TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE, TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command,

Gentlemen who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Gentlemen who propose to present others must send in writing the name of such Gentlemen to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, not later than *two days* previous to the Levee, in order that the Lord Chamberlain may submit the names to Her Majesty, when, if they are approved, Presentation Cards will be forwarded. Forms for the purpose can be obtained at the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

Gentlemen who wish to be presented officially should communicate with the heads of their Department, who will provide them with the necessary cards and instructions.

WHEREAS by "The Seal Fishery (Behring's Sea) Act 1891," it is enacted that Her Majesty the Queen may by Order in Council prohibit the catching of seals by British ships in Behring's Sea or such part thereof as is defined by the said Order during the period limited by the Order:

And whereas the expression "Behring's Sea" in the said Act means the seas known as Behring's Sea within the limits described in an Order under the said Act.

Now therefore Her Majesty in virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Act by

and with the advice of Her Privy Council is hereby pleased to order and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Seal Fishery (Behring's Sea) Order in Council, 1891.

2. From and after the twenty-fourth day of June one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one until the first day of May one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two the catching of seals by British ships in Behring's Sea as hereinafter defined is hereby prohibited.

3. For the purposes of the said recited Act and of this Order the expression "Behring's Sea" means so much of that part of the Pacific Ocean known as Behring's Sea as lies between the parallel of 65° 30' north latitude and the chain of the Aleutian Islands and eastward of the following line of demarcation, that is to say, a line commencing at a point in Behring's Straits on the said parallel of 65° 30' north latitude, at its intersection by the meridian which passes midway between the Islands of Krusenstern or Ignalook and the Island of Ratmanoff or Noonarbook and proceeding thence in a course nearly south-west through Behring's Straits and the seas known as Behring's Sea so as to pass midway between the north-west point of the Island of Saint Lawrence and the south-east point of Cape Choukotski to the meridian of 172° west longitude, thence, from the intersection of that meridian in a south-westerly direction so as to pass midway between the Island of Attou and the Copper Island of the Kormandorski couplet or group in the North Pacific Ocean, to the meridian of 193° west longitude.

WHEREAS by the three hundred and thirty-third section of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for every Pilotage Authority, by Bye-law made with the consent of Her Majesty in Council, from time to time to do within its district all or any of the things specified in that behalf in the said section:

And whereas the Fraserburgh Harbour Commissioners being the Pilotage Authority for the Port and Harbours of Fraserburgh within the meaning of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," in exercise of the powers vested in them by that Act have made and submitted for the consent of Her Majesty certain Bye-laws, Regulations, and Rates:

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that the proposed Bye-laws, Regulations, and Rates are reasonable and proper:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said "Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to approve of, and signify Her consent to, the said Bye-laws, Regulations, and Rates, as set forth in the Schedule hereto annexed.

SCHEDULE.

BYE-LAWS, Regulations, and Rates for the Captain Pilot and Pilots plying at the Port and Harbours of Fraserburgh.

Whereas the Harbour Commissioners of Fraserburgh, incorporated by the "Fraserburgh Harbour Act, 1878," are a Pilotage Authority within the meaning of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854,"

And whereas by section one hundred and sixteen of the said Fraserburgh Harbour Act it is provided that pilotage is compulsory at Fraserburgh on all vessels of thirty tons register and upwards the said Pilotage Authority have framed the Bye-laws hereunto annexed for the government and regulation of the Captain Pilot and Pilots of and for the Harbours of Fraserburgh within their district and under their jurisdiction and for fixing and determining the remuneration to be paid to such Captain Pilot and Pilots.

Captain Pilot.

I. The Captain Pilot shall have the superintendence of all the other Pilots, and see that the following Regulations for their government are strictly complied with; and in every case where his orders are not obeyed he shall immediately inform the Commissioners through their Clerk of any breach of duty of which any Pilot may be guilty.

II. He shall hold his appointment during the pleasure of the Commissioners, and shall not engage in any other employment or hold an interest in any steam Tug or Pilot Boat, but devote his whole time and attention to the duties of his office.

III. He shall cause the shipping to be supplied with Pilots according to their order, without partiality or favour, and he shall attend at all times, particularly two hours before tide-time, and continue on the piers or in his Office, for two hours past high water or for such time as he shall consider it safe for vessels to enter or leave the harbour.

IV. He shall make out the accounts for Pilotage, and collect, or cause to be collected, the rates and duties of Pilotage, according to the following Tables, and apportion the same among the Pilots who may have been employed.

V. He is empowered where there may be any great difficulty or danger in the Pilots getting out to the assistance of vessels in the Bay, to offer them such Premiums for their attendance in these instances, as he shall judge necessary; such Premiums however to be subject to such modification as the Commissioners may judge right, and the Pilots shall rest satisfied with their decision.

VI. In case he shall be called upon to furnish Pilot Boats or Pilots to the assistance of any vessel in want thereof, or in distress, and shall either refuse, absent himself, or neglect to comply with such request, he shall on proof of such refusal, absence, or neglect, pay a fine not exceeding five pounds sterling.

