Forms for the purpose can be obtained at the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

Gentlemen who wish to be presented officially should communicate with the heads of their Department, who will provide them with the necessary cards and instructions.

By Her Majesty's Command,

The Ladies who propose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing Room are requested to bring with them to the Drawing Room two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Queen.

PRESENTATIONS.

The privilege of making presentations to The Queen at a Drawing Room is restricted to those Ladies who have themselves been previously presented to Her Majesty, and who are themselves present at the Drawing Room.

Under such circumstances a Lady has the privilege of presenting one Lady only at a Drawing Room in addition to her Daughters or Daughters-in-law.

This restriction does not apply to Ladies who, from official position or other circumstances, are specially privileged to make presentations to Her Majesty.

The Lady who proposes to present another must send in writing the name of such Lady to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, not later than *two days* previous to the Drawing Room, in order that the Lord Chamberlain may submit the name to Her Majesty, when, if it be approved, presentation cards will be forwarded.

Printed Forms for this purpose can be obtained at the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

It is particularly requested that the names of the Lady to be presented be *very distinctly written* on the presentation cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain at the Drawing Room, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

It is not expected that Gentlemen will present

themselves at a Drawing Room, except in attendance on the Ladies of their families.

for directing that certain silver pieces of money shall be current, and be a legal tender, in Her Majesty's Colony of the Leeward Islands.

VICTORIA, R.

WHEREAS by Our Royal Proclamation of this day's date certain parts of "The Coinage Act 1870" with the modifications con-

tained in the said Proclamation, were directed to apply to, and be in force in, Our Colony of the Leeward Islands.

And whereas by virtue of the said Proclamation it is lawful for Us with the advice of Our Privy Council to make such Proclamation as is hereinafter set forth.

Now therefore We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, do hereby proclaim, order, direct, and declare as follows:

1. There shall be coined, from time to time, at Our Royal Mint in England pieces of silver money to be called "Groats" or "Fourpences," which shall be of the weight and fineness herein specified and in the making of such coins a remedy or variation from the standard weight and fineness herein specified shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the amount specified viz. :—

2. The said coins shall be of the design following:

For the obverse impression Our Effigy with the inscription "Victoria Queen," and for the reverse the word "Fourpence" placed in the centre of the piece, encircled by an oak wreath, and surmounted by the Royal Crown, with the date of the year below and the inscription "British Guiana and West Indies" and with a graining upon the edge.

3. The said coins shall each be deemed to be of the same currency value as, and be equivalent in value to, four pennies of the lawful bronze or silver coinage of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland authorized by "The Coinage Act 1870," and to the "Groat" or "Fourpence" of the lawful silver coinage of Our said Kingdom authorized by the said Act.

4. The said coins shall be current within, and be a legal tender within, Our Colony of the Leeward Islands.

5. This Proclamation shall come into force in Our said Colony upon the date fixed in that behalf by the Governor, or Officer administering the Government of the said Colony by Proclamation to be made by him.

A PROCLAMATION

for declaring part of an Act of the Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and intituled "An Act to consolidate and amend the law relating to the Coinage and Her Majesty's Mint," and which may be cited as "The Coinage Act 1870," to be applicable to, and in force in, Her Majesty's Colonies of Barbados and the Leeward Islands.

VICTORIA, R.

WHEREAS by "The Coinage Act 1870," it is provided that it shall be lawful for Us, with the advice of Our Privy Council, from time to time by Proclamation to direct that the whole or any part of that Act shall apply to, and be in force in, any British possession with, or without, any modifications contained in the Proclamation.

