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THE following General Order and Despatches, describing the operations of the Miranzai Field Force, have been received from the Government of India:—

GENERAL ORDER.

FIELD OPERATIONS.—MIRANZAI. Simla, the 3rd July, 1891.

THE Most Honourable the Viceroy and Governor-General in Council is pleased to direct the publication of the following letters from the Adjutant-General in India, dated the 16th March and the 22nd June, 1891, together with the Despatches of Brigadier-General Sir William Lockhart, K.C.B., reporting the operations of the first and second Miranzai Expeditions.

The object of the first expedition was to inflict upon certain sections of the Orakzai tribe the punishment they justly deserved for raids into British territory and outrages upon British subjects; penalties were imposed upon the offenders in the shape of the destruction of fortified towers and the infliction of fines, but the expedition encountered practically no opposition. The march of the columns was made over a mountainous country presenting great physical obstacles, in the depith of winter, and in heavy rain or snow, and His Excellency in Council desires to express his opinion that these difficult operations were conducted with ability by the General Officer Commanding, and carried out by all ranks with endurance and soldier-like spirit.

The object of the second expedition was to punish the Orakzais for treacherously attacking, on the 4th April, 1891, the guards of the 29th Bengal Infantry which were covering the working parties employed in making roads and posts within British territory on the Samana Range, and to take measures to ensure, as far as possible, the future peace of the border. The troops were quickly concentrated, and on the 17th April and tollowing days the Samana Range was carried, the enemy who occupied strong positions, being driven therefrom with great loss.

In the further operations the force was entirely successful; it marched through the countries of the offending tribes; terms of peace were imposed upon and accepted by them, and the previous rights of the British Government to occupy the

crest of the Samana, for the purpose of affording protection to its subjects in the Miranzai Valley, were enforced.

The Governor-General in Council heartily concurs with the Commander-in-Chief in India in his high appreciation of the vigour and ability with which Sir William Lockhart has conducted these operations, and of the gallantry of the troops under his command. In Sir William Lockhart's despatch the services of the Commanders of the columns, and of the staff and regimental officers, are brought to notice, and mention is also made of several warrant officers, native officers, non-commissioned officers and men. His Excellency in Council congratulates them on the honourable distinction they have thus received.

The Viceroy is glad to have an opportunity of expressing his sense of the valuable services rendered by Mr. R. Udny, Commissioner of the Peshawar Division, and by Major H. P. Leigh, Political Officer, assisted by the other officers, British and Native, alluded to by Sir William Lockhart.

His Excellency in Council is pleased to notice the efficiency of the Commissariat-Transport Department both in the field and in the preparation and concentration of the force, when many difficulties of time and distance had to be overcome in furnishing supplies and transport. That these difficulties were successfully surmounted is greatly due to the power of organization displayed by Lieutenant-Colonel R. Patch, Commissary-General of the Western Circle, and by the officers working under him. It is also a source of satisfaction to His Excellency to observe that Sir William Lockhart has commended in appreciative terms the services of the Public Works, Telegraph, and Postal Departments.

The Governor-General in Council desires, in conclusion of this General Order, to express his sincere acknowledgments to the head of the Government of the Punjab, the Honourable Sir James Lyall, K.C.S.I., and to the civil officers concerned, for the assistance given by them, and for the readiness with which the resources of the Provincial administration were placed at the disposal of the military authorities, not only in this campaign, but in the other expeditions which have been undertaken within the last three years on the frontiers of that province.

No. 1810-A—" Field Operations—Miranzai,"—dated Fort William, 16th March, 1891.

From Major-General W. Galbraith, C.B., Adjutant-General in India, to the Secretary to the Government of India, Military Department.

I HAVE the honour to submit, for the consideration of the Government of India, a despatch from Brigadier-General Sir W. S. A. Lockhart, K.C.B., C.S.I., recently commanding the Miranzai Field Force.

2. The force was practically unopposed; but the country was extremely difficult, and the labours of the troops were much enhanced by the rigour of an unusually severe winter, many of the men being attacked by pneumonia and frost-bite, the result of toilsome marches in rain and heavy snow-storms.

3. The General Officer Commanding has brought to the favourable notice of the Commander-in-Chief the good services rendered by all staff and regimental officers, making special mention of the Assistant Adjutant-General, the three Commanders of columns, the Principal Medical Officer, and the Political Officer with the force.