VII. In addition to the general superintendence of the Pilots the Captain Pilot shall have charge of the Berthing of all Ships Vessels and Boats in the Harbours.

Pilots.

I. No person shall act as a Pilot without being licensed by the Harbour Commissioners, and the Licences shall be renewed, yearly or oftener, as the Commissioners direct.

II. Those licensed to act as Pilots shall apply themselves exclusively to that duty, and shall not engage in the White Fishery, Herring Fishery, or in any other employment, nor be absent from the Port without permission in writing from the Commissioners or the Captain Pilot.

III. The Pilots must give immediate obedience to all orders of the Captain Pilot, and comply with his directions in every particular.

IV. The boats to be used by the Pilots shall be of proper size and otherwise to the satisfaction of the Captain Pilot, and the crew of each boat must consist of not less than four or six men as may be ordered by the Captain Pilot, one of whom must be a licensed Pilot. The Master or Chief Pilot of each boat must cause his own name, and the number of his boat, to be painted thereon in large and distinct characters.

V. A Pilot taking charge of a vessel without his boat being manned as aforesaid shall forfeit ten shillings sterling for each man deficient besides the amount of the pilotage.

VI. The Pilots must be in attendance at the Harbours during two hours before and two hours after high water in each tide in readiness to be employed in piloting, and when desired they shall attend with their boats two hours before high water, to take charge of vessels going to sea, or having occasion to move from one part of the Harbours to another, and on intimation being given by the Captain Pilot to any Pilot, he shall be bound to attend at the Harbours at any other time that his services may be required. There shall at all times, by night as well as by day, be at least one Pilot on the look-out, and this duty shall be discharged by the Pilots according to such rotation or selection as the Captain Pilot may from time to time determine.

VII. The Pilots, whether at sea or not, shall be obliged to pay proper attention to all vessels in want of pilotage assistance; and after taking charge of them, shall not leave them until brought into proper moorings, to the satisfaction of their Commanders, or until directed by the Captain Pilot.

VIII. The Pilots belonging to one boat shall not have power to take charge of more than one vessel during each tide, unless with consent of the Captain Pilot.

IX. In case it shall appear to the Commissioners, after due enquiry, that any Pilot has been guilty of such misconduct or neglect of duty, as in their opinion shall render it expedient that he shall not longer continue to act as a Pilot, they shall have power by a resolution to that effect, to declare his licence to be forfeited, and such Pilot shall, within twenty-four hours after such resolution is intimated to him by the Clerk to the Commissioners, deliver up to the Clerk the licence held by him to be cancelled, and shall not thereafter be entitled to act as a Pilot until a new licence shall be granted to him by the Commissioners, who shall have power to refuse to grant the same should they consider it expedient to do so.

X. Any person acting as a Pilot without being licensed, or after his licence has expired, or been forfeited, shall forfeit and pay a fine not exceeding five pounds sterling.

XI. The rates of Pilotage shall be according to the following scale, one half of which shall be charged for Pilotage inwards, and one half for Pilotage outwards.

XII. No Pilot shall be at liberty to pilot out, or convey any ship or vessel, until the Captain Pilot shall declare himself satisfied that the rates and duties, in respect to such ship or vessel have been duly paid to the Collector appointed by the Commissioners to receive the same; and every Pilot so offending shall forfeit and pay the sum of five pounds sterling.

XIII. Any Pilot who shall refuse to take charge of a vessel upon a proper signal being made, or when directed by the Captain Pilot, or any person concerned with such vessel, or shall refuse on such signal or application to lead the way of any vessel which cannot be approached without imminent danger; or neglect any part of his duty as a Pilot, or shall refuse or neglect to obey any orders, either written or verbal of the Captain Pilot or the Commissioners requiring their appearance before them, shall be suspended from exercising his duties as a Pilot, and forfeit such penalty as the sitting Magistrate in the Police Court at Fraserburgh shall think proper, not exceeding five pounds sterling.

XIV. Vessels making signals for Pilots at a greater distance than Cairnbulg Head to the east or south-east; Pitullie Point to the west; and two miles to seaward on a line from Cairnbulg Head to Kinnairds Head shall pay the Pilots going out to them beyond these limits, such additional allowance, beyond the rates in the foregoing table as may be fixed by the Captain Pilot or the Commissioners.

XV. If a Pilot after taking charge of a vessel within the limits described in Section XIV shall, by stress of weather or other accident, be detained on board, he shall be entitled to his provisions and three shillings per day while on board; and if he shall from such cause be carried to another port with such vessel, he shall be paid at the same rate until he shall have reached the port of Fraserburgh along with a reasonable sum for provisions and travelling expenses all to be determined by the Commissioners in case of dispute.

