The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventyseven; of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen; and of the Act of the thirty-seventh and thirtyeighth years of Her Majesty chapter sixty-three duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the twenty-eighth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, in the words and figures following, that is to say :-

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth chapter seventy-seven, of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen; and of the Act of the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth years of Your Majesty chapter sixty-three have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme with respect to certain rural deaneries within the two Archdeaconries which are now within the diocese of

Durham to wit, the Archdeaconry of Durham and the Archdeaconry of Auckland.

." Whereas by virtue of certain Orders of Your Majesty in Council duly published in the London Gazette the Archdeaconries and the Rural Deaneries in the diocese of Durham aforesaid have been from time to time rearranged and set forth.

"And whereas it has been represented to us hy the Right Reverend Brooke Foss, Bishop of the said diocese of Durham that the further arrangements which are hereafter recommended and proposed with respect to certain of the Rural Deancries within the said two Archdeaconries of Durham and of Auckland are desirable and should be carried into effect and we are of opinion that the same may be properly carried into effect.

" And whereas the said arrangements involve the rearrangement of the limits of the two Rural Deaneries of Auckland and of Stanhope in the said Archdeaconry of Auckland and also the discontinuance of the Rural Deanery of Ryton in the said Archdeaconry of Durham and also the formation of two new rural deaneries to be called respectively 'The Rural Deanery of Gateshead'

and 'The Rural Deanery of Lanchester' both in

the last-mentioned Archdeaconry.

" Now therefore with the consent of the said Brooke Foss, Bishop of the said diocese of Durham in testimony whereof he has set his hand and episcopal seal to this scheme we the said? Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that as from the day on which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the several parishes or cures or churches of Crook, Satley, Stanley, Thornley, and Towlaw Saint Philip and Saint Andrew, now within the said Rural Deanery of Auckland, and in the Archdeaconry of Auckland aforesaid, shall be transferred to, and shall be comprised within, and shall form part of, the Rural Deanery of Stanhope aforesaid in the same

Archdeaconry.

"And we further recommend and propose that as from the day aforesaid and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order as aforesaid the said Rural Deanery of Ryton within the said Archdeaconry of Dorham shall be discontinued and that the parishes or cures or churches of Beamish, Burnopfield, Greenside Saint John, Marley Hill Saint Cuthbert, Ryton, Stella Saint Cuthbert, Tanfield, Whickham, and Winlaton Saint Paul, now comprised therein shall be transferred to and shall be comprised within and shall form part of the rural deanery of Chester-le-Street in the said Archdeaconry of Durham; and that the parishes or cures or churches of Benfieldside, Blackhill Saint Aidan, Castleside, Collierley, Consett, Dipton Saint John the Evangelist, Ebchester. Leadgate, and Medomsley, being the remaining parishes or cures or churches now comprised: within the said Rural Deanery of Ryton, shall be transferred to, and shall be comprised within, and form part of the new rural deanery of Lanchester as hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And we further recommend and propose that as from the day aforesaid and without any assurance in the law other than as aforesaid the said rural deanery of Chester-le-Street shall be divided into two rural deaneries one of which shall be called 'The Rural Deanery of Chesterle-Street,' and shall comprise and consist of the several parishes or cures or churches the names of which are set down in numbered order under thename of the same rural deanery in the schedule: to this scheme annexed, and the other rural. deanery shall be called. The Banal Reanery off ateshead and shall comprise and consist of the several parishes or cures or what head manes of which are set down in numbered conterunder the name of the last mentioned remaindeaners in the same schedule.

" And we further recommend and propose that as from the day aforesaid and without any assurance in the law other than as aforesaid the Rimal Deanery of Durham in the said Anchdeacoury of Durham shall the divided into two ranal. deaneries, one of which shall be called 'The Rural Deanery of Durham' and shall comprise and consist of the parishes or cures or churches the names of which are set down in numbered order under the same rural deanery in the schedule to this scheme annexed as aforesaid, and the other rural deanery shall he called. 'The Rural Deanery of Lanchester 'and shall comprise and consist of the parishes or cures or churches (including those which are hereinbefore mentioned as to be transferred from the rural deanery of Ryton as aforesaid) the names of which are set down in numbered order under the name of the rural deanery of Lanchester in the said schedule, and that every parish or cure or church so set down under the names of the said rural deaneries ishall belong to and be and form part of the archdeacoury and of the rural deanery under the name of which it is set down as aforesaid and shall be 'subject to the jurisdiction and authority of the 'archdeacon of the same archdeaconry and of the trural dean of the same rural deanery, and shall not belong to or be or form part of any other carchdeaconry or rural deanery, nor be subject to the jurisdiction or authority of any other archdeacon or rural dean.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other matter or thing with respect to the matters aforesaid or any of them under or by virtue of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said. scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this: Order shall: have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is, pleased hereby to direct: that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the saids diocese of: Durham. The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. THEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial "of the dead in England beyond the limits of the "Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning "the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be

affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of,

on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial ground sany parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas the Right Honourable Henry Matthews, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secreturies of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein with certain modifications:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Ber Order in Council of the ninth day of May last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the twenty-second day of June, one thou-sand eight hundred and ninety-one, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial ground shall be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued, as follows; viz.:

LONG MELFORD.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Long Melford, in the county of Suffolk; and also in those parts of the churchyard which lie to the east, south-east, south, and south-west of the church except as follows:-

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In such earthen graves now existing as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the following relations of those interred therein at the date of this Order, viz.:widows and widowers, as can be buried at or below that depth.