4. I am desired to add that His Excellency considers much credit due to Brigadier-General Sir William Lockhart for the skill and energy he displayed in the conduct of operations, and to all ranks under his command for the soldier-like spirit with which they encountered hardships of no ordinary kind.

No. 309-C-M--" Field Operations—Miranzai,"
—dated Camp Kohat, 2nd March, 1891.

From Brigadier-General Sir W. S. A. Lockhart, K.C.B., C.S.I., Commanding the Punjab Frontier Force, and the late Miranzai Field Force, to the Adjutant-General in India.

I HAVE the honour to report on the late operations north of the Samana Range.

I. The object of the expedition was to punish five sections of the Orakzai tribe for offences committed against British subjects, and to bring them to submission.

II. The Miranzai Field Force was concentrated at Kohat by the 12th January, and its advance across the border was ordered for the 19th. Heavy rain, however, delayed the forward movement, which did not take place until the 26th.

A reconnaissance in force was made on the 24th January up the Khanki Valley as far as the villages of Gwada and Jandasam, the reconnoitring party being fired on from those villages, and from others east of them, without suffering loss.

III. The Field Force consisted of three columns, viz.:—

IV. The First Column advanced from Shahu Khel to Khaori, in the Khanki Valley, on the 26th January, with orders to reach Gwada on the following day.

The Second Column marched from Togh to Darband on the 25th January, with orders to cross the Samana on the 26th, and to reach Saifalmela, whence it was to cover the passage of the First Column through the defile east of that place on the 27th, and to go on to Gwada the same day.

The Third Column marched from Hangu to Darband on the 26th January, with orders to reach Gwada next day viâ Tsalai, and thence by any path found practicable, sending the baggage by the Saifaldarra route.

These movements were carried out as ordered, except in the case of the Third Column, whose baggage could not cross the Samana owing to the Saifaldarra route having become impassable from heavy rain.

The Third Column accordingly marched to Tsalai on the Samana crest on the 27th January; left in that place a garrison of Border Police; destroyed the towers and bamlet of Serimela in co-operation with the Second Column; and returned to Darband the same day, joining the remainder of the force at Gwada viâ the Saifaldarra route on the 29th January, after halting the night of the 28th at Saifalmela.

V. The next few days were devoted to reconnoitring to the north and west; to destroying towers and villages belonging to the principal Rabia Khel offenders, Makhmuddin and his associates; to improving the Saifaldarra road over the Samana; to sending away the sick under escort of such troops (5th Punjab Cavalry and 5th Punjab Infantry) as could now be spared and whose removal from the Khanki Valley would make the strain on the Commissariat Department less severe; and, finally, to the laying in of supplies for a projected march into the Shekhan country, and for the garrison to be left at Gwada.

The weather hitherto had been as a rule had. The field force had crossed the frontier in rain which soon turned into snow, the result being that frost-bite and chest complaints began to attack the troops.

VI. On the 4th February the towers of Gwada were blown up, and the Second Column, under Colonel Turner, marched down the Khanki Valley for the Shekhan country. This column had been joined by the second half of No. 5 Company, Bengal Sappers and Miners, and a half battalion of the 23rd Pioneers, whilst the 3rd Sikh Infantry was added to replace the 5th Punjab Infantry.

The route followed was—4th February, Khaori; 5th, Mir Asghar Mela; 6th, Drand. Three miles short of Drand word was brought to the column that Makhmuddin's family and cattle had just left the village, going westwards. Parties were sent in pursuit by the two western

routes (towards Torsamatz and Daradar respectively), but returned without success in the evening. The people and cattle had in reality had many hours' start. An extra fine of Rs. 500 was placed on the village for having harboured them, and the inhabitants were told that their tower should be blown up if the fine were not paid by noon on the following day.

On the 7th February security for the amount of the fine was given before noon, when the return march of the column began. No Shekhan

towers, therefore, were destroyed.

The Second Column reached Shahu Khel on the 8th, and Hangu on the following day.

VII. On the 9th Colonel Brownlow marched from Shahu Khel to Barmarai with—

Two guns of No. 3 (Peshawar) Mountain

No. 5 Company Bengal Sappers and Miners. 22nd (Punjab) Bengal Infantry (from Kohat). 23rd Bengal Infantry (Pioneers).

3rd Sikh Infantry.

On the 10th he crossed the Zara Pass (4,450 feet above the sea), and encamped in the Mastura Valley, near the village of Zara, whose inhabitants belong to the Sipah section, and were friendly. The sappers and pioneers worked hard at the road all day, but snow fell from noon until dark, and mules could with difficulty keep their footing on the north slope, where the path soon became a slide.

