PRESENT.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

W HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen and of the Act of the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth years of Her Majesty chapter sixty-three, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the sixteenth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and pinety-one, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth chapter seventy-seven, of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth years of Your Majesty chapter sixty-three, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme with respect to the rural deaneries within the two Archdenconres which are now within the diocese of Canterbury to wit, the Archdeaconry of Canterbury and the Archdeaconry of Maidstone.

"Whereas by virtue of an Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the thirty-first day of December in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three and published in the London Gazette on the eleventh day of January in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four certain re-arrangements were effected as to the areas of some of the rural deaneries within the two Archdeaconries aforesaid.

"And whereas it has been represented to us by the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Edward White, Archbishop of Canterbury, that the further arrangements which are hereinafter recommended and proposed with respect to certain of the rural deaneries within the said two Archdeaconries of Canterbury and of Maidstone are desirable and should be carried into effect, and we are of opinion that the same may be properly carried into effect.

"And whereas the said arrangements involve the transfer of one parish or cure from the said Archdeaconry of Canterbury to the Archdeaconry of Maidstone aforesaid.

"And whereas it appears to us to be convenient to set forth in the Schedule to this scheme annexed the names of all the parishes cures or churches which under the arrangements hereinafter recommended and proposed will be situate within and will constitute the several rural deaneries of the said two Archdeaconries of Canterbury and of Maidstone, to the intent that so far as legally may be the said schedule may be held to be in place of and in substitution for the statutory schedule of rural deaneries in the said two Archdeaconries dated the twenty-ninth day of January in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five and prepared under the provisions of the hereinbefore thirdly mentioned Act, and of and for the schedule to the said Order of Your Majesty in Council dated the thirty-first day of December in the year one thousand eight

hundred and eighty-three.
"Now therefore, with the consent of the said said Edward White, Archbishop of Canterbury (in testimony whereof he has set his hand and affixed his archiepiscopal seal to this scheme), we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that as from the day on which an Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette, and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the said Archdeaconry of Canterbury and the said Archdeaconry of Maidstone respectively shall comprise and consist of the rural deaneries the names of which are set down in order under the name of each of the said two Archdeaconries respectively in the said schedule to this scheme annexed, and that the name which in such schedule is given to any rural deanery shall be the name thereof; and that every parish or cure or church the name of which is set down in numbered order in the first column of the said schedule under the name of the said Archdeaconry of Canterbury or under the name of the said Archdeaconry of Maidstone and under the name of any rural deanery in either of the said two archdeaconries respectively shall belong to and be and form a part of the archdeaconry and of the rural deanery under the respective names of which it appears as aforesaid and shall be subject to the jurisdiction and authority of the archdeacon of such archdeaconry and of the rural dean of such rural deanery respectively, and shall not belong to or be or form a part of any other archdeaconry or rural deanery nor be subject to the jurisdiction or

authority of any other archdeacon or rural dean.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other matter or thing with respect to the matters aforesaid or any of them under or by virtue of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"Whereas by an Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the twenty-first day of March in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety and published in the London Gazette, on the twenty-fifth day of the same month ratifying a Scheme prepared by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, the said Archdeaconry of Wrexham was constituted, and in the Schedule to that Scheme annexed were set forth the names of the several rural deaneries within that archdeaconry.

John Southall Green in the county of Middlesex, bridge or culvert which carries the main line of and in the diocese of London. the Great Western Railway over the River Crane

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of the Holy Trinity Southall situate as aforesaid.

" Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Frederick Bishop of the said diocese of London (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all that part of the said new parish of Saint John Southall Green which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of the Holy Trinity Southall situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of the Holy Trinity Southall.