XVI. All charges for extra trouble to be settled by the Captain Pilot.

XVII. A Pilot demanding or receiving under any pretence higher rates than those above-mentioned, shall forfeit and pay a fine not exceeding one pound sterling besides returning the overcharge, and in the option of the Commissioners his licence shall be declared forfeited.

XVIII. Masters or Owners of vessels refusing to pay according to the foregoing rates shall forfeit and pay a fine not exceeding five pounds sterling.

XIX. The Pilots will be furnished with Licences and a copy of these Regulations, which they shall carry about with them on all occasions when they are employed as Pilots; and they shall be bound to produce them when called upon to do so otherwise the Masters of vessels shall not

be obliged to receive them or to pay the dues of pilotage.

XX. The fees to be charged by the Pilotage Authority for Pilotage Certificates granted by them to Masters and Mates of vessels under the provisions of section three hundred and forty of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," shall not exceed two guineas for each Certificate and two shillings for each renewal thereof.

XXI. All penalties fines and forfeitures enacted by the foregoing Regulations shall be recovered in the Police Court at Fraserburgh at the instance of the Commissioners or the Procurator Fiscal of the burgh, agreeably to the forms in use for the time being in such Court or any other forms competent by the law of Scotland; and the presiding Magistrate may sentence any person found liable in a pecuniary penalty to imprisonment until the same is paid, but in no case shall the period of imprisonment for non-payment exceed sixty days.

XXII. All persons concerned shall, besides be bound to observe and shall be conducted by and liable in the whole clauses, enactments, forfeitures and penalties that are contained in and may be sustained and incurred under "The Fraserburgh Harbour Act, 1878," "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," and the Acts amending and incorporated with the same.

WHEREAS by "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act 1862" it is provided that in the case of any harbour, river or other inland navigation for which rules concerning the lights and signals to be carried by vessels navigating the waters thereof, or concerning the steps for avoiding collisions to be taken by such vessels, are not and cannot be made by or under the authority of any Local Act, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council, upon application from the Harbour Trust or body corporate (if any) owning or exercising jurisdiction upon such waters, to make rules concerning the lights and signals to be carried, and concerning the steps for avoiding collision to be taken by vessels navigating such waters; and that such rules, when so made, shall, so far as regards vessels navigating such waters, have the same effect as if they were regulations contained in the table (C) in the Schedule to the said Act, and notwithstanding anything in the said Act or in the Schedule thereto contained:

And whereas the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board, established by the Mersey Docks and Harbour Act, 1857, for the time being empowered to carry into effect the provisions of the Mersey Docks and Harbour Acts, 1857 to 1889, are the Harbour Board owning and exercising jurisdiction over the River Mersey and the Port and Harbour of Liverpool:

And whereas the said Mersey Docks and Harbour Board have applied to Her Majesty in Council to make rules concerning the signal lights to be carried, and concerning the steps for avoiding collision to be taken by vessels—to wit—dredgers—anchored moored or working in the River Mersey, or the sea channels leading thereto within the jurisdiction of the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers in Her vested by the said recited Act, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council,

doth hereby make the said rules which are set forth in the Schedule hereto. *C. L. Peel.*

SCHEDULE.

RULES concerning the lights to be carried and concerning the steps for avoiding collision to be taken by vessels—to wit—dredgers—anchored moored or working in the River Mersey or the Sea Channels leading thereto.

Every dredger anchored moored or working in the River Mersey or the Sea Channels leading thereto, within the jurisdiction of the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board shall, between sunset and sunrise, exhibit three bright white lights from globular lanterns of not less than eight inches in diameter, placed in triangular form, not less than six feet apart, on the top of the framework athwartships, and of sufficient power to be distinctly visible, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least one mile.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the session of Parliament holden in the seventh and eighth years of Her Majesty's reign intituled "An Act to amend the Law respecting the Office of County Coroner" it is (amongst other things) enacted that when, and as often as it shall seem expedient to the Justices of any county that such county should be divided into two or more districts for the purposes of that Act, or that any alterations should be made of any division theretofore made under that Act, it shall be lawful for the said Justices, in General or Quarter Sessions assembled, to resolve that a petition shall be presented to Her Majesty, praying that such division or alteration be made, and thereupon to adjourn the further consideration of such petition until notice thereof shall be given to the Coroner or Coroners of such county as in that Act thereafter provided, and that the Clerk of the Peace shall give notice of any such resolution to every Coroner for such county, and of the time when the petition will be taken by the said Justices into consideration, and the Justices shall confer with every such Coroner who shall attend the meeting of the Justices for that purpose touching such petition, having due regard to the size and nature of each proposed district, the number of inhabitants, the nature of their employment, and such other circumstances as shall appear to the Justices fit to be considered in carrying into execution the provisions of that Act, and that such petition, with a description of the several proposed districts and of the boundaries thereof, with the reasons upon which the petition is founded, shall be certified to Her Majesty under the hands and seals of two or more of the Justices present when such petition shall be agreed to, and the Clerk of the Peace for such county shall forthwith give or send a proper copy of such petition, certified under his hand, to every Coroner for such county, and that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, if She shall think fit, with the advice of Her Privy Council, after taking into consideration any such petition, and also any petition which may be presented to Her by any Coroner of the same county, concerning such proposed division or alteration, or whenever it shall seem fit to Her Majesty to direct the issue of a writ de coronatore eligendo for the purposes of authorizing the election of an additional