The march from Barmarai had begun at 11.80 A.m., and although the entire distance was but five miles, and although every available man was placed on baggage guard, the last of the baggage did not reach Zara until 5 A.m. next day (11th), the rear guard with commissariat stores arriving at 1.30 P.M.

Early in the morning of the 10th two reconnoitring parties, consisting of three and two companies of infantry, had been sent across the Zara Pass with orders to go as far as possible into the eastern and western defiles respectively from Zara,—the first leading to the Bazoti settlements and the Ublan Pass, the latter to the Sturi Khel settlements.

The reconnaissance was in each case unopposed,

and information of value was obtained.

The Sturi Khel had, just before the column crossed the pass into their country, given security for the payment of the fine imposed on them, so that no punitive measures were necessary in respect of that section. It was all the same necessary to visit their valley, and accordingly a detachment was marched as far as the western limit of Sturi Khel territory. The valley was all under snow, and the people were in their villages.

VIII. Before leaving Gwada with the Second Column, I had ordered the First Column to march on the 5th February for Darband via Shahu Khel, leaving a garrison at Gwada of two guns of No. 4 (Hazara) Mountain Battery and the 1st Punjab Infantry, under Colonel Howell, in an entrenched camp. At Darband Colonel Bruce was to have the Samana Range between Tsalai and Mastan thoroughly examined and reported on. He was at the same time to furnish covering parties for road-makers employed by the Executive Engineer on the latter's requisition. Similarly, Colonel Turner on reaching Hangu from the Shekhan country was ordered to have the range from Lakka to Tsalai examined and reported on, and he also was to furnish covering parties on the Executive Engineer's requisition. All this was done. Samana from Lakka to Mastan has been

thoroughly examined, and the communications have already been improved by civil labour.

IX. On the 16th February I moved field force head-quarters to Kohat.

X. On the 18th the 29th Bengal Infantry was ordered to march across the Samana to Gwada, and, with the exception of the troops at that place, the field force was recalled to Kohat, and finally broken up on the 1st March.

XI. I trust that the valuable work of Major Leigh, my political adviser, may be favourably regarded by the Government of India, and that the services of his assistants may also be re-

cognized.

XII. Commanders and Staff Officers did their work well in every respect, and I have the honour to commend to the favourable notice of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief in India the following officers:—

From Major-General W. Galbraith, C.B., 'Adjutant-General in India, to the Secretary to the Government of India, Military Department.

I HAVE the honour, by direction of the Commander-in-Chief, to submit, for the information of the Government of India, a despatch from Brigadier-General Sir W. S. A. Lockhart, K.C.B., C.S.I., describing the operations of the Miranzai Field Force under his command in April and May, 1891.

2. As recently as last February the Orakzais had pledged themselves to maintain peace on the border, but on the 4th April they treacherously attacked some guards of the 29th Bengal Infantry employed in covering working parties.

3. Orders were at once issued for the concentration of a punitive force at Kohat, and General Lockhart, who was with the Reserve Brigade of the Hazara Field Force, was directed to assume command.

4. Arriving at Kohat on the 7th April he completed his preparations with the greatest expedition, and on the 17th and 18th attacked and drove the enemy with loss from strongly held positions on the Samana Range, following up his advantage with a series of successful actions, which speedily reduced the hostile tribes to submission.

5. The Commander-in-Chief feels that he cannot speak too highly of the energy and skill displayed by General Lockhart, and the endurance and gallantry of the troops under his command. Not only was immediate opposition crushed by the vigour and celerity of the movements of the force, but a formidable combination of the most powerful frontier tribes was effectually checked, and the conduct of operations has left an impression which His Excellency feels confident will tend to the establishment of security and friendly relations on the Miranzai border.