"Whereas the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Frederick, Bishop of the said diocese of London has caused proposals for a scheme for effecting an union of the said two benefices to be laid before us, which proposals are prepared under the seventh and eighth sections of the Act hereinbefore mentioned, and hereinafter referred to as the said Act, and are approved by the said Frederick, Bishop of the said diocese of London. as such Bishop, and also as the Patron, in right of his See, of the said rectory of Saint George in the East and of the said vicarage of Saint Matthew, Pell-street, and the same proposals are also assented to by the vestries of the two parishes concerned—that is to say, by the vestry of the parish of Saint George in the East, and by the vestry of the New Parish of Saint Matthew I'ell-

"And whereas it appears to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, to be expedient that the said proposed union of the said two benefices should be effected, and that such arrangements

relating thereto, and to the other matters hereinafter referred to, should be made as are hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas the Reverend Charles Henry Turner, Clerk in Holy Orders, is now the incumbent of both of the said two benefices and has expressed his willingness, in the event of the said two benefices being legally united, to become the incumbent of the same united benefice.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the said Frederick, Bishop of the said Diocese of London, as such Bishop and Patron as aforesaid (in testimony of which consent he hath to this Scheme set his hand and affixed his Episcopal seal) and with the consent of the Vestry of the said parish of Saint George in the East, and with the consent of the Vestry of the said new parish of Saint Matthew, Pell-street (in testimony whereof the Scheme is signed, in the case of each Vestry, by the Chairman of a Meeting of the same Vestry duly convened for the purpose of giving such consent), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and profose all that is in this Scheme contained under the several parts or headings hereinafter mentioned, as follows:—

PART I.

"As to the proposed union itself we recommend

and propose

- "1. That the said benefice of Saint George in the East and the said benefice of Saint Matthew, Pell-street, shall upon and from the day on which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme shall be published in the London Gazette, be united into one benefice under the style or title of 'The Rectory of Saint George in the East with the Vicarage of Saint Matthew Pell-street.'
- "2. That the said Charles Henry Turner shall become the first Incumbent of the said united benefice, and if any admission be necessary it shall be lawful for the Bishop of London for the time being to admit the said Charles Henry Turner to the united benefice as its first Incumbent without any form or fee, of presentation, institution or induction.
- "3. That the patronage of the said united benefice shall belong to, and be vested in the Bishop of the said diocese of London and his successors.

PART II.

"As to the parish church of the united benefice and matters connected therewith we recommend and propose

"1. That upon the union taking effect the church of Saint George in the East shall become

the parish church of the united benefice:

"2. That if upon the union taking effect the tables of fees used in the two churches of Saint George in the East and Saint Matthew Pell-street be alike in all particulars the table of fees used in the church of Saint George in the East (boing the church which will as aforesaid become the parish church of the united benefice) shall, unless or until revised or altered by proper authority, be the table of fees for the two parishes of the United Benefice; but if such tables of fees be not alike in all particulars, then the same shall be of no authority, and a new table of fees shall be made by the proper authority for the same two parishes as if the same were one parish.

PART III.

"As to the Church of Saint Matthew, Pellstreet, and the furniture and fittings thereof, we recommend and propose

"1. That upon the union taking effect the fabric

of the church of Saint Matthew, Pell-street, shall be left standing, and shall be used for the purpose of a Sunday School, or for any other purpose authorized by section nineteen of the said Act so long as the Bishop of the Diocese shall by his licence permit.

"2. That the Font, Communion Table, and Sacramental Plate, now in the church of Saint Matthew, Pell-street, shall be appropriated, as the Bishop of London may direct, in accordance with the provisions contained in the fourteenth

section of the said Act.

"3. That the organ, carved work, and other fittings and furniture now in use in the church of Saint Matthew, Pell-street, and not required for that building, when used for the purpose of a Sunday School as aforesaid, shall be disposed of or sold as the Bishop of London shall direct, and, if sold, the amount realized shall be appropriated and applied as part of the fund created by the twenty-second section of the said Act.

twenty-second section of the said Act.

"4. That upon the union taking effect the Register Books of Baptisms, Marriages, and Burials of the New Parish of Saint Matthew, Pell-street, shall be transferred to the Parish

Church of the United Benefice.

