard Bishop of the said diocese of Llandaff (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London

Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Fagan Aberdare shall be altered so that all those two portions of the said parish of Aberdare which are described in the first and second parts of the Schedule hereunder written and which are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended and are thereon coloured pink shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of Saint Fagan Aberdare; and that in like manner all that portion of the new parish of Saint Lleurwg Hirwain in the county and diocese aforesaid which is described in the third part of the Schedule hereunder written and which is delineated and set forth upon the said map or plan hereunto appended and is thereon coloured yellow shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of Saint Fagan Aberdare.

"And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory to be annexed to the new parish of Saint Fagan Aberdare in the county of Glamorgan and in the diocese of Llandaff, comprising:—

"I. All that contiguous portion of the parish of Aberdare in the county and diocese aforesaid wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls, and which is bounded upon the south-east by the said new parish of Saint Fagan Aberdare upon the south-west partly by the same new parish and partly by the new parish of Saint Lleurwg Hirwain situate partly in the said county of Glamorgan and partly in the county of Brecon and wholly in the diocese aforesaid (inclusive of the hereinafter described portion of the last-named new parish) upon the west and upon the north-west by the parish of Penderyn in the said county of Brecon and in the diocese of Saint David's and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the north-east by the new parish of Cyfarthfa, in the said county of Glamorgan and in the diocese of Llandaff aforesaid.

"II. All that other contiguous portion of the said parish of Aberdare wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls, and which is bounded upon the south-east by the new parish of Saint Margaret Aberaman in the said county of Glamorgan and in the diocese of Llandaff aforesaid, upon the south-west and west by the parish or parochial chapelry of Ystrad-y-fodwg in the same county and diocese, upon the north-west by the new parish of Saint Lleurwg Hirwain aforesaid (including the hereinafter described portion of the same new parish) and upon the east partly by the said new parish of Saint Fagan Aberdare and partly by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Fagan Aberdare from the parish of Aberdare aforesaid, at the point in the middle of the Dare River distant two chains or thereabouts to the west of the Dare Viaduct which carries the line of the Aman Branch of the Great Western Railway

over the said river, at which point the same river is joined by the stream or watercourse called or known as Nant Shon Shienecyn which flows from above the rifle range belonging to the Third Volunteer Battalion of the Welsh Regiment past the houses called or known as Tir-evan-bach-traws and Cwm Place, and extending thence that is from the said point in the Dare River aforesaid south-westward along the middle of the said stream or watercourse for a distance of fifty chains or thereabouts (thereby passing under the line of the Dare Valley Branch of the Taff Vale Railway and under the line of the Dare Branch of the said Great Western Railway and crossing the said Volunteer Rifle Range) to the source of the same stream or watercourse, and extending thence southward and in a direct line for a distance of thirty-three chains or thereabouts over the mountain called or known as Cefn-Rhôs-Gwawr to the source of the stream called or known as Nant Hafod-wen and continuing thence southward along the middle of the last-named stream for a distance of twenty-five and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with the stream called or known as Nant Aman-Fach and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named stream for a distance of two chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said parish of Aberdare from the new parish of Saint Margaret Aberaman aforesaid.

"III. All that contiguous portion of the said new parish of Saint Lleurwg Hirwain which is bounded upon the south-east partly by the secondly hereinbefore described portion of the parish of Aberdare aforesaid and partly by the new parish of Saint Fagan Aberdare aforesaid upon the east and upon part of the north by the firstly hereinbefore described portion of the said parish of Aberdare, and upon all other sides, that is to say, upon the remaining part of the north and upon the west by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary dividing the said firstly herein described portion of the parish of Aberdare from the new parish of Saint Lleurwg Hirwain aforesaid joins the boundary dividing the said county of Glamorgan from the county of Brecon aforesaid at which point the stream called or known as Nant Hir joins the Cynou River, and extending thence generally westward along the middle of the last-named river for a distance of forty-seven and a half chains or thereabouts (thereby following the said county boundary) to the point where the same river is joined by the stream called or known as Nant-y-Wrenddu, and extending thence southward along the middle of the last-named stream for a distance of twenty-three and a half chains or thereabouts (thereby passing to the west of the house called or known as Pant-yr-ysgawen, and passing under the line of the Aberdare and Hirwain Tramway, and under the line of the Hirwain Common Railway, and then following the western branch of the same stream) to the centre of the bridge which carries the Hirwain-road over the said western branch or the same stream, and extending thence in a direction due south, and in a straight line for a distance of twenty-eight chains or thereabouts (thereby crossing Slade's Patch) to the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Lleurwg Hirwain from the secondly hereinbefore described portion of the parish of Aberdare aforesaid."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme or representation have been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbents of the cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such scheme or representation and such patrons and

incumbents have respectively signified their assent thereto.