6. A list of officers recommended for special reward will be submitted separately.

Dated Camp Mastan, 8th June, 1891. From Brigadier-General Sir W. S. A. Lockhart, K.C.B., C.S.I., to the Adjutant-General in

- I HAVE the honour to make the following report on the operations against the Orakzai tribes carried out by the force under my command for the information of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief in India.
- 2. On the withdrawal of the troops at the termination of the previous expedition against the Orakzai Samil clans in February last, the 29th Bengal Infantry, subsequently reinforced by a wing of the 3rd Sikh Infantry, was left to cover the working parties making roads and posts on the Samana. On the 4th April a treacherous and unexpected attack was made on the guards furnished by the 29th Bengal Infantry. These were promptly reinforced from below, and fighting took place all along the Samana Range between Tsalai and Gulistan. Our losses during the day were 14 men killed and 7 wounded, all of the 29th Bengal Light Infantry. The enemy consisted of men of all the Orakzai tribes of the Khanki Valley, and were under the leadership of Zaman Shah, Rabia Khel. On the 5th April it was found necessary to evacuate Tsalai, the only post on the Samana still held by our troops, the enemy following up as far as the low hills near Darband.
- 3. On the morning of the 6th reinforcements began to arrive from Kohat, and on the evening of the following day I arrived myself at that station, and assumed command of the field force. Further reinforcements were meanwhile being pushed up from India as quickly as possible, the 6th Punjab Infantry marching from Bannu to Kohat, 80 miles, in as many hours, and No. 5 Company, Bengal Sappers and Miners, covering the 56 miles from Khushalgarh to Hangu in in 40 hours. There was some delay, however, in pushing on the troops beyond Kohat, as transport and supplies had to be collected from a distance. On the 9th the detachment at Baliamin was withdrawn to the camp near Darband, and an attack was made on that camp on the night of the 10th, but was beaten off without loss on our side, and the enemy did not subsequently venture down from the crest of the Samana.

4. The orders given to me were "to clear the Samana Range of the enemy, put down the hostile coalition of the tribes, and protect the working parties making the proposed roads and posts.

5. By the 16th April the whole force as per margin, divided into three columns had been

concentrated at Hangu and Darband.

At the former place there were also the 19th Bengal Lancers (471 of all ranks), two squadrons of the 5th Punjab Cavalry (311 of all ranks), and three guns of the Punjab Garrison Battery (47 of all ranks).

6. I advanced in the following manner on the morning of the 17th:-

The First Column, accompanied by myself and

the field force head-quarters, marched from Hangu at daybreak, and reached the foot of the range at 6 A.M. This column was accompanied. by three guns of the Punjab Garrison Battery, which, with the guns of No. 3 Mountain Battery, Royal Artillery, took up a position to cover the advance on Lakka. The cavalry, under Colonel Biscoe, 19th Bengal Lancers, consisting of two squadrons of the 5th Punjab Cavalry and the 19th Bengal Lancers, acting as escort to the The advance up to the crest was then carried out, and Lakka was reached at 8.30 A.M. without opposition. From here I heliographed to the Second Column to advance to the Darband Kotal. This column had been ordered to make a false attack to distract the enemy's attention should he have attempted to hold Lakka. At the same time that the Second Column advanced, I ordered the Third Column, which was also at Darband, to move rapidly to Pat Darband and ascend to the crest at Sangar.

7. These orders having been given, I continued my advance along the crest from Lakka, meeting the Second Column at Darband Kotal. column I strengthened by the 27th Bengal Infantry, and Lieutenant-Colonel Turner was ordered to descend to Gwada by the Saifaldarra road. This road, as well as that on the crest near the Darband Kotal, was found to have been broken up by the enemy. From the kotal I continued the advance, at 11 A.M., along the crest, with the First Column, towards Tsalai. That place was found to be occupied by the enemy, who opened fire on the troops as they advanced. I accordingly ordered up the guns of No. 3 Mountain Battery, Royal Artillery, and under their fire the place was assaulted and captured at 12.30 P.M., the King's Royal Rifles leading the attack. During this operation Colonel Cramer; commanding the King's Royal Rifles, and Major Egerton, Assistant Adjutant-General, were both severely wounded. Besides these casualties, the King's Royal Rifles had one man dangerously, one severely, and two slightly wounded; and Major Egerton's orderly, a lance-duffadar of the

3rd Punjab Cavalry, was also severely wounded.
8. I next carried Gogra and Sangar without further loss, and reached the latter place at two P.M., simultaneously with the Third Column; advancing up the Pat Darband Spur. This column was opposed during its advance, but succeeded in inflicting some loss on the enemy without any casualties to itself. On reaching Sangar, I decided to bivouse there for the night, as the enemy were reported to be holding Sartop in strength, and the men were completely knocked up by the intense heat and the want of water. They, however, behaved admirably, and only one man fell out during the day. In the meanwhile the Second Column had established itself at Gwada, which is immediately below Sangar and in sight of it. Lieutenant-Colonel Turner had, however, to fight his way, and lost one man killed and four wounded-one dangerously. The cavalry had also moved round by Shahu Khel after the First Column had gained the crest at Lakka, and advanced up the Khanki Valley and joined hands with Lieutenant-Colonel Turner. On the Second Column reaching the Khanki at Saifaldarra, the cavalry returned to Hangu by the Darband Kotal. They were fired on during the day, but suffered no loss. The position of my force on the evening of the 17th was therefore as follows:-The First and Third Columns holding the crest at Saugar, and the Second Column in the Khanki Valley at Grada.