Coroner above the number of those who have been theretofore customarily elected in such county, to order that such county shall be divided into such and so many districts for the purposes of that Act as to Her Majesty, with the advice aforesaid, shall seem expedient, and to give a name to each of such districts, and that every such Order shall be published in the London Gazette :

And whereas by an Order in Council (duly made at a Court holden at Windsor on the twenty-sixth day of September one thousand eight hundred and forty-six) under and in accordance with the said Act, the county of Devon was divided into six districts for the purposes of the said Act, respectively named the "Honiton District," "Crediton District," "Barnstaple District," "Okehampton District," "Stoke Damerel District," and "Totnes District," and such districts were respectively to comprise the several parishes and places, and have the boundaries in that behalf in the said Order mentioned and set forth :

And whereas previous to and at the date of the said Order, and thenceforward until after the coming into operation of the Local Government Act, 1888, the boroughs of Bideford and Dartmouth in the said county respectively, were Municipal Boroughs within the meaning of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1835, and the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, respectively, and a separate Court of Quarter Sessions was at the said times holden in and for each of the said boroughs :

And whereas previous to and at the date of the said Order, and since the borough of South Molton, in the said county, was a Municipal Borough within the meaning of the said two last-mentioned Acts, and since the date of the said Order, and before the passing of the Local Government Act, 1888, Her Majesty was pleased to, and did, grant that a separate Court of Quarter Sessions be holden in and for the said borough :

And whereas the said boroughs, each having a separate Court of Quarter Sessions as aforesaid, and each containing, according to the census of one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, a population of less than ten thousand became, under and by virtue of the Local Government Act, 1888, on the first day of April one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, and since have been parts of the county of Devon for all purposes relating to Coroners, and subject to the jurisdiction of the County Coroners :

And whereas by an Order in Council (duly made at a Court holden at Windsor on the twenty-first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and ninety) it was ordered, directed, and declared that writs de coronatore eligendo for the election of three additional Coroners for the said county should forthwith be directed to the Devon County Council, and that from the date of the said Order the county of Devon should be divided into nine districts for Coroners' purposes, which said nine districts should be named as was in the Schedule to the said Order directed, and should respectively comprise the several parishes and places and have the boundaries prescribed and mentioned in the said Schedule :

And whereas the said boroughs have none of them been annexed to any of the Coroners' Districts of the said county :

And whereas, under and by virtue of the Local Government Act, 1888, the powers and business of the Justices of the said county in General or Quarter Sessions assembled in relation to the matters aforesaid have been transferred to the County Council of the said county :

And whereas a petition was on the seventeenth day of February one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, presented to Her Majesty by the Devon County Council praying that the district described in the said Order of the twenty-first day of March one thousand eight hundred and ninety as the Bideford District might be included in the district described in such Order as the Barnstaple District, which said petition with a description of the said proposed district, and of the boundaries thereof, with the reasons upon which the petition is founded, was duly certified to Her Majesty :

And whereas all the provisions of the hereinbefore firstly recited Act in that behalf have been complied with in relation to the said petition :

And whereas the Coroners for the said county have not presented any petition to Her Majesty :

And whereas Her Majesty has, with the advice of Her Privy Council, take into consideration the said petition, and is minded to make such alteration as aforesaid :

Now therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, direct, and declare, and it is hereby ordered, directed, and declared, that from the date hereof :—

(1.) The district described in the Order in Council of the twenty-first day of March one thousand eight hundred and ninety as the Bideford District shall be annexed to, and form part of, and be included in, the district described in the said Order as the Barnstaple District.

(2.) The county of Devon shall be divided into eight districts for Coroners' purposes, and for the purposes of the said firstly-mentioned Act.

(3.) The said eight districts shall be named as in the Schedule to this Order directed, and shall respectively comprise the several parishes and places, and have the boundaries prescribed and mentioned in that behalf in the Schedule hereto.

(4.) This Order shall be published in the London Gazette.

SCHEDULE.

The Districts numbered 1 to 6 inclusive are to be deemed not to include any parishes, or places, or parts thereof, which are comprised within the boundaries of any Municipal Borough having a separate Court of Quarter Sessions, or which are otherwise exempt from the jurisdiction of the Coroners for the county of Devon, whether such parishes, places, or parts thereof, are hereinafter named, or included, or not.

(i.) The Honiton District.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty chapter thirty-seven, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the fourteenth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, in the words following, that is to say :—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-seven, have prepared and now humbly lay

before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes to be taken out of the parish of Bexhill in the county of Sussex and in the diocese of Chichester.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said parish of Bexhill which is hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship.