We, therefore, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, have thought fit to issue this Our Royal Proclamation and We do proclaim, ordain, declare, and command that, from and after the respective dates of the publication of this Our Proclamation by the Governors, or other Officers administering the Government of Our said Colonies of Barbados and the Leeward Islands respectively, so much of section eleven of the said Act as is hereinafter set forth (with the modifications herein contained) shall be applicable to, and be in force in, Our said Colonies respectively, viz. :

"The Coinage Act 1870," part of section eleven modified to read as follows:—

It shall be lawful for Her Majesty, with the

advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, by Proclamation to do all or any of the following things namely:—

1. To determine the dimension of, and design for, any coin:
2. To determine the denominations of coins to be coined at Her Majesty's Royal Mint in England:
3. To determine the amount of remedy to be allowed in the case of any coin:
4. To determine the weight below which a coin, whether diminished in weight by wear or otherwise, is not to be a current coin or a legal tender:
5. To call in coins of any date or denomination, or any coins coined before the date in the Proclamation mentioned:
6. To direct that any coins other than gold silver or bronze shall be current, and be a legal tender for the payment of any amount not exceeding the amount specified in the Proclamation and not exceeding five shillings:
7. To direct that coins coined in any foreign country shall be current, and be a legal tender at such rates, up to such amounts, and in such portion of Her Majesty's dominions, as may be specified in the Proclamation, due regard being had in fixing those rates to the weight and fineness of such coins as compared with the current coins of the Realm:
8. To revoke, or alter any Proclamation previously made.

Every such Proclamation shall come into operation on the date therein in that behalf

mentioned, and shall have effect as if enacted in "The Coinage Act 1870."

WHEREAS by "The Marriage Act 1890" power is given to Her Majesty the Queen by Order in Council to make regulations, among other matter.

"Modifying in special cases or classes of cases the requirements of the Consular Marriage Acts and this Act as to residence and notice, so far as such modification appears to Her Majesty to be consistent with the observance of due precautions against the solemnization of clandestine marriages."

And whereas necessity has been shown for modifying the requirements of the Consular Marriage Acts and the Marriage Act 1890 as to residence and notice in the cases of certain marriages which are about to be solemnized at St. Petersburg within the house of Her Majesty's Ambassador at that place as defined by the Foreign Marriages Order in Council 1890, one or both of the parties to which marriages respectively are British subjects or a British subject.

And whereas such modifications appear to Her Majesty to be consistent with the observance of due precautions against the solemnization of clandestine marriages.

And whereas the said parties to the said intended marriages have not yet complied, and may be unable wholly to comply, with the requirements of the said Acts as to residence and notice.

Now therefore Her Majesty by and with the advice of Her Privy Council and by virtue of the power vested in Her Majesty by the Marriage Act 1890 is pleased to order and it is hereby ordered as follows :

The requirements of the Consular Marriage Acts, and the Marriage Act 1890, as to residence and notice, are hereby modified so that the said requirements shall be dispensed with as regards any parties or party to any marriage which may be celebrated at St. Petersburg as aforesaid between the date of this Order and the ninth August one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, to the extent to which such parties or party shall at the date of such marriage have been unable to comply with them.

And the Right Honourable the Marquess of Salisbury, K.G., Her Majesty's Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, is to give the necessary directions herein.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the forty-fifth and forty-sixth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "The Militia Act, 1882," it is, amongst other things, enacted that, save as therein otherwise provided, the Militia shall be trained and exercised for not less than twenty-one days and not more than twenty-eight days in every year, at such times and at such places in every part of the United Kingdom as Her Majesty may appoint, and also that Her Majesty may, from time to time, with the advice of Her Privy Council, order that the period of training and exercise in any year, of all or any part of the Militia be extended, but so that the

whole period of training and exercise be not more than fifty-six days :

And whereas it is expedient that the training of the Edinburgh Artillery, Southern Division, Royal Artillery, the Forfar and Kincardine Artillery, Southern Division, Royal Artillery, the Donegal Artillery, Southern Division, Royal Artillery, the Mid-Ulster Artillery, Southern Division, Royal Artillery, the Clare Artillery, Southern Division, Royal Artillery and the Northumberland Artillery, Western Division, Royal Artillery, and also of the Royal Anglesey Engineer Militia, Fortress Forces, Royal Engineers, the Royal Monmouthshire Engineer Militia, Fortress Forces, Royal Engineers, and of the several Divisions of the Engineer Militia, Submarine Miners, Royal Engineers, should be extended beyond the period of twenty-eight days for the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one.