9. A seven o'clock on the morning of the 18th

I advanced along the crest from Sangar towards Sartop, which was held by the enemy. advance was covered by the fire of the guns of No. 3 Mountain Battery, Royal Artillery, and the three guns of No. 2 (Derajat) Mountain Battery. The Third Column advanced straight along the crest, the First Column moving round by the left, and attacking the enemy's position from that flank. The village was cleared of the enemy at eight A.M. by the 1st and 6th Punjab Infantry, leading their respective columns. Our loss in the attack was one mun killed and one officer (Lieutenant Patch, Royal Artillery) and seven men wounded. After the enemy had been driven off and the place occupied by our troops, I ordered a halt to be made at the spring below Sartop to enable the troops to get water, as some of them had been 24 hours without it, and they were exhausted by the heat of the sun.

10. At 11 A.M. I continued the advance, and occupied the Mastan plateau after slight opposition, entailing no loss. This plateau is the key of the Samana Range, and I left the Third Column to occupy it, the First Column returning to Sungar. I ordered the Second Column also to move to Sangar to take the place of the Third Column in order to simplify the question of supplies previous to a further advance. column on the 18th had been employed in destroying the tower and defences of the Rabia Khel village of Dzond. During that day they lost one man killed and five men wounded, — four

11. In carrying out the above operations, the troops underwent severe hardships and fatigue in a spirited and cheerful manner. The young soldiers of the King's Royal Rifles, fresh to this country, suffered especially from heat and thirst,

but showed great endurance.

.12. On the evening of the 19th Lieutenant-Colonel Brownlow reported that he was suffering annoyance from large bodies of the enemy who had collected in the neighbourhood of his camp, and during that day and the following night he lost one native officer and two men killed, and one officer, one native officer, and three men wounded. Early on the morning of the 2 th I sent reinforcements from Sangar to Mastan, consisting of the Peshawar Mountain Battery, the King's Royal Rifles, the 2nd Punjab Infantry, and the 5th Gurkha Regiment, with orders to Lieutenant-Colonel Brownlow to attack and disperse the enemy. That officer, having made good dispositions, advanced against the enemy's position about 2 P.M. The main attack on the village of Saragarhi was carried out by the King's Royal Rifles and the 5th Gurkha Regiment, and the enemy was soon flying in all directions, the Gurkhas getting to close quarters with them as they made off. Simultaneously with this attack the 6th Punjab and the 19th Bengal Infantry, under cover of the guns of the Derajat Mountain Battery, carried the village of Ghuztang, the enemy making no stand, but flying towards the Khanki. Some 60 dead bodies were left on the ground, and, from reports subsequently received, it appears that the enemy's losses amounted to nearly 300 killed and wounded. Our casualties were only one man of the King's Royal Rifles killed, and one officer and six men of other corps wounded. All sections of the Orakzai tribe were represented in this engagement, and the Akhel and Mamuzai were reported especially to have suffered.

13. On the 21st I advanced to Gulistan with the Second Column under Lieutenant - Colonel 27th Bengal Infantry, and on the following day I advanced into the Akhel (or Chagru) Valley. Retaining the guns and the 27th Bengal Infantry on the crest of the high hill overlooking the Akhel settlements, I sent the 1st Punjab Infantry along the ridge to the Chagru Kotal with orders to work down the valley, while the 2nd Punjab Infantry, followed by the 3rd Sikh Infantry, descended towards the Khanki, with orders to work up and meet the 1st Punjab Infantry. The enemy opened fire on the 1st Punjab Infantry as it advanced, but that regiment, aided by the guns on the crest, soon cleared out the villages in their The 2nd Punjab Infantry reached the bed of the Chagru Nala under cover of a spur running down from the crest, and surprised the enemy before they were able to escape, inflicting heavy punishment. This regiment then moved up the nala, covered by the 3rd Sikh Infantry on the right bank, and cleared cut the villages, destroying towers and defences. The enemy was prevented from following up by the fire of the guns, which I had moved to a point commanding the opposite side of the valley, and the troops returned to camp without molestation. Large bodies of tribesmen were seen about the hills and down in the valley, but these were dispersed by the fire of the guns and by Infantry Our losses during the day were one volleys. man killed and 13 wounded. The enemy was reported to have lost between 50 and 60 killed. .