- " 5. That in the event of the Bishop of the diocese refusing or withdrawing has licence or permission to use the church of Saint Matthew. Pell-street, for the purpose of a Sunday School or for any other purpose authorized by the nineteenth section of the said Act, the said Bishop shall certify this fact in writing to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and the said church shall, so soon as may be after the receipt by us of such certificate from the Bishop, be taken down and its materials and site, together with any ground annexed thereto and necessary for the use or enjoyment thereof shall be sold and disposed of by us at such time or times and in such manner in all respects as to us shall seem expedient, such sale or disposal being made in all respects subject to the provisions contained in the seventeenth section of the said Act.
- "6. That in the event of the materials and site of the said church of Saint Matthew, Pell-street, being sold, the proceeds of such sale shall be applied towards the cost of building a church, and, if the fund permit, a parsonage house for a new Ecclesiastical District to be formed, under one or more of the Acts of Parliament administered by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, out of some parish or parishes or other cures within the limits of the metropolis, to be selected by the Bishop of London.

" PART IV.

"As to the endowment and parsonage house of the united benefice, we recommend and

propose

"1. That upon the union taking effect all the properties constituting the endowments of the said rectory of Saint George-in-the-East and of the said vicarage of Saint Matthew, Pell-street, shall be transferred and annexed to the united benefice as the endowments thereof provided that out of such endowments a sum of forty-two pounds a year or such less sum in any year as the Bishop of London shall authorize, shall be applied in the first place to the full and proper repair and sustentation of the fabric of the disused church of Saint Matthew, Pell-street, and to the preservation and care of the monuments and tablets (if any) therein and to the other expenses connected with the same building so long as it shall remain standing.

" 2. That the said sum of forty-two pounds, or

such less sum in any year as the Bishop of London shall authorize, shall be a charge upon the income of the united benefice and the incumbent thereof shall be deemed to have accepted the same subject to a trust to carry out all repairs as aforesaid and to pay for the same out of the said income, and if in any year such repairs shall not be duly carried out and paid for as aforesaid by the incumbent for the time being of the said united benefice it shall be lawful for the Bishop of the diocese to make an order on the incumbent requiring him to carry out and pay for such repairs within a time to be specified in the said order, and if the same be not carried out and paid for within such prescribed period it shall be lawful for the said Bishop to sequester the profits of the said united benefice until such repairs shall have been carried out and paid for, and the costs of the sequestration shall have been paid and satisfied.

"3. That upon the union taking effect the present parsonage house belonging to the rectory of Saint George-in-the-East shall become the parsonage house of the said united benefice.

"Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, from recommending and proposing any other matter or thing as to the measures aforesaid or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been laid before both Houses of Parliament for the space of two calendar months.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of London.

In Wem Church Burial-ground near the Railway Station, in the parish of Wem, until the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one.

In the parish churchyard of East Haddon, in the county of Northampton, until the twentyfirst day of October, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one.

In the parish churchyard of South Crosland (Almondbury), in the county of York, until the thirty-first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one.

ORDER of the Local Government Board: Appointment of Dispenser: Regulations:—

Walsall Union.

To the Guardians of the Poor of the Walsall Union, in the County Borough of Walsall and the County of Stafford;—

And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS it is expedient that the Guardians of the Poor of the said Walsall Union should be empowered to appoint a Dispenser of Medicines for the Sick Poor within a certain part of the said Union, and that rules and regulations should be made and issued with respect to the duties of such Officer and of certain of the Officers of the said Union appointed, or to be appointed, for the relief of the Sick Poor chargeable to the said Union:

Now therefore, We, the Local Government Board, in pursuance of the powers given to Us by the Statutes in that behalf, hereby Order as follows:—

ART. 1. This Order shall come into operation on the Sixth day of August, 1891.

Appointment of Dispenser.

ART. 2. The Guardians shall, within twentyone days from the Sixth day of August, 1891, appoint some duly qualified person to be the Dispenser for so much of the said Union as is included in the Walsall Borough and Stafford Street Medical Relief Districts; and all the provisions contained in the General Order of the Poor Law Commissioners dated the 24th day of July, 1847, addressed to the Guardians of the Poor of the said Union (amongst others), and in any other Orders in force in the said Union which relate to the appointment and the suspension of officers, the supply of vacancies, and the payment of salaries of officers, and the provisions contained in Article 1 (No. 1) of the General Order of the Local Government Board dated the 12th day of February, 1879, with regard to the tenure of office of certain officers therein named, shall apply to the Dispenser.