"And whereas for the purpose of providing an endowment for the said proposed district a sum of four thousand and three hundred pounds three pounds per centum India Stock has been transferred to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners by Joseph Pearce Budgett Wills of Chintings in the said parish of Bexhill, Doctor of Medicine in the University of Durham and by William Cockell of Inglewood in the same parish, Gentleman to be held in trust by us as and for a permanent endowment for the minister for the time being of the said district hereinafter recommended to be constituted and so soon as the said district shall have become a new parish under the provisions of the hereinbefore secondly mentioned Act then for the incumbent of the said new parish and the amount of the annual interest and dividends to accrue due on account of the said sum of stock to be receivable by the said minister or incumbent for the time being when he shall have been duly licensed in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act.

"And whereas the said sum of four thousand and three hundred pounds India Three per cent. Stock has been so provided as aforesaid upon the understanding that we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners should out of the common fund created by the firstly hereinbefore mentioned Act grant to the said proposed district or new parish a capital sum of seven hundred pounds in respect of which there shall be paid by us to the incumbent of the said proposed district or new parish when duly licensed as aforesaid a yearly sum of twenty-one pounds and upon the further understanding that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the whole right of patronage of the said district or new parish and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereto should be vested in the manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas a church is being erected within and for the said proposed district at the cost of the Reverend Charles Leopold Stanley Clarke, Clerk in Holy Orders, and Prebendary of the prebend of Bargham in the cathedral church of the Holy Trinity in the diocese of Chichester aforesaid.

"And whereas the said Charles Leopold Stanley Clarke, the said Joseph Pearce Budgett Wills and the said William Cockell have nominated to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, themselves, the said Charles Leopold Stanley Clarke, Joseph Pearce Budgett Wills and William Cockell as the persons in whom it is desired that the first turn of nomination and appointment of a minister to the said proposed district, when duly constituted, should be vested, and the Right Reverend Richard Bishop of the said diocese of Chichester, as such Bishop, and his successors Bishops of the same diocese for ever, as the person or persons in whom it is desired that the second and all

subsequent turns of nomination and appointment should be vested.

"And whereas the said grant of seven hundred pounds will after the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme be made and secured by an instrument to be executed by us the said Commissioners under our common seal in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and eleven.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Richard Bishop of the said diocese of Chichester as such Bishop (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said parish of Bexhill which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part together with the boundaries thereof is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Barnabas Bexhill.'

"And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district, and when the said district shall have become a new parish as aforesaid, then of the said new parish, and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereto, shall, without any assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to and become and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may be exercised for one turn, and that the first turn only, by the said Charles Leopold Stanley Clarke, the said Joseph Pearce Budgett Wills and the said William Cockell, their heirs and assigns, and that the second turn and all the remaining turns of patronage and nomination shall in like manner be assigned to and become and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may be exercised by the said Richard, Bishop of the said diocese of Chichester and his successors, Bishops of the same diocese for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or to any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint Barnabas Bexhill, being:—

"All that part of the parish of Bexhill in the county of Sussex and in the diocese of Chichester, wherein the present incumbent of such parish still possesses the exclusive cure of souls, which is bounded upon the east by the parish or reputed parish of Saint Mary Bulverhythe in the said county and diocese upon the south by the sea upon the west and upon the north-west by the new parish of Saint Mark Bexhill in the said county and diocese and upon the remaining sides, that is to say upon the north-east and upon the north by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Mark Bexhill from the parish of Bexhill aforesaid at a point in the middle of the road which leads from Pevensy to Bexhill a little to the east of its junction with the road which leads to Great

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time

when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas by another Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit:

And whereas the Right Honourable Henry Matthews, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbent and the Churchwardens of the parish hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that he is of opinion that the Order of Her Majesty in Council of the twenty-first day of February, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-two, in so far as it affects burials in the parish church and churchyard of Saint Asaph, in the county of Flint, should be varied, and that the following directions should be substituted for those contained in the said Order, with respect to burials in the said church and churchyard, viz. :—

That burials be discontinued forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Saint Asaph, in the county of Flint; and also in the churchyard, except as follows :—

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the following relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order, viz., widows and widowers, as can be buried at or below that depth.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the tenth day of August next:

The following is an account of the services in respect of which the Decoration has been conferred:—

On the occasion of the sinking of the British steam ship "Utopia," through collision, off Gibraltar, on the 17th March, 1891, when 551 lives were lost, a number of boats were put out by the vessels of the Channel Squadron to the assistance of the shipwrecked persons.

The launch of Her Majesty's ship "Immortalité," while engaged in the work of rescue, fouled her screw, became uncontrollable, and was beaten on to the shore near the breakwater, where she eventually became a total wreck. Two of her crew were drowned, two others swam safely ashore, and the remainder, with eight emigrants from the "Utopia," were rescued in an exhausted condition by officers and men of the Port Department and of the King's Royal Rifles.