14. On the morning of the 23rd a large gathering, with three standards, having collected near the village of Margharu, I moved out of camp to attack their position. Sangars had been erected at a point just beyond the village, and from here the enemy opened fire on the advancing troops, but after an engagement lasting kalf an hour the position was carried by the 15th (Sikh) Bengal Infantry, who led the attack, the enemy dispersing down the reverse slopes of the hill under a heavy artillery and infantry fire. I then ordered Lieutenant-Colonel Turner to move down the spur and destroy the tower and defences of the village of Talli, out of which the enemy had advanced with standards on the previous day. This was satisfactorily done, and the troops returned to camp without a shot being fired as they retired. Our losses during the day were one man killed and one native officer and five men wounded. A strong contingent of Afridis fought in the ranks of the enemy on this occasion, but after the action they, as well as the Akhel and Ali Khel, sent me a message asking if I would receive their deputations. Permission having been granted, jirgas arrived in camp on the 21th and were received by Major Leigh, who however, reported that they were in no sense representative of their tribes.

15. Meanwhile the punishment of the Rabia Khel continued. On the 21st Lieutenant-Colonel Brownlow blew up the towers of the Ibrahim Khel hamlets, and on the 23rd a small column under Lieutenant - Colonel Reid, 29th Bengal Infantry, destroyed the defences of Bazai.

16. The post at Chilibagh was fired into on the night of the 22nd, and an attack was made on the morning of the 23rd upon a convoy near the Darband Kotal, in which we lost four men killed and three wounded, and at the same time. a number of mules were killed, others being carried off. I therefore determined to move a column into the country of the Shekhan and Mamazai (Daradar), as those tribes were principally concerned in the above attacks. Accordingly, on the Turner, reinforced by the 1st Punjab and the 27th, I marched to Hanga, where the First

Sym, C.B., was concentrated on the 28th. On the following day I advanced with this column to Mir Asghar Mela, and on the 30th I reached Dran, the head-quarters of the Shekhan tribe. This village was occupied after slight opposition, one sepoy being wounded. The towers of the villages of Laghardarra and Dran were all blown up, and the force advanced on the 1st May to the Kharai Kotal. On the way I was met by the jirgas of the Samil clans, but declined to receive them until all Government property in their possession should have been restored. On the 2nd May I advanced to Starkili (generally called Daradar), the principal village of the Mamazai (Daradar). From here I detached a column, consisting of the 1st Punjab and the 27th Bengal Infantry, to visit Torsmatz and Takhtak, belonging to the Shekhan tribe, the towers of which were blown up, as also the tower of the village of Nakatta on the pass between those places. On this day fourteen of the rifles taken from the 29th Bengal Infantry were brought in to me. May I returned to Sangar, destroying en route the towers of Daradar, Miru Khel, and Adu Garhi, belonging to the Mamazai (Daradar), and the towers of Inzaur, the property of Zaman Shah, Rabia Khel, the principal instigator of the recent outbreak.

17. On the 5th May a half-battalion of the Manchester Regiment, which I had ordered up from Kohat, arrived at Mastan. Mr. Udny, the Peshawar Commissioner, also arrived on the same date at my invitation. I advanced to Gulistan on the 6th, and on the following day the jirgas of all the Samil clans-Rabia Khel, Mishti, Shekhan, Malla Khel, and Mamazai (Daradar)—came into camp, bringing with them the Government property in their possession. Their attitude was thoroughly submissive, and they expressed their readiness to accept all my conditions relative to the Samana, acknowledging our right to build posts on the crest, and undertaking to pay revenue for all lands possessed by them on the southern side of the range.