ART. 3. No person shall be qualified to be appointed the Dispenser unless he shall be a Licentiate of the Society of Apothecaries, London, or hold a certificate of that Society as to his qualification to act as an Assistant in compounding and dispensing medicines, or shall be a compounder of medicines duly qualified in accordance with the Regulations for the Army Medical Staff Corps, or shall have been duly registered under the Pharmacy Act, 1868, or some other authority in

Law in that behalf.

Duties of Dispenser.

ART. 4. The following shall be the duties of the Dispenser:—

No. 1. To attend at the Dispensary at such hours and for such time as the Guardians shall appoint.

No. 2. To take charge of, and keep carefully and safely, as far as shall be in his power, all drugs, medicines, and stores provided by the Guardians for use in the Dispensary.

No. 3. To compound and supply all medicines required by the Medical Officer for use in the discharge of the duties of his office.

No. 4. To prepare and dispense skilfully and cautiously all prescriptions drawn up and ordered by the Medical Officer, and punctually to supply the medicines when prepared to the persons authorized to receive the same, and, when so required by the prescriptions, to express in writing or by printed labels the proper directions to accompany the medicines.

No. 5. To make such pharmaceutical preparations for use in dispensing prescriptions as he may be required to make from time to time by the Medical Officer.

No. 6. To take charge of the Dispensary and to keep the same and all its furniture and appurtenances in clean and proper condition.

No. 7. To enter in a book, to be kept for that purpose at the Dispensary, the time of his own arrival and departure.

No. 8. To file all prescriptions supplied to him by or on account of the paupers or by the Medical Officer, and keep them in the Dispensary, subject to the directions of the Guardians.

No. 9. To prepare from time to time, as directed by the Guardians, an estimate of any drugs, medicines, and stores which may be required, and to submit the same to the Guardians; also to bring under the notice of the Medical Officer or the Guardians the need for further supply of drugs, medicines, and stores, as and when such need shall occur.

No. 10. To keep an account in a book to be supplied by the Guardians, of all drugs, medicines, and stores committed to his charge, and, as nearly as may be, of those consumed or supplied to or for the paupers or to the Medical Officer, and of the quantities thereof remaining in store; to balance such account at the termination of each half-year ending on the twenty-fifth day of March and the twenty-ninth day of September, and to submit the same from time to time to the Guardians.

No. 11. To perform all such duties in relation to the dispensing of medicines and relief to the sick poor as the Guardians may from

time to time direct.

Duties of District Medical Officers.

ART. 5. Whereas by the above-mentioned General Order of the Poor Law Commissioners provision is made in Arts. 76, 200, and 206 (Nos. 1 and 2) for the attendance of every District Medical Officer of the Union upon poor persons requiring such attendance within his District, and for the supply by him, or at his cost, of medicines for such poor persons, and it is expedient that the same should, as regards the Walsall Union, be rescinded as hereinafter mentioned so far as relates to the person for the time being holding office as Medical Officer for the Walsall Borough and Stafford Street Medical Relief Districts:

Now therefore, We hereby Order, as regards the portion of the Walsall Union comprising the Walsall Borough and Stafford Street Medical Relief Districts, as follows:—

From and after the said Sixth day of August, 1891, the said Article 206 (Nos. 1 and 2), as well as so much of the said Arts. 76 and 200 as relates to the supply of medicines, shall be rescinded, and it shall be the duty of the District Medical Officer—

No. 1. To attend duly and punctually, either at the home of the poor person on whose behalf application is made, or elsewhere, as the case may require, and supply all requisite medical or surgical advice and assistance to, and duly prescribe for, every pauper in the District placed under his charge, whom he shall be required to attend as Medical Officer by a written or printed order of the Guardians, or of a Relieving Officer, or of an Overseer, when such Overseer shall be lawfully entitled to grant relief to such pauper.