And whereas the said scheme or representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Llandaff.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the twenty-third day of May in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-four and published in the London Gazette upon the fifteenth day of October in the same year a part of the parish of Rhuddlan in the said county of Flint and in the diocese of Saint Asaph aforesaid was assigned as a chapelry district to the consecrated church situate at Rhyl within the limits of such parish and the same chapelry district was called 'The Chapelry District of Rhyl.'

"And whereas the said chapelry district of Rhyl has under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and four, become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act, and by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and by the above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas it has been represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the new parish of Rhyl should be altered in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Alfred George Bishop of the said diocese of Saint Asaph (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or repre-

sentation) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries of the said new parish of Rhyl shall be altered so that all that portion of the said parish of Rhuddlan which is described in the Schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended and is thereon coloured pink shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of Rhyl.

"And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory to be annexed to the new parish of Rhyl in the county of Flint and in the diocese of Saint Asaph, being:—

"All that part of the parish of Rhuddlan in the same county and diocese wherein the present incumbent of such parish still possesses the exclusive cure of souls which is comprised within and is co-extensive with the limits of that part of the township of Brynhedydd which is bounded upon the east by the township of Rhydorddwy in the said parish of Rhuddlan upon the north by the sea upon the west by the said new parish of Rhyl and upon the remaining side that is to say upon the south by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Rhyl from the parish of Rhuddlan aforesaid at the point opposite to the gate at the entrance to the house called or known as Merllyn in the middle of the road which leads from Rhyl to the house called or known as Rhydorddwy-fawr and to Henafon and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last-mentioned road for a distance of forty chains or thereabouts (thereby following for a short distance the boundary which divides the said township of Brynhedydd from the township of Trellewelyn in the parish of Rhuddlan aforesaid) to the point where such road crosses the boundary which divides the said township of Brynhedydd from the township of Rhydorddwy aforesaid."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme or representation have been transmitted to the patron and to the incumbents of the cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such scheme or representation and such patron and incumbents have respectively signified their assent thereto.

And whereas the said scheme or representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Saint Asaph.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the fifteenth and sixteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in the metropolis," it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that for the protection of the public health burials in any part or parts of the Metropolis, or in any burial grounds or places of burial in the Metropolis, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that, from and after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such part or parts of the Metropolis, or in such burial grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require; provided that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order the same to be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of the parishes in which any burial grounds or places of burial affected by such representation shall be situate, or on some other conspicuous places, within the part or parts of the Metropolis affected by such representation, one calendar month, at the least before such representation is so considered; Provided always, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and the Vestry Clerk of such parish:

And whereas by another Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit:

The following information has been received from Commander C. T. Turner, Her Majesty's ship "Nympe," the result of recent examinations made of the locality:—

On 29th November, 1890, from a position about four miles southward of Laeloa or Barber Point, the "Nympe" steered towards the lighthouse on that point, with look-outs on deck and aloft; the day was bright with a moderate southerly swell, and any danger would have been seen to

break; the lead gave no bottom at 80 and 70 fathoms, until the lighthouse bore N. ¾ W., distant about two miles, when a depth of 85 fathoms (sand and coral) was obtained; with the lighthouse on nearly the same bearing and distant about 1½ miles the water shoaled quickly to about 14 fathoms and to five, and three fathoms at the distances of one mile, and seven cables respectively; other soundings extending about 1½ miles both northward and eastward of the point gave similar depths at a somewhat less distance from the land.

On 2nd December, further examination was made in the "Nympe" and her steam cutter, when, although there was no wind and only a slight swell, the surf broke in about three fathoms; from the sudden shoaling, the sea probably breaks in much deeper water with southerly gales. The edge of the shoal ground, about 1½ miles southward of Barber Point, and in about the depth of 20 fathoms, is well marked by change in the colour of the water; the point itself is very low.

Consequent on this examination, the Cautions Note:—"A shoal is reported to extend off Barber Point," has been removed from the Admiralty Chart.