18. As, however, the Mishti clan had not received any punishment for their share in the outbreak, the Samil jurgas were informed that I intended to destroy the towers of Kandi Mishti, and they were directed to accompany me to witness the punishment. I therefore advanced on the 10th May, taking with me the troops as per margint under Lieutenant-Colonel Turner, and following the route by the Akhel Valley to Karappa. The Akhel, who had previous to this made their submission, were all back in their villages. From Karappa I advanced the same day to Kandi Mishti and blew up its towers without opposition, thus clearing off all accounts with the Samil clans. On returning in the evening to Karappa, I found the jirgas of the Ali Khel, Mamuzai, and Alisherzai sections awaiting me. These Gar clans were informed that I intended to visit their country, and that if any opposition were offered they should receive severe punishment. I accordingly advanced to Sadarai, a Khadizai village, on the 12th, and the following day to Khanki Bazar, the head-quarters

Column, troops as per margin,* under Colonel of the Mamuzai, passing en route Starkili, the principal village of the Alisherzai. From Khanki Bazar I ascended to the crest of the pass between the Khanki and Kurmana valleys. No opposition was offered throughout the day. The survey of the country being completed, I left Khanki Bazar on the 14th and returned to the Samana on the 15th May, and there received the Daulatzai and Sturi Khel jirgas, which had been summoned to meet me. Their attitude was satisfactory; and as there were no cases outstanding against them, their jirgas were dismissed.

19. I am thus in a position to report that the work entrusted to me is finished. The tribes who opposed us on the Samana have been punished, their countries have been visited, and they have all submitted and accepted the terms imposed upon them. The construction of roads and posts is now being rapidly pushed on, and, until these shall have been completed, a force consisting of one native mountain battery and three native infantry battalions should, in my

opinion, be kept on the Samana.

20. I forward herewith a map, showing the routes followed by the force; also a detail of staff and troops,* and a return of casualties.

21. The conduct of all ranks of the field force under my command has been admirable as regards discipline, and also as regards the cheerful endurance of fatigue, exposure, and hardship generally.

22. I have the honour to bring to the special notice of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief in India the services of the following officers:-

Major C. C. Egerton, 3rd Punjab Cavalry, Assistant Adjutant-General, was wounded on the 17th April, and I was thus deprived of a Staff Officer of exceptional ability, whose services during the Miranzai expedition of January and February last I have already brought to notice. He was invaluable to me during the concentration of the field force and its advance to the Samana. I have never known a better Staff Officer.

Major V. Jenkins, West Riding Regiment, succeeded Major Egerton as Assistant Adjutant-General, and joined me at Sangar on the 20th April. During the subsequent operations I have found him all that a Staff Officer should be.

Captain D. W. Hickman, 34th Bengal Infantry Pioneers), Deputy-Assistant Adjutant-General, has been with me throughout. He is a most

capable and energetic officer.

Captain A. H. Mason, Royal Engineers, has a second time this year been my Deputy-Assistant Quartermaster-General for Intelligence in the Orakzai country. This talented officer is an expert as regards frontier tribes and topography, and I attribute a great deal of my success to the accurate information he has always been able to give me on those points. In any other field his clear head and sound judgment would make him conspicuously valuable.

Lieutenant-Colonel E. J. de Lautour, Royal Artillery, commanded the artillery of the field

force to my complete satisfaction.

Major J. D. Cunningham was the senior Royal Artillery officer previous to Lieutenannt-Colonel de Lautour's arrival at field force head-quarters on the 18th April, and commanded that arm during the capture of the Samana. The high opinion I have formed of this officer is endorsed by Lieutenant-Colonel de Lautour in his report submitted separately.

Major W. T. Shone, D.S.O., Commanding Royal Engineer, has for the second time this year admirably filled that post under my

command in the Orakzai country. I could not wish for a more able Commanding Engineer in the field.

Lieutenant H. F. Kays, Highland Light Infantry, has superintended the signalling of the force since its concentration. The management of this important service has left nothing to be desired. I wish to record here my high appreciation of the work done by all ranks of signallers, who have been by far the hardest worked men in the field force.

Brigade-Surgeon R. Harvey, M.D., Indian Medical Service, has for the second time this year been my Principal Medical Officer in the field, and I again desire to expresss my indebtedness to him and to the other officers of the department which he has so ably conducted for the admirable state of efficiency in which it has been maintained, often under very unfavourable conditions.

Captain E. C. C. Sandys, Staff Corps, Chief Commissariat Officer, has, as on the occasion of the first Miranzai expedition this year, given me complete satisfaction. Thanks to him and his subordinate officers, the troops have wanted for nothing in spite of many difficulties.

Captain H. Wharry, Staff Corps, Divisional Transport Officer, has likewise for the second time this year proved himself a thoroughly efficient

officer of his department.

Captain R. J. H. L. Mackenzie, Royal Engineers has satisfactorily conducted the survey work of the expedition. He has been successful in extending the survey of the Orakzai country to the Tsappar Range, south of Tirah, and to the Marghan Pass between the Khanki and Kurmana Valleys, thus completing the excellent work of Captain Wahab, Royal Engineers, whose name I brought to notice at the end of the last expedition.