Among the rescuers, WILLIAM SEED, Chief of Police, and Corporal WILLIAM MCQUE, of the Rifles, particularly distinguished themselves.

Although the night was intensely dark, with a strong gale blowing and a strong current and heavy sea dashing on the breakwater (which is a low line of jagged rocks, giving no foothold outside the wall of the fortifications), they plunged into the waves with ropes, and, although washed back on the rocks, renewed their attempt until they succeeded in reaching the launch, which was eighty yards off shore, when the rescue was effected.

THE Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a Despatch, dated June 20, from Her Majesty's Representative at Copenhagen, reporting that, in consequence of the prevalence of yellow fever at Rio de Janeiro, the Danish Government have extended the stipulations contained in Chap. II, Art. I of the Law of July 2, 1880, to ships arriving from, or having communicated with, others coming from the port of Rio de Janeiro. The usual prohibition is prescribed against the importation into Denmark of used linen, clothes, bedclothes (which are not passengers' luggage), rags, wadding, teased wool, and refuse paper, and the disinfection of all passengers' luggage coming from the infected port is prescribed. The application of the same provisions of the Law in question to Venice has been withdrawn.

Markby, Stewart, and Co., transmitting certain Bye-laws of the Institute of Chartered Accountants in England and Wales (in lieu of the existing Bye-laws Nos. 65 to 91) adopted by resolution passed at the Ordinary General Meeting of the Institute held on the sixth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, and

confirmed at an Extraordinary General Meeting of the same Institute held on the twenty-first May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one.

And whereas by the 26th Article of the Charter of Incorporation of the said Institute, it is provided that Bye-laws made by the Institute shall not have effect until they have been submitted to and allowed by the Lords of the Privy Council.

Now, therefore, their Lordships having taken the said Bye-laws into consideration (a copy whereof is hereunto annexed) are pleased to allow the same.

BYE-LAWS referred to in the foregoing Order.

REVISED BYE-LAWS RELATING TO EXAMINATIONS CHAPTER VI.—Examinations.

65. The Council at their first Meeting after each Annual Meeting of the Institute shall appoint not less than seven of their number, in addition to those Members who are Members of the Committee by virtue of their offices, to be the Examination Committee for the ensuing year, and their powers and duties may be exercised and discharged at any Meeting of the Committee at which not fewer than three Members of the Committee are present.

66. The Committee shall have such powers and duties, in addition to the powers and duties hereby conferred, in reference to the Examinations, as may be, from time to time, delegated to them by the Council. Provided that the powers and duties so delegated shall not be inconsistent with the provisions of the Charter and Bye-laws.

67. The Examination Committee, with the approval of the Council, may, from time to time, issue regulations for holding the Examinations, and, under and subject to the provisions of these Bye-laws, for the conduct of the Examinations.

68. The Members of the Committee shall be the Examiners, and, with the assistance (so far as they may think necessary to resort to the same) of such qualified persons as the Council may from time to time appoint, shall conduct the Examinations. The persons so appointed to assist the Examiners shall hold office for a year, but shall be eligible for re-appointment. The Council, nevertheless, may, at any time during his term of office, remove any person so appointed by a resolution passed at a Meeting of the Council, at which at least twelve Members shall be present, by a majority of two-thirds of the Members voting.

69. The Committee shall, at least two months before each Examination, select from its Members, or from the qualified assistants appointed by the Council (as above stated), persons who shall, by written papers, examine the Candidates for Examination, and who shall report the results of such Examination to the Committee. But, nevertheless, the Committee shall have power to alter such report with reference to individual Candidates as it may see fit.

70. There shall be paid out of the funds of the Institute, to each person selected by the Committee for examining the Candidates, the sum of not less than five nor more than twenty guineas (to be fixed by the Examination Committee) for each Examination of not more than one hundred Candidates, with a proportionate increase for any Candidates above that number examined by him at any Examination; and, for the purposes of this Bye-law, the Final Examination and the Examination equivalent thereto shall be deemed to be one Examination. Provided that, in the case of the person or persons appointed to examine Candidates for the Preliminary Examination, such

further sum, not exceeding thirty guineas, as the Committee may fix, may be paid to him or them for the remuneration of an assistant or assistants.

71. A Member of the Council shall preside in each Examination room on each day in which an Examination is being held, at such remuneration, not exceeding five guineas per diem, as the Committee shall determine; save that, in the case of Preliminary Examinations held out of the Metropolis, one of the Fellows of the Institute appointed by the Examination Committee under the provisions of Bye-law 78 shall preside.

72. Every Candidate, at least thirty days before the Examination at which he proposes to be examined, shall give written notice to the Council of his desire to be examined, and shall pay the fee payable in respect of such Examination; and shall, in the case of the Final Examination, leave with the Council, to be registered, the certificate of service required by these Bye-laws to be so left for registration. In case the articles under which he is serving have not been registered, he shall, at the same time, leave them with the Council for registration, having, when necessary, first obtained permission from the Council to have them registered.