Now therefore, Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and direct that the period of training and exercise of the before-mentioned Regiments and Divisions of Militia, shall, for the year one thousand, eight hundred and ninety-one, be extended, under the provisions of the before-cited Act, from twenty-eight days to the number of days in each case hereinafter mentioned, that is to say :—

Edinburgh Artillery, Southern Division, Royal Artillery, thirty-four (34) days.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her Majesty chapter ninety-four, of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her Majesty chapter ninety-four and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her Majesty chapter ninety-four duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme or representation bearing date the nineteenth day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, in the words following, that is to say:—

“We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England acting under the provisions of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme or representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Killingworth in the county of Northumberland and in the diocese of Newcastle.

“Whereas by the authority of an Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the eighteenth day of May in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five and published in the London Gazette upon the day following a part of the parish of Long Benton in the said county of Northumberland and at that time in the diocese of Durham but now in the diocese of Newcastle aforesaid was constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and the same was named ‘The District of Killingworth.’

“And whereas the said district of Killingworth has, under the provisions of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-seven become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act and by the above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four.

“And whereas it has been represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Killingworth should be altered in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

“Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Ernest Roland Bishop of the said diocese of Newcastle (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation)

we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries of the said new parish of Killingworth shall be altered so that all that contiguous portion of the parish of Earsdon (known as the township of Burradon) in the said county of Northumberland and in the diocese of Newcastle aforesaid which is described in the Schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended and is thereon coloured pink shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of Killingworth.

“And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore-mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

“The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference:—

“The territory to be annexed to the new parish of Killingworth in the county of Northumberland and in the diocese of Newcastle being:—

“All that portion of the parish of Earsdon in the same county and diocese wherein the present incumbent of such parish still possesses the exclusive cure of souls which is comprised within and is coextensive with the limits of the township of Burradon.”

And whereas drafts of the said scheme or representation have been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbents of the cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such scheme or representation, and such patrons and incumbents have respectively signified their assent thereto.

And whereas the said scheme or representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Newcastle.

“We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting under the provisions of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Your Majesty, chapter ninety-four, of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme or Representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels Bishopston in the county of Gloucester and in the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol.

“Whereas by the authority of an Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the nineteenth day of July in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two and published in the London Gazette upon the twenty-second day of the same month certain contiguous portions of the parish of Horfield of the parish of Stapleton and of the new parish of Saint Andrew Montpelier all in the said county of Gloucester and in the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol aforesaid were assigned as a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of St. Michael and All Angels situate at Bishopston within the limits of the said parish of Horfield and the same consolidated chapelry was called ‘The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Michael and All Angels, Bishopston.’

“And whereas the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Michael and All Angels Bishopston has under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and four become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act, and by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven and by the above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four.

“And whereas it has been represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels Bishopston should be altered in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

“Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles John Bishop of the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels Bishopston shall be altered so that all that portion of the parish or parochial chapelry of Westbury-upon-Trym, which parish or parochial chapelry is situate partly in

“And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore-mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

“The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

“The territory to be annexed to the new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels Bishopston in the county of Gloucester and in the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, being:—

“All that portion of the parish or parochial chapelry of Westbury-upon-Trym which parish or parochial chapelry is situate partly in the said county of Gloucester and partly in the city and county of the city of Bristol and wholly in the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol aforesaid wherein the present incumbent of such parish or parochial chapelry still possesses the exclusive cure of souls. And whereas the said scheme or representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the respective Registrars of the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, at Bristol, and at Gloucester.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the eleventh day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-one and published in the London Gazette upon the twelfth day of November following a part of the parish of Bolton-le-Moors in the said county of Lancaster and at that time in the diocese of Chester but now in the diocese of Manchester aforesaid was assigned as a district chapelry to the consecrated church called Saint George's Chapel situate within the limits of the said parish and the same district chapelry was called 'The Saint George's District.'