No. 2. To file and keep at the Dispensary until the Guardians shall otherwise direct, all

such orders as aforesaid received by him, | which orders, when given by direction of the Guardians or by a Relieving Officer, shall be in the Form A in the Schedule to this Order.

No. 3. To keep and duly enter up daily, in addition to the District Medical Officer's Relief Book, an Alphabetical Register of Sickness and Mortality, in the Form B in the said Schedule, and submit the same to the Guardians at the first ordinary meeting in each quarter, and whenever the Guardians shall require it to be produced to them; which Register shall be deposited at the Dispensary except on the days when the same is required to be submitted to the Guardians, and, at any time between the hours of 10 o'clock in the forenoon and 4 o'clock in the afternoon, shall be open to the inspection of any Medical Officer of Health of the Walsall Urban Sanitary Authority, or of the Walsall Rural Sanitary Authority, or other competent authority within the Union.

No. 4. To supply to each pauper under his treatment, when requisite, a written prescription in the Form C, in the said Schedule, signed with his initials, and to renew such signature, with the proper date, whenever the prescription may be changed or renewed by him either at the home of the pauper or

No. 5. To notify to the Guardians at the commencement of every quarter of a year the paupers whose names have been inserted in the Permanent Medical Relief List for a period of six months, and to advise the Guardians as to the continuance of such paupers in such list, and to take the directions of the Guardians thereon.

Duties of Relieving Officers.

ART. 6. Whereas by Article 215 (No. 3) of the above-cited General Order of the Poor Law Commissioners, it is provided that in any case of sickness or accident requiring relief by medical attendance, the Relieving Officer shall procure such attendance by giving an order on the District Medical Officer in the Form therein prescribed, or by such other means as the urgency of the case may require ;

And whereas it is expedient that the said Article should, as regards the Walsall Union, be altered so far as respects the order to be given by the Relieving Officer in cases arising within the Walsall Borough or Stafford Street Medical

Relief Districts:

Now therefore, We hereby order that, from and after the said Sixth day of August, 1891, the duties of the Relieving Officer or Relieving Officers of the Walsall Union shall be as follows, so far as regards the order to be given by him under the circumstances referred to in the said Article 215 (No. 3), in cases arising within the Walsall Borough or Stafford Street Medical Relief Districts:

No. 1. To give an Order for Medical Relief in

the above-mentioned Form A. No. 2. To keep books to be supplied to him by the Guardians, containing the Forms, with a counterpart, as set out in the Schedule to this Order; and when he gives one of such orders, to fill in the counterpart with the particulars, and to retain the counterpart until the Guardians authorize him to destroy the same.

No. 3. To write upon the order the word "urgent" in every case where he considers that immediate attention is required.

General Duties of the Guardians.

ART. 7. The Guardians shall keep the Dispensary and all its furniture, fittings, apparatus, books, and other requisites in good repair, order, and condition, and properly supplied with drugs, medicines, and stores.

ART. 8. The Guardians shall from time to time carefully examine the state of the Dispensary; inspect the several books and forms required to be kept by each Officer in pursuance of this Order; enquire into the stock of drugs and medicines; and ascertain, as far as practicable, whether each Officer has duly discharged his duties.

ART. 9. The Guardians shall, as soon as practicable after the end of every half-year ending on the Twenty-fifth day of March and the Twenty-ninth day of September respectively, compare or cause to be compared the stock of drugs and medicines in the Dispensary with the accounts showing the receipt and consumption or disposal of the same, as kept by the Dispenser. Provided that the Guardians may, if they so determine, cause the stock to be compared and certified by the Stocktaker appointed in pursuance of Our Order dated the Twenty-seventh day of June, One thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, and the provisions of that Order shall apply to the Dispensary and to the Stock-

Definition.

ART. 10. In this Order the term "Medicines" shall include medical and surgical appliances.