73. Any person who has failed to pass any Examination to the satisfaction of the Examination Committee may present himself again at any subsequent Examination, save that the Examination Committee may, in their discretion, refuse to allow any such person so to present himself.

If after payment of his fee a Candidate withdraw his name or fail to present himself for Examination, no part of the fee shall be returned to him; but the Examination Committee may allow such fee to apply to the next Examination at which such Candidate presents himself.

74. The Examination Committee shall report to the Council the result of each Examination, and, upon the adoption by the Council of the report of the Committee, a Certificate to the effect that he has passed any Examination shall, unless withheld for any reasonable cause, be issued to every person who has passed such Examination to the satisfaction of the said Committee. Such Certificate shall be signed by two Members of the Council, and countersigned by the Secretary.

Each Candidate for an Examination shall have a number assigned to him, and he shall be referred to by such number only until after the adoption by the Council of the report of the Committee as to the result of his Examination.

75. Except as provided for by Bye-law 73, every person presenting himself for any examination shall, on each occasion of his so presenting himself, pay the sum of two guineas as an Examination Fee, before he is admitted to be examined.

Preliminary Examinations.

76. Every person desirous of becoming an Articled Clerk shall, before he is Articled, pass a Preliminary Examination to test his general education; save that the following persons shall be entitled to exemption from such Examination:—

1. Graduates of any University in the United Kingdom.

2. Persons who have passed the following Examinations, viz.:—

- (a.) The "Responsions" Examination at the University of Oxford.
- (b.) The "Previous" Examination at the University of Cambridge.
- (c.) The Examination in Arts for the second year at the University of Durham.

(d.) The Matriculation Examination at the University of Dublin or the University of London.

(e.) The Preliminary Examination at the Victoria University, Manchester.

(f.) The "Moderations" Examination at St. David's College, Lampeter.

(g.) The Higher Examination of the Oxford and Cambridge Schools Examination Board.

(h.) The Examination for the First-class Certificate of the College of Preceptors.

(i.) The Oxford or Cambridge Senior Local Examination.

(k.) The Oxford or Cambridge Junior Local Examination, provided that the Candidate was not over the age of 16 when examined.

(l.) The Examinations for Commercial Certificates of the

Oxford and Cambridge Schools Examination Board.

Victoria University, Manchester.

London Chamber of Commerce (Higher Examination).

Manchester Chamber of Commerce (Senior Examination).

(m.) The Examinations by the Civil Service Commissioners for First Class Clerkships in the Home Civil Service, and for the India Civil Service; and the Further Examinations for the Royal Military Colleges at Sandhurst and Woolwich.

Provided that, in the case of the Examinations referred to in (g) (h) (i) (k) and (l) the Candidate shall have passed in the same subjects as those specified in Bye-law 79: save that in such case a candidate may substitute an additional optional subject for elementary Latin.

Any person shall, upon satisfying the Council that he has graduated in any of the above Universities, or passed any of the above Examinations, be entitled to receive a certificate to the effect that he is exempt from passing the Preliminary Examination of the Institute.

The Council may, by a resolution passed at a meeting specially convened for that purpose, with notice of the object, at which meeting there shall be present not less than twelve of the Members of the Council, and for which resolution not less than three-fourths of those present, and voting, shall vote, resolve—

(a.) That any one or more of the Examinations mentioned in this Bye-law shall no longer entitle to exemption from the Preliminary Examination; or,

(b.) That any other specified Examinations besides those set forth in this Bye-law shall entitle to exemption from the Preliminary Examination. Provided, nevertheless, that the proviso in this Bye-law as to the subjects to be passed shall apply to all such Examinations so added by the Council.

Provided that, notwithstanding anything in these Bye-laws, all persons who, prior to the 1st August, 1891, shall have passed any examinations which, under the first Bye-laws of the Institute, would have entitled them to Certificates of Exemption from the Preliminary Examination, shall be entitled to such Certificates.

77. Preliminary Examinations shall be held during the first week of June, and the first week of December, and at such further or other times as the Council may hereafter from time to time direct.

78. Such Preliminary Examinations shall be held at the offices of the Institute or at such other place as the Committee may from time to time appoint; and, simultaneously, should the Com-

mittee think it desirable, in the following towns or some of them, and at such place or places in those towns as the Committee may decide:—

Birmingham, Bristol, Liverpool, Manchester, Newcastle-on-Tyne, Sheffield.

The Committee shall appoint at least two Fellows of the Institute to preside at the Preliminary Examination held at each of the above towns.

79. The Preliminary Examinations shall be conducted wholly in writing, in the following subjects, viz.:—

1. Writing from dictation.
2. Writing a short English composition.
3. Arithmetic.
4. Algebra, to Quadratic Equations (inclusive).
5. Euclid (the first four books).
6. Geography.
7. History of England.
8. Latin (Elementary).