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend James, Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries both of the said new parish of Saint George (Bolton-le-Moors) and of the said new parish of Saint Paul Bolton-le-Moors shall be altered so that all that portion of the said new parish of Saint George (Bolton-le-Moors) which is described in the Schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended and is thereon coloured pink shall be dissevered from such new parish and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of Saint Paul Bolton-le-Moors.

"And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory to be dissevered from the new parish of Saint George (Bolton-le-Moors) in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester and to be annexed to the new parish of Saint Paul Bolton-le-Moors in the same county and diocese being:—

"All that part of the said new parish of Saint George (Bolton-le-Moors) which is bounded upon part of the north by the new parish of Saint Luke Halliwell in the said county and diocese upon the west and upon the south-west by the parish of Dean in the same county and diocese upon the south-east partly by the new parish of The Saviour Bolton-le-Moors in the county and diocese aforesaid and partly by the new parish of Saint Paul Bolton-le-Moors aforesaid and upon the remaining sides that is to say upon the north-west and upon the remaining part of the north by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Paul Bolton-le-Moors from the new parish of Saint George (Bolton-le-Moors) aforesaid at the bridge which carries over the River Croal the roadway connecting Grime-street with Pool-street and extending thence northward for a distance of two chains or thereabouts along the middle of the said roadway and along the middle of Pool-street

aforesaid to the junction of the last-named street with Saint Helena-road and extending thence first north-eastward and then northward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of six and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Bark-street and extending thence westward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of five chains or thereabouts to its junction with Pool-street aforesaid and extending thence northward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of two and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Saint George's-road and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of six chains or thereabouts to its intersection by Dawson-lane and extending thence southward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of seven chains or thereabouts to its junction with Bark-street aforesaid and with Chorley-street and extending thence westward and in a direct line across the last-named street to a point on its western side upon the boundary which divides the township of Little Bolton from the township of Great Bolton and extending thence first north-westward and then south-westward along the said township boundary for a distance of eighteen chains and a half or thereabouts thereby passing in part along the wall or fence forming the north-eastern and north-western boundaries of the Bolton Infirmary to the point where the same wall or fence joins the wall or fence forming the north-eastern boundary of Bolton Park and extending thence alternately westward and northward along the last-described wall or fence for a distance of thirteen chains or thereabouts to the point where it strikes the southern side of Chorley New-road and extending thence northward and in a direct line to the boundary in the middle of the last-named road which boundary divides the said new parish of Saint George (Bolton-le-Moors) from the new parish of Saint Luke Halliwell aforesaid."

And whereas the said scheme or representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Manchester.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that for the protection of the public health the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the *London Gazette*, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and vestry clerk or churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas by another Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit:

And whereas the Right Honourable Henry Matthews, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbent and

the churchwardens of the parish hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that he is of opinion that the Order of Her Majesty in Council of the fifth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, in so far as it affects burials in the church and churchyard of Iping, in the county of Sussex, should be varied, and that the directions hereinafter set forth should be substituted for those contained in the said Order, with respect to burials in the said church and churchyard:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the twentieth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, and such Order has been published in the *London Gazette*, and copies thereof have been affixed as required by the said first-recited Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered:—

That burials be discontinued forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Iping, in the county of Sussex; and also in the churchyard, except for the future burial, at his decease, of Mr. Charles Gibbs, in a vault or grave not less than five feet deep.

(ii.) The same parts of the landing-vessel shall be thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water: then

(iii.) The same parts of the landing-vessel shall have applied to them a coating of lime-wash: except that

(iv.) The application of lime-wash shall not be compulsory as regards such parts of the landing-vessel as are used for the crew.

(2.) The scrapings and sweepings of the landing-vessel shall not be landed unless and until they have been well mixed with quicklime.

5. The cattle so transhipped shall continue to be deemed foreign animals.
