FRANCE—WEST COAST.

Port Louis—Sunken Rock in Fairway of Gavre Channel.

THE French Government has given notice, dated 26th March, 1891, that a rock, with about one foot on it at low water spring tides, exists in the Fairway of Gavre Channel, south-west of Port Louis. This rock lies with La Paix Rock Beacon (red tower) in line with Larmor Church Spire bearing N. 46° W., the beacon being distant about 1½ cables.

Approximate position, lat. 47° 42' N., long. 3° 21' 45" W.

RED SEA—WESTERN SHORE.

Trinkitat Harbour—Leading Beacons on Western Shore.

WITH reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 143 of 1891, that the two temporary beacons on the western shore of Trinkitat Harbour had been removed, information has been received from Commander H. N. Dudding, Her Majesty's ship "Dolphin," dated 26th February, 1891, that two beacons have again been erected on the western shores of Trinkitat Harbour, which, kept in line bearing S.W. by W., lead through the harbour entrance in not less than 24 feet water. These beacons consist of poles 35 feet high, placed 120 yards apart; the north-east beacon is surmounted by a diamond-shaped cage, the south-west by a square cage. The north-east beacon is situated close to the shore with Ras Makdam bearing N.E. ¾ N., and Observation Spot S.E. ¼ E., distant 5½ cables.

NOTE.—These beacons have been placed on the plau of Trinkitat Harbour, with "Temporary" written against them, as there is no guarantee how long they will remain in position.