And also in any two of the following subjects, one of which, at least, must be a language, to be selected by the Candidate:—(1.) Latin; (2.) Greek (Ancient); (3.) French; (4.) German; (5.) Italian; (6.) Spanish; (7.) Higher Mathematics; (8.) Physics; (9.) Chemistry; (10.) Animal Physiology; (11.) Zoology; (12.) Botany; (13.) Electricity, Magnetism, Light and Heat; (14.) Geology; (15.) Stenography.

80. At least four months before the day appointed for holding any Preliminary Examination, the Examination Committee shall prepare a list of the books (if any) selected by them for the Examination of Candidates in the above-mentioned optional subjects, and a copy of such list shall be furnished to any person applying for the same.

81. Every candidate shall, in the notice given to the Council of his desire to be examined at the Preliminary Examination, state the two optional subjects in which he proposes to be examined under these regulations, and the place at which he wishes to be examined, together with his age and residence, and place or mode of education.

82. For the purpose of the Preliminary Examinations held out of London, the papers set by the Examiners shall be transmitted in a sealed packet to those Fellows of the Institute who have been appointed, as hereinbefore mentioned, to preside. The said Fellows shall open the packet in the presence of the Candidates, and shall require the Candidates, in their presence, to write from dictation, and give written answers to the papers so transmitted, and the said Fellows shall, without delay, seal up and send to the Committee the writing from dictation and the answers so written.

Intermediate Examinations.

83. Every Articled Clerk shall, after the expiration of one-half of the term of service prescribed by section 12 of the Charter, pass an Intermediate Examination to test the progress he has made in professional knowledge; but if his service commenced before the date of the Charter, he shall not be required to present himself for such Intermediate Examination.

84. The Intermediate Examination shall be held at the offices of the Institute, or at such other place as the Committee may from time to time appoint, during the second week of June and the second week of December in each year, or at such further or other times as the Council may from time to time direct.

85. The Intermediate Examination shall be

conducted in writing, in the following subjects, viz.:—

1. Bookkeeping and Accounts (including Partnership and Executorship Accounts).
2. Auditing.
3. The Rights and Duties of Liquidators, Trustees, and Receivers.

Provided that the Council, by the votes of three-fourths of such Members of the Council as are present and voting at a meeting of the Council specially convened with notice of this object, may add to, take from, or alter such subjects.

Final Examinations.

86. Save as in these Bye-laws provided, every person who is not entitled under the Charter or Bye-laws to be admitted without examination shall, before applying to be admitted a Member, pass a Final Examination to test his professional acquirements.

87. A person who passes the Intermediate Examination shall not present himself for the Final Examination within two years thereafter, except that Graduates of a University who have been articulated for three years only, may present themselves for the Final Examination one year after passing the Intermediate Examination—save that the Examination Committee may for any reasonable cause admit any such person to be examined at any time after the expiration of his term of service.

88. The Final Examination shall be held at the offices of the Institute or at such other place as the Examination Committee may from time to time determine, in the third week of June and the third week of December in each year, or at such further or other times as the Council may from time to time direct.

89. The Final Examination shall be conducted in writing in the following subjects, viz.:—

1. Bookkeeping and Accounts (including Partnership and Executorship Accounts).
2. Auditing.
3. The Rights and Duties of Liquidators, Trustees, and Receivers.
4. The Principles of the Law of Bankruptcy.
5. The Principles of the Law relating to Joint Stock Companies.
6. The Principles of Mercantile Law.
7. The Principles of the Law of Arbitrations and Awards.

Provided that the Council by the votes of three-fourths of such members of the Council as are present and voting at a meeting of the Council, specially convened with notice of this object, may add to, take from, or alter such subjects.

Examinations Equivalent to Final.

90. The Council may, at a meeting convened as prescribed by section 14 of the Charter, and in exercise of the powers thereby conferred, elect as an Associate any Candidate for admission as a Fellow or Associate who, having been in practice, or having been employed as a Public Accountant's Clerk, prior to the commencement of the first Bye-Laws made under the Charter (21st March, 1882) has, up to the date of his application, been continuously five years in practice or employed as a Public Accountant's Clerk, or partly in practice and partly so employed, and who has passed an Examination by the Examiners of the Institute equivalent to the Final Examination under the Charter. Provided that every person who, by this Bye-Law or by Bye-Law 36, may be admitted under section 14 of the Charter, upon his passing an Examination equivalent to the Final Examination, shall give the same notice of his intention to present himself for Examination as is required of Candi-

dates for the Final Examination ; and shall, at the time of giving such notice, pay to the Council two guineas as an Examination Fee ; and, not less than thirty days before the Examination, satisfy the Council that he has fulfilled the conditions prescribed by these Bye-Laws applicable to his case.

91. The Examinations equivalent to the Final Examinations shall be held at the same time and place and in all respects in the same manner as the Final Examinations ; and any person who passes any such Examination to the satisfaction of the Examination Committee shall be entitled to receive from the Council a certificate to the effect that he has passed such Examination, in the same manner and in all respects subject to the same regulations as if he had passed a Final Examination.