Lieutenant the Honourable C. G. Bruce, 5th Gurkha Regiment, my orderly officer in the Hazara Field Force, accompanied me in the same capacity to the Miranzai Valley, but I regret that ill-health prevented him taking part in the capture of the Samana. He rejoined his regiment at his own request, and was present with it in the subsequent operations.

Lieutenant G. P. Brasier Creagh, 9th Bengal Lancers, who began as extra orderly officer, succeeded Lieutenant the Honourable C. G. Bruce, and has been my very efficient orderly officer throughout. He was present at every engagement

on the Samana.

Captain O. S. W. Nugent, King's Royal Rifles, succeeded Lieutenant Brasier Creagh as my extra orderly officer. A keen and excellent officer, he has been of much assistance to me.

Colonel J. M. Sym, C.B., 5th Gurkha Regiment, commanded the First Column, and maintained his reputation as a good soldier in the field. His ability and war experience have always made me feel that any work entrusted to him would be thoroughly and satisfactorily carried out.

thoroughly and satisfactorily carried out.

Lieutenant-Colonel A. H. Turner, 2nd Punjab Infantry, who commanded the Second Column, I have already had the honour to bring to favourable notice for his services in January and February last. He is an officer of great resource and dash, and I am glad the Government of India has shown its confidence in him by nominating him to command the Samana Posts until the final reduction of the garrison.

Lieutenant-Colonel C. C. Brownlow, 4th Sikh Infantry, I also mentioned favourably at the close of the last expedition. He has again done excellent service, and by the good disposition of his

troops at Mastan on the 20th April, he inflicted heavier loss on the enemy than the latter has sustained in any other engagement.

Colonel W. W. Biscoe, 19th Bengal Lancers, has commanded the cavalry of the field force throughout, rendering valuable service during the first advance, when he co-operated in the Khanki Valley, and since then on the communications along the southern base of the Samana.

I beg also to mention Lieutenant-Colonel W. J. Vousden, V.C., 5th Punjab Cavalry, who commanded the cavalry in January and February, and has again done good service in command of his regiment.

23. In a separate letter I shall have the honour to submit reports by column commanders and heads of departments. I endorse the favourable mention therein made of the following officers:—

24. His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor of the Punjab had suggested to me that the presence of Mr. R. Udny, Commissioner and Superintendent, Peshawar Division, might be advantageous when discussing matters in which tribes other than Orakzai should be involved. I readily accepted the suggestion, and invited Mr. Udny to join me, which he did at Mastan on the 5th May. His presence at once cleared away difficulties which had threatened to interrupt my programme; measures were adopted for allaying the suspicions of the Afridis as to our intentions with regard to Tirah, and I was enabled to visit the Mamuzai and Alisherzai countries without producing any external complications. Mr. Udny accompanied me, and I wish to record my sense of the great public service he rendered in a difficult and delicate situation.

25. In March last I expressed the hope that Major H. P. P. Leigh's services during January and February might be favourably regarded by the Government of India, and that the services rendered by his assistants, Lieutenant C. M. Dallas and Messrs. F. B. R. Spencer and D. Donald, might also be recognized. Major Leigh has again been my political adviser throughout the recent operations, and again I desire to record my sense of the great value of his work. His intimate knowledge of border matters and his talent in dealing with the tribes seem to fit him pre-eminently for a responsible position on the frontier, and to point to his advancement being for the public good. Lieutenant Dallas has been selected to remain as civil officer on the Samana after the reduction of the garrison. He has again proved himself a most capable officer, and I am sure that his selection is a good one. Messrs. Spencer and Donald have also again assisted Major Leigh, and have in all respects upheld the good opinion I formed of them during the operations at the beginning of the present year. I trust that the native gentlemen mentioned by Major Leigh may receive the recognition of Government for the loyal assistance they have given him.
26. The Telegraph Department under Mr.

O. Burne, Assistant Superintendent, was thoroughly efficient in the field, and I quite agree in the terms of commendation employed by him with regard to those working under him in the report which I submit separately.*

27. Mr. A. Bean, of the Postal Department, carried on his duties to my satisfaction.

· 28. The excellent work done by the Public Works Department under Mr. W. Macdonald, Executive Engineer, especially in the matter of road-making, merits my warm acknowledgments.