BARKEY.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Barkby, in the county of Leicester; and also in the old part of the churchyard except as follows :-

(a.) In such vaults as are now existing burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of this Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

(c.) In such earthen graves now existing as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of this Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

Aughton.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Aughton, near Ormskirk, in the county of Lancaster, and in the old part of the churchyard; and also in the addition made to it in one thousand eight hundred and thirty-eight except as follows:-

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework

or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In such earthen graves now existing as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the following relations of those interred therein at the date of this Order, viz.: widows and widowers, and parents, as can be buried at or below that depth.

(c.) In such reserved grave spaces as have never before been buried in, and which when opened are free from water, burials may be allowed of so many members of the families to whom they may be allotted as can be buried at or below the depth of five feet.

Also that the churchyard be effectually drained so that water shall not accumulate in

any grave or vault.

Morval.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Morval, in the county of Cornwall; and also in the churchyard except as follows :-

(a.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of this Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

(b.) In such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of this Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

(c.) In such reserved grave spaces in the churchyard (as have never before been buried in, and which when opened, are free from water) burials may be allowed of so many members of the families to whom they may be allotted as can be buried at or below the depth of five feet. " C. L. Peel.

Bedwellty Union.

To the Guardians of the Poor of the Bedwellty Union, in the counties of Mormouth and Brecknock;—

And to all others whom it may concern:

WHEREAS by a General Order of the Poor-Law Board, dated the 14th day of January, 1867, addressed to the Guardians of the Poor of the said Bedwellty Union (amongst others), it is required that certain Accounts relating to the provisions, clothing, and other stores in the Workhouse, when made up and balanced, shall be submitted to the Visiting Committee or to some Member thereof, who shall enter a memorandum at the foot of such Accounts, certifying to the same having been submitted, and to the correctness, or otherwise, of such Accounts as regards the stock remaining in store;

And whereas it is expedient to empower the said Guardians to appoint a competent person or persons to examine the stores at the Workhouse belonging to the said Union, and to perform the

other duties hereinafter set forth;

Now therefore, We, the Local Government Board, in pursuance of the powers given to Us by the Statutes in that behalf, hereby order as follows:—

ARTICLE I.—The Guardians of the Poor of the said Bedwellty Union may, as and when they shall think fit to do so, appoint a competent person or persons to perform the duties of a Stocktaker as hereinafter set forth.

ARTICLE II —Every such appointment shall be made in the manner prescribed by the Regulations as to the appointment of Officers in force in the said Union for the time being.

ARTICLE III.—The Guardians shall pay to the person or persons appointed under this Order such salary or remuneration as We may from time to

time direct or approve.

ARTICLE V.—The Stocktaker shall, on the day next after the termination of each quarter, and at any other time when required by the Guardians to do so, examine the stores at the Workhouse and compare the same with the quantities of stock remaining in store as shown by the entries in the proper columns in the Accounts termed respectively the "Quarterly Balance of the Provisions Account." and the "Quarterly Balance of the Necessaries and Miscellaneous Account."

He shall also, on the day next after the termination of each half-year, and at any other time when required by the Guardians to do so, examine the stock of clothing at the Workhouse and compare the same with the balance appearing in the Accounts termed respectively the "Clothing Materials Receipt and Conversion Account" and the "Clothing Receipt and Expenditure Account."

Arrice VI - After making the examination

fand recomparison referred to in Article V, the said General Order as provides that no pauper Stocktaker, if he find the stock to be correct, shall sign a certificate sat the foot of each of the aforesaid Accounts in the following form:

If he find the stock to be in any respect incorrect, he shall make such addition to the said certificate as he may deem necessary, specifying the particulars in which he finds the quantities of

stock to be incornectly stated.

ARTICLE VII. - The Master of the Workhouse shall, when required by the Stocktaker to do so, on the days and at the times referred to in Article V, submit to him the stores and Accounts therein mentioned, and render to him such assistance as may be necessary for the purpose of such examination and comparison as aforesaid.

ARTICLE VIII.—The Master of the Workhouse shall lay each of the said Accounts before the Guardians at their next meeting after the date of the entry therein of any such certificate as aforesaid.

ARTICLE IX.—So long as a Stocktaker is appointed it shall not be necessary for the Visiting Committee to examine the stores or to enter in any Account the memorandum required by the above-cited Order dated the fourteenth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixtyseven.

APPOINTMENT OF STANDINGS FOR HACKNEY CARRIAGES WITHIN THE METROPOLITAN POLICE: DISTRICT, AND REGULATIONS TO BE OBSERVED.

By virtue of an Act passed in the 13th year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for consolidating the Office of the Registrar of Metropolitan . Public Curriages with the Office of Commissioners of Police of the Metropolis,

and making other provisions in regard to the consolidated Offices."

I, EDWARD RIDLEY COLBORNE BRADFORD, Commissioner of Police of the Metropolis, do hereby appoint Standings for Hackney Carriages at the several places hereinafter mentioned, for such number of carriages at each standing as is specified, and within the boundaries set forth for each standing, provided that no hackney carriage shall be suffered to, stand across any street or thoroughfare, or opposite the end of any street or carriage-way, or upon any place where foot passengers usually cross the carriage-way.
